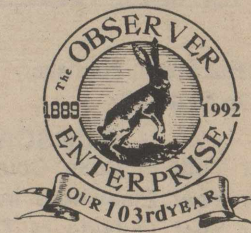

Prospects for dove season look brighter

Prospects look a little brighter for the September 1, 1992 opening of Mourning Dove Season than they have for the last four or five years. Adequate rainfall has produced the best weed crops and ag crops that Coke County, or the rest of the state for that matter, has seen for a number of years. Abundant standing water reserves along with the food supply seem to have encouraged some resident birds to nest in the area for a change.

Hunting regulations are basically the same as in the years past. Daily bag limits have been set at 12 birds; hunting hours are one-half hour before sunrise to sunset; shotguns must be plugged back to three shells for migratory birds. A less familiar law prohibits hunting doves over a baited area. Normal livestock operations do not constitute baiting. As always, get the free Texas Early Season Migratory Game Bird guide wherever sporting goods and license are sold for more specific laws and statewide regulations.

All Texas fishing and hunting license expire on August 31, 1992. Get a new hunting license before starting your

Mourning Dove season. Most license and stamps are the same as last year. The resi-

dent combo hunting/fishing license is \$25 and separately they are \$13 each.

park under the shade trees.

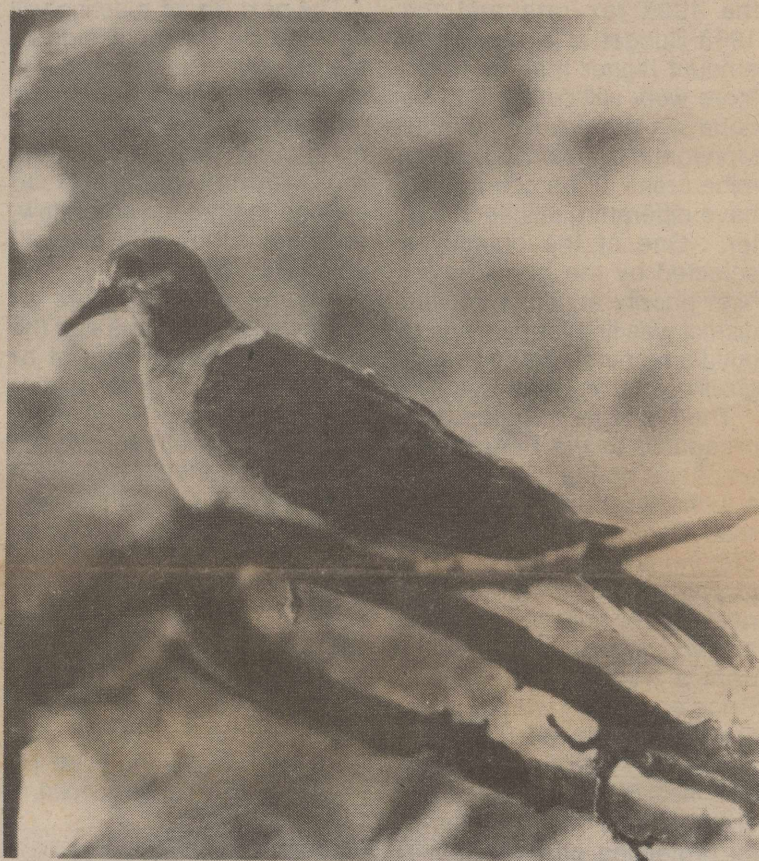
Mrs. Crenshaw says the BBQ and chili cooks for the Rabbit Twister Cook-Off are enthusiastic and ready to go.

CCUWCD sets '93 budget

The Coke County Under-ground Water Conservation District met recently in regular session to hold a public hearing on the 1993 Budget and to take care of other business of the district. The Board set the 1993 tax rate and the 1993 Budget at a very small amount higher than in 1992. More work will continue to be done on the Water Quality Monitoring Network to determine areas of the county that have different qualities of water. One of the objectives selected by the directors for high priority action when the district was first formed was to build a resource data base for groundwater in Coke County.

The Manager's Report was presented to the Board, with emphasis on the following:

1. Lena Guerrero, Texas Railroad Commissioner's trip to Sterling County exposed her to salt water contamination related to oil field activity. She also was given a taste of water from a water well on Frank Price's ranch which had turned salty in the last few years. Ms. Guerrero was also informed of water district operations and their concerns for protecting groundwater in the area.

2. Texas Water Commissioners John Hall and Peggy Garner also made a trip to Sterling County. Chairman Hall gave a talk and gave reasons for the Commission's actions on the Edwards Aquifer. In a meeting with groundwater district managers and directors, Chairman Hall made the statement that he thought single county water districts were doing an effective job in West Texas. He also said he would support legislation to exempt groundwater districts and all aquifers in the state, with the exception of the Edwards, from Texas Water Commission management and control.

3. The Extension Service and Senator Bill Sims are proposing a Water Education Conference to be held in San Angelo. The title of the program is "WATER IN 2020: WILL IT BE THERE?" The program will be planned to interest all segments of the population around San Angelo. Water districts will cooperate with this conference.

The Board of Directors went on record to oppose the Texas Water Commission action of changing the Edwards Aquifer to an underground river whereby it would be un-

der TWC control and management. The Board is concerned that the TWC action, if upheld by a court of law, would set a precedent for future state management in other areas of the state.

The next Board meeting will be held on the east side of the County. Bud Johnson will show and explain the various formations where water enters the ground, the directions the rock formations slope to change the groundwater flow, and where the water is available for pumping.

Anyone who believes in private property rights and the continued private control of groundwater, or the continued right to continue to manage any type of property as they see fit should so inform their elected representatives.

Water analyses is still being done for those well owners who wish to have their water tested. Those interested can contact the district office or one of the district directors.

The current district directors are: Wayne McCabe, Joe Ash, Bud Johnson, Fred H. McCabe, Jr., and Otis Smith.

Memory Lane was voted 1990 "Band of the Year" by the Metroplex Country Music Association and also received the 1990 Terry Award for "Danceband of the Year."

McBroom

Graveside services were held on Sunday, August 23, 1992, in the Robert Lee Cemetery for Chanda Brown McBroom, longtime resident and teacher of Robert Lee. Greg Fleming was the officiant.

Mrs. McBroom, 75, died Saturday morning, August 22, 1992, in Hendricks Hospital in Abilene.

She was born in Robert Lee on April 10, 1917, to Nathaniel Crockett and Agnes Augusta Brown, the youngest of fourteen children. Her father, N.C. Brown was a postmaster, teacher, and a Church of Christ minister. For many years the Southside Church of Christ was referred to as the "Brown Church" in deference to his large family and other relatives.

Mrs. McBroom began teaching school as a young woman and at one time taught at Hayrick School between Bronte and Robert Lee, while living with a young couple, Melvin and Essie Childress. She was married to Russell McBroom on October 26, 1945, in San Angelo. They made their home in New Mexico for ten years. Mrs. McBroom taught school in New Mexico and in Lamesa. The couple returned to Robert Lee with their family where she began a long teaching career. After almost twenty years, she retired in 1980.

Russell McBroom died in 1980 and after a short period Mrs. McBroom became a missionary to Argentina where she served for nine years, along with her daughter, Marilyn McBroom. She was a lifelong member of the Church of Christ.

Her survivors include two

daughters, Linda Carol McBroom of Seattle, Washington and Marilyn Sue McBroom of Abilene; two sons, Robert Chisom McBroom of Oak Ridge, Tennessee and Thomas Wayne McBroom of San Antonio; one sister, Alice Aycock of Corsicana; five grandchildren; numerous nieces and nephews, including Dale and Juanell Brown and Pritch and Dot Brown, all of Robert Lee; and a sister-in-law, Ruth Brown of Robert Lee.

Annual Sheep and Goat Field Day Set

The Texas A&M University Research and Extension Center's annual Sheep and Goat Field Day in San Angelo has been set for September 3, 1992. This year's event is being dedicated to Dr. George Ahlschwede who recently retired after eighteen years as the Center's Extension Sheep and Goat Specialist.

Outside walking tours will begin at 9:45 am under the direction of Dr. Frank Craddock, newly named San Angelo based Extension (TAEX) Sheep and Goat Specialist. The tour topics and speakers will include: "Managing Sheep to Reduce Damage from Spear Grass", Rex Jones, Tom Green County Extension Agent and Steve Byrns, TAEX, Communications Specialist; "Prevention of Sore-mouth and Other Diseases", Dr. Andres de la Concha, Assistant Professor, Texas Agricultural Experiment Station (TAES) San Angelo and Dr. Charles "Butch" Taylor, Associate Professor, TAEX- Sonora; "Ratites (Ostriches and Emus)", Tom Carter, Irion County Ranchman and Dr. Dale Rollins, TAEX, San Angelo-based Wildlife Specialist; and "Noxious Plant Control Update", Dr. Darrell Ueckert, Professor, TAEX, San Angelo, Dr. Jake Landers, TAEX, San Angelo-based Range Specialist and Dr. Billy Warrick, TAEX, San Angelo-based Agronomist.

Following an 11:45 am to 12:45 pm "dutch-treat" lamb lunch the field day will go inside for the formal program under the direction of newly named Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers Association President, Robert Pfluger.

The session will begin with a special recognition of Dr. Ahlschwede by Dr. Carl Menzies, the Center's Director of Research. Ahlschwede retired March 31, after twenty seven years of Extension work in this area and with the Kansas Cooperative Extension Service. A strong leader in the state and national sheep and goat circles, Ahlschwede was instrumental in starting the sale of performance tested rams following the annual Sonora Ram Performance Test. The test and sale features rams from some of the top Rambouillet flocks in the world. It is touted as the single most significant factor in the improvement of sheep across West Texas.

Legislators are sworn in

The hundred-sixteen newly elected members of the Fourth Silver Haired Legislature were sworn-in in the Texas House of Representatives chambers by Secretary of State John Hannah Jr. Tuesday, August 4, 1992. Leo Kilmer is the representative for this area.

The Texas Silver Haired Legislature is a non-partisan body whose members are at least 60 years of age and are elected by their senior peers to represent twenty-eight districts statewide. They are duty-bound to stay in touch with the seniors in their districts, to understand their concerns, carry these concerns to the State representative and seek legislation to address the issues.

After the swearing-in ceremony representatives spent three days in the election of its leadership, forming committees and orientation sessions for its new members.

Speakers during the session were State Attorney General Dan Morales, State Comptroller John Sharp, State Treasurer Kay Bailey

Hutchinson, and Secretary of State John Hannah Jr.

The Texas Silver Haired Legislature will meet in General Session beginning on September 15th, at which time resolutions will be adopted and prioritized for submission to the 73rd Texas State Legislature for their consideration when it meets January 1993.

One of the primary concerns of the Fourth Silver Haired Legislature is additional funding for the health care and support of the nutrition centers and the in-home delivery of meals to the home bound senior citizens. Texas ranks forty-ninth in per capita funding for the elderly, a mere two dollars and thirty five cents, when our neighboring state New Mexico appropriates thirty eight dollars and fifty eight cents. The average for region VI, a five state area which includes Texas, is eleven dollars and eleven cents per capita. If additional funds are not forthcoming, some nutrition centers may have to be closed and some reduction in home delivered meals may have to be made.

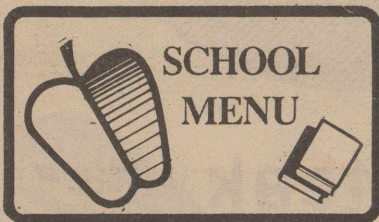

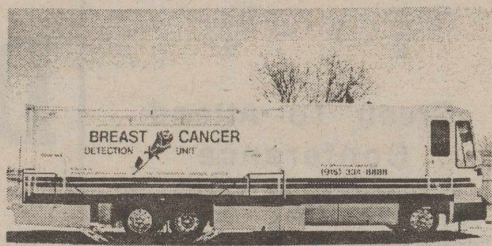

According to the American Cancer Society, one out of ten women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime in her lifetime. It is currently estimated that over 37,000 women die each year as the result of breast cancer.

Ninety percent of breast cancers are diagnosed by women or their physicians finding a lump in the breast. Women who are diagnosed with a lump large enough to feel have a 50 percent five year survival rate. A woman who is diagnosed as having breast cancer by mammography, before a lump can be felt, has a 97% five year survival rate and a 90% 10 year survival rate.

A mammogram can detect a cancer this small, even before it can be felt.

Guidelines For Screening Mammography Established by the American Cancer Society.

- I. 35-40 years of age - One baseline mammogram.
- II. 40-50 years of age - A mammogram every 1-2 years depending on breast type and risk factor.
- III. 50 years of age and over - An annual physical examination and annual mammogram.
- IV. Asymptomatic women under 50 years of age with significant high risk factors should be examined at appropriate intervals. These risk factors include previous breast cancer and family history of cancer.

V. A symptomatic woman should have a mammogram at any age when she experiences a mass, nipple discharge, skin changes or unexplained breast pain.

A screening mammogram is an x-ray of the breast using extremely low dosages of radiation (usually comparable to dental x-rays) and is designed to find very early cancers.

A female technologist who is highly trained in mammography will perform the examination.

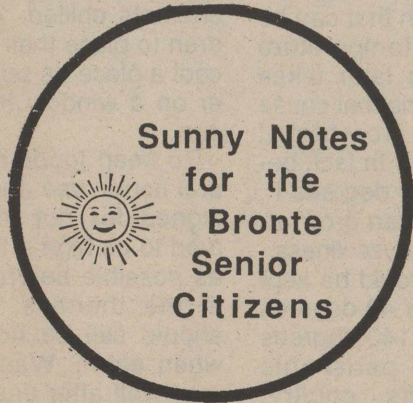

Long visits Ukraine

Briefly, I will share with you the highlights of our Partnership Mission to Russia. The trip was sponsored by the Southern Baptist. People from fifteen states participated. Taylor Henley of San Angelo was the guide.

The flight from Dallas to Frankfort takes 9 1/2 hours, from Frankfort to Moscow - 2 1/2, from Moscow to Simferopol - 1 hour 45 min. Then by car we drove 4 hours to Kerch. We left Dallas at 7:30 Thursday night, spent a few hours in Moscow, and got to Kerch on Saturday night about 8:00. We were totally exhausted.

We went to the Crimea area of the Ukraine, the southern most part of the former Soviet Union. The Crimea is a peninsula bordered on one side by the Black Sea and the Azov Sea on the other. Our eighty-six members were divided into twenty-two teams and were placed in twenty-two different places mostly along the coast line of Crimea. I was located at Kerch, the eastern most city in the Crimea. Kerch is a port city, and was very important during World War II. I saw historical spots that date back four centuries B.C.

The most important thing that happened was that more than 8,000 people accepted Christ. Many Christians were encouraged to be bolder. There is no Christian material to help train the children and new Christians, so training is slow.

Most of the Christian people we met had enough food and a few changes of clothing, but not enough money for extra things. We did see extreme poverty, though.

A church is called a "House of Prayer". They always stand to pray, sing, or read scriptures. They also stand to pray before and after meals.

The Christian people I met at Kerch were so kind, loving, and generous. They treated us like royalty. The food was very good and plentiful. They just could not believe that someone from America would

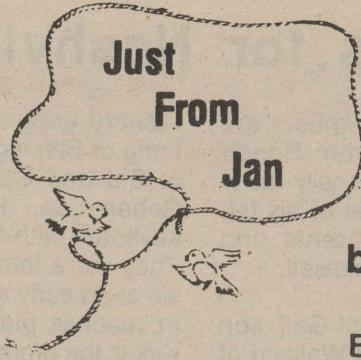

around when it might be caused by the "food bug."

Packing a lunch that can be stored at room temperature and eaten hours later takes extra care. Bacteria that cause foodborne illness grow best at room temperature. In fact, between 40 and 140 degrees F, enough bacteria can grow after two hours to cause illness.

Some foods should be kept either cold (below 40 degrees F) or hot (above 140 degrees F). These are perishable foods like meats, poultry, seafood, eggs and milk products (including yogurt). The key to packing a safe lunch is to keep cold foods cold, hot foods hot and everything clean. Here's why and how.

To grow, the bacteria that cause foodborne illness need the right temperature, moisture and a food source like protein. So any moist, protein-containing food is susceptible to bacterial growth. If the food is handled a lot during preparation, there's the extra risk of spreading germs from your hands to the food. That means there's more risk of contamination with meat salads like ham, chicken or egg salad.

If you choose cooked, ready-to-eat lunchmeats for a sandwich, pay attention to "use-by" dates. These products may contain a type of bacteria that can grow slowly at refrigerator temperatures.

Ideally, you should store lunches in a refrigerator to keep them cold, but this often is not possible. Lunch boxes, especially insulated ones, generally keep foods cold much better than paper bags. A commercial freezing gel, a

container filled with ice or a frozen drink helps keep lunch contents chilled. Advise children to place their lunch in as cool a place as possible, never on a window ledge in the sun.

To keep foods hot for several hours, use a thermos designed for hot food. Bring food to as high a temperature as possible before pouring it in the thermos. The food should still be hot to touch when eaten. Wash the thermos well after each use and then rinse the inside with boiling water before using again.

While preparing lunches, keep everything clean to avoid spreading bacteria. Be sure utensils, hands and work areas are clean. Wash food containers, including the thermos and the lunch box itself, after each use. Wrap foods in clean wrap. If using brown paper bags, buy bags made for that purpose. Grocery bags may be contaminated from insects or food leakage.

Occasionally, foods that don't need to be kept hot or cold may be a desirable lunch choice. These foods include peanut butter, dry meats such as beef jerky, and some non-perishable cheeses and cheese spreads. Other options are meat, poultry and seafood canned products, opened and eaten immediately; fresh fruits and vegetables; and breads, cereals and nuts. Some packaged ready-to-eat foods in individual-size servings, such as canned fruits and puddings, make a nice addition to a carried lunch.

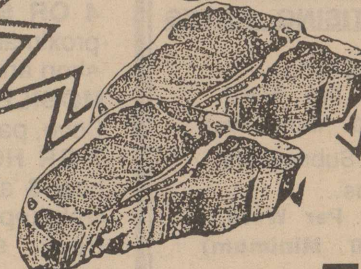

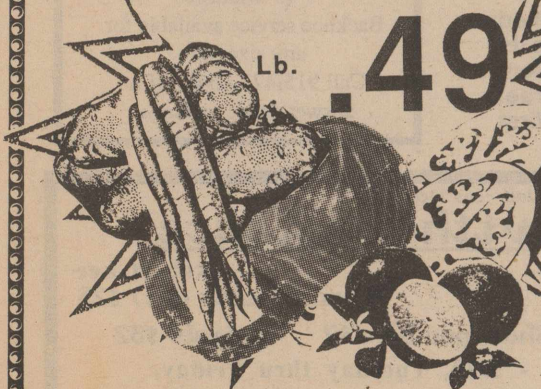

Prison pen pal scheme

Pen Pals have been with us for years. Perhaps you had one when you were in school. Adults have pen pals too. Often they are jail inmates who place pen pal ads in magazines, which cater to seniors living alone, or others who are looking for relationships. Prisoner ads have proliferated in recent years, and some prisoners maybe looking for genuine contact with life outside their prison walls. However, many prisoner ads are merely a part of a sophisticated mail fraud scheme (using postal or other money orders) which has bilked consumers of their hard-earned savings.

Be aware of the tell-tale signs of this unusual scheme. If you begin to write letters to a prisoner who is attempting to cultivate you for his mail fraud scheme, he will slowly attempt to gain your trust and confidence. If you are a single woman, he may even promise to marry you upon his release. Eventually, the prisoner will ask you to deposit some money orders in your checking or savings account, because he has no one else he can trust. After sending you several money orders, usually

in the amount of \$700 each, for you to deposit in your account, the prisoner will wait long enough for the money orders to be deposited, then he will call you (usually collect) by telephone and urgently request most of the money be withdrawn. He will want the money to be sent by Express Mail or wired by Western Union to another friend in order to pay an attorney to help gain the prisoner's immediate release from prison.

When the U.S. Postal Service routinely compares the cashed money orders with the original money order receipts, these money orders are found to be altered. All altered money orders will ultimately be discovered. Under current law, the person who cashes in an altered money order is responsible for its total (altered) value. If you have a bank account, the U.S. Postal Service will contact your bank, and you will be made to pay the difference. For example, if you cash a one-dollar money order, which has been altered to \$700, you will end up being charged \$699 of your own money. Remember this, if you see a pen pal ad from a prison inmate and are thinking of writing.

Volunteers are used to help the family and the patient during this traumatic disease and death process. Patient contact volunteers receive a thirty hour training before being assigned to a family. This training is being offered through ASU Adult Continuing Education this fall for eight Thursday nights from 6:00 pm to 9:30 pm beginning September 17 thru November 5, 1992.

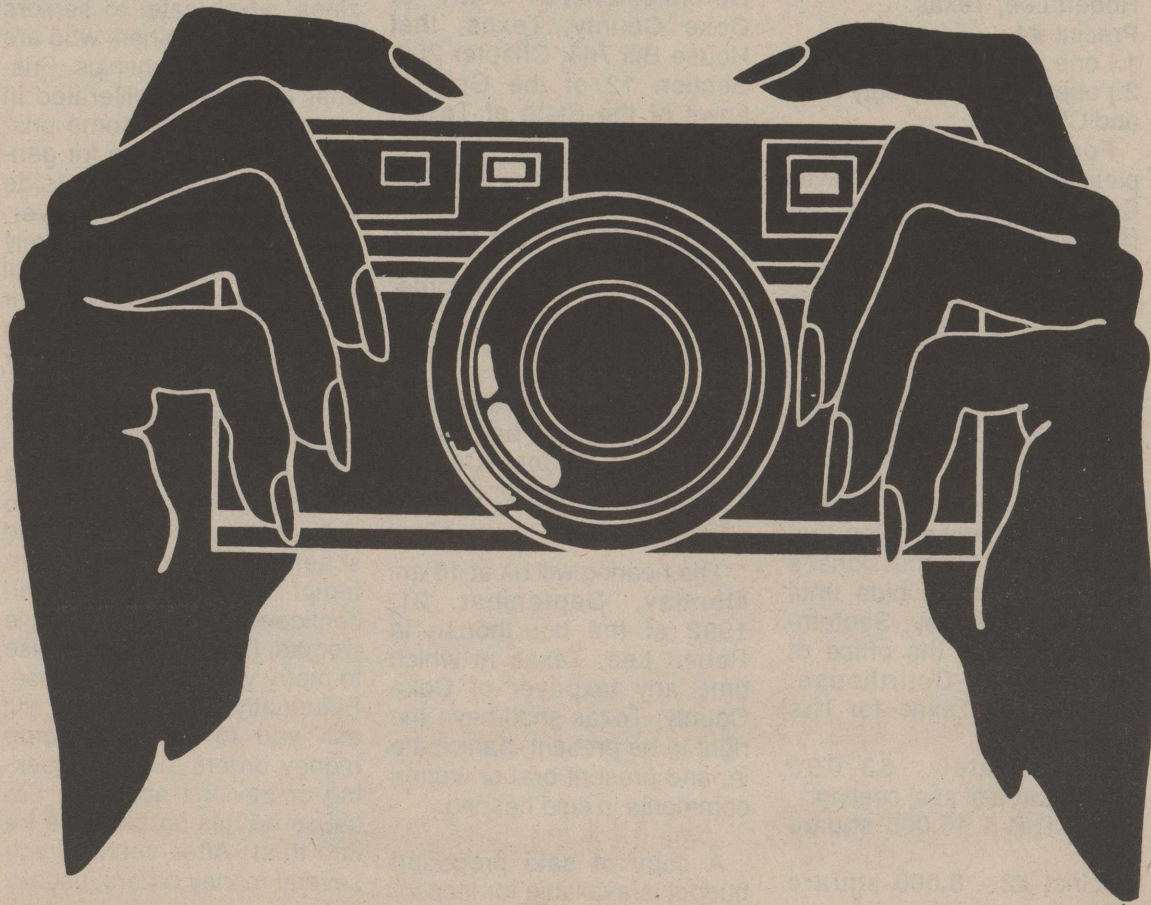
Once the training is complete the volunteer is under no obligation to serve any time. Those interested may call 949-2339 at ASU to receive information about this class.
