FmHA nominations due

The Farmers Home Administration will begin accepting nominations April 2 for election of county committee members under new rules that make it easier for farmers to qualify as candidates and to vote, Paul Cline said.

FmHA county committees perform a variety of duties for the U. S. Department of Agriculture's credit agency, including deciding whether an applicant is eligible for a farm loan.

"One important change broadens the definition of a farmer to anyone who has an interest in a farm in the county as owner, tenant or share-cropper," Cline said. "The new definition also includes the spouse of an eligible farmer. An old requirement that more than half of the candidates income must come from the farm operation has been dropped."

"The nominating period has been extended to 45 days from the previous 25 days thus allowing more opportunity for people to run for the committee," Cline said. "At least three eligible farmer voters, including the nominee, must sign the petition."

Two of the three committee members are elected by farmers in the county, and one is

appointed by FmHA. One of the elected seats is to be filled for a three-year term at this year's election, which is scheduled for June 30.

"Another important change this year is that one member of the committee can be an active FmHA farm borrower, or be eligible for an FmHA farm loan," Paul Cline said. "Previously, this was not allowed."

WCCCD meets with lengthy agenda

West Coke County Community Development met in general session on Monday evening with a lengthy agenda. Called to order by President Laura Crenshaw, routine officer and committee reports were noted. On March 9, the group cleaned their 2-mile designation on the Adopt-A-Highway project. Assisting WCCCD were two local Cub Scout troops and their leaders, and several volunteers which made a quick clean-up for the group.

Reminder was made to members concerning the upcoming fundraiser - the Westland Amusement Carnival to be held in Robert Lee April 14-17 at Austin and 10th Streets. Members may sell

tickets at 1/2 price till the carnival arrives in town.

The Downtown Project workday on March 27 proved successful, Crenshaw said. Although public involvement was disappointing, other workdays to paint and clean up will be set. Everyone in the community was invited to drive through downtown Robert Lee to admire the work already accomplished by businesses and WCCCD.

The remainder of the meeting was turned over to Paul Adams of San Angelo, vice president of Shannon Medical Center. His program was centered on rural health care, reforms, and options of small towns. One alternative

is the Rural Health Clinic, staffed by a physicians assistant, under the umbrella of a designated physician's supervision. The ever-growing numbers of these clinics are proving to be cost-effective, meet the needs of communities, and are easing tax payers' burdens.

Also on the program were Dr. Wayne Williams, of Eldorado and the coordinator from the Mason Rural Health Clinic.

Special guests at the meeting were Joan Cooper and Jim Stansbury with the Naval Detachment from Goodfellow AFB and Betty Fife, newly-appointed administrator for the West Coke County Nursing Home.

Regular 11 am services will also be held at the church that day.

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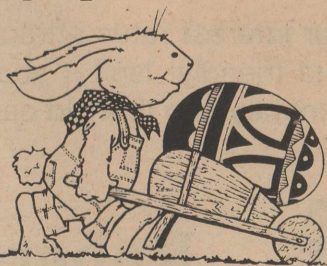

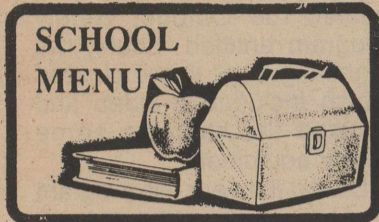



The senior at Water Valley was also named the Most Valuable Boys Player on the Standard-Times newspaper's All-West Texas Team.

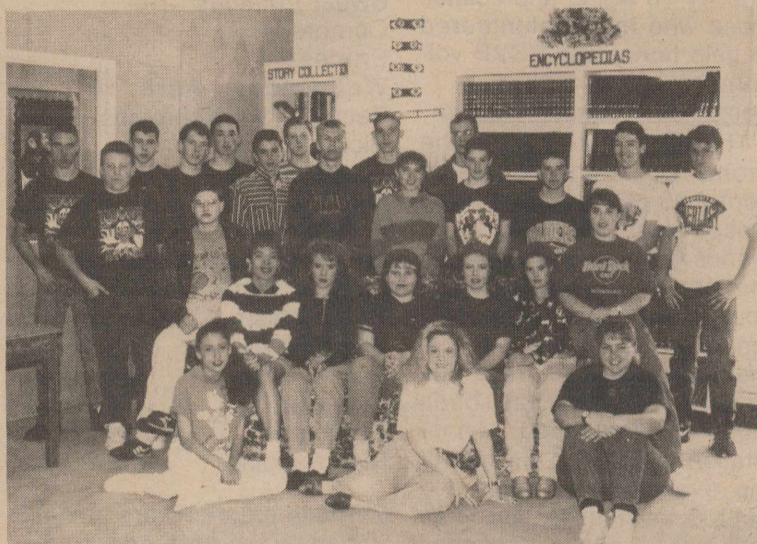

Army college fund increase

The Army today increased to \$30,000 the maximum amount of money for college available to qualified applicants who enlist for the new Army College Fund, or ACF, according to Lt. Col. Brad Beasley, Army Recruiting commander for New Mexico and West Texas.

This substantial boost from the previous maximum of \$25,000 for a four-year enlistment was initiated by Congress to restore the fund's buying power to its original fiscal year 1985 level, according to Beasley.

Annual college costs have been rising since the start of the ACF program in 1985. A year of college then was about \$5,000 for public colleges and nearly \$10,000 for private institutions. Currently a year of public college costs about \$6,300 while a private institution costs about \$16,300, and by 1995 these expenses are expected to jump to \$11,000 and \$23,700 respectively.

The \$30,000 ACF amount is a special incentive which is created by combining \$13,200 from the Montgomery GI Bill with a one-time \$1,200 contribution from the soldier and \$15,600 provided by the Army. Similar increases have been made to provide \$25,000 for three-year enlistments and \$20,000 for two-year enlistments.

"The new Army College Fund attracts high-quality people for the Army," Beasley said, "but it also gives qualified soldiers the chance to get guaranteed funding for college."

A soldier who successfully

completes a four-year enlistment with the money for college option would have \$833 a month for each of four years of college, based on a nine-month academic year. The money may be used at any school approved by the Veteran's Administration.

Army Reserve soldiers will also receive increased education benefits, up to \$6,840 for undergraduate studies. Qualifying full-time students receive \$190 per month for 36 academic months, while half-time students can receive half that amount for up to 72 months.

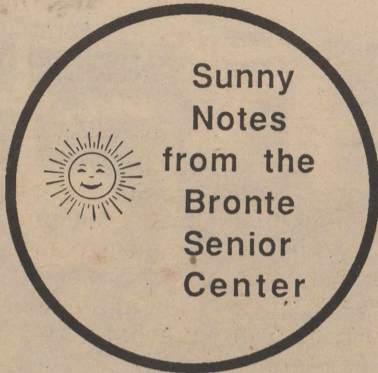
To qualify for the new Army College Fund amounts, applicants must have a high school diploma and score at least 50 on the entrance aptitude test. They must also enlist in a designated critical job skill, have no prior military service, and meet the normal enlistment eligibility requirements.

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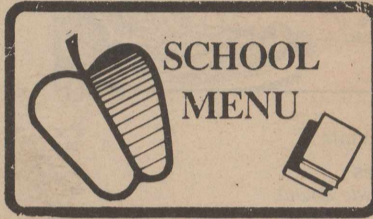

There are relatively few health care providers who would bill for items or services they did not render or that were not necessary for the well being of their Medicare patients. However, those who do place a real burden on the Home Care Financing Administration (HCFA) and the taxpayer.

of the serious issue of white collar crime. Because of the growing impact on health care cost, both private and government insurers are increasing their anti-fraud efforts.

Here are some tips to help prevent and detect potential fraud:

>Be suspicious of anyone who offers you a service or item free of charge. Many times these "free services" are billed to Medicare. If anyone tells you the service is free, ask for this information in writing. Medicare is not obliged to pay for services or items which are given free of charge.

>Be leery of anyone trying to sell equipment or services that your doctor did not recommend or that you think is not needed. It is a good idea to talk to your regular doctor before accepting any equipment or service that is not familiar.

>Never let anyone else use your Medicare card and never give out your Medicare number to anyone you do not know.

>Always read and keep a copy of any document or agreement you sign. If you do not understand what you are asked to sign, ask questions until you get a satisfactory answer. Never sign anything until you understand and agree with it.

If you have reason to believe that a doctor, hospital or other health care provider is billing Medicare for services or items you did not receive or did not need, please report this immediately to the Medicare office. You will find the name, address and telephone number of your office at the bottom of each Explanation of Medicare Benefits (EOMB) form you are sent upon settlement of a claim.

When reporting possible wrongdoing, you will need to provide the following information:

>Your health insurance claim number. (This is the number on your Medicare card.)

>A telephone number, if available, where you can be reached.

>The exact nature of the

suspected wrongdoing.

>The name and address (if available) of the doctor, hospital or other health care provider involved.

>The date or dates of the wrongdoing.

Any complaint of wrongdoing you send to your Medicare contractor will be examined carefully. Many times there is a reasonable explanation for the billing received. If this is the case, the contractor will explain the circumstances and tell you that no fraud is involved.

If fraud is detected, all necessary steps will be taken to collect Medicare overpayments and to prosecute the offenders.

Here is how Medicare has reinforced its fight against fraud:

>Each Medicare contractor has a special unit dedicated to detecting and investigating fraud and abuse.

>These special units generate fraud and abuse alerts to share with other Medicare offices and federal, state and local agencies -- including both physicians and beneficiary associations.

>A coordinator has been placed in small geographic regions across the nation. These coordinators make sure that information about fraud and abuse schemes are shared nationally. They also help educate beneficiaries on ways to detect fraud and protect themselves from becoming victims of fraud.

Seniors are mail targets

"Senior citizens and new brides continue to be the target of scare tactics and misleading solicitations from direct mail advertisers," said Franklin H. Upp, Social Security manager in San Angelo.

Upp said the organizations that target senior citizens generally ask for money because they claim the Social Security system is in serious financial trouble or that Social Security's trust funds are being mishandled. "The special interest groups who conduct these mailings are entitled to their opinions and can solicit contributions in order to pay lobbyists to voice those opinions to Congress. But sometimes their requests for donations are misleading and troublesome to many senior citizens," Upp said.

According to Upp, Social Security's headquarters in Baltimore, Maryland receives hundreds of letters weekly from senior citizens across the country expressing confusion over such mailings. One elderly woman wrote: "This organization was mailing me for payments twice a month. I'm in the low income bracket and their letters to me stated \$5 was not enough. So I tried to send them \$10." Other seniors express contempt for such direct mailing practices. This opinion comes from a typical letter: "I think it's wicked to send seniors such scary letters. Social Security is my only income to pay my rent and buy my food."

Upp said another deceptive mailing practice targets women who have recently married offering to change their name on Social Security records for

a fee. Pointing out that the Social Security Administration provides the same service free of charge, he said, "People can choose to pay for the service through a private business if they wish, but they should know that if a direct mail advertiser implies that they are in any way connected with or working for the government or the Social Security Administration, that organization is breaking the law and the advertiser will be referred to the authorities."

Upp offers this advice: If you think you are being harassed by direct mail solicitations, or if you receive an offer from a private organization that implies a connection to the government, you should refer to the complete mailing, including the envelope to: Social Security Administration, Office of Public Affairs, Misleading Information, P. O. Box 17740, Baltimore, MD 21235.

If it's more convenient, you can take the entire package to your local postmaster or send a complaint that includes the package to the: Chief Postal Inspector, United States Postal Service, 475 L'Enfant Plaza Washington, D. C. 20260-2100.

You also should advise the Texas Attorney General's Office or the Consumer Affairs Office and the local Better Business Bureau.

TV EFFECTS

Television may not cause a teen to be overweight, but it could help predict if a child has high cholesterol. These findings come from two separate studies. The first, from Dr. Thomas Robinson, of Stanford University, compared the number of hours teenage girls spent watching television with the amount of body fat and amount of physical activity. It showed that the teens in the study who watched more television were no more overweight than their peers who watched less, but the TV watchers were less physically active.

The second study, reported in the Journal *Pediatrics* just in time for National Cholesterol Education Month, found that of children with high cholesterol, more than half watched two or more hours of television a day compared to only about one-third in a group of children with lower levels of cholesterol. This study also shows that children who watch a lot of television tend to be less physically active.

Laughter - great medicine

"Take two silly pills and call me in the morning." It may sound corny, but many medical experts today agree that laughter and play can help to enhance both physical and emotional well-being.

According to new research, laughing produces an actual physical reaction which reduces muscle tension, improves digestion and lowers blood pressure (pressure rises during laughter but lowers below its starting point immediately after).

In addition, experts now believe that laughter triggers the release of hormones which produce increased alertness, and that tears released during laughter contain bacteria-killing agents.

"All our emotions have a biological component," said Matthew Lambert, Ph.D., licensed psychologist on staff at Methodist Hospital. "When people are in a good mood, their brain chemistry changes and they function at a higher level."

Laughter also helps relieve tension and anxiety and im-

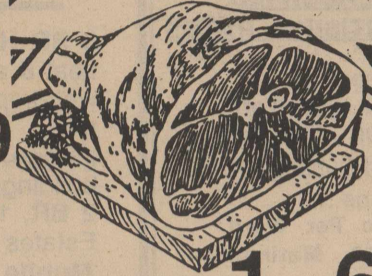

Apply Immediately

Workers suffering from a physical or mental impairment which prevents them from working should consider applying for Social Security disability benefits when it appears the impairment will last 12 months or longer, Franklin H. Upp, Social Security manager in San Angelo, said recently.

Social Security disability benefits can be paid to workers under 65, disabled widows and widowers 50-60, and to unmarried adult children that become disabled before reaching age 22.

Under Social Security, a person is considered disabled if he or she has a severe impairment which prevents him or her from doing substantial gainful work and is expected to last for at least 12 months or result in death.

No payments can be made to a disabled worker, widow or widower for the first five full months of disability.

To help speed the application process, it may be helpful for a person to gather the following information before applying:

- *the disabled person's social security number
- *the date last worked
- *the date the person became sick or was injured
- *the names, addresses and telephone numbers of doctors and hospitals that provided treatment
- *military service dates
- *a list of the kinds of jobs performed in the previous 15 years
- *the names and social security numbers of spouse and children
- *the worker's compensation claim number

If all the above information is not available, do not postpone filing. The people in the San Angelo Social Security Office can help. Call Social Security toll free 1-800-772-1213 from 7:00 am to 7:00 pm Monday through Friday.

PRIZE WINNING PIES

(DM)—Sue Allen Tate, Mississippi's winner in the Crisco American Pie Celebration, came from generations of good cooks. Her winning recipe for Lemon Cheese Pie was a wedding gift from her great aunt. After experimenting with further refinements, it became a family favorite and won her a chance to compete for a kitchen-full of new major appliances from co-sponsor KitchenAid.

FAMILY'S FAVORITE LEMON CHEESE PIE

Crust		2 tablespoons all-purpose flour
1 cup all-purpose flour		2 tablespoons yellow cornmeal
½ teaspoon salt		4 eggs
⅓ cup Crisco Shortening		¼ cup butter or margarine, melted
3 tablespoons ice water		¼ cup milk
½ teaspoon white vinegar		2 tablespoons freshly grated lemon peel
Filling		¼ cup fresh lemon juice
2 cups sugar		

Crust: Combine flour, salt and Crisco in plastic bowl with tight fitting lid. Seal. Shake one to 2 minutes or until mixture resembles coarse cornmeal. Add water and vinegar. Reseal. Shake one to 2 minutes or until mixture will form a ball. Press between hands to form 5 to 6-inch "pancake".

Heat oven to 375°F.

Flour rolling surface and rolling pin lightly. Roll dough into circle. Trim one inch larger than upside-down 10-inch pie plate, reserving scraps. Loosen dough carefully. Roll loosely over rolling pin. Slip into pie plate. Press to fit. Trim edge even with pie plate. Moisten pastry edge with water.

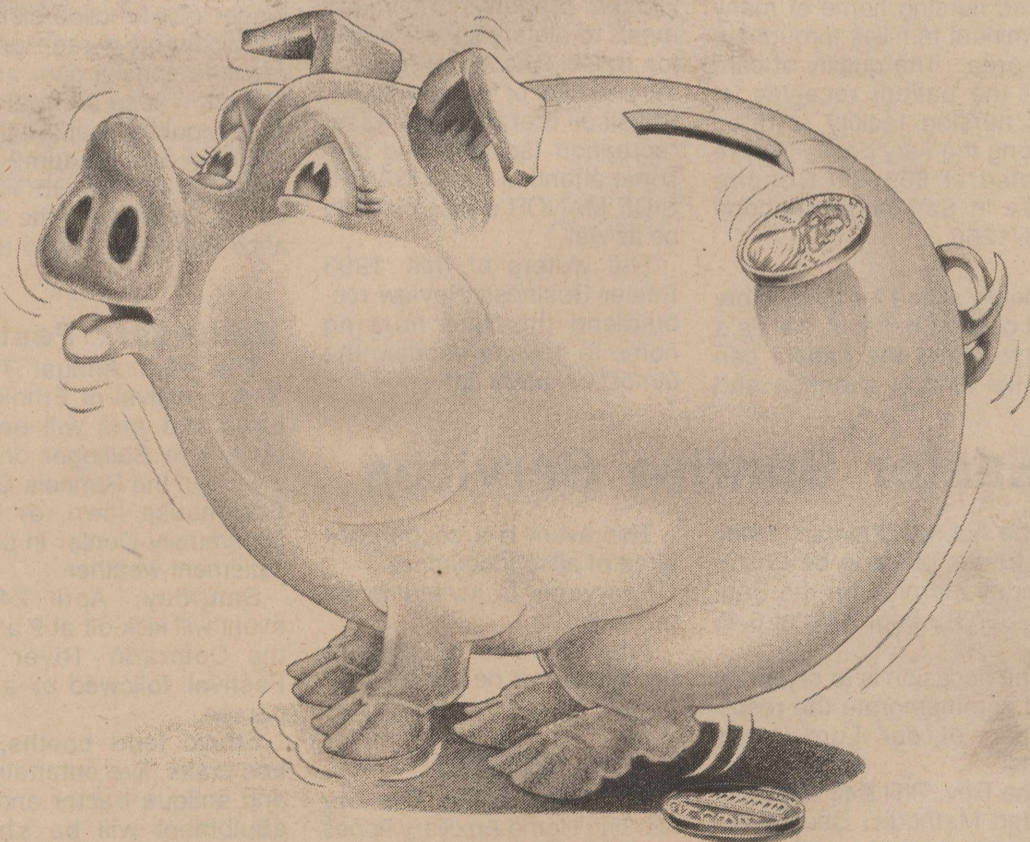
Cut tiny lemon leaf shapes from pastry scraps. Place around edge of pie shell, overlapping slightly.

Filling: Combine sugar, flour and cornmeal in medium bowl. Mix lightly. Add eggs, butter, milk, lemon peel and lemon juice. Beat with wire whisk or spoon until well blended. Pour into unbaked pie shell.

Bake at 375°F for one hour, or until golden brown and set, covering entire pie or edge with foil the last 30 minutes, if necessary, to prevent overbrowning. Cool to room temperature before serving.

Makes one 10-inch pie.
