Krueger takes oath in "Bronte" boots

Nineteen years ago when Bob Krueger was elected to the United States Congress, a group of friends and supporters from Bronte presented him with a pair of M. L. Leddy custom-made boots. Last Thursday when the former congressman took the oath of

office from Vice-President Al Gore to become the newest U. S. senator from Texas, he again wore the boots. Sen. Krueger pointed out the Coke County footwear and said, the boots, made by the long-time San Angelo bootmaker, were a symbol of the good stew-

ardship he will practice in Congress. He noted that the boots serve to remind him of his roots that he will never forget.

A Democrat from New Braunfels, Sen. Krueger will serve as interim replacement for former Sen. Lloyd Bentsen, now Treasury Secretary. Sen. Krueger was appointed to the seat earlier this month by Gov. Ann Richards. He will serve in the position until an election for the seat can be held.

HEALTH NOTES

Breast Cancer Risk Reduced

Added evidence that certain fruits and vegetables may lower the risk of cancer comes from State University of New York at Buffalo. Researchers, led by Dr. Jo Freudenheim, compared information from a group of women with breast cancer to another group of premenopausal women over the age of forty. Women with breast cancer tended to eat fewer fruits and vegetables than the women without breast cancer.

Dr. Freudenheim told the Society for Epidemiologic Research that the total amount of vegetables in a woman's diet appeared to be related to the risk of getting breast cancer. She also said that certain nutrients concentrated in fruits and vegetables - vitamin C, folic acid, and carotene - may reduce that risk. Vitamin C is found largely in citrus fruits, folic acid in various vegetables and carotene is concentrated in yellow and green vegetables.

This study is by no means conclusive, but it does suggest that eating a diet rich in fruits and vegetables may be beneficial.
