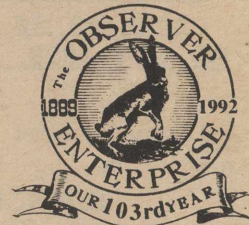

## Pageant will take audience back in time

This weekend, for the 16th year, beginning on Friday night (tonight), Coke County will step back in time, to its roots. "Ole Coke County - Home of the Rabbit Twisters", our own historical pageant, will come alive for the last 2 weekends in July - Friday and Saturday, the 24th and 25th and July 31-August 1. The site will be the Mt. Creek Amphitheatre in Robert Lee, in the north part of town behind the baseball fields. The Pageant Choir will entertain before the 8:30 pm start when the Indians begin to move among the mesquites and cedars. This sets the mood for the lifelike scenes, costumes, and feeling of being transported back in time.

No matter if you have seen the Pageant once or many

times, it's never the same and changes year to year, with new scenes and new faces.

Harrell Johnston, the Robert Lee postmaster, is the Rabbit Twister as he narrates the show which covers a time frame roughly from 1854-1906.

The music is original, much of it written by Lucile Bryan, longtime music teacher, who is the actual originator of the Pageant itself.

Seating area for the amphitheatre is made up of benches. Since the area seats hundreds, lawn chairs are allowed between benches for the audiences' comfort, or bring your cushions and stadium seats. Cooler weather promises a brief respite from the July heat normally prevailing. The opening night

promises to be a pleasurable experience.

Pageant tickets are \$3 for ages 5 to 12 and \$6 for ages 13 and older. There is no reserved seating. Discounts for groups of 20 or more can be arranged by calling 453-2831 or 453-2692.

The concession stand will offer sandwiches and snacks, with soft drinks and lemonade to drink.

**Hunter Safety and Wildlife Management Workshop**

A Hunter Safety and Wildlife management workshop is to be held at the Bronte High School Ag. Shop on July 27-30. The course is open to any man or woman, of any age, that is interested in hunter safety and wildlife management. The workshop will be held from 6:30 pm until 9:00 pm each day. Each person attending the workshop, above the age of 12, can receive the Hunters Education Card, which allows them to hunt in Texas as well as most all other states in the nation.

Effective Sept. 1, 1992, those born between Sept. 2, 1971 thru Aug. 31, 1976 must have completed the course. On Sept. 1, 1993, anyone 12 years of age must have completed the course. Anyone born after Sept. 1, 1971, is exempt, or does not have to have the card, to hunt in Texas. Thus, anyone born after Sept. 1, 1971 must have a Hunter

Education Card. A person must have attended a minimum of ten hours of the course in a minimum of two or more days, to receive the card. Regardless of age, Texas residents hunting in other states must have a Hunter Education Card.

Hunter Education is a movement to improve sport hunting. Not only will safety rules be discussed, a variety of topics from wildlife identification, hunting techniques, to wildlife management, will be taught that will be valuable to both young and old hunters. There will be various speakers that are very qualified in various areas of safety, etc., that will speak and answer questions. The cost of the course is \$5.00 and will be limited to 25 students.

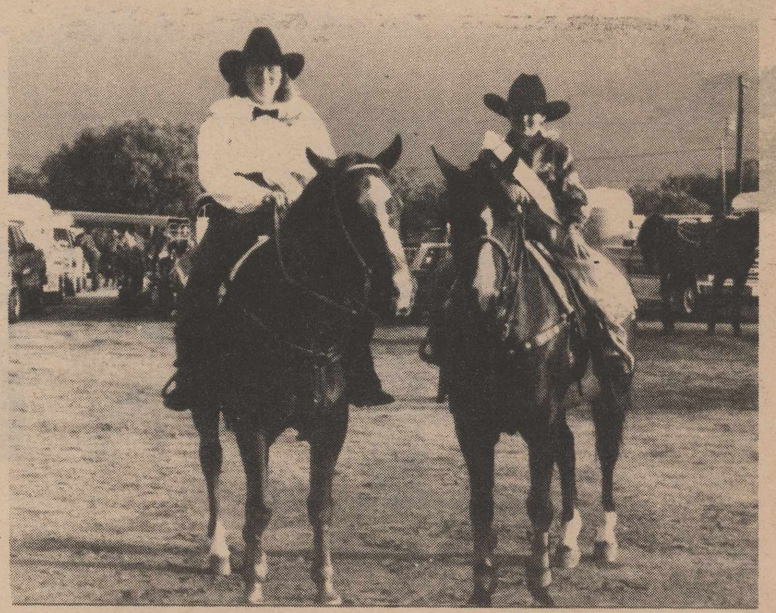
**Bronte OES meets at Masonic Hall**

Take two state-winning coaches and twelve of the best volleyball players in Texas, and what do you get? An all-star game so exciting that it left fans, players, and coaches alike pumped with adrenaline.

Connie Bozarth, head coach of the West All-Stars, teamed with Anne Krueger of San Antonio to direct a stellar team of talent.

For three days the group practiced four hours per day in the hot humid weather of Arlington to prepare for Saturday's all-star match.

The twelve players, all of whom have committed to play in college, not only had to sharpen their individual skills, but also had to get to know each other to play as a team.

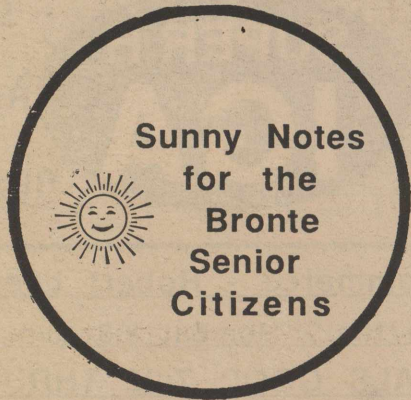

**Keep SS address current**

Any current Social Security beneficiary who has changed his or her address and not notified the Social Security Administration (SSA) needs to do so now in order to ensure that benefits do not stop. It is important that SSA have a correct address in case they need to contact beneficiaries about current entitlement to benefits.

Each January, SSA sends millions of benefit statements to its beneficiaries. When the post office returns a benefit statement as undeliverable, SSA remails the statement. If a new address has been submitted, the agency uses it. If the statement is returned as undeliverable for a second time, SSA uses other means to determine a new address.

For example, SSA asks banks and other financial institutions to furnish the correct address for direct depositors. Or, they check with the Post Office and telephone directory assistance for a different address.

If these efforts fail, SSA sends a letter to the last address informing the person that benefits will be suspended unless he or she contacts the agency.

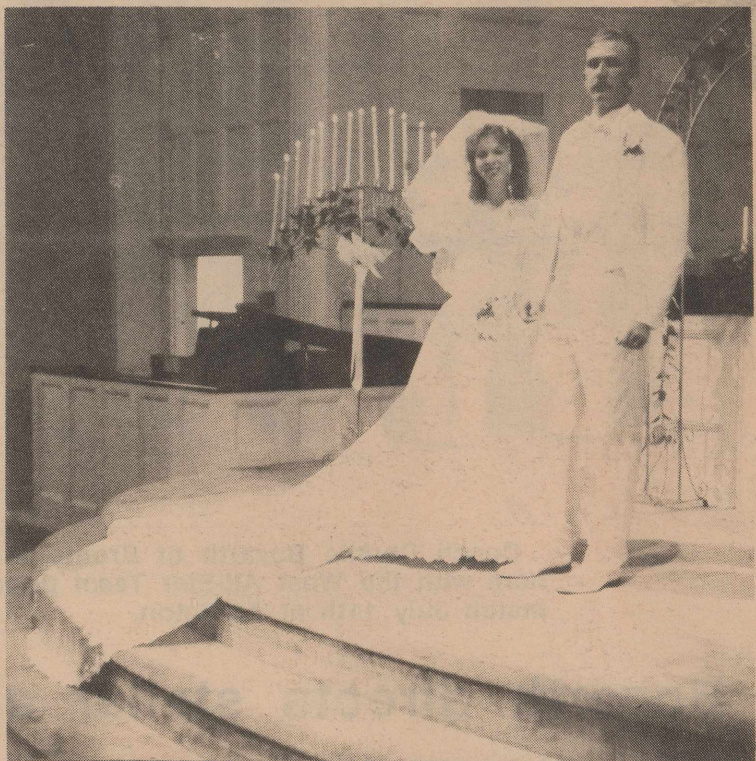

### SIDS Risk Reduced

The custom of placing infants on their stomachs when putting them into their cribs may seem logical, since if the infant were to spit up or vomit he might have a lower risk of choking. However, the American Academy of Pediatrics now recommends that healthy infants, when being put down to sleep, be placed on their side or back.

Studies suggest an association between Sudden Infant Death Syndrome and infants who sleep in the prone position. The pediatricians' organization says, while there is evidence linking SIDS to the prone position, there is none suggesting sleeping on the side or back is harmful to normal infants.

Specific causes of SIDS remain elusive, but studies show enough of an association with infants sleeping on their stomachs to warrant the change. However, the American Academy of Pediatrics says there are still good reasons why certain infants should be placed on their stomachs when sleeping so the issue should be discussed with your child's doctor.

West Texas Pecan Management

Newly transplanted trees require a minimum of seven to ten gallons of water per week depending upon soil structure.

A soaking type action where a hose or drip emitter disperses a small amount over a period of time reduces evaporation and produces a more constant soil moisture at a deeper soil depth.

Irrigation requirements increase with the age of the tree. Older trees will require as much as 50 inches of precipitation annually. Since the arid West averages less than 19 inches annually, a considerable amount of supplemental irrigation is required.

During the developmental stages of pecan nutlets, available moisture at two specific periods is critical to large, high quality pecans. The latter part of May and June are when pecans begin to size up. A deficiency of moisture during this period makes for small pecans. Early August and through September moisture is needed to fill nuts properly. Adequate moisture during June and July, but a short supply during August and September results in large poorly-filled pecans that even squirrels pass up.

Allowing water to soak from a slowly running outlet is one of the best methods of irrigating large trees.

Facts Associated with Pecan Production in West Texas

Pecan trees shed bark. As the tree grows older new bark is produced within the old bark and the older bark is sluffed off. Insects use these crevices and cracks for hiding, but are not usually pests. This bark sluff is a natural occurrence and is more pronounced in certain varieties such as Burkett.

Pecan varieties are chosen through breeding programs. Older varieties were improved native pecans. A native pecan is classified as a pecan that developed through generations of natural selection of wild trees.

If a Burkett nut is planted, the resulting tree will be a Burkett seedling and not a native or a Burkett. Only one of the parents, the female (Burkett) is known. The male parent could have been any pecan tree in the neighborhood or orchard. The nut produced from this variety seedling may look like a Burkett, like a male parent or like neither.

The sticky substance drop-

ping from pecan trees like rain is the result of insects feeding on pecan leaves. Those tiny insects are aphids which suck sap from leaflets and deposit a sticky substance commonly called honeydew. Large populations of yellow and black aphids are sometimes established in July, August, or September. Extensive leaf loss and a sticky mass can result.

Control of yellow pecan aphids is extremely difficult. Spraying trees with Malathion, Diazinon, or Lorsban may give temporary relief.

There are three main possible causes of pecan drop during the latter part of pecan development. These are:

1. An inadequate supply of available moisture. In order to produce nuts pecan trees must not be in a stress condition due to lack of water.
2. A deficiency, ie. essential nutrients. A poor fertilization and zinc spray program may result in pecans dropping prior to maturing. In addition, a heavy crop load in the preceding year reduces the level of stored food, and trees in this condition may shed pecans due to inadequate food reserves and as a self defense mechanism.
3. Insect or disease attack. Pecan pests will indirectly, through leaf damage or directly through nut damage, cause premature shedding of pecans. The following pests are most responsible:
  - a) Pecan Nut Casebearer
  - b) Hickory Shuckworm
  - c) Pecan Weevil
  - d) Black and Yellow Pecan Aphid
  - e) Pecan Scab

It was also discussed to print some more copies of the Arrott Book. This is to be looked into by Colleen Carnahan and reported on at next meeting.

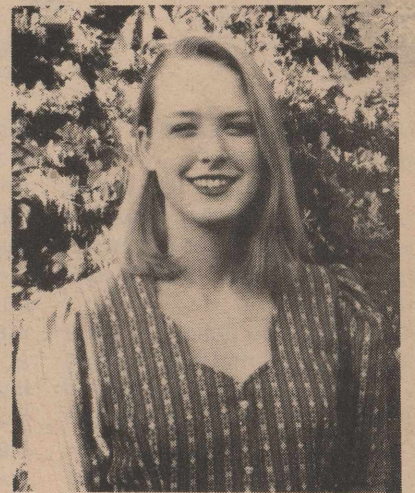


## Youth named to exchange

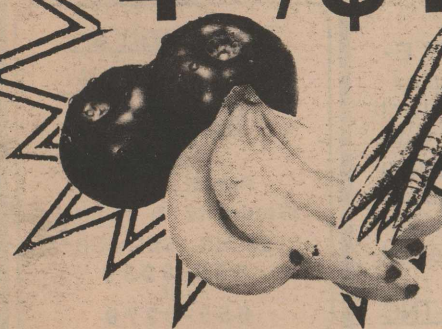

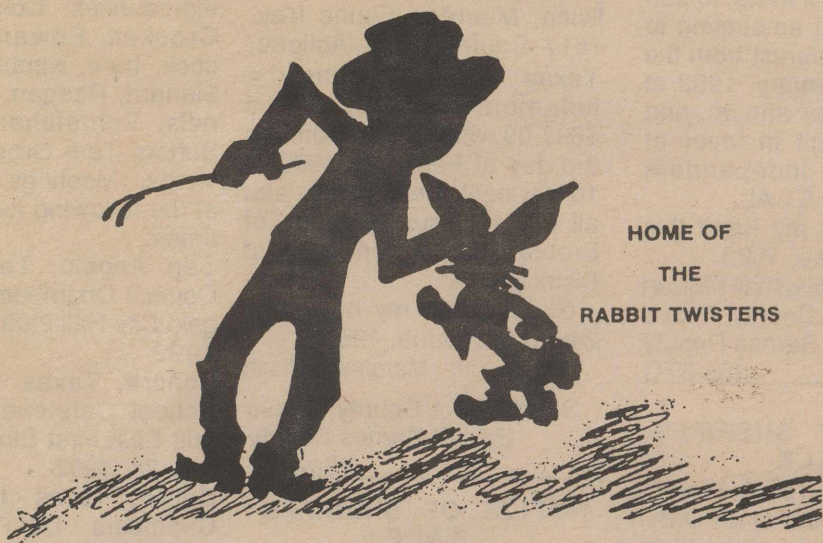
