# "Early" special election voting continues

Absentee voting (now called "early voting" by Secretary of State John Hannah, Jr.) began on Wednesday, October 16, and will continue through November 1. Any eligible voter may vote early in the office of County and District Clerk Ettie Hubbard in Robert Lee during this period, 8 am - 5 pm, Monday through Friday.

On the November 5 Special

Election ballot, Texans statewide will consider 13 proposed constitutional amendments.

Perhaps the major proposals are Proposition 4 which deals with bond issues for prisons and mental health/retardation facilities; Proposition 11 authorizes a state lottery; and Proposition 13, providing issuance of bonds for college student

loans, an issue which was narrowly defeated in the August 10, 1991, election, possibly due to confusion in wording.

A number of the other proposals are significant and deal with points in changes of the law that bear study. Be an informed voter; read explanations of the proposed amendments by non-partisan voter groups.


Coordinated by Sheriff Marshall Millican, the first-ever event hosted a good number of teams, with roping continuing til well after dark.

# WCCCD to host barbecue

The Hunters Appreciation BBQ, sponsored annually by West Coke County Community Development, is set for Saturday, November 2, at the Rec Hall in Robert Lee. This year, the WCCCD has taken on the job of building new BBQ pits near the county stock barn and hope to finish before the big event November 2. New pits have been needed for years. Those who can help with this project could come to the park on Saturday, October 19.
