Attending the Texas Farm Bureau's 30th annual-Citizenship Seminar at Baylor University in Waco, Texas June 15-19, were Denise Petty of Sterling City, Krista Green of Robert Lee, and Amy Allen of Bronte.

Sponsored by the Coke-Sterling County Farm Bureau, they were among approximately 400 high school junior and senior students from 156 counties across the state.

Citrus Cigarettes?

Various methods have been tried to help people kick the smoking habit, but an alternative now being tested at Duke University Medical Center's Division of Biological Psychology may offer satisfaction without nicotine and without actually lighting up.

Dr. Jed Rose, the primary inventor of the nicotine skin patch, has developed a cigarette substitute that uses puffs of citric acid to replicate the sensations of nicotine smoke on the tongue and airways, as well as gives smokers something to hold.

The cigarette substitute, made from lemons, allows the user to draw a puff of very fine citric acid powder. Dr. Rose says the puff of citric acid is mildly irritating to the throat - as is nicotine smoke - effectively fooling the sensory system. He says current tests with smokers combine the citric acid cigarette substitute with the nicotine skin patch to help conquer the sensory and biological addictions to nicotine. ©1992, Lyle Dean, Inc.
