

Who's Who, published by Educational Communications, Inc., Lake Forest, Illinois, is the largest high school recognition publication in the country. Students are nominated by high school principals and guidance coun-selors, national youth groups, churches, or by the publishing company based upon students' performance in scholarship award contests or extracurricular activities.

Final selection is determined on the basis of criteria which include high achievement in academics and leadership in school activities, athletics or community service. Traditionally, 99% of Who's Who students have a grade point average of "B" or better and 97% are college bound.

The 25th edition of Who's Who, published in 15 regional volumes, features nearly 700,000 students or just over 5% of the nation's 12,000,000 high school students. They represent 18,000 of the 22,000 public, private, and parochial high schools in the country.

Children Of Divorce & The Holidays

"Over the river and through the woods" for many children of divorced parents signifies where the child will be spending the holidays because of visitation arrangements. Holiday visits and the accompanying disruptions can cause children anxiety and stress.

Communication is the key to helping families get through these anxious times. A child may need to discuss certain subjects with one or both parents before he leaves home, including his feelings of abandoning the parent back home, travel plans, sleeping arrangements, how and where the holiday will be celebrated and who else will be present during the visit.

Help preschoolers start their own holiday calendar several weeks prior to holiday separation to let them know how many more days they have before leaving, mark how long the visit will be and identify the day of return. Time and order are important to some children and tend to eliminate some

anxiety of holiday visitation while providing a "comfort zone" within which to operate.

Allow a child to call home. Set limits on the number or the time allowed to talk if the calls become excessive. On the other hand, constant calling may be a cue to discuss with a former spouse problems you can identify.

The visited parent should avoid the temptation to provide a "magical holiday" and squeeze too much into one short visit. Feeling obligated to have a "good time" tires everybody out. Sharing everyday activities, like fixing breakfast, allows special time together for parent and child. Grandparents also need to heed the warnings about over-indulgence when the child-of-divorce is with them for the holidays.

Parents who don't live with their children want to be involved in their children's lives. Holiday visits are an excellent way to show children that both parents still love them and are still there. Many stepfathers enjoy having the "other kids" there too.

Continued abuse could close areas

The Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) builds and maintains rest areas with water and restrooms, picnic areas with tables and garbage barrels, and some just barrels. These are for the convenience of the people travelling the highways who need to dispose of the trash they have accumulated while driv-

The department contracts with private individuals and firms to pick up the trash and clean these areas to provide an attractive place people can stop and rest or have a picnic lunch before continuing their trip. These have proven to be very popular, and are a definite safety feature for the weary or sleepy driver.

The department provides these areas a few miles outside of town so those people who get a sandwich and drink in town can stop when they finish eating and not have to carry the trash with them for a long way.

Highway users fees and taxes are used to pay for trash removal and cleaning. The money has to come out of the funds available to patch potholes, restripe a highway, or rehabilitate a roadway that needs to be rebuilt due to age or design characteristics.

The department's mission is to build and maintain an adequate and safe highway system for the motorists at the least expense to the taxpayer. Persons using these areas to dump their household or weekend garbage cost the department money it should not have to spend for this type activity.

Continued abuse by a few could result in the closing of a picnic area and the enforcement of the State Anti-Litter Law

Disposal of solid waste is the responsibility of the cities and counties. With new restrictions on landfills, it is realized that in many places this is expensive, and around the state, many cities and counties have had to close their landfills.

The department is asking the cooperation of all citizens to dispose of their trash and household garbage properly in order to prevent the Department of Transportation from having to close a picnic



Judge Walther will enter the


campaign on the Republican ticket. She has been a practicing lawyer and for the past 4 1/2 years, has served 12 counties as Family Law Mas-







CITY OF ROBERT LEE, P. O. Box 26, Robert Lee, Texas 76945 has applied to the Texas Water Commission for renewal of Permit No. 10603-02 which authorizes a discharge of treated domestic wastewater effluent at a volume not to exceed an average flow of 213,000 gallons per day. The permit also authorizes the permittee to use treated effluent for irrigation on a golf course with application rates not to exceed 4.2 acre-feet/acre/year. The wastewater treatment facilities are located on the east bank of the Colorado River, approximately 2,500 feet southwest of the Coke County Courthouse in Coke County, Texas. The effluent is discharged into the Colorado River below E. V. Spence Reservoir in Segment No. 1426 of the Colorado River Basin.

In accordance with the Texas Surface Water Quality Standards, the Commission staff must determine the existing uses for the receiving water in the area of the proposed discharge and whether the proposed discharge will cause significant degradation to any high quality waters in the area. The designated uses for Segment No. 1426 are contact recreation, high quality aquatic life uses, and public water supply. The effluent limitations in the draft permit will maintain and protect the existing instream uses. All determinations are preliminary and subject to additional review and/or revision.

The Executive Director of the Texas Water Commission has prepared a draft permit which, if approved by the Commission, will enforce more stringent effluent limitations in order to meet existing applicable rules and regulations. It is proposed that the expiration date of the renewed permit by specified as midnight, five years after date of Commission approval.



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


A highway sign warns: "Take notice: when this sign is under water, this road is impassable."
