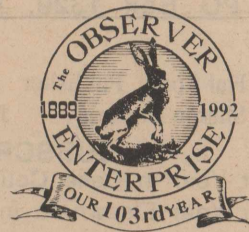

Local vote totals mirror other areas

The Democratic Primary was held Tuesday, March 10, 1992, with 904 votes being cast in Coke County.

Local totals mirrored those in other areas of the state as Bill Sims and Bill Clinton were clear winners both in Coke County and throughout the district and state, respectively.

In the run for Democratic nominee for the office of President of the United States, Bill Clinton was the clear winner with 535 votes. Others receiving votes in the election were Rufus Higginbotham with 9; Tod Howard Hawks 2; Charles Woods 23; Lyndon H. LaRouche, Jr. 10; Tom Harkin 7; Paul E. Tsongas 103; J. Louis McAlpine 4; Bob Kerrey 10; and Edmund G. Brown, Jr. 29. George W. Bennis was also on the ballot in the section but received no votes in Coke County.

Congressman Charles Stenholm received 686 votes for his incumbent bid for United States Representative, District 17.

David Young received 393 votes and Lena Guerrero received 373 votes in the race

for Railroad Commissioner.

Oscar H. Mauzy received 545 votes in his bid for Supreme Court Justice, Place 1. Rose Spector received 522 votes for Supreme Court Justice, Place 2. Jack Hightower carried the race for Supreme Court Justice, Place 3, with 436 votes to Paul Banner's 314 votes.

Charles F. (Charlie) Baird received 375 votes in his run for Judge, Court of Criminal Appeals, Place 1. His challenger, Sam Paxson, received 188 votes. Morris L. Overstreet, candidate for Judge, Court of Criminal Appeals, Place 2, received 337 votes to Gene Kelly's 256 votes. Candidate for Judge, Court of Criminal Appeals, Place 3, Pete Benavides, received 480 votes.

In the hotly contested race for State Senator, District 25, Bill Sims emerged the winner in Coke County with 692 votes to Temple Dickson's 190 votes.

Robert Junell posted 716 votes in his unchallenged race for State Representative, District 72.

John Powers received 400

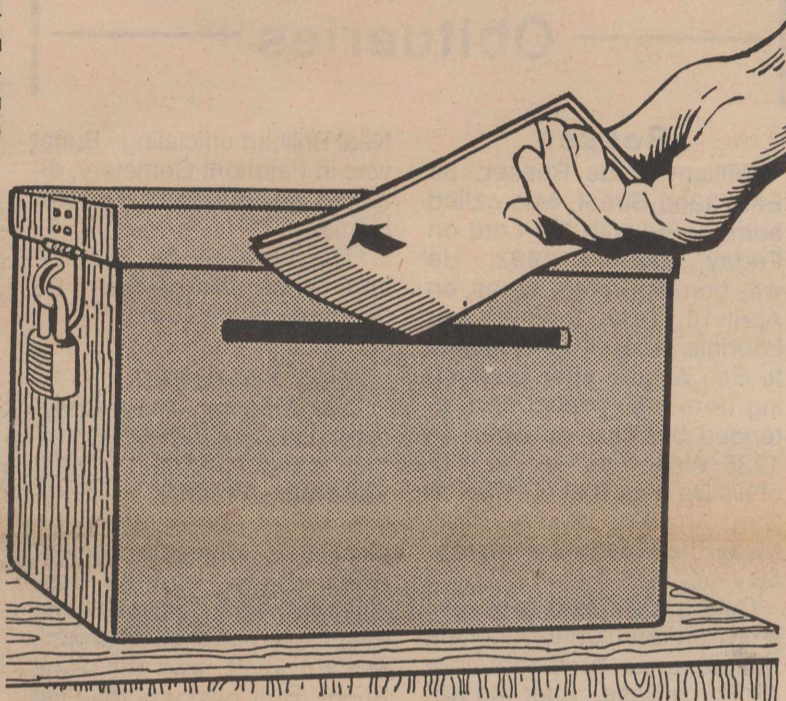
votes in the 3rd Court of Appeals District Justice election with Charles Chapman receiving 171 votes. Bea Ann Smith received 514 votes to fill an unexpired term as Justice in the 3rd Court of Appeals District.

Robert Post picked up 543 votes in his run for 51st Judicial District Judge and Charlotte Harris received 535 votes in her run for District Attorney, 51st Judicial District.

Coke County government election results included incumbent County Attorney Bill Helwig receiving 571 votes, incumbent Sheriff Marshall Millican receiving 729 votes, and incumbent Tax Assessor-Collector Kristeen Roe receiving 714 votes. In the race for Constable, Precinct 1, Kenneth Rasco, 285 votes, edged out David Rawlings, 212 votes. Incumbent Constable, Precinct 2, Wayne Arrott, received 308 votes. Incumbent County Commissioners, Paul Burns - Precinct 1 and Tim Millican - Precinct 3, received 242 and 179 votes respectively.

County Democratic Chairman incumbent Patty Ivey received 666 votes. Democratic Precinct Chairmen include Precinct 1 - Sally Gloria with

Court kills unit roads

The Coke County Commissioners met in regular session Monday, March 9, 1992.

The agenda included a discussion regarding a unit road system for Coke County. Judge Royce Lee asked for comments from visitors at the meeting relating to the proposed system. One interested person spoke in favor of the system. The Court thanked the citizen for his interest and input.

The Judge then asked the court if they had any comments. One commissioner expressed diametric opposition to the proposal. A second commissioner agreed with the first and a third commissioner held the following opinion. "I don't know whether the unit system is the right thing for Coke County or not. Therefore, I don't want to vote for the Commissioners Court to cause an election, because the people of Coke County might interpret that decision as one in favor of the system."

The Judge called for other discussion and Paul Burns, Commissioner Precinct 1, made the motion that the Court approve and call for an election, to be held either during the upcoming general election or in a special election, where the people of Coke County can vote either for or against the unit road system.

After a long pause, Judge Royce Lee seconded the motion. A vote was called and the following results were recorded: For - (2) Judge Royce Lee and Commissioner Burns; Against - (3) Commissioners Tim Millican, Billy Joe Lockett, and James Tidwell. The subject was then closed with expressions of peace and harmony prevailing and the Court went to the next order of business.

The subject of a unit road system is now closed and will remain so unless the opposition or the general public requires it to be newly recognized.

Severe weather safety

Although tornadoes, severe thunderstorms and floods can strike virtually any part of Texas at any time, spring seems to bring an increase in violent weather.

You can take precautions to assist yourself and your family in the event of a tornado.

Periodically hold a tornado drill so that family members know what to do and where to go if the national weather service issues a tornado warning. The safest part of a house during a tornado traditionally is the basement, but be aware of the potential for flooding if there is heavy rain in the area. Interior bathrooms, hallways and closets on the ground floor also offer protection from tornadic winds. Avoid windows and outside walls. Take along blankets or sleeping bags to protect yourself from falling debris and shattering glass, which are frequently cause of death and injury during a tornado.

Make certain you have a portable radio and several flashlights (and fresh batteries for both) as well as bottled water, extra prescription medications and a first aid kit in your shelter area.

Remember, if a tornado strikes, electricity, gas, water and sewer service may be disrupted for several days.

Mobile homes and automobiles are dangerous places to be during a tornado. If you live in a mobile home, make sure all family members know where the nearest substantial shelter is. If you are in your mobile home or car and can't get to a better shelter: go outside, lie down in the nearest ravine, ditch or culvert and cover your head with your hands. Be aware of the possibility of flooding in low-lying areas. Do not hide under your mobile home or car because both can be easily picked up and carried away by a tornado.

Your local (city or county) emergency management office can provide you with additional information on severe weather precautions. The Governor's Division of Emergency Management, the National Weather Service, the Texas Insurance Advisory Association and the Federal Emergency Management Agency are sources of information and publications on various weather phenomena and related information.

St. Jude Children's Research Hospital has announced that Mrs. Jody Johnson will coordinate the Bronte "Wheels For Life" Bike-A-Thon. The date of March 28, 1992, has been selected for the ride.

Founded by Danny Thomas in 1962, St. Jude Children's Research Hospital is the largest childhood cancer research-treatment-education center in America. Although located in Memphis, Tennessee, the hospital has a local impact because area doctors and hospitals can use treatments and procedures developed at St. Jude.

St. Jude Hospital is non-sectarian, interracial and provides medical care for over 3,600 active patients. Currently, over \$215,000 is needed each day to keep the doors open. These funds come primarily from public contributions.

This year's Bike-A-Thon is dedicated to Brooke Simon. Six-year-old Brooke, from Delcambre, Louisiana, developed Wilms Tumor in November, 1988. Following the removal of her left kidney, she has undergone radiation and chemotherapy. Though her prognosis is good, her fight still continues.

We are grateful for the concern that Mrs. Johnson has for our work and we hope the citizens of Bronte will support the Bike-A-Thon to help provide the funds that are needed to preserve the world's greatest asset... "Our Children".
