





Bivins returns from stay in Spain

Christy Bivins has returned from a seven week trip to Spain where she was part of a group of Texas A&M students studying Spanish at the University of Spain at Salamanca. The students visited the Royal Palace and the Prado Museum in Madrid. They were especially impressed with Greco's painting of the crucifixion. In Grenada the students toured the beautiful Alhambra. The palace built by the Moors who controlled Spain from the 800's to 1492, when they were finally pushed back into Africa by the armies of Ferninand and Isabella. The students also visited Toledo and Portugal during their school term.

Christy lived with a Spanish family in Salamanca. The family spoke no English, but tried to make the students comfortable by often cooking American style dishes. Fruit was readily available, but Cokes were \$3.00 each, and bottled water was \$7.00. Because sandwiches were \$7.00, Christy's Spanish housemother liked to help her students by sending large lunches with them whenever they traveled.

After the end of the school term, Christy and several other students caught a train to Nice and Canne on the French Riviera. The beautiful beaches there are overlooked by hills filled with villas owned by wealthy Europeans. The people were very friendly to

they would drop their purses and packages. The other Gypsies would snatch them up and run.

The students then rode a train to Rome. Many of the trains and hotels were doublebooked. The girls ended up staying in a pension with some students from California. It was not as clean as most Americans expect, and each person had to furnish his own towel, but it was a new experience. The girls went to the Vatican and saw the Pope. They were impressed by the paintings on the ceiling of the Sistine Chapel. The coliseum was very impressive. The shops in Rome were wonderful, but the prices were so high that most of the students could not buy anything.

In Paris, the students used the metro to reach Notre Dame Cathedral and other famous attractions. By this time they were so hungry for American food that their favorite place was the Hard Rock Cafe with its hamburgers and nachos. Paris was very impressive, but the girls were limited in their time to see everything. The city was especially beautiful at night as they stood on the top of the Eiffel Tower. At \$75.00 per person, they decided not to eat at the restaurant on the top.

Christy and her friends felt like everyone should get the opportunity to visit Europe. They thought the smaller cities were better to see because it was easier to learn more about the culture in them. The prices are usually not as high, and the people are friendlier. Learning a foreign language was easier when they heard nothing but that language. Getting to visit the nation and learn its culture made the language study more enjoyable.

Justin is the grandson of Mr. & Mrs. J. D. Dewbre of Bronte.





Trouble breathing is a primary problem for about fifty thousand Americans with cystic fibrosis. The disease fills the lungs with thick mucus, and it's been treated mainly with antibiotics and by pounding on patients' chests to loosen the mucus. There's hope for something much better. Tests are being conducted on an aerosol spray made from genetically engineered proteins that helps clear the lungs of cystic fibrosis patients.
