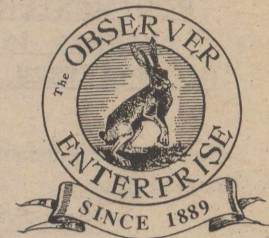

## Early voting continues at record pace

Early Voting will continue through Friday, Oct. 30, at the clerk's office at the county courthouse in Robert Lee for the Nov. 3 general election. The voting opened last week and with over another week left, Ettie Hubbard, County and District Clerk, reported a total of 106 early voters. No legal reason is now required and voters may cast their ballots whenever they are in town, at their convenience. That, coupled with some who must vote this year farther from their homes, may have produced more early votes, she said. However, if the pre-

sent pace continues, it will be a record for the period.

Early Voting has always served as a barometer for total voter participation in elections. It is an election year of controversy sparked by budget, economic, and political turmoil. Political experts predict that more voters than ever will cross party lines on their ballots this fall. They offer up the opinion that few of the voting public will continue to vote straight party tickets in the future.

Drawing the most interest on the ballot, of course, is the

Presidential race. The Lena Guerrero flap has drawn attention to the Railroad Commissioner race and most voters will be interested to see how the Bill Sims/Troy Fraser contest for State Senator, District 25, comes out in the area.

Coke County voters will be making a decision whether to adopt a County Road System.

On Tuesday, Nov. 3, polls will be open from 7 am - 7 pm at your appropriate polling place. Cast your ballot; don't let others make your choices for you.

 Bronte got back on track Friday night and defeated Sterling City, 20-7.

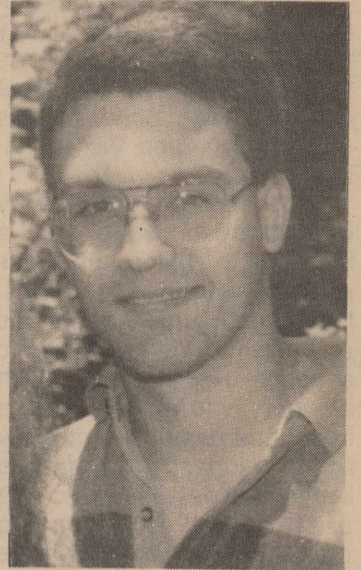
Brent Taylor scored the first and only TD in the first quarter with 6:04 left, and with Nathen Barnett's PAT a success, the first quarter ended 7-0.

**Referendum set Oct. 29th**

October 29, the voting date of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raiser's Association Sheep and Goat Referendum is nearing. The referendum which encompasses 111 counties will, if passed, affect producers in the heart of the Texas sheep and goat production area.

If accepted by producers, the referendum would add funds to existing predator control efforts. Producers will also vote on three directors to represent their respective districts on Commodity Producers Board. These nine board directors will decide how the referendum's funds are to be spent. Nominations are now complete for the October 29th election.

The referendum would levy a maximum of \$0.20 (twenty cents) per head assessment to the seller of sheep and goats at the first point of sale. The charge would be imposed on all sheep and goats sold in the 111 county referendum area.

Anyone regardless of age

who produces sheep or goats in the referendum area is eligible to vote. Voting will be done in the conference room of the county courthouse. Producers may vote in the county in which they live or where their ranch headquarters are.

A short biographical sketch of the Commodity Producers Board nominees is available at the Extension office.

**No Pain, No Gain**

Children fight or disagree with their friends more often than they do with children who are not their friends. While parents - and even the children - may view the conflicts as harmful, University of Minnesota child psychologist Willard Hartup says the conflicts are intrinsic to close relationships, and play a vital role in forming and maintaining friendships.

He notes girls tend to use rationales and explanations to back up their positions in dealing with friends, while boys are more apt to state their positions and hold them without explanation.

Although conflicts among children are not pleasant, Dr. Hartup says they test the limits of relationships and can lead to changes that cause friendships to grow stronger. In other words, no pain, no gain. Of course, conflicts can also end the friendship. But that too, is a part of growing up.
