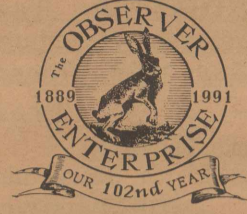

Violent weather causes damage to area

Three days of violent weather, more common to spring than fall, has brought needed rains but unwelcome hail and lightning damage to the immediate area. No real damage in Robert Lee resulted from the marble sized hail, but several residents suffered appliance losses and telephone outage from lightning strikes.

Neighboring communities of Wilmeth and Winters had farmers whose cotton and unharvested feed were totally wiped out by hail.

Bronte also experienced hail, but during much of it, the rainfall was so heavy little damage resulted. However, the heavy rain was responsible for flooding in the southwest section of Bronte. A few homeowners reported that they had water standing in and around their homes. Kickapoo Creek, where it crosses Barclay Street, was

also an unusual sight as it rose and stranded a few unlucky motorists who didn't realize its depth until they tried to cross it. Precinct 4 Commissioner James Tidwell eventually put up blockades to detour cars.

Most residents measured a total of 5.1 inches. Robert

Lee generally got about 1.3 inches.

Coke Countians woke Wednesday morning to light rain and 35° which felt much colder. The cold is forecast to last over the weekend, making hunters ecstatic, with opening day Saturday, November 2.

Election set for Tuesday

On Wednesday morning, with only two days of early voting left, the county clerk's office had only recorded 29 votes, including mail-ins, for the November 5 Special Election.

Although most officials pointed out that turnouts are normally very light for special or off-year elections, many felt a handful of the proposed constitutional amendments, particularly #11, allowing the

state lottery, would bring voters out.

Coke County voters will cast ballots at their usual polling places. Polls will be open from 7 am until 7 pm. State Secretary John Hannah, Jr., advised voters to get out and vote on the 13 proposed amendments they have decided on or understand and leave others blank. His office hoped that voters would not be put off by parts of the entire ballot and not vote at all.

Hunting season to begin November 2

The regular gun season for white-tailed deer in Tom Green, Concho, Irion, Rea-

gan, Glasscock, Coke, Runnels, and Coleman Counties is November 2 through Jan-

uary 5, 1992. The bag limit in these counties is four deer, either sex but with a limit of no more than two bucks.

Wildlife biologists Lee Miller of San Angelo and Don Davis of Winters would like to remind landowners and hunters concerning the proper harvest of deer. The Texas Parks and Wildlife Department biologists also indicated that no antlerless deer permits will be required for taking antlerless deer in the counties indicated during the 1991-92 regular deer season.

Deer populations vary from area to area and from ranch to ranch. The either-sex regulation allows the landowner the flexibility to harvest deer on his property at the proper rate. It does not automatically mean that a heavy harvest of antlerless deer is needed. The recommended harvest rates of both antlerless deer and bucks are

as provided by the Department, should be used only as a general guideline for harvesting deer in the above indicated counties.

Wildlife biologists caution that the harvest of bucks in these counties in the past has been comparatively heavy. The proper harvest of bucks is important to allow bucks to reach their genetic potential.

H'way project is underway

Flasher Equipment Company of San Antonio is scheduled to begin a project to place raised pavement markings on 350 miles of highway in District 7. Various sections of highways in Val Verde, Kinney, Real, Edwards, Sutton, Crockett, Menard, Runnels, Coke, Tom Green, Irion, and Glasscock counties will receive the new markings, according to Joe W. Lane, P. E., of Sonora, the engineer in charge of the project for the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT).

The contractor will begin work Monday, October 14, in Glasscock County, and will move east and south as they complete a section. They estimate it will take 80 working days, including some Saturdays.

In the area where the crew is working, adequate warning signs, barricades, flaggers, and other warning devices will be utilized to direct the traveling public. Motorists approaching the work area should slow down and watch for men and equipment. The crew will move down the road at a steady but slower pace than the public.

This \$203,895 project is one of many the department contracts with private firms to do state work.

The following highways in Coke County are included in the project: FM 3399 from SH 70 to 2.2 miles east; SH 70 from the Nolan County line to US 277; and US 277 from SH 158 to the Tom Green County line.

After the match, a special trophy was presented to the most improved shooter for the 1991 season, and the top gun award for the club shooter who placed the highest in the Club's approved matches for the year.

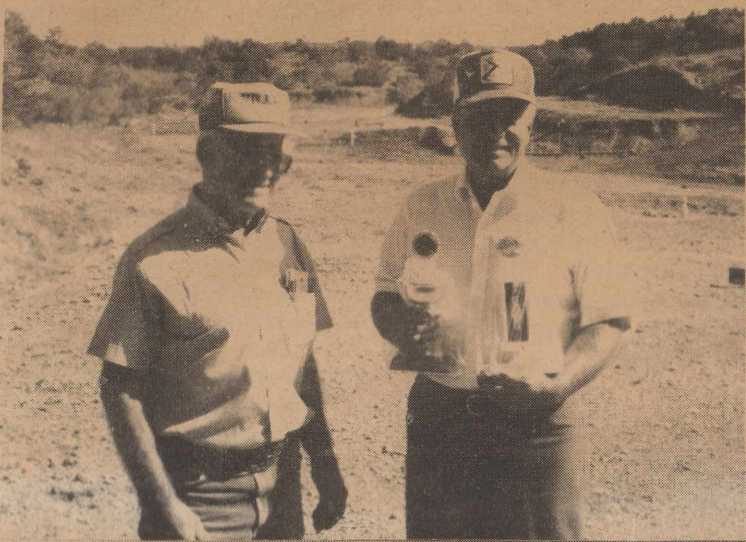
Top gun winner for 1991 went to Richard Johnson while the most improved shooter for 1991 was Kenneth Green.

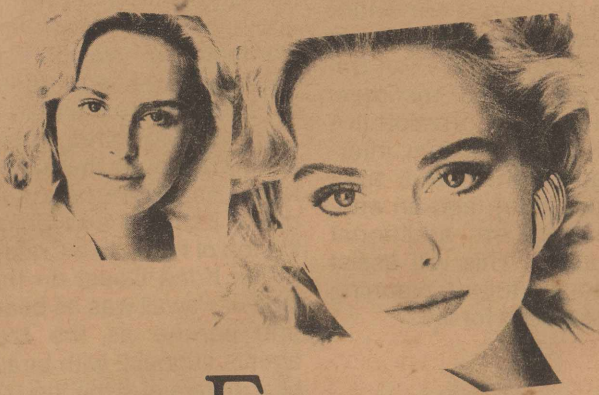
Completion noted

Oryx Energy Company today announced completion of the first horizontal well drilled in Ecuador. The Gacela #1 discovery well, located onshore in the northern part of Block 7, initially tested in excess of 1,000 barrels of oil per day (BOPD).

The vertical portion of the Gacela #1 encountered four pay zones with more than 120 feet of oil pay, including 100' of pay in the Hollin formation. The horizontal portion of the well was drilled in the Hollin formation and completed from about 800' of lateral hole in that formation. Initial tests from the lateral extension achieved an average flow rate of more than 1,000 BOPD through a one-inch choke. Further testing, using a down-hole jet pump, increased the rate to more than 2,500 BOPD. A second well is planned for the first quarter of 1992, following an analysis of the Gacela #1 tests. Oryx Energy is the operator and 100% working interest owner in the Gacela #1.

Also on Block 7, east of the Gacela #1, Oryx Energy holds a 35% interest in the unitized Coca-Payamino Field, where development drilling is expected to increase gross production to 11,000 BOPD in mid 1992 from its current level 3,600 BOPD. Block 7 covers nearly 500,000 acres in the Oriente Basin; and Oryx Energy has four additional discoveries and several undrilled prospects to appraise as a part of its ongoing drilling program.

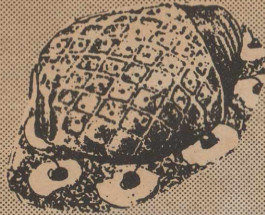

Rodeo Club forming at Bronte High

 Bronte High School has been the home of many activities and achievements in the past, ranging from state championships in athletics, academic scholarships, state FHA officers, and Sweepstakes band. Now the Rodeo Club, which held their first official meeting Wednesday, October 23, will be added to the list of extracurricular activities found at BHS.

Freshman Chris McPherson brought the idea of a rodeo club from his former home of Santo. McPherson, who enjoys riding, has a strong desire to see such a club succeed at Bronte.

"Cowboys are left out of things because there are no activities for them," he said.

Offered to Junior High and High School students as well as interested younger students, the Rodeo Club would focus on teaching techniques, horsemanship, and training for high school rodeos.

"It would just be something new for the school," senior Teresa Vaughn said.

This "something new" would work on individuals' skills in team roping, goat roping, calf roping, barrel racing, pole bending, steer wrestling, and goat tying. For the advanced cowboys, there would be rough stock events such as bull riding, saddle bronc riding, and bareback riding.

Members would have the opportunity to participate in the annual Coke County Rodeo and other rodeos if they desire. However, members are not required to participate in rodeos.

The formation of a rodeo club also has the support of the administration. "I think it's great that a lot of people are interested in this and certainly in this area, we can still use the kind of skills and teamwork it promotes," Principal Albert Johnson said.

Before the club can become a reality, certain steps will have to be taken. First, the officers must secure a minimum of twenty members and a sponsor. Then, the organization would visit other schools with successful rodeo clubs and learn the pros and cons of their programs.

Most of all, the program asks for the support of the Bronte community. With enough interest and commitment, the Rodeo Club can become another successful part of the Bronte School system.

CLEAT honors Dickson

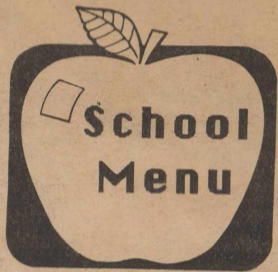

The Dogies' next game will be on the road against Garden City October 31.

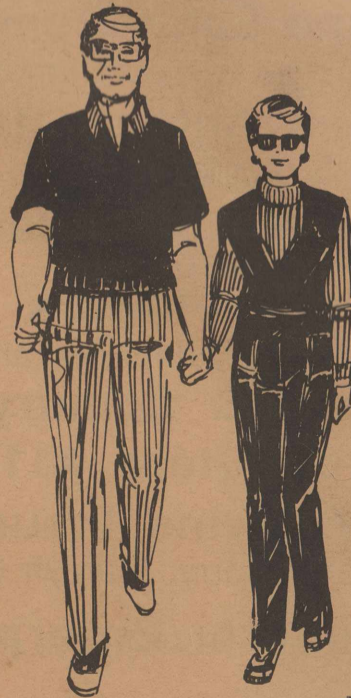

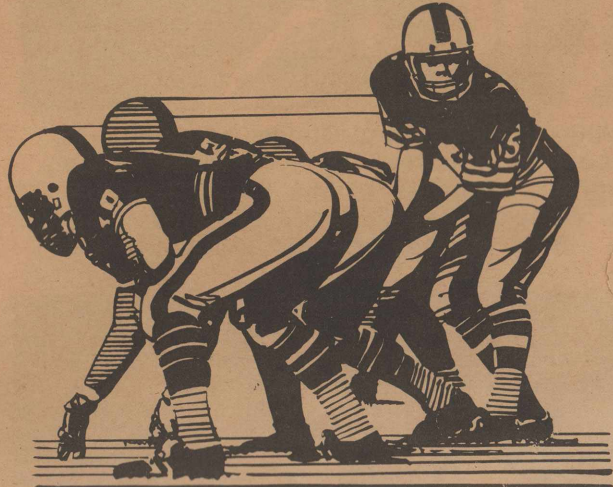

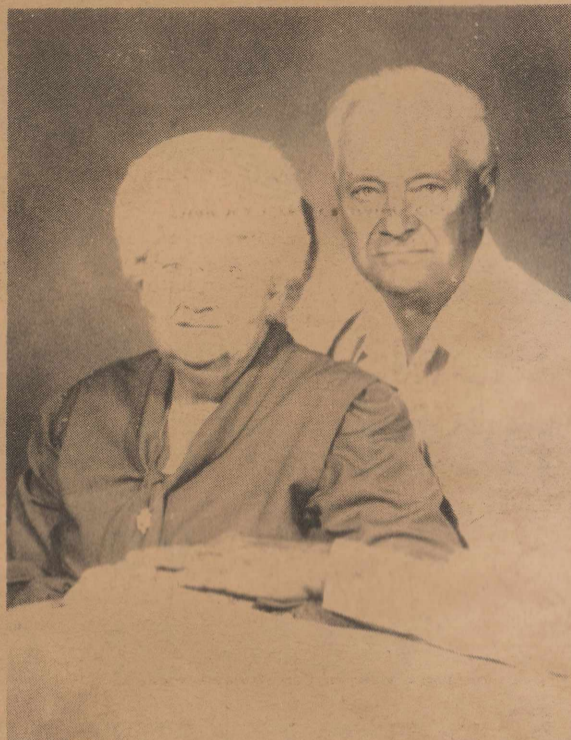
Askins couple to celebrate fiftieth

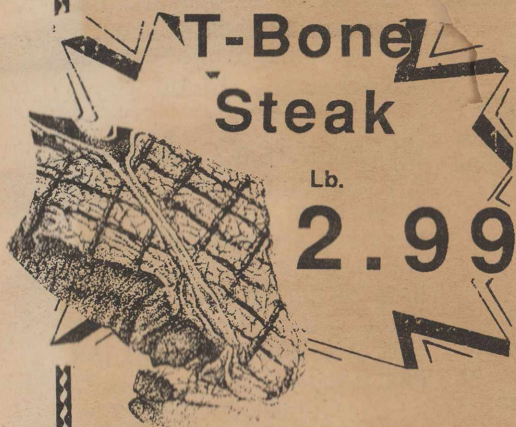

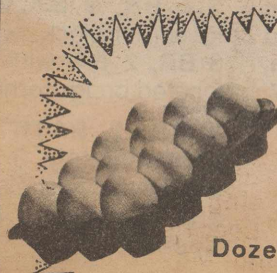

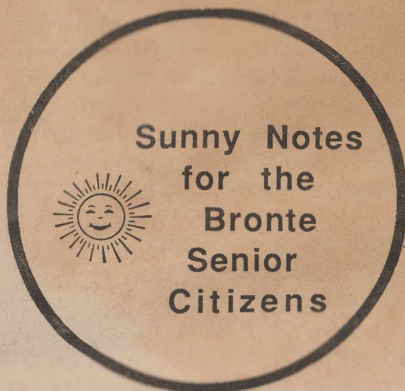
PPWT battles litter

PPWT routinely performs pelvic exams and pap smears on patients, screening for cervical cancer. If a pap smear test result is abnormal, a follow up procedure called

Colposcopy is recommended to confirm findings. Although relatively simple, the procedure must be performed by a physician and is expensive. Many women are therefore unable to obtain the procedure, and virtually risk dying from cervical cancer. Upset by this fact, staff voted to put all proceeds from their recycling efforts in a fund so that women who need this procedure can get it.

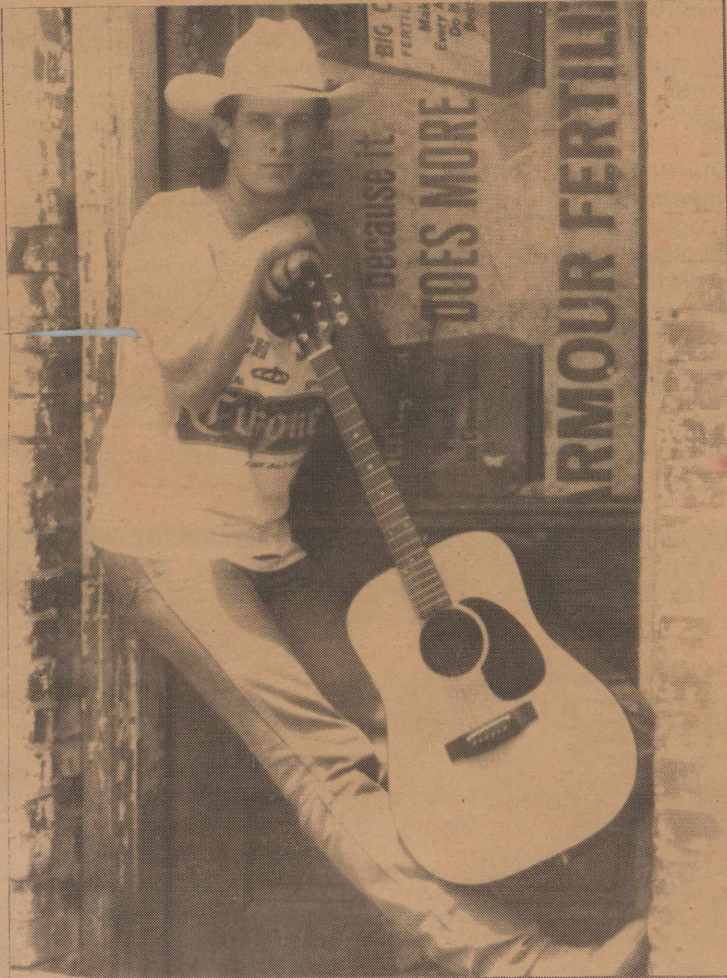

Winter Supplements

Supplemental feed is one of the largest annual expenses in a cow/calf operation. In order to maintain acceptable levels of productivity, some winter supplemental feeding is necessary across most of this area.

Cattlemen need to consider several factors in planning winter supplemental needs of range cattle. The major considerations include: the production status of the cow herd; the body condition of the cows going into winter; and the amount and quality of the remaining range vegetation.

Most of our cattle in this area are going into the winter in very good condition. Many have a reserve of body fat. Late summer rains have provided excellent growing conditions for summer annual and perennial grasses, which has allowed fall calving cows to put on condition late in the year.

The body condition is critical for cows lactating and trying to rebreed during the winter when native forage quality is at its poorest. If stocking rates have been maintained properly, there should be a good supply of native feed available into the winter.

Simply stated, supplementation means providing what is lacking in the cow's diet for a given period of time. For ranchers, this means providing what is needed to supplement what is available from range resources.

Therefore, to supplement in a cost effective manner, ranchers need to have knowledge of two essential elements, the quantity and quality of the range vegetation and the cow's minimum daily requirements for essential nutrients.

Often ranchers let price alone be the determining factor in choosing the supplemental feed. However, what you get to furnish the cow's requirements for the price you pay is most important. In comparing prices and various feeds, make sure that comparisons are made of the same quality products and that the feed will provide what is truly needed.

For our area, protein is the most essential supplemental nutrient needed for range cattle. Protein is essential for rumen function and encourages dry matter intake. Therefore, the protein requirement must be met before cattle can use the dry grass that has been grown this year.

Cottonseed products are the basis for most of our high protein feeds and are usually readily available at a very competitive price. In addition to furnishing high quality protein, cottonseed products are high in phosphorus, the most needed mineral in range cattle diets.

When selecting supplemental feeds, consideration should be given to what kind and what price and when to

start feeding. Begin feeding supplements before any major weight loss occurs. It is cheaper to save condition now than to feed it back on during late winter. On selecting what kind at what price, the so called "bargain cubes" actually cost more when figured with good quality feed on a cost per pound of available protein. Urea or non-nitrogen protein used in these cheaper cubes is not totally utilized by livestock, therefore, you are actually getting less for your dollar in cheap supplements.

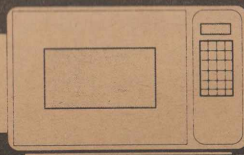

- 1/2 cup diagonally sliced celery
- 1 green onion, sliced
- 1/2 cup green beans or fresh pea pods
- 1 tablespoon cornstarch
- 3 tablespoons honey or light corn syrup
- 2 tablespoons toasted sliced almonds (optional)

1. Cut pork into bite-size strips or chunks. Combine with soy sauce, orange juice and ginger in small bowl. Refrigerate at least 1/2 hour.



2. Reserving marinade, remove and drain pork. Preheat microwave browning dish 8 minutes or as directed by manufacturer of dish. Add oil, red pepper and celery. Microwave at HIGH (100%) for 1 minute or until crisp-tender, stirring once. Add pork to browning dish. Microwave at HIGH 3 minutes. Stir in onion and beans. Microwave at HIGH 2 minutes longer, stirring once.

3. In 1 1/2-quart glass serving dish, stir together cornstarch, corn syrup and reserved marinade. Add pork-

vegetable mixture. Stir. Cover and microwave at HIGH until sauce is thickened and clear, about 1 minute. Sprinkle with almonds, if desired. Serve with rice.
