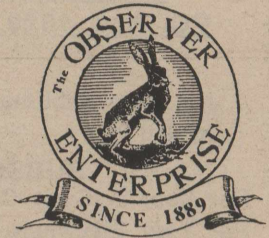

## Bronte entities set dates for elections

It's official filing time for City of Bronte, Bronte schools and Hospital District elections. Local elections are set for May 1, 1993. March 17th is the last day to apply for a place on the ballot.

The city of Bronte will feature three places on the ballot. Two councilmen will be elected for two-year terms and one councilman will be elected to fill a one-year term. The terms of Chester Wilson, Gerald Sandusky, and Pete Percifull will expire. Incumbent councilmen are Bill Thomas and Paul McGuire.

Application for a place on the ballot must be received by the city Secretary by 5 p.m. March 17, 1993. Applications

may be made at the City Hall during regular working hours 8 am to 5 pm, Monday through Friday.

Candidates for a place on the Board of Trustees of Bronte Independent School District may file at the school on Monday through Friday, from 8 am to 4 pm.

The Bronte Independent School District Trustee Election will feature three places on the ballot. Two of the ballots are for full three-year terms and one for a one year unexpired term.

The terms are currently held by Ray Barnett and Wayne Coalson. The one year unexpired term is currently held by appointed Martin DeLaGarza.

Incumbents are Steve Kelton, Andrae Arrott, Kendall Gibbs, and Richard Hembree.

Two places are up for East Coke County Hospital Board to serve for two-year terms. They are currently held by Jane Cumbie and Pat Oglesby. Other hospital board members are incumbents Eddie Alexander, LeDrew Arrott and R. W. Blackmon.

Candidates wishing to file may contact the Bronte Nursing Home on Monday through Friday, from 8 am to 5 pm.

Every student who submitted a poster received a certificate from the Soil Conservation Service in appreciation for the thought, effort and publicity on the need and worth of soil and water conservation that the picture depicted.

Three posters done by Jimmy Soto, Amye Peel, and Kimberly Perry will be entered in the Texas Regional Contest

which includes 52 counties.

Pupils could choose any phase of resource conservation that is part of the work of the local soil and water conservation district. Included in this work are: soil use and treatment; erosion control practices; crop, range, and pastureland management; drainage problems; watershed protection; flood prevention; fish and wildlife management; and promoting the involvement of all citizens in conserving water and renewable resources.

Response from teachers and students was excellent and posters submitted were outstanding, both in art work and content. Trying to pick only four winners per class and two overall was a difficult task for the board of directors.

Last week the Texas House passed a proposed constitutional amendment pertaining to school finance. If the Senate adopts the House's version of the amendment, it will be presented to the voters for their approval in a May statewide election. The amendment is certainly not the long term solution to the school finance problem. It is instead, a "band-aid" to a problem that is going to continue to exist as long as we depend on local property taxes for over 50% of our funding for our public schools.

The proposed amendment, as passed by the House, has some safeguards which in my opinion make this plan an improvement over previously offered ones. First, there is a cap of \$1.00 per \$100 valuation on the county education tax. Second, there is a provision that would constitutionally disallow any new unfunded state mandates. In other words, if the state mandates the school district to do something, then the state must fund the program and not put the burden on the local taxpayer. Third, recapture from the "rich districts" is limited to 2.75% of the total amount of state and local funding. This is an important limitation to the school districts in Irion, Sterling and Mitchell counties.

Two other plans were presented to the House by Republican members. I voted for both of these plans, however, they were not adopted by the majority of the membership and certainly would have fall-

en far short of the 100 votes needed to pass a constitutional amendment.

In the past few weeks, I obtained and read the transcript of the hearing held in January by Judge Scott McCown. Judge McCown has jurisdiction over the school finance litigation. Anyone who would read this transcript could only conclude, as I did, that there is no question that the judge would close the schools of Texas, if we do not adopt a constitutional funding system by June 1st.

Before I came to the legislature, both our prison system and our mental health and mental retardation system had been take over by the courts. We have now resolved those suits and are getting out from under court supervision for the first time in 20 years. What a tragedy it would be for our

schools to be run by the courts. I believe any plan fashioned by the court would be much more punitive to the districts I represent, than the one passed by the House this past week.

In May, the voters of the State of Texas will have an opportunity to decide for themselves if what has been proposed by the legislature is the type of public school funding system they desire. I will not mislead anyone by saying this is the best school funding system that could be developed. However, it is absolutely true that this is the best system that could be passed prior to the court's deadline, and I urge all voters to become educated on this issue and participate in the election in May.

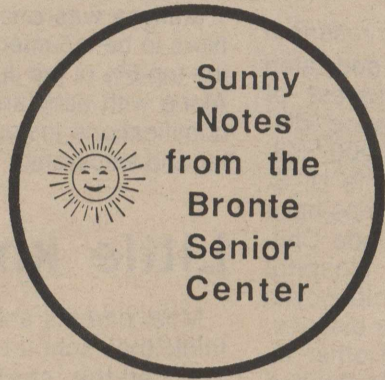

## Little known scholarships

Most parents and students think that scholarships are only for the students with good grades, low-income families, or the athletically inclined. A small example of the numerous scholarships available to students include: Left-handed Student Scholarships, Handicapped Student Scholarships, Members of a Church Scholarships, David Letterman's Scholarship for 'C' Students, Veteran children's Scholarship, Scholarships for minorities and much much more!

The general public is not aware that over \$10 billion is available to students from private sector scholarships. Over \$20.4 billion from the federal government. In a U. S. Congressional study, it was reported that, "Over \$6.6 billion of private sector financial aid went unused because parents and students did not know where to apply." A conservative college tuition for a full-time students runs from \$10,000-\$30,000. High scoring colleges run from \$40,000-\$100,000 and this

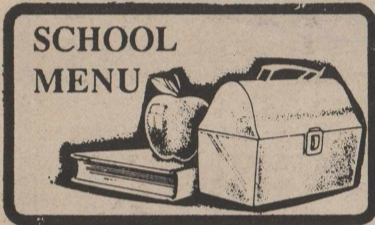
tuition is per year.

There are organizations that have spent hundreds of hours in research, locating scholarship sources. These organizations are AEE (American Educational Excellence) members and have a list of over 400 different scholarships available. The lists include the scholarship names, addresses, telephone numbers, application deadlines, summaries about the scholarships and the amount the scholarships will pay your child.

Many scholarships pay the entire tuition; otherwise, students combine scholarships

to pay tuition payment. Most scholarships include junior colleges, career and vocational schools, 4 year colleges, graduate schools and medical and law schools.

## HEALTH NOTES

### Right Shoe

Most American women haven't had their feet measured for at least five years, according to a study at the University of Southern California. The study says the result is that a majority of women are wearing shoes too small, causing foot pain, bunions and hammertoes. Dr. Max Jardon, an orthopedic surgeon at the University of Nebraska Medical Center, also says most foot problems can be prevented simply by wearing the right type of shoe, with the right fit. He says - although he shouldn't have to - the most common cause of foot pain is from wearing tight shoes.

Another diagnosis of foot problems comes from Scripps Clinic in San Diego where a podiatrist says he has noticed a dramatic increase in the number of patients with inflammation of the big toe joint. His comment, in *American Family Physician*, is that running on artificial turf, jogging on city streets or simply walking in high-heeled shoes can cause the inflammation.

 \*Track current time spent together: Each day for seven days, write on the calendar the times family members did things together. Include all activities that involve two or more family members with at least one adult. Family meal time counts.  
 \*Record individual activities that did not involve other family members: Note the number and kinds of these activities as well. Compare the number and kind of individual activities with the number and kind of family activities.  
 \*At the end of the week, schedule a "family board" meeting to examine the calendar and discuss possibilities for change.  
 \*Consider a new weekly plan that would allow for a balance of individual and family activities. Plan some time each day for family interaction. At the end of the week, hold another family meeting to look at the time that was spent together and discuss what was special for each family member.  
 \*Use the new approach to plan family time each week. Spend some time talking together about what activities would be fun to do together. Even family chores can become more enjoyable if plans are made to do them together.  
 Commitment to spending time together as a family unit can strengthen family ties.

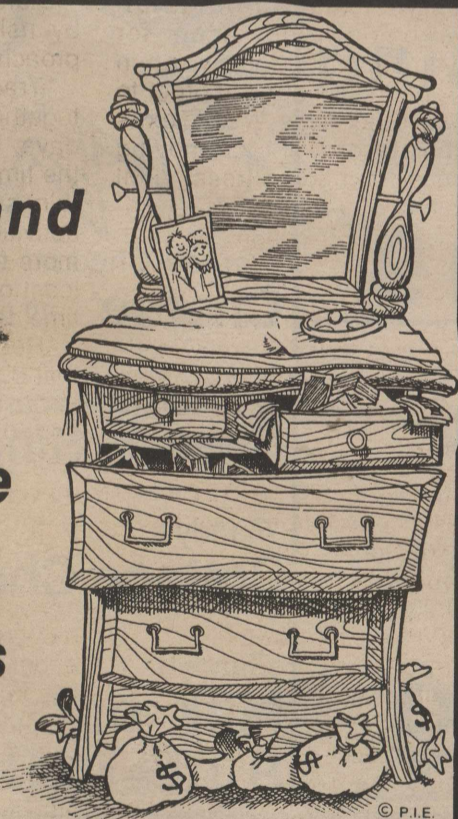

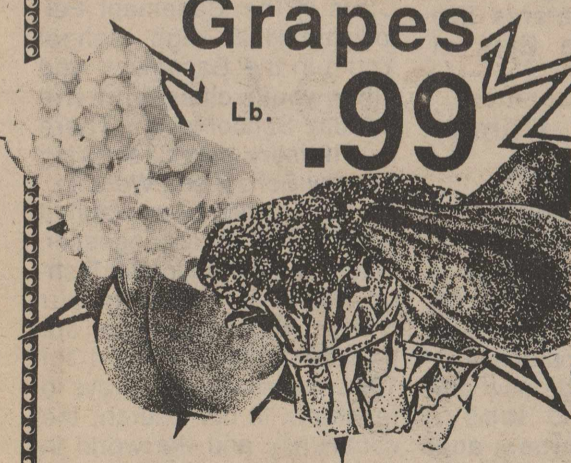
