Judge signs farm safety proclamation

PROCLAMATION By The County Judge of Coke County

TO ALL TO WHOM THESE PRESENTS SHALL COME:

, Royce Lee County Judge of Coke County do hereby declare the week of September 20-26, 1992 as FARM AND RANCH SAFETY AND HEALTH WEEK in Coke County, for the following rea-

WHEREAS, the President has proclaimed the 49th Annual National Farm Safety and Health Week and the Governor has proclaimed the same period as Texas Farm and Ranch Safety and Health Week; and

WHEREAS, The National Safety Council estimates indicate that in 1991 farm work accidents resulted in approximately 1,400 deaths and 140,000 disabling injuries. The death rate was 44 per 100,000 workers, having fallen slightly during the past decade, agriculture remains the highest of the major industries and four times their composite death rate. Many more farm and ranch residents and workers were killed or seriously injured in home, recreation and roadway accidents. An undetermined number of people involved in agricultural work suffered job-related illnesses known to cause disability or death; and

WHEREAS, during the week, a statewide farm and ranch accident prevention education campaign is being undertaken by the Texas Farm Bureau; the Texas Farm and Ranch Safety Council; the Texas Safety Association; the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and the 4-H Clubs; the Texas Education Agency through the Texas Future Farmers and Future Homemakers of America, the Young Farmers and Young Homemakers of Texas and the Coke-Sterling County Farm Bureau with the theme, "Take Charge of Your Safety and Health". and

WHEREAS, accident prevention is often a matter of common sense; putting into practice basic safety rules like always buckling your safety belt: reading and following instructions in operator's manuals and product labels; and many other simple sensible measures that involve little or no extra time, effort or ex-

THEREFORE, I urge all those who live and work on farms and ranches to take necessary precautions to protect their safety and health - on the job and off. I also urge leaders in the agricultural community to bolster safety and health efforts in your area by example and by educational programs.

Exemption form listed

Under Article 2137-A, Vernon's Annotated Civil Statutes a person may claim permanent exemption from jury service on the ground of being over sixty-five (65) years of age by filing a statement declaring that he or she desires a permanent exemption on that ground.

Sec. 5 of this Art. states that the names of persons filing for permanent exemption from jury service may not be placed in the jury wheel or otherwise used in preparing the record of names from which a jury list is selected.

I, therefore, file with the County Clerk of Coke County the following statement:




1st Qtr



Reversing Electrical Injuries


Electrical injuries are often likened to an iceberg because extensive, unseen tissue damage can underlie a small surface burn. Tissues damaged by heat can generally be recognized visually and surgically removed. But the unseen tissue damage in the path of the electrical current may cause normal-looking cells to die hours or several days later.

For the first time, the ability to repair these cells has been clearly demonstrated. Researchers from the University of Chicago Medical Center report intravenous injection of an emulsifier, called a poloxamer, can even reverse much of the damage caused by severe electrical shock. This process is still in the testing stage, but Dr. Raphael Lee writes in the Proceedings of the National Academy of Science (5-15), that the poloxamer is apparently absorbed by damaged cells, as it seals the tiny leaks on the surface of the cells, and allows the repair process to begin.

NOTICE OF COMPARABLE TAX RATES AND REVENUES

The legislature has enacted a statute on school funding to comply with a court mandate enforcing the state contribution. Under prior statutes the tax rate for last year provides \$6,417 per student in state and local revenues. Under this statute that same rate now provides \$6,712 per student in state and local revenues.

State law only requires a minimum tax rate of \$.82011 for County Education Districts. State law does not require a school district to adopt additional taxes. Neither does state law require a school district to adopt a tax rate that maximizes the receipt of state funds.

The Board of Trustees of the Bronte Independent School District hereby gives notice that it has adopted a tax rate of \$.51598 that will provide \$6,755 per student in state and local revenues.

Get your name in the state recordbooks

There are a lot of lakes in 'for two witnesses to sign and West Texas that don't have official state records for many of the fish found in them. For example, the only fish submitted for an official Texas Parks and Wildlife Department (TPWD) Waterbody record at O.H. Ivie is a 9.50 lb. largemouth bass. There is no lake record white or black crappie, nor any catfish records of any kind. Waterbody Records are not limited to only "sportfish." Some examples of other fishes that we have records on for other lakes are longnose gar, bluegill, green sunfish, warmouth sunfish, buffalo, carp, freshwater drum, goldfish, and even a Pacu (a common aquarium fish) caught in Lake Nasworthy.

Getting your fish recognized as a TPWD Waterbody record is also very easy. After you have caught the fish you think is a record, you have to fill out a TPWD Fish Record Application. These forms are available at most marinas and bait shops. Filling out the form is very easy. All it takes is your name and address, the fish species, date, and lake it was caught in, and the fish's weight and length. The fish must be weighed on a scale certified by the Texas Department of Agriculture. Most marinas and bait shops have one or know of where a close one is. If you can't find one, we have one at our office here in San Angelo where you can bring them by here or perhaps voir. The form also has blanks 13.06 lb; Flathead catfish,

a blank for a professional fisheries person to verify the fish is properly identified. After that, all that is needed is a notarized signature and a picture and you can mail the form to the address on the form. TPWD will then send you a certificate acknowledging your record.

Some of you are probably wondering, "What are the TPWD lake records for our lake and what fish don't have records yet?" Well, here is a list of them.
