

It was a fast-paced, high scoring game while still being a defensive contest.

McCown and Jackson were lost to fouls late in the 4th quarter and the Steers called on some help from the bench and they did an admirable job. If one factor spelled the defeat, it probably would be the Eula team's deadly skill at the free throw line.



Dear Editor,

In January, after receiving a notice of EMT classes, I enrolled with a "first aid refresher course" in mind. The fee was \$60 for books (the instructor, guest speakers and assistants volunteered). Class schedule is each Monday and Thursday through April 29, followed by 3 evenings of exams for a total of 108 hours of classroom plus one Saturday.

Within 3 class days, I knew the West Coke County EMS was lacking in volunteers, so I decided I'd become certified. This requires 3 8-hour shifts at Shannon Hospital's Emergency Room and 3 emergency runs on the San Angelo Fire Department's ambulance, 9 hours of tests and the state examination.

If I pass all these requirements, resulting in certification, and if I serve ten twelve (12) hour shifts a month for four months on the WCC EMs. ambulance, I'll be reimbursed for my books. The cost of my smock, name tag and minimum of 4 trips to San Angelo will be part of my expenses. Also I'll receive nothing monetary for any ambulance run I will make. Then I attended the February monthly meeting of the volunteers. I learned how badly they need volunteers for all phases of the service. Also that most Wednesday and Saturday day time hours there is no ambulance service for lack of volunteers. Other shifts are sometimes doubtful. So where does that leave us? As for me, hopefully I will be certified by June. For you? "Shedule" your accidents and illnesses on days other than Wednesday and Saturday! An EMT Student





"The only thing that stands between us and our rightful title is the willingness of New Mexico chile chefs to actually show up and fight," reads her official memorandum.





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posure to ultraviolet radiation from the sun, and while that depletion needs urgent action, some of the possible consequences of it are not as clear. The American Academy of Ophthalmology says studies link ultraviolet-b light with the formation of cataracts, but it may take decades to determine whether changes in the earth's ozone layer will have a measurable effect on the general population.

A study showed that fishermen on Chesapeake Bay had a high risk of forming cataracts, but they spent many years working on the water where reflected radiation from the sun is intense. The fishermen who wore sunglasses or a brimmed hat substantially reduced their risk of developing cataracts. Few of us get that much long-term exposure to ultraviolet-b radiation. More likely are sunburned eyes from just a day on the water or ski slope. That painful temporary burn to the eye can also be avoided by proper eye protection.
