Focus on disaster plans

On May 19 at 6 pm, a group of about 60 people interested in the safety and welfare of the Robert Lee, Bronte, and Blackwell communities gathered in the county courtroom. Purpose of the meeting was to organize a county-wide Emergency Planning, Committee as part of Texas Disaster Act, requested by governor Richards.

At that time, Judge Royce Lee said that further planning and information would take place in about 3 weeks. It was a foregone conclusion that every county should have an Emergency Plan in the event

of a natural disaster or accident.

An announced shelter, with food and water, for each town, communication alternatives, medical emergency planning, and escape routes all would be needed during a natural disaster such as a tornado or flood, and for an accident of great magnitude such as a fire, explosion, or plane crash. An accident involving radioactive materials could be a factor locally, also.

A handout or instruction schedule is in the planning stage and could mean the difference between organization and chaos.


McMurry University Announces Dean's list

Betty Wojtek, administrator of the Eden Nursing Home, presented a short program on Elder Alert vials. She brought 200 of the plastic tubes and will bring more if needed. They are free to the Lions Club and anyone who asks for them. According to Mrs. Wojtek, her nursing home facility is one of 17 in Texas to receive the life-saving vials. A

complete medical history of a resident is enclosed in the plastic tube; it is stored in the refrigerator, and a decal with the program's name is stuck to its door. Since a refrigerator is found in every home, a patient's medical history, medications taken, next of kin, etc can be stored there.

EMS volunteer or neighbor could have this information readily available for an ambulance crew, doctor or emergency room. The vials are not only beneficial to the elderly but anyone with a medical problem.

Mrs. Wojtek was accompanied by her husband, Frankie, a Robert Lee native.

Robert Lee and her brother and wife, Mack and Cindy Tubb of Cisco, commemorated Memorial Day by attending the annual services at Ft. Smith National Cemetery in Ft. Smith, Arkansas.

Their brother, Frank Tubb, was killed March 15, 1945, during World War II and was buried in the national cemetery September 16, 1949. During a bombing raid on a Japanese ammunition ship, his plane, on a low pass, was hit by explosives and crashed on the coast of Formosa. Frank Tubb and two others could not be identified and were buried in the same grave at Ft. Smith after the war.

Mrs. Davis said the cemetery grounds are beautifully kept and the expanse of 8,500 markers is awesome. A

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Mrs. Ava Lou Davis of locator directory guides visitors to the grave they seek. The first recorded burial was in August, 1918, for a surgeon stationed at Ft. Smith.

Each grave was marked with a small United States flag and an avenue of over 1,000 large flags were flying to honor the war dead for the annual Memorial Day service. Volunteers, including school children, helped place the flags.

The State Commissioner of the American Legion was the speaker for the service and the impressive program also featured the Tabernacle Choir with stirring selections of religious and patriotic music.

According to Mrs. Davis, the family had not been back to the national cemetery since Frank Tubb's burial and were inspired by the trip.




