## Unit roads on Nov. ballot

In Monday's Coke County Commissioners' Court meeting, the panel received voter petitions calling for the placement of a proposal for a unit road system on the next election ballot. Mike Ross, representative for the petition proponents, presented them to the group.

According to law, the petitions were required to have 127 qualified voter signatures. They contained 378 names and were turned over
to Tax Assessor/Collector, Kristie Roe for certification. Eight signatures were disqualified with 370 voter signatures certified as being qualified.

A decision for or against the adoption of a county unit road system will be made when the proposal appears on the ballot in the General Election on November 3, 1992.
Several other items on the agenda were passed until the next meeting.

## Joan Davis attends

 Justice ConferenceJustice of the Peace Joan Davis of Robert Lee attended a Conference on "Multi-Death Inquest/Disaster Planning" held in San Antonio, on July 23-24,1992. The seminar was sponsored by the Texas Justice Court Training Center, headquartered at Southwest Texas State University in San Marcos. The conference covered the following topics: Multi-Death Incident Case Studies, The Inquest Law and the Disaster Planning Act of 1975, Managing the MultiDeath Scene - The Medical Examiner's Perspective, The Investigative Role of the Federal Government at MultiDeath Scenes, Leadership and Incident Management and a Disaster Planning Strategy Session.
Speaking to the group of judges was Arnoldo Corpus of Mission, Jutice of the Peace of Hidalgo County, who worked the 1989 school bus accident in South Texas where 21 died. Judge Mary Lou Szymanski of Eagle Lake was also on the program. She worked a 1992 commercial plane crash where all aboard, 14, were killed.
Killeen Judge, Doyle Hardin, who was in charge of the fatalities following the mass shooting there, was also on the program, but was taken ill. In his place was Bob Mathis, who is now in business as a Disaster Planning Consultant. He was on duty during the 1981 Kansas City Hyatt Regency walkway collapse in which 108 people were killed; five died later. Mathis was at that time a captain with the Kansas City Police Department.
Highlight of the conference was the program brought to the large group by Dr. Vincent DiMaio, Bexar County Medical Examiner, who performs most of the autopsies in this area of the state.
All of the speakers and professionals at the conference urged the group of judges to return to their home counties and work with local Emergency Management which prepares the community for disasters.
The conference was held in downtown San Antonio at the Marriott Rivercenter

## Outdoor barbecue safety

Traditional summer barbecues can be fun and easy, until you get burned or injured. Keep in mind, safety is just as important as hamburgers and soda pop.
"Preparation can prevent injury," says Dr. Robert Fromm Jr., medical director of the Emergency Room at The Methodist Hospital in Houston. "Just a few simple steps can help ensure a safe family celebration."
If you are going to fire up the barbecue pit, use only tools with wooden handles. Metal cooking tools should not be used on a grill since metal will conduct heat between a hot grill and your hands. Additionally, plastic tools shouldn't be used because they can melt and stick to your skin.
"Never add lighter fluid to fire," says Fromm. "And, never toss or throw matches onto the charcoal -- you may miss your mark."
If you are using lighter fluid to start a fire, soak the charcoal and wait a few minutes before lighting. When lighting a grill use longer fireplac matches or a lighter wand

The first step is to eliminate contact with the burning substance, such as a barbecue tool, charcoal, or hot plastic.

However, ice should not be applied directly to a burn since it may actually freeze the tis sue and make it difficult to treat the affected area. Ice cold water can help cool and solidify the plastic making it easier to remove.
There are three degrees of burns: first, second, and third. First degree burns usually produce redness on the skin and do not require seeing a doctor unless there is pain or discomfort or the burn is on a joint area, such as the hand or foot.

Second-degree burns are more serious and will usually cause redness or blistering This type of burn should be examined by a doctor and may require treatment.
Third-degree burns are the most severe type of burns. These burns are deeper, and break and char the skin. Anyone with a third-degree burn should be taken to a hospital emergency room for treatment.

Farm loans being accepted by FmHA
Applications for emergency farm loans for losses caused by adverse weather conditions are being accepted a the Farmers Hom Administration (FmHA) office located in San Angelo, TX, FmHA County Supervisor, Paul Cline, said today.
Sterling And Coke are two of the counties in Texas re cently named by Secretary of Agriculture Edward Madigan as eligible for loans to cover part of actual production losses resulting from freeze and rain between October 28, 1991, and December 31, 1991
Paul Cline said farmers may be eligible for loans of up to 80 percent of their actua losses or the operating loan needed to continue in business or $\$ 500,000$, whicheve is less. For farmers unable to obtain credit from private commercial lenders, the interest rate is 4.5 percent.
As a general rule, a farmer must have suffered at least a 30 percent loss of production to be eligible for an FmHA emergency loan. Farmers participating in the PIK or Federal Crop Insurance programs will have to figure in proceeds from those programs in determining their loss.
Applications for loans under this emergency designation will be accepted until March 1 1993, but farmers should apply as soon as possible. Delays in applying could create backlogs in processing and possibly over into the new farming season.
FmHA is a credit agency of the U.S. Department of Agriculture. It is authorized to provide disaster emergency loans to recognized farmers who work at and rely on farming for a substantial part of their living. Eligibility is extended to individual farmers who are U.S. citizens and to farming partnerships corporations or cooperatives in which U.S. citizens hold a majority interest
The FmHA office in San Angelo is open from 8:00 am to 12 noon and $1: 00 \mathrm{pm}$ to 5:00 pm Monday through Friday.

He also commented on the results of caps placed on the amount of money junior show exhibitors could receive for their animals at auction. Money paid in excess of these caps (first implemented in 1992), $\$ 808,900$, was added to the show's scholarship fund.

Buying herbicides over the phone
Several inquiries have been received concerning the effectiveness of herbicides that are being sold by telephone. These herbicides have a variety of tradenames that are not readily recognizable.
A salesperson will contact farmers and ranchers by telephone. The product is promoted as a highly effective, broad spectrum herbicide for control of weeds and brush. The salesperson promises a quick and longlasting kill of the unwanted plants.
The herbicide or herbicides in the product vary. However, it often contains 2,4-D and may contain bromacil, mecoprop (MCPP), dichlorprop (2.4-DP) and petroleum distillates. The percentages of the herbicides in the mixture vary. Often the petroleum distillates may make up more then 96 percent of the mixture. The cost per gallon of the herbicide mixture is high ( $\$ 50$ to $\$ 90$ per gallon). In some cases, equivalent results may be obtained by using diesel fuel oil without herbicide. These herbicides have an EPA- approved label. Thus, farmers and ranchers should be en-
couraged to ask the salesperson to send a copy of the label that lists the active ingredients before they agree to purchase the herbicide. The telephone salespeople are persistent.

## Compost grass clippings

Mowing the lawn generates grass clippings that are excellent for a compost pile.
Compost is a good source of organic matter for gardens and flower beds. Furthermore, composting is an excellent way to dispose of garden debris, leaves and similar plant material.
Make the compost pile 4 to 6 feet wide and any length, depending on material and space available.
The simplest composting method is to alternate 4 to 6 inch layers of plant matter, such as leaves or grass, with 2 to 4 inches of good garden oil Add menure to the soil soil. Add manure to the soil layer if it's available, and sprinkle commercial fertilizer on each layer of plant matter to hasten decomposition. Use a cupful of fertilizer with a 1-1-1

The top layer of the compost pile should be soil and should form a basin to hold water. Water each layer of organic matter before adding the soil layer.

Water the pile thoroughly when completed; then add water as needed to keep the material moist but not soggy. Leaves decompose slowly if too dry.

Turn compost every three o four months to aerate the material and speed decomposition. Within six months to a year, it will be ready to use, and you'll be glad you saved those grass clippings.

## Protect the skin from summer hazards

Sunburns are not the only hazard your skin may face this summer. Take the time to protect your skin from bugs and poisonous plants, too, says a dermatologist at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston.
"Picnics, campouts and other outdoor activities do have their dangers," said Dr. John Wolf, chairman of dermatology at Baylor. "During the summer months, more people suffer from severe skin damage than any other time of the year."
Insect bites and stings are the leading cause of animalrelated deaths in America. Certain insects are potentially dangerous because they can transmit diseases such as St. Louis encephalitis spread by the Culex mosquito, and the tick-caused Lyme disease.
Some allergy sufferers are particularly susceptible to stinging insects. Wolf recommends that people with allergies to bee or wasp stings carry a first-aid kit containing injectable forms of antihistamines, adrenaline and cortisone.
"Some people are hypersensitive to insect stings which can cause an itchy, painful rash and even anaphylactic shock," he said. "It is important to treat the sting immediately. For some, it could be fatal."
Approximately one million Americans are allergic to ven omous bees, yellow jackets, hornets and fire ants. An es timated 50 people die from a
sting each year. Wolf says extreme caution should be taken when going outdoors. However, if a bee stings, gently remove the stinger with tweezers and place an ice pack on the infected skin to reduce swelling. Scratching should be avoided.
At the beach, the Portuguese man-of-war, a type of stinging jellyfish, can produce whelps, blisters, discoloration and scarring. In rare cases, its venom can cause brain and heart damage and even death. Other less venomous jellyfish can still cause discomfort.
Wolf suggests sprinkling the skin with meat tenderizer which contains papain, an enzyme that deactivates the jellyfish's venom. Rinse the tentacles with salt water and carefully remove them, and take an antihistamine to minimize any allergic reaction.
Campers and hikers should watch for poison ivy which can disguise itself in shrubbery. Wolf says remember the phrase, "leaves of three, leave them be," while enjoying the great outdoors.
When first-aid treatment does not rid the pain, swelling and redness, consult a physician. Antibiotics or corticosteroid drugs may be more effective.

Wolf reminds beach-goers not to forget about sunburns, the most common skin problem for vacationers. He recommends "rescuing" the skin with a cool, wet towel, fol-
lowed by a moisturizing lotion and a pain reliever.
Wolf suggests the following summer-related prevention tips:

Wear insect repellent. People who are allergic to bee and fire ant venom should avoid wearing perfumes or scented soaps which may attract insects.
Campers and hikers should wear longsleeved shirts and long pants or knee-high socks and shorts to guard against ticks and mosquitoes.
Do not panic and duck or swat at the flying insect when approached, but instead, walk slowly away from it.
Wear sunscreen with a sun protection factor (SPF) of 15 or higher to prevent sunburn
Carry a first-aid kit containing cotton balls, alcohol, aspirin or other pain medications, calamine lotion or corticosteroid cream, and bandages.
Discard garbage immediately to prevent unwelcome insects.
Check if there are any animal- or insect-borne diseases such as Rocky Mountain spotted fever or viral encephalitis in the area you plan to visit.
Whether you go to the beach, or picnic in the park or at home always be prepared " wolf said "By taking a few, common sense precautions you can have an enjoyable and safe holiday."

## Aging and Exercise

Will you live longer if you adopt a program of intense and regular exercise? Researchers at the University of Texas Health Science Center at San Antonio say tests with laboratory animals show the maximum lifespan of those on an exercise program was no better than that of another group that had no exercise.

Before you head for the couch, you might consider that Dr. Roger McCarter and his colleagues did find that more of the exercising animals lived to old age than the nonexercising animals, suggesting, as previous studies have, that exercise may help fight disease that could otherwise shorten the animal's life.

Dr. McCarter says animals that consumed less than a normal amount of calories were the ones that voluntarily exercised the most. The research, funded by the National Institute on Aging, showed animals that exercised the most tended to live nearer their maximum expected lifespan.

Many people may think that if they disagree with a decision made by a large govern ment bureaucracy such as Social Security, the bureau cracy would just as soon have them keep their opinions to themselves.
It isn't true. One of the good things about Social Security is that the system stresses fairness. And, the "appeals pro cess" is designed to make sure that every claimant gets every opportunity to present all the evidence in his or her case.
Here's how the system works.
Suppose that you are one of the 3 million people who apply for disability benefits under the Social Security or Supplemental Security in come programs each year And, suppose that your claim is denied. You would firs learn the denial through a let ter that explains why we had to say no. If you disagree with the denial you can appeal the the denial
decision.
There are three separate levels of appeal:

1) Reconsideration-- This involves a complete review of your claim by someone who was not involved in the firs decision. Your request for a decision. Your request for a
reconsideration must be made in writing, and must be sent to Social Security within 60 days of the date you re ceived the denial notice. During reconsideraton of your claim, you can present new evidence.
2) Hearing-- If your claim is denied on reconsideration, then you have 60 days to re quest a hearing before an Administrative Law Judge. The judge will look at all previous evidence in your case and also allow you to present new evidence and call any witnesses to testify in your behalf. If for any reason you or your representative can't attend a hearing, then you must notify the judge in writing, and you may have your hearing rescheduled.
3) Appeals Council ReviewIf your claim is denied at the hearing, you have 60 days from the date you receive the Administrative Law Judge's decision to request in writing a review by Social Security's Appeals Council.
If you go through all these appeals and are still not satisfied that your case was fairly and correctly adjudicated then you can file a lawsuit in a Federal district court.
Any Social Security office can help you prepare your appeal before the Social $\mathrm{Se}-$ curity Administration or you may choose someone to represent you during the appeal-a relative, friend or lawyer. This representative cannot charge you a fee without first getting written approval from Social Security. Also, Social Security has guidelines on who can and cannot represent you.

## FmHA to accept EIDLs from businesses

Walter Fronstin, district director of the U.S. Small Business Administration in Lubbock announced that SBA is accepting applications for Economic Injury Disaster Loans (EIDLs) from eligible small business concerns and small agricultural cooperatives without credit available elsewhere. Applicants must have sustained substantial economic injury because of their dependence upon farmers and ranchers who suffered the agricultural damages. "Farmers and ranchers are not eligible to apply for these SBA loans," Fronstin said. "However, nurseries that are victims of drought can apply."
Fronstin said that businesses seeking loan information and loan applications may call SBA's Area 3 Disaster Office in Fort Worth since all disaster loans are processed through
that office. The toll-free number is 1-800-473-0477 or TDD 817-267-4688 for the hearing impaired.

Businesses located in the following counties in the Lubbock District and were affected by freeze and rain between October 28, 1991 and December 31, 1991 have until March 1, 1992 to file an EIDL application: Borden, Coke, Fisher, Howard, Mitchell, Nolan, Scurry, SterMitch
ling.

The EIDL loan program is intended to assist agriculturedependent business and small agricultural cooperatives who substained a substantial decrease in sales (or other forms of economic injury) directly due to losses incurred by the farmers and ranchers to whom the business usually sells. In some cases, this may include non-agriclture-releat-
ed businesses which sustain a substantial economic loss directly due to the inability of the farmer affected by the disaster to purchase goods and services at their normal levels. Small businesses claming to have been physically injured by the specified adverse weather are not eligible for the EIDL loans.
Fronstin said the program is available only to those businesses that are considered small by SBA's size standards and do not have credit available from other sources.
The interest rate for loans processed under this designation is 4 percent. The loans are limited to the financial needs of the applicant based on the actual economic injury and may be made for up to $\$ 500,000$. A loan may extend to 30 years, depending on repayment ability.
