## County lakes benefit from abundant rainfall

County lakes are finally storm, stripping vegetation reaping benefits of abundant 1991-92 rains. Monday night's downpours pushed levels up without much damage locally. Mountain Creek Lake, Robert Lee's city water supply, stands virtually full without breaking over the spillway. City Water Superintendent James Royall noted that the water supply will be adequate to last all summer without using water from Spence to supplement usage.
Chad Beck, son of Richard Beck, Oak Creek Lake patrolman, said Tuesday evening the reservoir had lapped over the spillway, thanks to the 4 inches of rain on Monday night.

Lake Spence's level improved, according to Royce Hood, lake superintendent. He related that on May 24, the lake elevation was 1867.32 and on Wednesday morning it had risen to 1873.48 for a gain of 6 feet plus with some runoff still coming in.
He reported the lake is on a healthy upswing-clorides are down some, with plenty of bait fish present and the fish population is actively spawning.
Although the bone-jarring thunder and electrical storm Monday night brought up to 3 $1 / 2$ inches of run off rain to the immediate vicinity, the area did not escape some damage. Robert Lee had marble-sized hail in places but an isolated area between Silver and the Pecan Baptist Church suffered tennis-ball sized hard stuff during the

## County Rainfall <br> Measurements

Rainfall measurements in Bronte and Robert Lee varied greatly in both locations, with some residents reporting measurements of up to three inches.

Bill Thomas of Bronte, reports a total of 2.4 inches for Saturday and Sunday. One and two tenths fell Monday night.
All area rain was accompanied by thunder, spectacular lighting, and strong winds. Power was off for most portions of the county for short periods of time Monday.
Residents in the Edith area of Robert Lee reported some large hail Monday night, while other residents received at least pea size hail.
Area farmers report that while oat crops have been ready to harvest for a while they have been damaged by the wind and rain and may not be salvageable. Wheat crops are ready for harvest, but the soil in some areas is too saturated to do so.

## 39th Sanco Homecoming set Saturday

The thirty-ninth annual Sanco Homecoming will take place Saturday night, June 13, and all day on Sunday, the 14th. The historic event will be held, as always, under the old tabernacle at Sanco, west of Robert Lee. The association will provide the barbecue, beans, and tea. Those who attend the gathering may bring salad, vegetables, or dessert as they desire.
Below is a short history of Sanco, reprinted from the annual newsletter.
"Sanco was the second community in Coke County, Ft. Chadbourne was first. Ira Bird had a townsite surveyed in 1907, four blocks divided into 25 lots. The townsite is near where the first road built from Ft. Chadbourne straight west crossed Yellow Wolf Creek. This was a route of travel before the settlement. Nearby was the big spring on the creek.

The first Sanco Community was just south of Durham Peak. The post office was established in the J.L. Durham residence July 10, 1888. Charles B. Teague es tablished Durham Peak School in 1887. William Scarborough owned the store and some distance west S.S Craddock had his blacksmith shop. By 1905 the community began to be moved to the new site on Yellow Wolf.
Miller and Rosa Birds gave the land where the Methodist

Church, the school building, the Baptist Church and the tabernacle were eventually built.

Wesley Meek built his home
and a cotton gin west of where the church buildings now stand.

In 1908 Miller Bird deeded 2 acres to the County Judge of Coke County for a cemetery. Bob Cosby built a shop and garage in 1916. Later it was used for a store and post office and is the building still standing.
The tabernacle was built in 1924 under the leadership of Rev. William E. Hawkins, Jr., who started Sanco Camp Meeting that continued 23 years.
Here Rev. Ernest R. DeWitt conducted a youth camp from 1957 to 1969.
From 1930 to 1936 Ulmer Bird preached in rural communities in Coke County. Since 1954 he furnished help Since 1954 he furnished help
and leadership in carrying on and leadership in carrying on
Sanco Homecoming obSanco Homecoming ob
served in June of each year.
Rev. Horace Bloodworth served as Baptist pastor at Sanco for years and also at Silver. Brother Early was the last Baptist pastor at Sanco.
In the 1920's Luttrell and Keeney built, and for a while operated a gin across the highway NW of the present store building

The only public buildings remaining are the store, the school, the Baptist Church, the Methodist Church and the tabernacle.
The early settlers and their children after them made Sanco a wonderful place to grow up. Those born and reared here count it a privilege to be among the number, and we honor those pioneers who gave us such a rich heritage.

COUNTRY AGENTS NEWS
by Tommy Antilley Coke County Agent

Cattle grubs are internal leg region，glued in position parasites and their damage is largely unseen，yet they cause greater economic loss－ es to the U．S beef cattle in－ dustry than any other insect pest．
While grubs are usually found on the backs of infest ed animals during the winter months，that＇s not the time for control measures since the pests have already done their damage．Feed efficiency and animal vigor are reduced in in－ fested animals
Grubs are the larvae or worm stage of heel flies，and adul heel flies are active over most of the state from March through May．
The time to control grubs is from now through August when grubs are small and be－ fore infested animals suffer stress，weight loss and de－ creased feed efficiency． Considerable hide damage will occur if infested animals are slaughtered．
Heel flies cannot sting，have no functional mouth parts and cause no pain to cattle．Yet， they frighten animals，making them difficult to manage．
Heel flies lay their eggs on an animal＇s hairs in the lower

Tiny larvae hatch in a few days，crawl down to the base of the hair and burrow into the animal＇s skin．
Then they begin a migratory course through the animal＇s body，congregating in the throat after a few months，and after eight to nine months， appear in the mature grub state on the animal＇s back．
If a producer has a history of grubs in his cattle herd，it＇s best to treat each animal over three months of age with one application of an approved systemic insecticide or in jectable treatment during the May through August period．
Systemic insecticides are absorbed directly through the animal＇s skin，circulate throughout the body，and kill grubs while they are small Injectable treatments are cir－ culated in the animal＇s body fluids to kill the invading pests．
These insecticides come in various forms，dips，sprays， pour－ons，injections and spot－ on treatments．A listing of ap－ proved insecticides and methods for controlling cattle grubs is available at the coun－ ty Extension office

## Rabies remains a <br> danger

Through the first 5 months of this year, 64 rabid animals have been reported from 10 of the 36 counties in public health region 3. From January through May of last year, these same counties had reported 48 rabies cases.
Nearly one half of this year's rabies cases have been skunks. Other reported wild animals with rabies have been foxes, bobcats, raccoons, a ringtail and a bat. Twelve rabies cases have been reported in domestic pets and livestock. Coke County has had one cat reported which was rabid when tested.
In the preceding 10 year period, rabies in these counties occurred most frequently during March, April and May. The number of rabies cases rapidly decreases beginning in June and continuing through September. While fewer cases of rabies can be expected for the remainder of the year, the outbreak is not over. Rabies in both livestock and wild animals has already been reported this month from Schleicher and Kimble counties.

Pet owners are reminded that all dogs and cats must be vaccinated against rabies every year. People should avoid contact with any unfamiliar or strange acting wild or domestic animal.
