Court approves 911 emergency system

The Coke County Commissioners Court approved on Monday, August 10, 1992, the debated 911 emergency system.

A sizable crowd attended the meeting, most in support of the system. Both West Coke County and East Coke County nursing homes will have a dispatching center for response to the emergency medical groups, fire depart-

ments, and the Sheriff's office.

The proposal will now go to the Concho Valley Council of Governments; in turn it will go to the state agency for funding. On January 1, 1993, a fifty cent charge per month will be made to every Coke County telephone, to go toward the cost. The Council of Governments is hopeful the

911 system can be implemented within six months of the January 1, date or by midyear 1993. More work and planning is forthcoming.

Remainder of the meeting was taken by budget planning, approval of bills, Senior Center contracts for service and food, van driver regulation, and other miscellaneous business.

Coke County Commissioners recently granted a contract for drilling three water wells in an attempt to locate sheet water and prevent courthouse basement seepage.

sources of information, county commissioners, under advisement of White Buffalo Environmental Service, Inc. in San Angelo, drilled three water test wells. The well on the north, midway of the building, was dry. Well #2 at the northwest corner of the courthouse produced about five gallons per minute while well #3 at the southwest corner guaged seven gallons a minute. A pump was put on the last well, hoping to pump it away from the building's basement. The water, first thought to be a spring, is slightly "hard" and is thought to be sheet water.

For the last week, the well water has been directed away from the structure onto the trees and grass. Later, if the water table holds up, it could possibly be used in the cool-

ing tower.

At presstime Wednesday morning, the northwest well had weakened, apparently being pulled by the southwest well. The basement seepage has slowed and at present the outcome of the operation appears successful.

Aging funding decreases

The FY 1993 appropriation numbers passed by the House of Representatives for aging related programs did not fare well, being reduced an average of one percent from FY 1992 or a total of \$8.2 million. Funding for the White House Conference on Aging was eliminated. This appropriation level is due to the lack of reauthorization of the Older Americans Act. The Act is still held up in the Senate due to an unrelated amendment put on by Sen. John McCain (R-AZ) regarding the Social Security earnings test. Therefore a lack of a reauthorized Older Americans Act has caused a real loss of program dollars for Older Americans Act programs

In other programs in the House bill, the Low Income Home Energy Assistance

Programs were reduced by \$609 million or 57 percent. However, National Institute on Aging programs increased roughly \$18.6 million, a 4.9 percent increase from the previous year. This was largely due to the intense lobbying done by advocates for research programs on Capitol

The Senate appropriations committee is expected to act very soon on their version of the FY 1993 appropriations.

The National Association of Area Agencies on Aging are seeking support for these older American programs by contacting your Senators and asking them to move immediately and vote for increases in appropriations. Aid could come from advisory councils, service providers, and other advocates by drawing their attention and support.

Controlling pond weeds With warm weather, weeds watermilfoil

are not only growing in yards and fields but also in stock ponds.

Some weeds or green vegetation is necessary for oxygen formation vital to fish survival, but an overabundance of weeds makes the tank impossible to fish or swim in.

There are three types of vegetation problems in farm ponds. These are algae, submerged weeds and emerged weeds.

Algae can be controlled with algacides that are supplied directly to the water.

More common ones include copper sulfate (bluestone) and Cutrine Plus. Copper sulfate rates are .5 to three pounds per acre foot of water, while Cutrine Plus calls for 60 pounds per acre or .6 gallons per acre foot of water.

Both of these are safe for livestock water.

Also, Hydrothol 191 can be used, but no fishing, livestock or domestic water use can be utilized for three months. Rates for hydrothol range from 3-11 pounds per acre for granular and .6 to 2.2 pints per acre foot for liquid.

Emerged weeds such as cattails, waterlilly or arrowhead leaf can be effectively controlled with Rodeo (glyphospate) and diquat if livestock are using the water.

Water treated with Rodeo has no restrictions while that treated with diquat has a 10-14 day restriction on use.

Rodeo is used at 3 quarts per acre in 100 gallons of water applied.

Submerged plants such as

pondweed and bladderwart can be treated with diquat, endothal or Aquakleen (2,4-

Diquat has a 7-25 day restriction and Aquakleen has no restriction for use by beef animals but cannot be used for dairy animals.

Drink water to help diet

Everyone knows that water is good for you, but recent studies have shown that drinking plenty of water may actually help you lose weight. According to Tracey Norman, R.D., outpatient dietitian at Methodist Hospital, water naturally suppresses the appetite and helps the body metabolize stored fat. "Drinking about eight 8 ounce glasses of water each day can actually help reduce fat deposits," said Norman.


Here's why: the kidneys don't work properly without enough water, and when they don't work to their capacity some of their load is taken on by the liver. One of the liver's primary functions is to metabolize stored fat. But, if the liver has to do some of the kidney's work, it can't operate fully and as a result, metabolizes less fat. So, more fat is stored throughout the body.

The study also revealed that drinking plenty of water has a converse effect on water retention - drinking plenty of water actually helps guard against fluid retention. "When the body gets less water than it needs, it preceives it as a threat and begins to retain it," said Norman. "So, the best way to overcome the problem of water retention is to give your body what it needs plenty of water." Drinking water also helps rid the body of excess salt, which is another major contributor to water retention.

Some other benefits of drinking water include better muscle and skin tone and improved irregularity.

The average person needs to drink about two quarts (eight 8-ounce glasses) of water each day. Water intake should be increased during exercise, or in hot, dry weath-

Overweight people should drink an additional 8 ounces of water for every 25 pounds of excess weight.



Just One Sunburn...


Do you think a suntan makes your child look healthy? You're not alone. Most parents surveyed think so, despite clear evidence that even one sunburn in childhood increases the risk for skin cancer later in life.

Researchers at the University of Texas Medical Branch in Galveston wrote, in Archives of Dermatology (5-92), only about half of the parents questioned had been using sunscreen lotions on their children, and use of sunscreens tended to come after the child has previously experienced painful sunburns.

Dr. Lurleen Maducdoc and her colleagues say even children not susceptible to painful sunburns need protection from the sun, since they receive three times more damaging ultraviolet-type B radiation than adults.

The report is not trying to prevent fun in the sun, rather, it wants to remind parents there is no such thing as a healthy tan.

Measles cases confirmed

The measles outbreak in South Texas is a close example of a disease that is affecting many lives. People around the state should take precautions, and be immunized.

This year alone, more than 600 confirmed measles cases have been reported in over 20 counties in South Texas, primarily in Hidalgo County. Recently, an 18-month-old, unimmunized child, died of suspected measles. The Public Health Region 3 communicable disease staff of the Texas Department of Health is currently monitoring measles cases in the region and providing vaccine to all Public Health Clinics.

According to Charles Mallory, Program Manager for the Communicable Disease Programs for Region 3, "Even though no measles cases have been reported in the region this season, it is still very important for your children and young adults to be immunized against measles. Measles is not just a disease of young school children, in fact, more than one third of all cases occur in people of 15 years of age and older. "Anyone having questions regarding immunizations should call the local Public Health Region 3 field office clinic, county health department, or your private doctor for information.

People catch measles by

breathing the measles virus that an infected person spreads by coughing, sneezing or simply talking. It takes from 10 to 14 days for a person to begin to show the symptoms of measles: high fever, rash, runny nose, watery eyes, or cough.

Babies and adults who catch the measles are often much sicker and are more likely to suffer longer than elementary school children and teenagers with measles.

Measles is often a severe disease, with frequent complications such as middle ear infection, or, more rarely, convulsions, hearing loss, and mental retardation. In the United States, 1 child out of every 500 to 10,000 who gets measles dies.

Public Health Region 3 recommends that infants and children be immunized at 15 months of age, and again at 4 to 6 (before entering school). Children will receive a combination vaccine, MMR (Measles, Mumps, Rubella).

Adults born after 1957 who have not had the live measles virus vaccine on or after their first birthday, had a case of measles diagnosed by a doctor, or had a blood test for measles, should be immunized.



Burning CRP Fields

The winter season will be here before we know it, and it is time to begin thinking about prescribed burning in CRP fields. If you have not thought about burning your 3 to 6 year old CRP, consider these advantages: a reduction in the population of predators and varmints; a reduction in the chance for uncontrolled wild-fire; benefits to quail and deer; and invigoration of grass.

Several years after establishment, most CRP fields develop dense mats of old dry grass. This accumulation of dry grass provides an ideal home for critters like skunks, coyotes, and wild housecats and poses an increased threat of wildfire. This same buildup of several years grass growth limits habitat quality for quail, who need sparse vegetation to walk through, and deer, who eat small weeds.

Finally, range grasses developed under a fire and grazing ecology. If excessive dead top growth is not removed periodically, it will choke and severely weaken the grass stand.

Breast cancer clinic set

The Breast Cancer Detection Unit will be in Bronte, Monday, August 31, 1992, at the Bronte Senior Center. Call 473-6471 for information or to make an appointment.

According to the American Cancer Society, one of ten women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime in her lifetime. It is currently estimated that over 37,000 women die each year as the result of breast cancer.

Ninety percent of breast cancers are diagnosed by women or their physicians finding a lump in the breast. Women who are diagnosed with a lump large enough to feel have a 50 percent five year survival rate. A women who is diagnosed as having breast cancer by mammography, before a lump can be felt, has a 97 precent ten year survival rate.

A mammogram can detect a cancer, even before it can be felt

The American Cancer Society has established guidelines for mammography in asymptomatic women. (Women who have no symptoms of the disease.) Those guidelines have been adopted by the American Academy of Family Physicians, Amer-

ican College of Obstetricians and Gynecologists, and The American College of Radiology. Those guidelines are as follows:

1) 35-40 years of age- One baseline mammogram.

2) 40-50 years of age- A mammogram every 1-2 years depending on breast type and risk factor.

3) 50 years of age and over-An annual physician examination and annual mammogram.
4) Asymptomatic women under 50 years of age with significant high risk factors should be examined at appropriate intervals. These risk factors include previous breast cancer and family

history of cancer.

5) A symptomatic women should have a mammogram at any age when she experiences a mass, nipple discharge, skin changes or unexplained breast pain.

A screening mammogram is an x-ray of the breast using extremely low dosages of radiation (usually comparable to dental x-rays) and is designed to find very early cancers.
