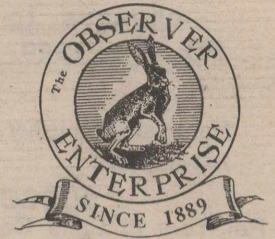

## Weather smiles on 53rd annual stock show

A most unusual happening occurred at this year's Coke County Livestock Show. No, the quality of the livestock wasn't any the worse for wear - this year's show stock was some of the best quality ever exhibited. The number of exhibitors was also up some over previous years. And this

year's premium sale was as strong as ever, thanks to the hard work of the committee members.

The most unusual occurrence was that Mother Nature smiled on those involved with some of the best stock show weather that residents have experienced in quite a few

years. No sandstorms, icy roads, or muddy conditions greeted this year's participants --- just clear skies, calm winds, and mild temperatures (for January) made this year's show really enjoyable for all those involved.

While the temperature outside was falling on Friday night, the action inside the barn was heating up, as the sheep and meat goat shows started this year's event, the 53rd annual livestock show in Coke County.

In the Steer Division, Casey Antilley and Russel Vaughn displayed the Grand and Reserve Grand Champion steers.

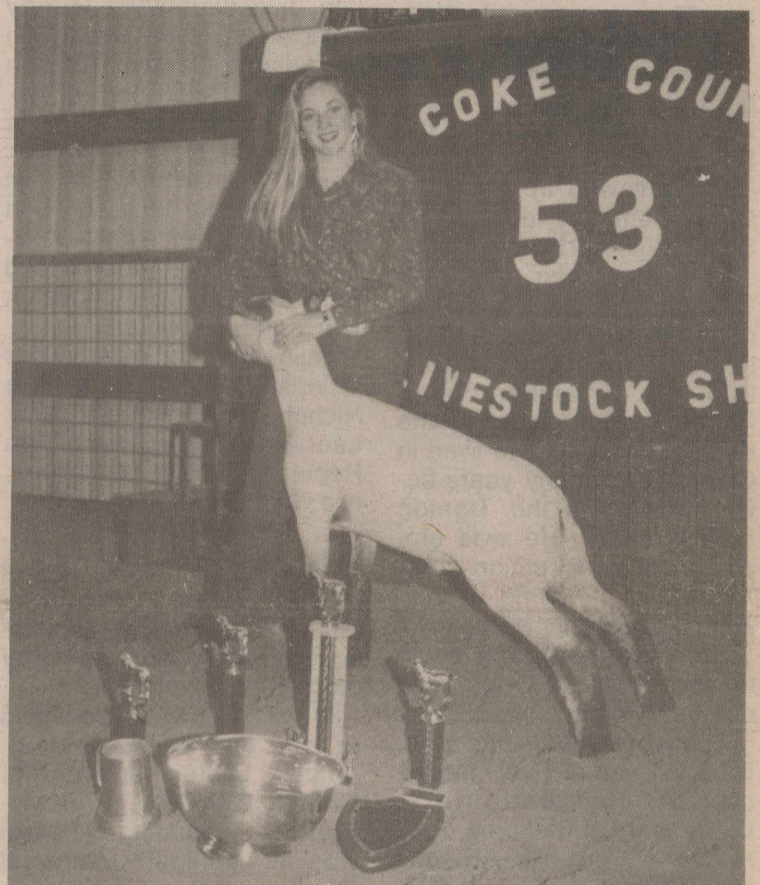
The Frank Percifull Overall Showmanship award went to James Tennison, with Shelley Burrows taking this year's Ralph Walker Top Hand Award.

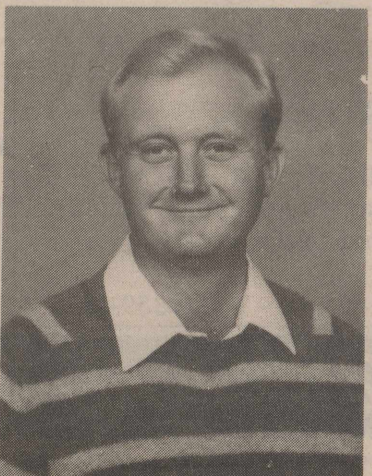
## Luckett promoted by FNB

in 1986 with a Bachelor of Science Degree.

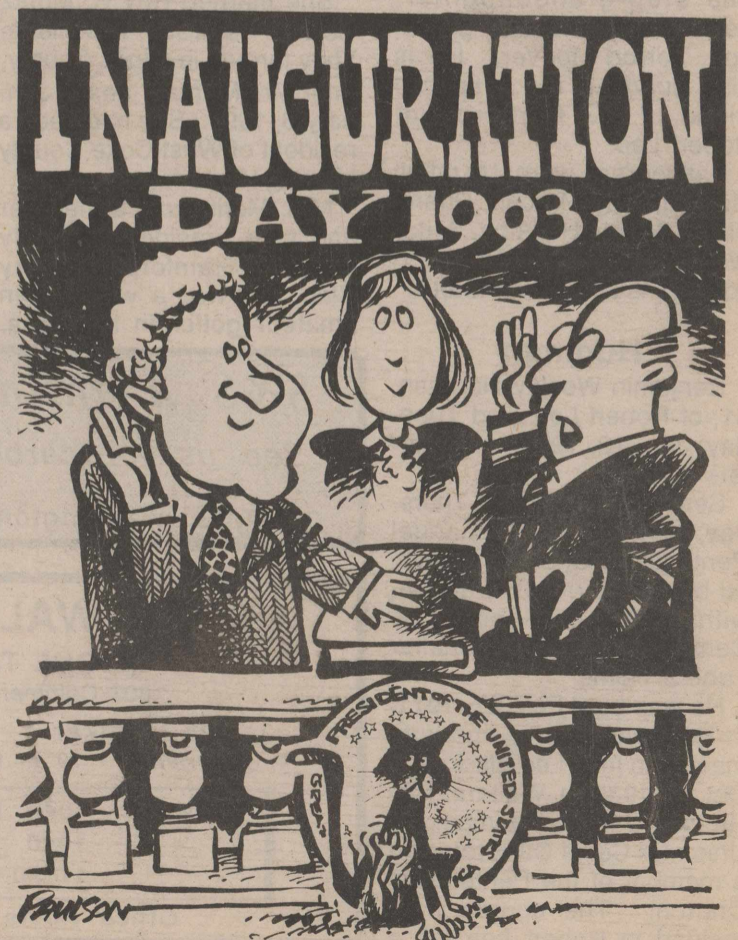

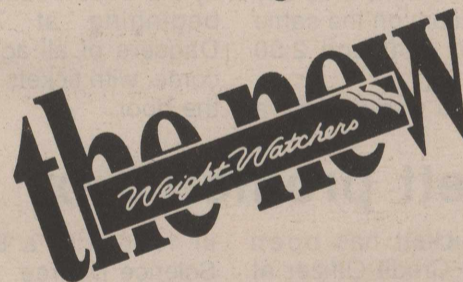
Edna M. Sneed, 86, of Blackwell died Friday, Jan. 15, 1993, in a San Angelo hospital.

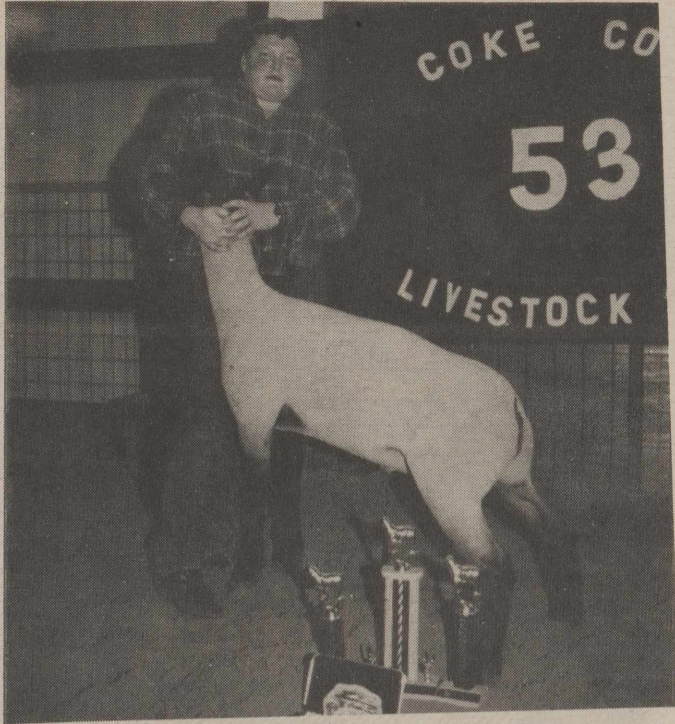

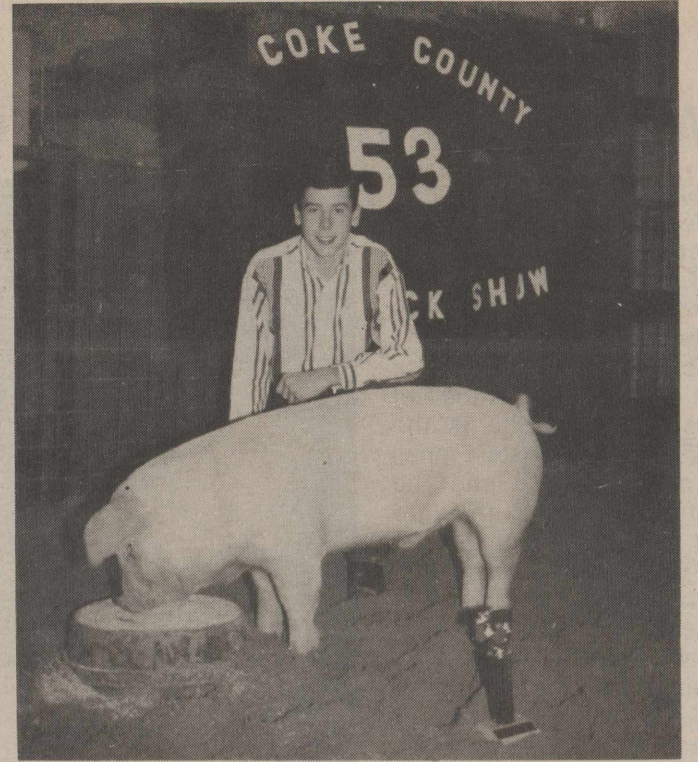

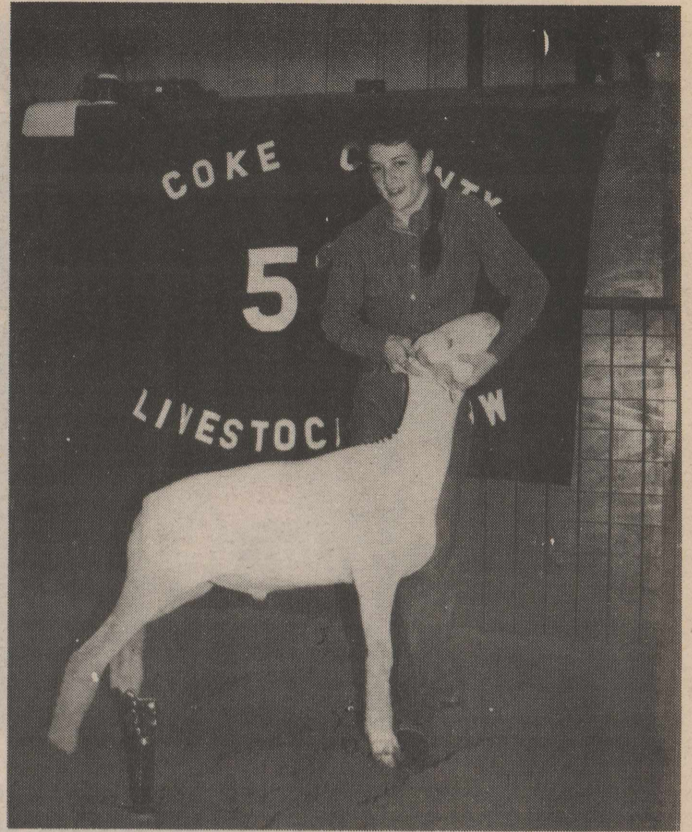

## USPS warns of mail scam

The Postal Service is warning consumers today not to fall prey to a nationwide mail order scam that is encouraging the underpayment of first-class postage. Promoters of the mail order scam are selling an information package at a cost ranging from \$5 to \$100 that describes how to mail first-class letters for 2 cents, rather than the current rate of 29 cents. The scheme is designed to bilk the postal customer out of their money using inaccurate and out-of-date information, says Inspector in Charge D. C. Strader.

The information packages cite Title 39, United States Code, Section 4253, as a legal basis for the 2 cent first class rate. Inspector Strader advises that this section was eliminated in August 1970 under the Postal Reorganization Act. The current first-class rate is 29 cents for the first ounce or fraction of an ounce.

Unfortunately, some letters bearing only a 2 cent stamp have been delivered without collection of the deficient postage, and that has given credence to the claims made by the promoters of this fraudulent scheme. This is because most mail is processed through automated equipment, and not because it is legal to mail at the 2 cent rate. Postal inspectors investigating this scheme have filed administrative and criminal complaints against the promoters. It is our goal to pro-

tect the Postal Service from loss of revenue and to stop this fraudulent promotion, says Inspector Strader.

Postal employees have been alerted to the scam and are being instructed to check first-class mail for appropriate postage. Any mail carrying less than 29 cents will be delivered with a charge for the amount due as a required by postal regulations.

Inspector Strader advises postal customers not to fall victim to this illegal scam. The penalty for mail fraud is a fine of not more than \$250,000.00 or imprisonment for not more than five years, or both. Postal customers who receive this package are asked to forward all the material to their local postmaster or to the Postal Inspector in Charge, Fort Worth Division, P. O. Box 162929, Fort Worth, Tx. 76161-2929.

### Growth Hormone Abuse

Routine screening of athletes for steroid use has led some athletes to seek a substitute for steroids. Some believe human growth hormone is the answer. Although produced by our bodies to spur growth in muscles, bone and connective tissue, athletes who use additional human growth hormone believe it will give their muscles a "jump start". Not so, says Dr. Kevin Yarasheski, of Washington University School of Medicine in St. Louis.

His study, published in the *American Journal of Physiology*, showed a growth hormone supplement does not help muscles grow any faster or operate any more efficiently than does exercise alone. He says human growth hormone is probably not the "magic bullet" that makes people stronger and healthier, and there are side effects. The most common is fluid retention, leading to such problems as high blood pressure and a wrist condition known as carpal tunnel compression.

**Health News**

Cigarette smoking affects the amount of milk a breast-feeding woman produces as well as the fat content says a researcher at the USDA's Children's Nutrition Research Center in Houston.

Dr. Judy Hopkinson, a research assistant professor at Baylor College of Medicine, has found that smokers produce almost as much milk in the first two weeks as their non-smoking counterparts. However, at four weeks the smokers were producing 43% less milk, and by six weeks, there was a 46% difference.

Normally, breast-feeding mothers experience a rapid increase in milk production two to four weeks following delivery.

In addition to the decrease in volume, Hopkinson also found the fat content of smoker's milk to be 20% lower than that of non-smokers.

Hopkinson's findings were featured in the December issue of *Pediatrics*.

"Infants need a high-fat diet, and about half of the calories in breast milk come from fat," she said.

In many cases, infants can compensate for a low calorie count simply by consuming more milk. But because the smoking mom's milk production has been reduced, the infant cannot make up the difference.

"This means, that on average, the breast-fed infant of a smoker may receive 10% fewer calories per ounce of milk than the breast-fed infant of a non-smoker," she said.

Hopkinson believes the reduction in milk production and low concentrations of fat explains why smoking mothers tend to wean their infants earlier than non-smoking moms.

She emphasizes that these results do not apply to all smokers.

"There were some women in the study who produced ample supplies of milk for their children. But why take the risk?" she asked. "Women who smoke cigarettes really need to understand that if they want to successfully breastfeed, they are stacking the cards against themselves by continuing to smoke."

**RL Stamp Club Meets**

The Robert Lee Stamp Club met in its first meeting of the new year on January 5. In addition to the regular program, the group elected officers for the coming year. Lois Dunklin will serve as president of the club, Dianne Simpson as vice-president, Peggy Davis as secretary; treasurer is Bobbie Allen, and historian is Jerry Thomason.

### Silver-Haired Legislature Meets

In early August, Attorney General Morales met with the members of the Third Silver-Haired Legislature. He spoke about the major issues facing the Texas Legislature in its next session, the work of the Attorney General's Elder Law Section, and the pending settlement of the Ruiz prison lawsuit. General Morales also hosted a reception for the members of TSHL and for the OAG attorneys and staff who handle lawsuits filed on behalf of senior citizens.

The Silver-Haired Legislature was created by law in 1985. It meets every two years to debate all manner of issues affecting the state, to draw up a set of legislative priorities, and to work for passage of legislation by the Texas Legislature. Priorities for the upcoming legislative session include improved funding to assist Alzheimer's residents in nursing homes, standardization of Medicare supplemental insurance policies, a mandatory thirty-day grace period for paying utility bills, and changes in the way sentences are handed down in criminal cases.

The Silver-Haired Legislature is a non-partisan, volunteer body. Its members are elected to two-year terms. All Texans over age 60 are eligible to participate. 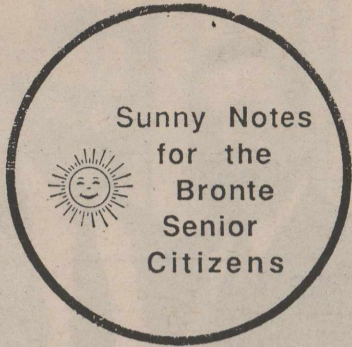
