Precincts pull together to repair road

In early October, the four Coke County precincts began a joint venture to remedy an ongoing thorn in their side. The Rough Creek Road to Lake Spence down Exxon Road has washed out every time a rain of any size has fallen. The washout is on a steep narrow stretch that pours down a draw. The heavy rains the first 2 1/2 weeks of September ate a 25'

long drop, 11' deep, straight down beside the pavement. Past experience told the county commissioners it would do no good to fill it again.

Commissioner Paul Burns of Precinct I, knew of a project in Lake Spence Estates that didn't pan out, involving a railroad tank car with both ends cut out. It was 56' long, 10' in diameter, and weighed a

whopping 58,000 lbs. The county purchased the tank and hired two oilfield tandem trucks and a haul truck float to get it to the construction site.

Employees and commissioners from the four precincts have spent considerable work on the project cutting across the road, preparing an approach, and building a detour so that traffic to oilfield facilities and the lake would not be interrupted.

Burns estimates 60-70 yards of concrete will be used to partially cover the "tinhorn" and build slopes and a small spillway at the ends. Work also includes widening that stretch of Exxon Road which previously would not accommodate 2 cars. The job could be completed in 10 more working days, Burns said.

He added that another county-wide job has been worked in with the Exxon Road project. A few months ago, the county received a grant to install lights at the county airport. The county is doing the dirt work for that project to conserve funds.

Lee injured at Abilene

Martin Lee of Bronte was injured in a two vehicle crash Monday afternoon when a City of Abilene truck ran a red light and hit his truck at Maple and Industrial in Abilene.

Mr. Lee was trapped for 20 minutes before rescuers pried open his truck with the "Jaws of Life."

Officer Clayton Daniels of the Abilene Police Department said the city truck, which was hauling a tractor, was northbound on Maple and ran a red light about 6:45 pm Monday.

Daniels said the city truck caught the front end of Lee's

truck and carried it into the northwest ditch of the intersection where both came to a stop.

Due to the involvement of the city vehicle, formal charges will be delayed until the case goes through Justice of the Peace Court, Daniels said.

Lee was reported Monday night to have a dislocated hip and was in serious condition at Humana Hospital in Abilene.

Lee underwent surgery for a fractured hip Thursday morning and is in room 509 at Humana.

Driver assaulted east of Bronte

An assault and robbery incident on Monday about noon resulted in a delivery truck driver being treated at the emergency room in the local hospital in Ballinger. After treatment, he was released with minor lacerations.

A CaterVend truck driver was on Hwy 158 between Bronte and Ballinger when he observed a Hispanic woman in her late 20's standing with a young child near a car with its hood raised. He pulled over to offer assistance when three Hispanic males, also believed to be in their 20's, jumped from the vehicle and assaulted him. The assailants took several money bags from the truck, estimated to contain \$500, all in coins.

The driver traveled into Ballinger to report the robbery and was taken to the emergency room.

The victim could not pinpoint the exact location of the robbery which was originally thought to have occurred in Runnels County. Since it was

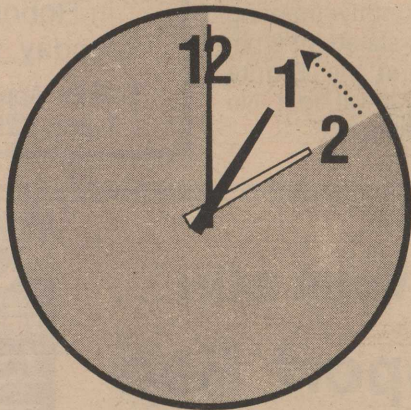

WCCCD to sponsor blood drive

The West Coke County Community Development will sponsor a community blood drive on Wednesday, November 6, 1991, from 12 noon to 6 pm at the courthouse in Robert Lee. The theme of this drive is "Give Thanks, Give Life, Give Blood!"

With the upcoming holidays fast approaching, the need for blood will be great. Donations can be anytime during that afternoon, but for your convenience, you can schedule an appointment by contacting Dee Anna Harmon at 453-2804.

In this area, 65 blood donations are needed each day to meet patients' needs. United Blood Services, the area's non-profit community blood provider, relies entirely on volunteer donors to maintain a constant, sufficient blood supply. Blood comes from only one source - healthy people who are willing to give of themselves. Many people are alive today because blood was available when they needed it.

"Donating blood is safe, simple and satisfying," says Paula Kennemer of United Blood Services. The body contains about 10-12 pints of blood and, since the body constantly manufactures blood, the amount given is quickly replaced. The donation process takes only about 30 minutes, with about five to seven minutes for the actual donation. Blood can be separated into components, so one donation may help several patients.

ASCS issuing CRP checks

The ASCS office has been busy lately preparing and writing CRP checks for producers who have CRP contracts in the county. The CRP program, administered by ASCS, takes highly erodible cropland out of agricultural production and places it in a conserving use state. The CRP land is put in grass in most cases with some acres planted in wildlife food plots.

The 1990 CRP program was further modified to better address environmentally sensitive cropland and to provide for more water quality. Program participants receive an annual rental payment with amounts dependent on a per acre rental rate and the number of acres under contract.

There are currently 72 CRP contracts totalling 8772.9 acres. For 1991, the office paid out \$342,361.00 to area farmers and ranchers who are participating in this program.

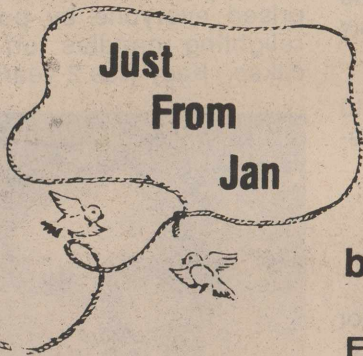

Halloween Safety

As part of the Safe Watch message, we present these Halloween safety tips, developed by the U. S. Consumer Product Commission:

- Make sure your children save all the treats they get until they get home, so that you can examine the carefully before they eat them.
- Buy or make costumes that are flame resistant. Flimsy materials and baggy outfits should be avoided to lessen the risk of contact with candles or other flames.
- Costumes should be light and bright enough to be visible to motorists. They can be decorated with reflective material or tape.
- Children should carry a flashlight to see and to be seen.
- Costumes should be short enough to prevent tripping.
- Hats and scarves should be tied securely so they don't slip and block the wearer's vision.
- A mask of cosmetics will be less restrictive and provide better vision. All masks should have eyeholes large enough to provide full vision.
- An adult should always accompany small children.
- Children should use the sidewalk, and walk from house to house.
- The homes children visit should have an outside light on or some other sign of welcome.
- Children should not enter a home unless accompanied by an adult.
- Children should avoid walking out from between parked cars, or running across lawns with clothes lines and ornaments.
- If you are expecting trick-or-treaters, clear their path of

obstacles, and keep jack-o-lanterns away from areas where they might contact children's costumes.

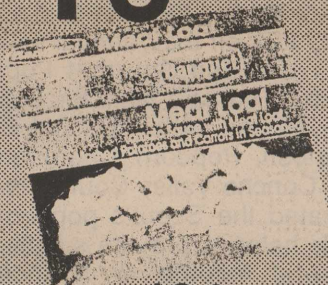


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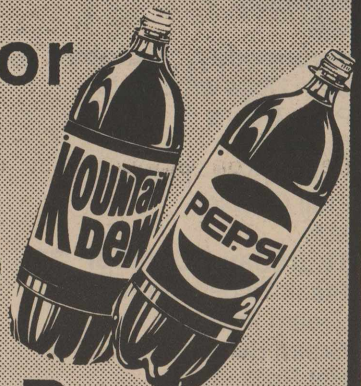

kicked a 30 yard field goal. The Eagles then put together a strong drive that lasted 5 minutes and covered 69 yards. They scored from the one yard line and the pass for two points was good.

The Steers had 3:58 to work with and needed a touchdown to win. They started their drive on their own 28 yard line. They couldn't move the ball on the ground and had to go to the air. Jackson completed a pass to John Fluhmann for 31 yards, two more running plays and Jackson went to Scott for 15 yards. Then back to Fluhmann for 24 more yards. Jackson was sacked for a 10 yard loss, but he then passed to Scott for 24 yards as time ran out with the ball on the Eagle one foot line. The game ended with Sterling City 16, Robert Lee 11.

The Steers will travel to Roscoe tonight for more district action.

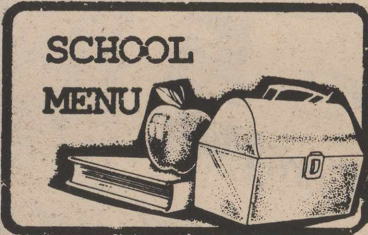
SC blanks Dogies

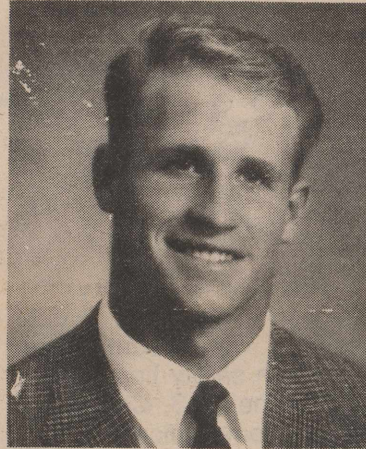
Davis visitors told

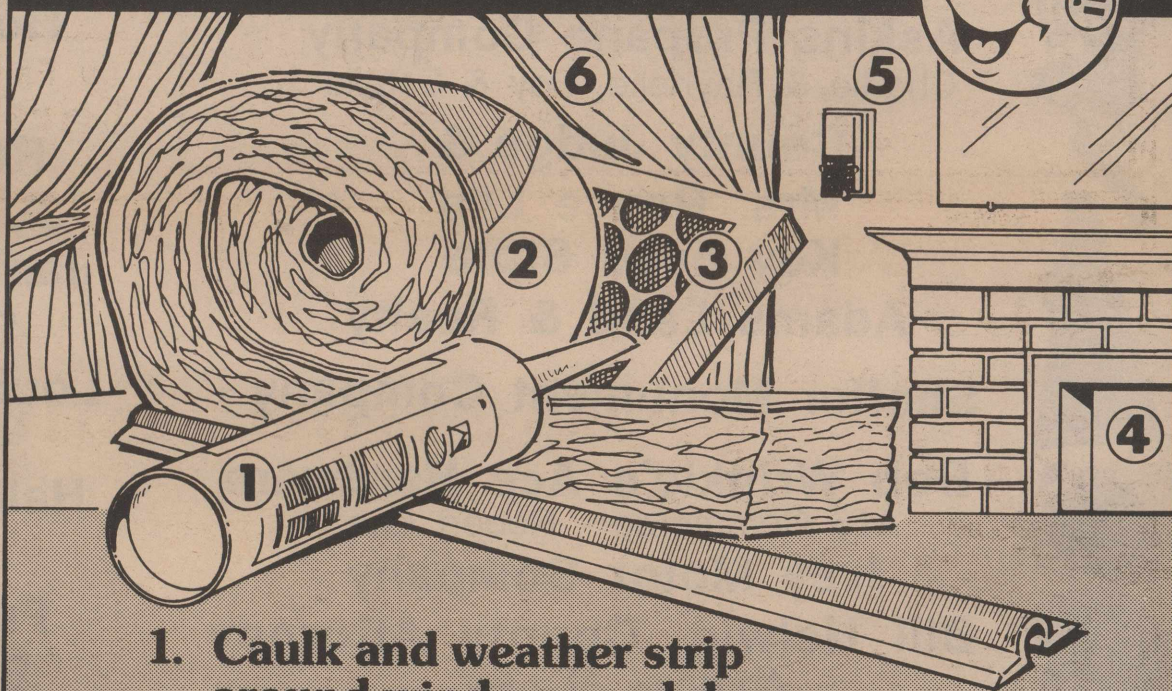
certificate, drivers license, social security card, utility or phone bill to show proof of address. Rent receipt is acceptable in lieu of a utility bill.
