Registration outlined

Kristy Roe, Coke County Tax Assessor/Collector, met with the commissioners court on Monday to clarify some points connected with the new voter registration cards. Her office is now readying the cards for mailing and she felt many voters would be confused by them. Law dictates the new voter cards be mailed out this month since the current cards expire December 31, 1991.

Although the law also mandated major changes in precinct lines, that plan has not been accepted by the Justice Department and it could be months before

changes are final. At this time, county voters should use the new card being issued for any upcoming election.

Mrs. Roe urges voters to make any corrections or changes in name, address, location, etc. on the back of the new card and return to her office. If no changes are due, hold the card as usual.

If and when precinct changes take place, registered voters will receive a new card to replace those being mailed this month. Questions concerning the cards or registration can be answered by calling Mrs. Roe or one of her clerks at 453-2614.

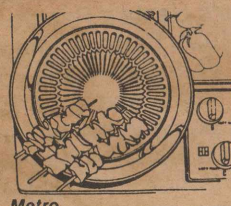

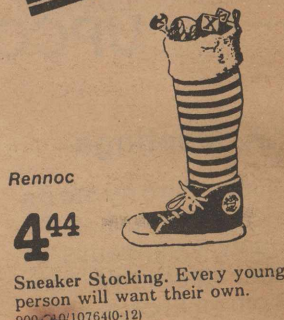

McPeek awarded Gold Scholarship

Dean's Scholars of Texas Tech University's College of Agricultural Sciences were honored by faculty, administrators and parents at a reception November 20 in the University Center Courtyard.

Each of the Dean's Scholars were awarded either a \$2,500 Gold Scholarship or a \$1,250 Silver Scholarship. The scholarships are renewable for up to four years if the program's requirements are met.

To be eligible for a Gold Scholarship, students must graduate in the upper 10% of their high school class and/or have a minimum score of 1,300 on the Scholastic Aptitude Test or a minimum grade of 30 on the American College Test.

Silver Scholarship recipients must graduate in the upper 10% of their high school class and/or have a minimum SAT score of 1,200 or grade of 28 on the ACT.

To retain the scholarships each year, students receiving a Gold Scholarship must maintain a 3.4 grade point average; Silver Scholarship winners must maintain a 3.2 grade point average for a minimum of 30 credit hours.

Among the Gold Scholarship winners was Brent McPeek, freshman agricultural economics major from Robert Lee; son of Douglas and Winnie McPeek, also of Robert Lee.

The Bronte Volunteer Fire Department has issued information about safety during the holidays.

A fresh green tree is safer than a tree with needles that can be pulled out. Also, before setting up the tree, you need to make a fresh straight cut at the bottom of the trunk. Sap has sealed off the original cut and a new cut is necessary in order for the tree to utilize the water. Put the tree in water immediately and keep in water as long as it is in the house. Other holiday tips include:

- Check all electrical plugs and wiring on Christmas lights carefully.
- Keep children away from all electrical cords and fixtures.
- All decorations must be fire-proof and use balls and decorations that are unbreakable.
- Do not leave tree lights on all night.
- Keep fireworks away from buildings and dry grass.
- Do not place tree near a heating outlet in the home.

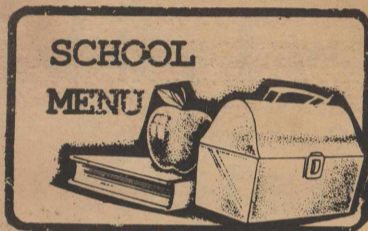

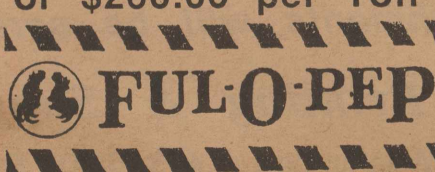

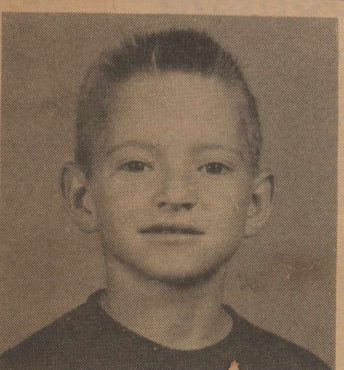

1. Notice is hereby given that the Colorado River Municipal Water District has filed an application with the Texas Water Commission for a State permit to conduct weather modification operations to change or attempt to change the natural development of clouds for the purpose, objective, period, and by the method summarized hereinbelow.
2. The Colorado River Municipal Water District has a valid Texas weather modification license. The initial license was issued on December 18,

1974, and was renewed in 1976, 1977, 1978, 1979, 1980, 1981, 1982, 1983, 1984, 1985, 1986, 1987, 1988, 1989, 1990, and 1991.

3. The purpose of the weather modification operation is to increase rainfall to affect water resources. The period of the permit is March 1 through November 30 during the years 1992, 1993, 1994, and 1995.

4. The proposed weather modification operation is to be conducted for and on behalf of the Colorado River Municipal Water District, P. O. Box 869, Big Spring, Texas 79721-0869.

5. The proposed weather modification operation is to be carried out in both an "operational area" and a "target area" to cause the intended effects to occur only in the target area. The operational area is that area described as being the area between an outer boundary which is defined by a line that encompasses the block of counties of Lynn, Garza, Kent, Fisher, Nolan, Runnels, Coke, Sterling, Glasscock, Martin, and Dawson, and an inner boundary which is that of the target area.

6. The area to be affected by the proposed weather modification operation is the target area. The target area is that area described as bounded by a line beginning at a point of origin at Big Spring, Texas, and running along Highway 87 in a northwesterly direction

to Lamesa; thence, north-northeast on Highway 87 to the north border of Dawson County; thence, east along the northern boundary lines of Dawson, Borden, and Scurry Counties to Highway 84; thence, southeast along Highway 84 to Roscoe, in Nolan County; thence, south-southeast to Maryneal; thence, east to the Nolan-Taylor County border; thence, south along the eastern Nolan County line to the Runnels County border; thence, east along the northern Runnels

County line; thence, south along the eastern Runnels County line; thence, west along the southern Runnels County line; thence north along the western Runnels County line; thence, north along the western Runnels County line to a point where the southern Coke County line meets Runnels County; thence, west along the southern Coke County line to a point 13 miles south of Robert Lee in Coke County; thence, north to Robert Lee; thence, west to Highway 87 at a point approximately 13 miles northwest of Sterling City; thence, northwesterly along Highway 87 to the point of origin at Big Spring, Texas.

7. The methods and materials to be used in conducting this operation are summarized herein: A licensed meteorologist will select cumulus clouds for cloud-seeding using a weather radar display, standard meteorological analyses, forecast techniques, observations, and pilot reports to direct an aircraft equipped to dispense the seeding particles, silver iodide crystals, into the updraft air at cloud base.

8. Persons interested in knowing more about the technical aspects of the proposed operation should contact the applicant or the Weather & Climate Section of the Commission.

9. A public hearing on this application may be called by mailing a petition that requests a hearing to the Executive Director, Texas Water Commission, P. O. Box 13087, Capitol Station, Austin, Texas 78711. The petition must contain (1) the

signature, full name, address, and phone number of each person requesting; (2) a statement that each person is at least 18 years of age and resides or owns property in the operational area; and, (3) a description of each person's interest and how that interest would be adversely affected. Requests for hearing must be received by the Commission within 30 days of the date of the first publication of this notice. More information on calling a hearing can be obtained through the Legal Division of the Commission.

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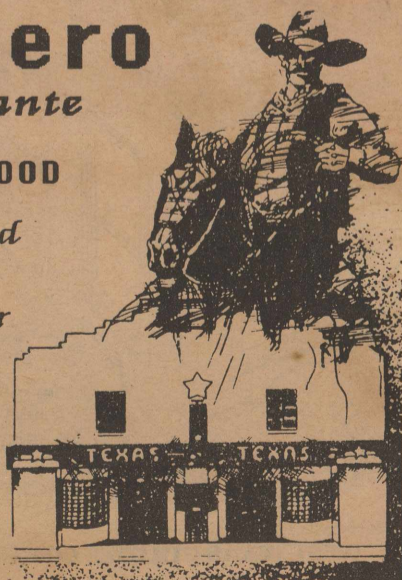
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FB Resolutions Committee meets

The Texas Farm Bureau Resolutions Committee has completed its work and now its the voting delegates' turn to give final approval to the state resolutions and national recommendations at the 58th annual TFB convention, according to Robert M. Brown, president of the Coke-Sterling County Farm Bureau.

"As always, the 37 member Resolutions Committee has done an excellent job of taking the vast number of proposals (208 from 130 county Farm Bureaus) and preparing them in a concise manner for our delegates to consider in the two days we will have at Lubbock," Mr. Brown stated.

He noted that county Farm Bureaus are becoming more involved in governmental affairs as seen through the large number of issues surfaced recently at the Committee's meeting in Waco.

"Infringement on private ownership of land by non-profit organizations and government entities will be one issue that delegates will be giving serious consideration to December 3-4," Mr. Brown observed.

He also pointed out that county Farm Bureaus expressed a serious concern about "fiscal responsibility" by state and federal governments.

"Runaway spending at both the state and national level is of grave concern to all of us," he added.

Finding the means to finance public education while at the same time curbing rising administrative costs will be of major interest to the delegates, Brown pointed out.

Mr. Brown cited the following issues as among the many proposals delegates will consider at Lubbock: Ad valorem taxes; The North American Free Trade Agreement with Mexico; GATT negotiations; Exemption of the set aside acreage from cover crop requirements; An earlier announcement of the farm program guidelines since many Texas producers have in the past been delayed with planting due to government red tape; and a shorter interval from the time when applications to Farmers Home Administration are made and when approval for credit is received.

Mr. Brown encouraged his contingency of delegates from Coke-Sterling County Farm Bureau to participate in their right to vote on state resolutions and national recommendations.
