Conservation mandatory for compliance

In accordance with the Food Security Act (FSA) of 1985 and 1990, producers should now be applying conservation practices to their highly erodible cropland (HEL) fields as called for in their FSA compliance plans. Remember, these plans are to keep a producer who farms HEL eligible for government programs (including wool & mohair incentives).

An FSA plan for a field stays with the field, not the operator. When leasing or buying farmland, it is the responsibility of the new operator and/or owner to check with the ASCS and SCS office to see if there is any highly erodible

cropland (HEL), whether there is an FSA plan, and what it requires. In order to stay eligible for government programs, the new producer will need to update the FSA compliance plan as a new operator on existing highly erodible cropland (HEL). Also, if a producer plans to break out any new cropland (a field that hasn't been farmed since 1985) a determination will need to be made on the field by the SCS. If the new cropland is highly erodible a plan will need to be developed and all required practices installed before the field is actually planted to the first crop.

Each year the USDA in Washington randomly selects 5% of the tracts in each county with highly erodible cropland (HEL) to be spot checked. The Soil Conservation Service is required to certify that the highly erodible land (HEL) in each of the selected tracts is being operated in compliance with the FSA plan. If any revisions are needed on a FSA compliance plan, the plan must be updated before it is spot checked.

Due to a recent change in national policy regarding adequacy of conservation plans, the Soil Conservation Service is in the process of revising most of the plans in the county and will be contacting the producers that are affected. Holiday Vandalism

Coke County Sheriff Marshall Millican reported a relatively quiet holiday period for his office. One of the most serious incidents involved a case of criminal mischief near Bronte. An oilfield pumper discovered on Dec. 21, a tank battery had been shot with a large caliber rifle and a shotgun. The shots penetrated a 210-barrel fiberglass storage tank. A heater-treater and an electric meter in a junction box were also damaged. Fortunately, no explosion or fire resulted from the shots. The tank battery is located about 1/2 mile east of the Bronte park area.

Some physical evidence was recovered and the investigation continues into the incident.

Deputy Rick Styles related that a WTU spokesman reported that a large number of street lights in Bronte had been shot out, possibly with a BB or pellet gun. The number was reported to be as many as in the 40's in a two week period.

Due to an icy New Year's Eve, several wrecks and "fender-benders" were also reported. Millican also noted some vandalism-type incidents involving Christmas lights and decorations had occurred but said, all in all, the usually busy period for his office was fairly quiet.

VITA provides tax help

Lower-income working families may be eligible for government checks of up to \$2,211 from the Internal Revenue Service.

Local IRS employee Dawn Sanders said volunteers in an IRS sponsored community program known as the Volunteer Income Tax Assistance (VITA) program will provide free tax help that includes determining if a family qualifies for government refunds through the earned-income tax credit program. "If a family made less than \$22,370 in 1992, they may qualify for the earned-income credit", Sanders said.

VITA volunteers have gone through special IRS sponsored training and are qualified to assist taxpayers with basic tax questions involving filing status, dependent exemptions, tax-credits, and itemized deductions. VITA volunteers can also prepare 1040EZ, 1040A, and basic form 1040 for taxpayers. "Vita volunteers do not handle complicated tax returns nor answer questions outside the scope of their expertise", Sanders said.

Exercise More, Fall Less

Aerobic exercise is important for older adults because that kind of exercise benefits the heart. But a program of resistance exercise to strengthen muscles may help older people keep up an active lifestyle. Associate Professor of Nursing at Indiana University-Purdue University, Robert Topp, found a twelve-week program of strengthening exercises improved muscle strength and balance for a group of older volunteers when compared to a similar group of volunteers who did not take part in the exercise programs.

He chose to focus on muscle-strengthening exercises because previous studies suggest a lack of balance, flexibility, leg strength and reaction time are major reasons older adults fall. Professor Topp says being able to safely and easily do such things as carry your groceries from the car are important components of the quality of life. Not being able to do things requiring strength means a less independent lifestyle.

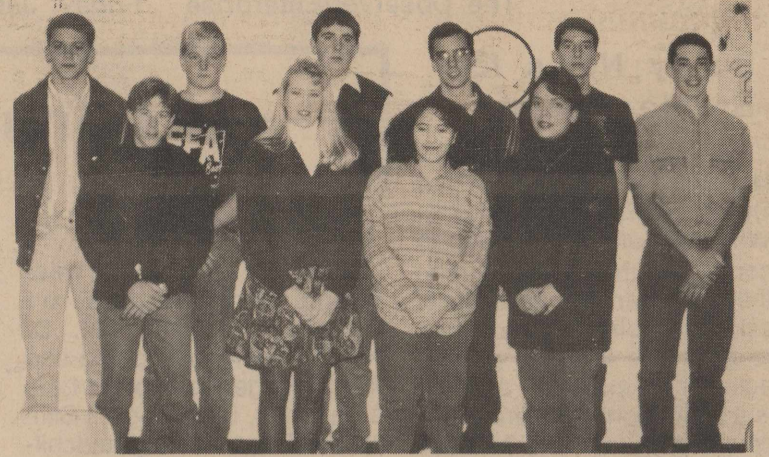

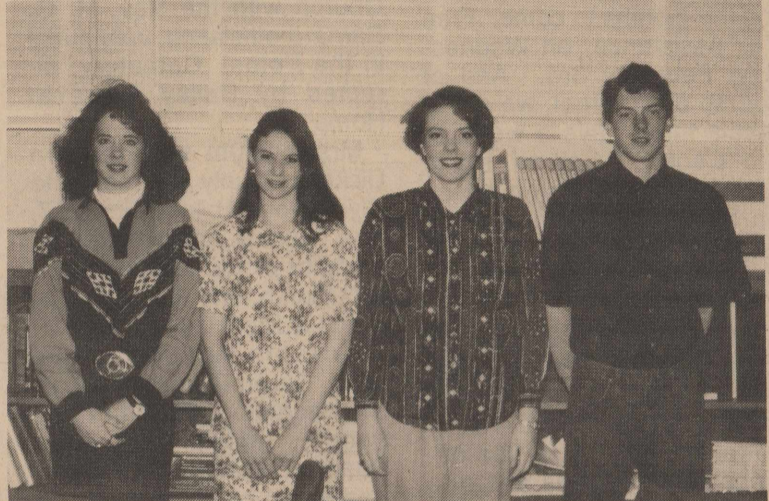

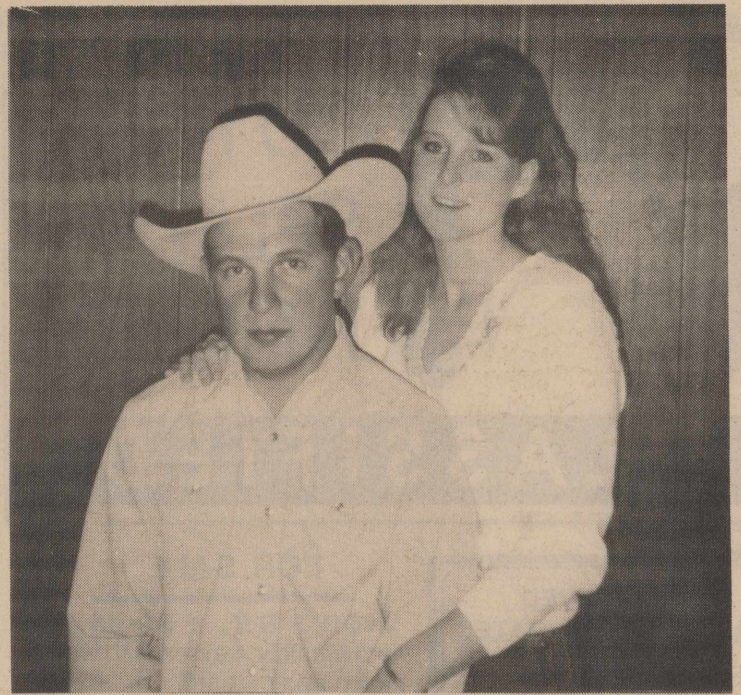

The American Cancer Society predicts that about 44,000 women will die of breast cancer this year. Experts estimate that if every woman had regular mammograms according to guidelines established by the American Cancer Society, nearly a third of the women who die of breast cancer would survive. The guidelines are: a) begin mammography by age 40; b) age 40-49 mammogram every 1-2 years; c) over age 50 annual mammogram; d) monthly breast self-examination; e) regular breast exams by a physician. Mammography is the best means for early detection of breast cancer.

TransAmerican Diagnostic Services has been accredited by the American College of Radiology since 1989. The American College of Radiology Program is voluntary and designed to insure women receive optimum quality mammographic examinations. The accreditation is done through evaluation of the facility's staff qualifications, (technologist, radiologist, and physicist), equipment, quality control, quality assurance, image quality, and breast dose. Services is also approved by the Texas Department of Health to accept self referred patients and is approved by Medicare as a provider to the Medicare Mammography Program.

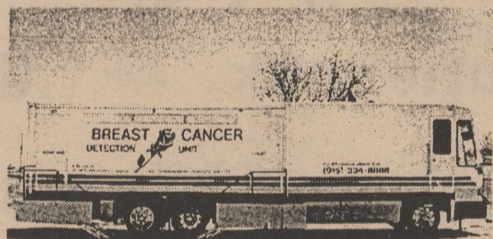

According to the American Cancer Society, one out of nine women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime in her lifetime. It is currently estimated that over 37,000 women die each year as the result of breast cancer.

Ninety percent of breast cancers are diagnosed by women or their physicians finding a lump in the breast. Women who are diagnosed with a lump large enough to feel have a 50 percent five year survival rate. A woman who is diagnosed as having breast cancer by mammography, before a lump can be felt, has a 97% five year survival rate and a 90% 10 year survival rate.

A mammogram can detect a cancer this small, ● even before it can be felt.

Guidelines For Screening Mammography Established by the American Cancer Society.

- I. 35-40 years of age - One baseline mammogram.
- II. 40-50 years of age - A mammogram every 1-2 years depending on breast type and risk factor.
- III. 50 years of age and over - An annual physical examination and annual mammogram.
- IV. Asymptomatic women under 50 years of age with significant high risk factors should be examined at appropriate intervals. These risk factors include previous breast cancer and family history of cancer.

V. A symptomatic woman should have a mammogram at any age when she experiences a mass, nipple discharge, skin changes or unexplained breast pain.

A screening mammogram is an x-ray of the breast using extremely low dosages of radiation (usually comparable to dental x-rays) and is designed to find very early cancers.

A female technologist who is highly trained in mammography will perform the examination.

The charge for the screening mammogram is \$70.00. The Unit accepts cash, check, Visa, Mastercard and American Express.
