Voters turn thumbs down on road system

With the bulk of nationwide election returns in, Bill Clinton has been elected President of the United States. When he takes office January 20, 1993, he will be supported by a Democratic Congress. Initial reports at presstime showed Clinton was elected by 44 percent of the vote, George Bush garnered 39 percent, and Ross Perot gained 17 percent for a respectable third place, a decent finish for his on-again, off-again campaign.

George Bush did carry Texas and Coke County in the county presidential voting, Bush gained 640, Clinton had 580, and Perot got a surprising 393.

Senator Bill Sims took the Dist. 25 race but not by as large a margin as expected. In the county he garnered 1058 to Troy Fraser's 532.

Barbara Walther will serve the 51st District as Judge, gaining county support over Robert Post 825-708. Coke County went for Charlotte Harris as the new 51st District Attorney over Richard Ely Jr. 886-451.

U.S. Representative Charles Stenholm retained his seat and Coke County gave him 1113 votes over 390 for Jeanie Sadowski.

Barry Williamson soundly defeated Lena Guerrero for the Railroad Commission seat. The county supported Williamson 955-521.

All county candidates ran without opposition and voters gave them full support in their respective precincts.

One of the hottest contested questions on the ballot was the Unit Road System proposed for Coke County. The issue was defeated 626-757.

A total of 1629 persons voted in the general election

out of 2,168registered voters, making it a high percentage turnout, as predicted. A record 100 million votes were cast in the nation, surpassing the 92 million Americans who went to the polls in 1988.







The Steers can hold their head high, as they head toward the playoffs. The Steers are a good team and they seem to be getting better each week.


1st Quarter



Abuse At Work

Abuse in the home has been targeted by private and

public groups, but we've only started to hear about abuse in the workplace. Deborah Anderson, president of a Minneapolis consulting firm, has surveyed employees in the private and public sector with similar results - that there is as much or slightly more abuse at work than at home, and the abuse goes back and forth between home and work.

Employees include a broad range of intimidation in their definition of abuse. An article in the Journal of the American Medical Association (3-18) says employees abused at work have similar problems as family members experiencing abuse - they have more health problems, lower self-esteem, poor peer relations and they can't concentrate.

Another report says as many as one in four supervisors run their offices the way their parents ran their households - often screaming, yelling, unfairly criticizing, and engaging in other abusive behavior that seriously undermines business productivity.


