
Thefts solved

Sheriff Marshall Millican and Deputies Jeff Barnes, Wayne McCutchen and Rick Styles, along with peace officers have had a busy five or six weeks, mostly due to thefts and burglaries.

The Coke County Sheriff's Department during the past week, has recovered stolen property that was taken in ten residential burglaries in Coke County. The burglaries were committed in the Bronte and Oak Creek Lake areas. There were more than 75 items recovered; they include numerous rifles, tv's, microwaves, stereos and other household items. The suspect has been identified and awaits Grand Jury indictment.

Another burglary was solved and property recovered last month in the Oak Creek area where a VCR, microwave and other small items were taken.

The Grand Jury that met in March returned two indictments. One was for burglary of a building where several thousand dollars worth of tools were stolen by a San Angelo resident. The second indictment was returned on a Coke County resident on five counts of livestock theft. Over the past weekend three suspects were apprehended and property recovered in connection with a burglary of a motor vehicle.





STAR info available from recruiter

It may be easier than you think to get started in the health care profession with the Army Reserve's new Specialized Training for Army Readiness (STAR) program.

"Qualified young men and women train at an Army-approved, civilian school in their own town," said Capt. Roger Furnival, the Army Reserve operations officer at the Army recruiting battalion in Albuquerque, New Mexico.

In return, the Army Reserve will pay up to \$6,000 a year for two years for a student's tuition, books, and any associated school fees, even student health insurance, Furnival said. Depending on the student's qualifications and the needs of the local Army Reserve unit, students can train as a practical nurse, emergency medical techinician, dental laboratory specialist, operating room specialist, x-ray technician, pharmacy specialist, respiratory specialist, or medical laboratory specialist. Once students qualify for the program and enlist in the Army Reserve, the new soldiers attend eight weeks of Army basic training. Upon completion they return to the civilian school where they were accepted for their academic program, attending weekend unit drills and earning additional Army Reserve pay and benefits.

"When the STAR program soldiers graduate, they still get more medical training," Furnival added. "They're sent to an Army medical facility for four weeks of on-the-job training before they go to their weekend units."

CRP sign-up slated for June 15-26

program (CRP) was established to conserve and improve soil and water resources by retiring highly erodible cropland. The Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) will share half of the cost of establishing permanent native and/or introduced grasses, forbs, and shrubs on highly erodible cropland. Under 10 year contracts, ASCS will make annual rental payments to you as long as the terms and conditions of the contract are met.

For the last sign-up, a maximum rental rate of \$40 dollars an acre was established. This figure is not set, so the next sign-up may be more or less then the previous amount.

During the 10 year contract, CRP land cannot be grazed, hayed or harvested for seed. The area may be grazed or haved under severe drought

The Conservation Reserve conditions which will be determined by the Secretary of Agriculture. Hunting is permitted which will allow additional farm income from leasing the CRP land for hunting. CRP has the potential to greatly improve wildlife habitat conditions. Landowners can further increase wildlife benefits by providing for specific wildlife needs when planning and implementing their program.

The next sign-up period for bidding cropland into CRP will be June 15, 1992 through June 26, 1992. Applications can be made at the ASCS office in Robert Lee. Only 25% of the County's cropland may be enrolled in the program. There are currently 81 contracts with over 9,600 acres that have previously been accepted into the program.

If you wish to participate in CRP, your field(s) must meet the criteria. The field(s) must have records showing they have been farmed for at least 2 years from 1986 to 1990 and you must have owned the land for at least 3 years. The Soil Conservation Service (SCS) will make an erodibility determination and ASCS will determine eligibility from the erosion rate and various other information concerning the type of crops grown on your land, etc. If you land is determined eligible, the SCS can then develop a plan with you for establishing permanent cover on cropland.

If you wish to sign-up in the CRP program in June remember the criteria for eligibility and start planning as soon as possible to avoid any delays in getting your contract ready. If you have any questions please contact the Soil Conservation Service in Robert Lee at 11 East Sixth Street or call us at 453-2623.


