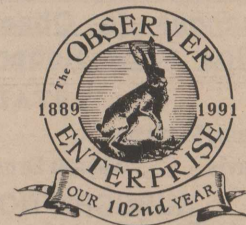

RL Homecoming activities detailed

The annual "Orange and Black" Robert Lee Homecoming is set for Friday, October 18.

Opening activity of the Homecoming each year is the Thursday night bonfire and pep rally behind the school. Since the Jr. High will be playing in Sterling City that night, it will begin immediately after they return Thursday night.

According to Student Council advisor Kenneth Rasco, the theme for the downtown parade will be "Wild, Wild West."

School will be dismissed at 2 pm and the parade will begin downtown in the courthouse vicinity at 2:30. New parade rules this year prohibit golf carts, go-carts, or 3-wheelers from running freely through the procession for safety's sake. These vehicles may participate as an entry or group by staying together in line with other floats, however. Parade entries may call Mrs. Baker, 453-2333, at the school to enter.

A rousing pep rally at the gymnasium will follow the parade after its arrival at the school.

The Homecoming football game will pit the Steers against the Sterling City Eagles at 7:30 pm. Student roy-

alty for the event will be announced at half-time after their selection by secret ballot by the student body.

The West Coke County Community Development will sponsor the after-the-game activities. Co-chairs for the two events are Doug and Debbie Wilkes. A reception, free to the public, will be held in the Rec Hall. It will be highlighted by various refreshments, visitation, and tables set up for "42" domino games. Chips, dips, cookies, and coffee will be served.

Scheduled to perform at a concert and dance from 10

pm - 1 am is Prairie Fire, partially made up of Robert Lee natives, including ex-students Buddy Wallace, Richard Long, Scot Long, Matt Wilson, and friend Kirk Williamson. Clay Bloodworth of Silver will serve as lighting technician.

The concert and dance will be in the county showbarn. Admission has been set at \$5 per person, children 12 and under \$1. Children under 12 must be accompanied by a parent.

Evening services are October 13-16 at 7 pm each night.

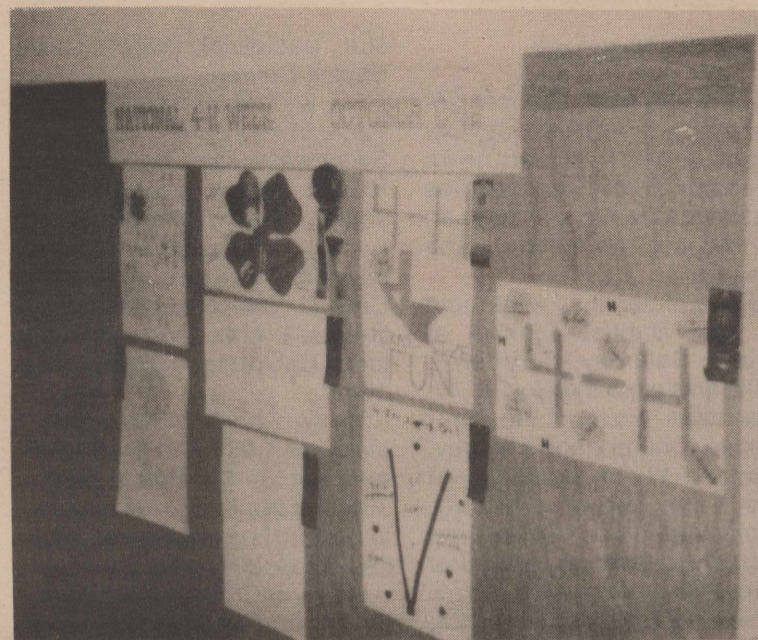
Leading the services will be Evangelist Robert R. Welch of Longview and Mark and Doretta Tolar from Pioneer

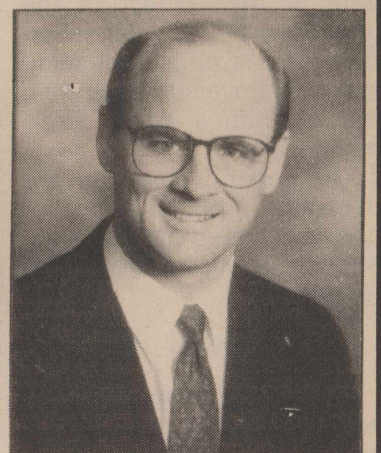

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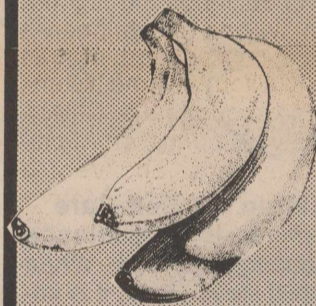

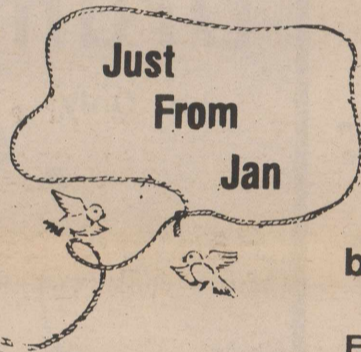

Children In Self-Care

All children experience fears during childhood. When your child stays alone, it is important for the two of you to talk about any fears your child may have so you can help her or him cope with them.

It is easier to deal with fears if they are specific, so encourage your child to name each situation he or she is afraid of.

Fear can be a useful emotion that protects children from danger and harm. Sometimes, however, children are afraid of things that are not really dangerous. Help your child recognize the difference between real dangers such as fire, possible dangers such as a stranger at the door and imaginary dangers such as a foreign spy who will blow up your house.

People are less fearful if they feel prepared. Talk with your child about what to do when faced with real and possible dangers. Generally in the case of real danger, your child should stay calm, get out of danger, and if possible, get help. Stress that, in case of a fire, your child must not try to put it out and must leave the home quickly.

In the case of possible danger, your child should be careful and follow the safety rules you have discussed.

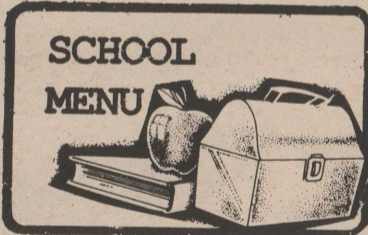
Your child is more likely to remember what to do in different situations if she or he actually has gone through the motions ahead of time.

Therefore, in addition to talking with your child, it is also important to have your child practice the steps to take when faced with real or possible danger.

Fear of imaginary dangers is common in childhood. Keep in mind that your child's fear is real, even if the danger is not. Reassure your child that the feared situation will not happen or that the feared object is not dangerous.

Sometimes fear of imaginary dangers results from loneliness or boredom. Sometimes it is a sign of stress. You may be able to help your child feel safer by helping him or her find activities to keep busy. Being able to talk to you about the fears when you get home also may help.

Please note that if your child has intense fears about being alone, it is best for her or him not to stay alone until the fear can be resolved. Intense fear of staying home alone is a sign that your child is not ready for self-care.

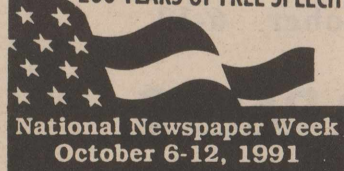

Stenholm amends release

Congressman Charles Stenholm (D-TX) today announced that on several occasions he did unknowingly have insufficient funds at the House of Representatives Bank during the 101st Congress.

Stenholm issued a statement to correct a September 25 press release where he stated he did not think he had overextended his account.

"I first stated (because I believed it to be correct) that I had not had any overdrafts at the House Bank. But upon careful review of my account at the bank, I have found that I have, in fact, on several occasions, made errors in the timing of transfers of funds between the three banks in which I maintain accounts with

resulting overdrafts.

"I was shocked, to say the least, when I reviewed my account and embarrassed completely that in my own way I have added to the negative attitude expressed by the people toward the Congress. I accept my share of the blame for permitting, as well as contributing to, a story that sheds bad light on the Congress.

"I am in total agreement with the new policy announced by Speaker Foley," states Stenholm.

Last week, Foley announced that, effective immediately, overdrafts will be assessed a service charge and that no checks drawn against a House Bank account with insufficient funds will be honored.

Pulse obituary published

[Editor's Note: The following obituary appeared in a Dallas newspaper.]

Dr. Terry L. Pulse of Dallas, Texas, beloved son, brother, uncle, and friend, died unexpectedly of a heart attack in Rome, Italy, on September 29, 1991, while on an extensive European vacation.

Dr. Pulse was born in Lubbock, Texas, October 24, 1950, and grew up in Pampa, Texas. In the summer of 1968, he studied at the University of Strasbourg in France. He attended Pampa schools, where he was active in band, art, and was a straight "A" student from elementary through high school. He graduated from Pampa High School with honors, third in a class of 454 in May, 1969. While in high school, he served as president of both the Latin Club and French Club and was secretary of Key Club International.

He attended TCU in Fort Worth in 1969-70, and West Texas State University in Canyon from 1970-73. He graduated with a Bachelor of Science degree on May 12,

1973. He attended the University of Texas Medical Branch in Galveston, Texas, and earned his M. D. on May 27, 1978. His internship and residency was in Family Practice at St. Paul Hospital in Dallas from 1978 through 1980. He did a psychiatric residency at Southwestern Medical School in Dallas from 1980 through 1982. From 1982 until his death, he was a member of the American College of Emergency Physicians.

He served as County Health Officer in Coke County from 1984 to 1986. He was also Chief of Staff at West Coke County Hospital in Robert Lee and the Bronte Family Practice Emergency Services in Bronte.

He maintained a Family Practice in Grand Prairie which he was in the process of selling at the time of his death in order to pursue his first love - research.

He was on the Utilization Review Committee, DFW Medical Center in Grand Prairie as well as being an active staff member and was on the Infectious Control Committee and Pharmacy and Therapeutic Committee. He was a member of the American Medical Association, the Texas Medical Association, Dallas Medical Society, and has been a clinical investigator for numerous pharmaceutical companies, and an active AIDS researcher for the past several years.

Dr. Pulse attended the First International Conference on the Global Impact of AIDS in London, England, March 8-10, 1988. He and two other physicians presented a study, "An Extended Clinical Pilot Study using Aceman (ACE-M) in HIV patients. Dr. Pulse was a published medical researcher, in addition to numerous articles, papers and books, both medically and commercially. He was an accomplished musician and artist.

He is survived by his mother, Ernestyne J. Pulse of Pampa, who was his guest in Rome at the time of his death, the vacation being a special birthday present; five brothers, Harrison Lee Haslam, Pasadena, California, Randy H. Pulse, Jacksonville, Florida, Charles H. Pulse, Corpus Christi, Clifford E. Pulse, Pampa, Bryan A. Pulse, White Deer; and two sisters, Lynn Pierce, Sugarland, and Cindy Pulse-Ellis, of the home. He is also survived by seventeen nieces and nephews.

Services were held at 2 pm Monday, October 7, 1991, at the Church of Incarnation Episcopal in Dallas.

"His everlasting love knew no bounds. He was a devoted son, brother, uncle, friend, and physician, and to have known this dear man was to have loved and respected him. He enriched the lives of all who knew him, and we should not grieve his passing, but celebrate the life he lived on this earth. He lived life to the fullest every day, and we can be assured Heaven is richer by one more beautiful angel."

Organism causes pneumonia cases

A recently identified organism has been found to be one of the top five causes of infectious pneumonia worldwide, but most physicians are unaware of it.

Chlamydia pneumonia, unrelated to the similarly named sexually transmitted disease, has the same symptoms as many other respiratory infections, said Dr. B. Rusty Lang, a research associate at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston, but it requires different treatment.

"Penicillin will not help," Lang said. "Patients need a high dose of tetracycline or erythromycin for at least two weeks. Even then, incomplete cures and relapses are common."

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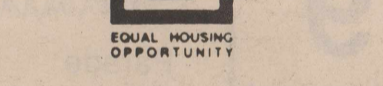

Most annual winter grasses and weeds that plague lawns in late winter and early spring are ready to germinate now. The best way to stop them in the lawn is to apply a pre-emergence herbicide promptly, before their seeds germinate.

One of the worst pest plants that needs to be targeted now is henbit -- a common lawn invader that brightens up the lawn with blue, but seldom-appreciated, blossoms in late winter and early spring. Winter grasses, including winter rye, also germinate now. Most of our most beautiful spring wildflowers also sprout in the fall and need to be targeted now if they are considered to be "weeds" in a well-manicured lawn.

Pre-emergence herbicides are chemicals that kill weed seedlings as they germinate. They are ineffective against weeds and grasses once they grow beyond the seedling stage. Apply a pre-emergent herbicide as a uniform, broadcast treatment to problem areas of the lawn. At least 1/2 inch of water -- irrigation or rain -- is needed after application to move the herbicide into the soil where it is activated.

Labeled pre-emergence herbicides for lawns include XL, Betasan, Balan, and Princep. All of these materials will do a reasonably good job of stopping winter weeds and grasses if applied accurately and in time.

All of these herbicides are

available in granular formulations while Betasan, Princep, and other pre-emergence herbicides labeled for lawn use also are formulated for spray application. Most home gardeners can do a more accurate job by using a granular formulation and broadcasting it as they would fertilizer. Spray application of a pre-emergence herbicide should be attempted only if you have a sprayer that is capable of applying a uniform, blanket spray. The sprayer also must be accurately calibrated.

Read and follow herbicide label directions carefully. Under application can result in no weed control while over application may risk damage to the lawn.

Remember that pre-emergence herbicides cannot distinguish "good seed" from "bad seed." Do not use them in a lawn or garden where herbicide breakdown varies. Balan deteriorates rapidly and seed can be planted within two months after application, while XL deteriorates slowly and can prevent seed germination as long as a year after application.

PALs attend San Angelo Retreat

The Bronte High School PAL's (Peer Assistance Leadership) spent last Wednesday, October 3, at the Presbyterian Lake Facility in San Angelo at a PAL Retreat. Other schools attending were Water Valley, Irion County, and Wall.

The day was spent learning through fun group activities. The main objective for the retreat was to bring PALs together to review PAL, group experiences, sharing ideas, and having fun doing it.

PAL was started at Bronte High School last year. Its main objective is to grow and learn through the helping process and to let students know they are there to help in many ways such as listening, tutoring, and helping kids have someone older to look up to in many ways.

The students go through 6-8 weeks of training and then go into the elementary classes for 3 days each week for a class period.

The Bronte PALs have been chosen to do a presentation to middle school students in Austin on November 2. The presentation is an introduction to PAL using the ever popular Teenage Mutant Ninja Turtles. We will have more details on this at a later date.

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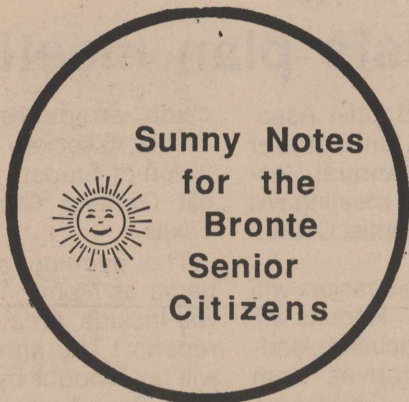
