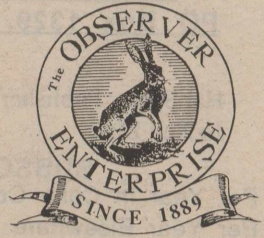

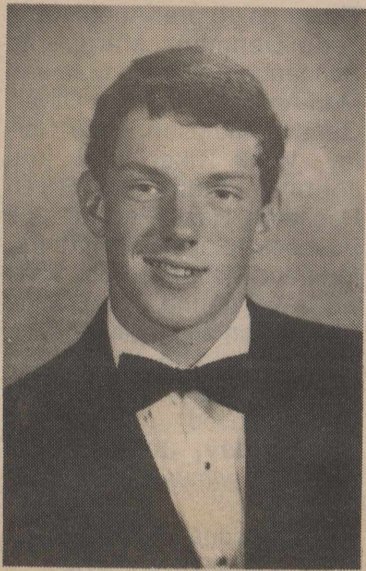

Odessa man dies at Spence

An Odessa man died at Lake Spence Friday night, May 21. The Coke County Sheriff's Department was notified at approximately 10:30 pm by the Department of Public Safety who had fielded a 911 call for an ambulance. The West Coke County EMS responded and traveled to the site at Cedar Cove. Coke County Sheriff's Deputy Jeff Barnes and DPS Trooper Roy Blair were also at the scene. Local EMS personnel determined the man was dead and returned to Robert Lee.

The death of James G. Moores, 55, was certified by Justice of the Peace Gary Shaffer of Bronte who ordered an autopsy. Shaffer Funeral Home transferred the body to an Odessa medical examiner's office.

Deputy Jeff Barnes was in charge of the investigation.

According to his report, the body was found in the bed of a pickup at the scene. Mr. Moores was on an outing with a number of his friends from Odessa. Someone at the site checked on him and found he was unresponsive and called for an ambulance. No evidence of foul play was noted and cause of death was undetermined at presstime.

Holiday Closings

The Memorial Day Holiday on Monday, May 31, will provide a break for many local people. The Coke County Courthouse in Robert Lee will be closed for the holiday as well as many public offices and businesses.

The Robert Lee City Hall will be closed on Monday while the landfill will close both Saturday and Monday. Bronte City Hall and landfill will be closed on Monday, Memorial Day.

Early Voting

Early voting will continue in County Clerk Ettie Hubbard's office in Robert Lee through Tuesday, June 1, for the Special Election on Saturday, June 5. As of Wednesday morning, 44 early votes had been cast, Mrs. Hubbard reported.

The runoff election is for the Senatorial seat vacated by Lloyd Bentsen and pits Bob Krueger against Kay Bailey Hutchison. The small, 4 X 5 ballot contains only that issue.

On June 5, the polls will be open 7 am - 7 pm and precinct polling places have again been combined for convenience. Precinct #1 voters will cast their ballots at the Robert Lee Senior Building; Precinct #2 will vote at the Bronte City Hall; Precincts #3-9-10 at the Coke County Courthouse, and Precincts # 4 & 5 can vote at the Bronte Depot.

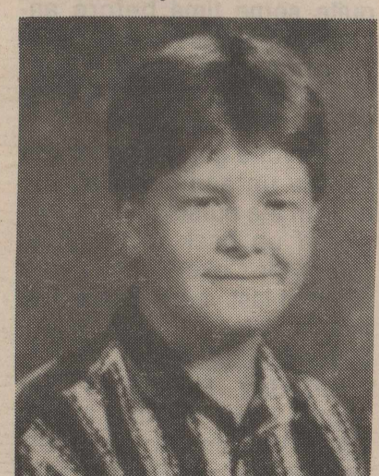
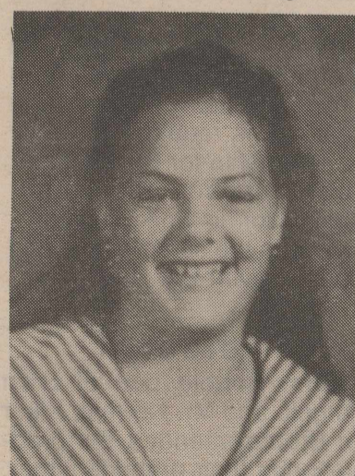

These school years are over for him. I was told over the phone and in the meeting that he could always come back next year and go through the ceremonies then. With the Lord's help, he hopes to have a year of college behind him by then.

As parents, we punish our children for doing something bad and hope it teaches them a lesson. In our Judicial system, we punish someone because they have broken the law and we hope to rehabilitate them. What is the lesson this student will learn and how are they rehabilitating him? What is the accomplishment? Why put a scar on a young person's heart forever? B. J. is suffering enough with the fact that he is not the scholar that the other students are and the embarrassment that goes along with this.

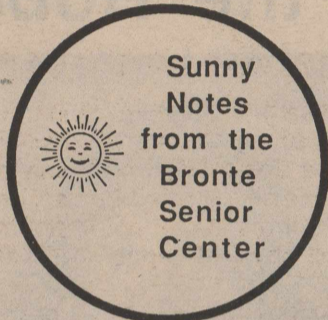

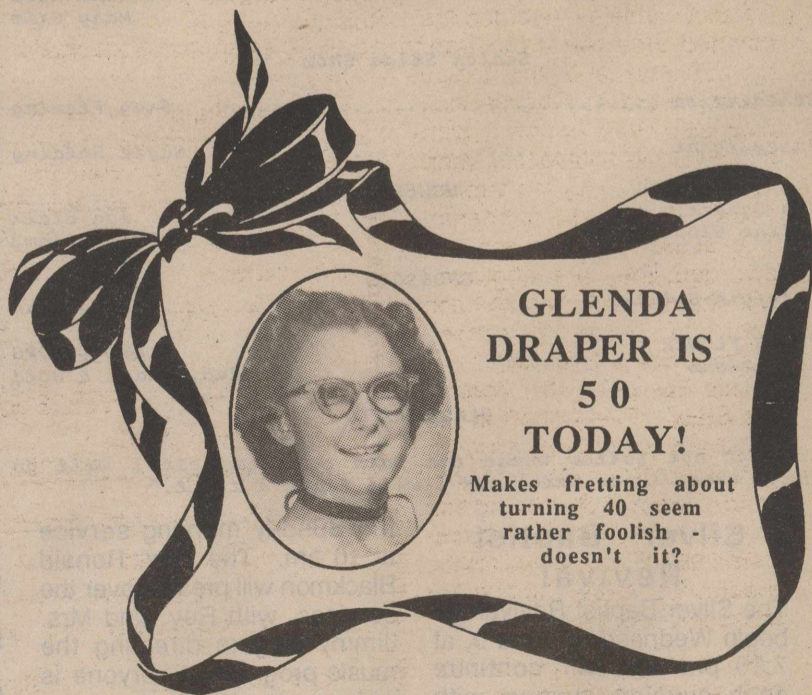

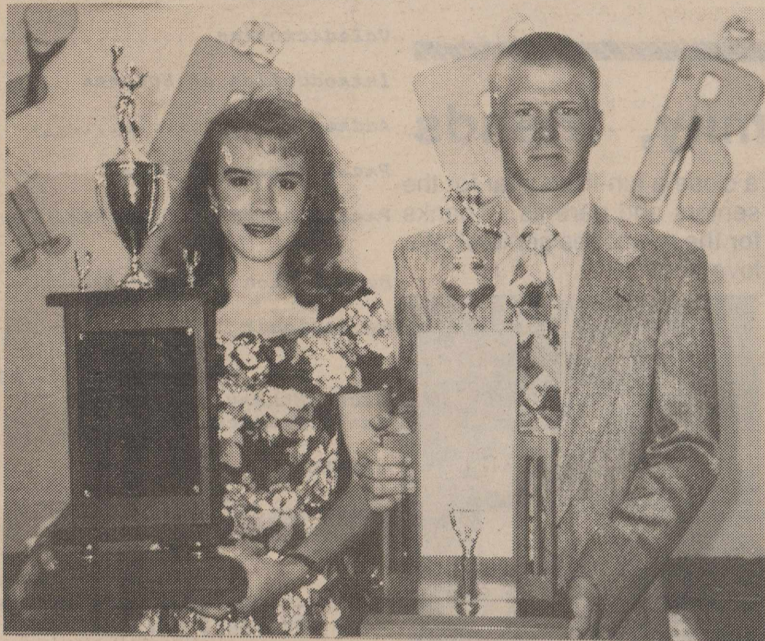

"Year of the Steer" theme for banquet

By some common understanding among them, they had designated the 92-93 athletic year as the Year of the Steer (and it had no sexist meaning, for athletes are on equal grounds as both male and female). Now they all sat rather quietly for high school students - some in pairs, some not. The girls were all pretty, in florals mostly - the boys handsome in their favorite shirts with some in ties and jackets, some not. Despite the festive decorations for the annual banquet - black and orange everywhere, tables highlighted by trophies from the hall cases - they were almost solemn. I believe it was because of the sudden realization it was almost over. It was May 11 and the finish line was just ahead and they weren't ready to give it up yet.



Chosen by their fellow athletes to receive the Lady Steer and Steer awards for 1993 were Seniors Shelbi Grim and Danny Jackson. Presentations were made at the annual Athletic Banquet on May 11.

No athletic year is perfect. Many of their goals had been met, some had not, but this town, like most small towns, takes great pride in its athletes and to us it was perfect.

Master of Ceremonies for the event was Athletic Director and Head Coach Ed Poehls. He directed most of his praise and obvious pride to the athletes (who he calls "Ladies and Gentlemen"). He was especially pleased this year about having the largest number in athletics of any year since he came to Robert Lee - between 60 and 70. During the course of the evening every individual athlete was recognized for his or her accomplishment. Each sport and its record was noted and then groups of athletes by classes. Those who assisted the program in any way - from cheerleaders, managers, statisticians, and filmers to his own coaching staff were recognized.

The athletes made recognitions of their own - to cheerleaders, past and present, to the Seniors, to underclassmen, and to several individuals. Elaine Gibbs was named Football Sweetheart. The Cheerleader Hero Award was claimed by Coach Terry Page, who will be leaving coaching at the end of the year. Kenneth Rasco, longtime employee and teacher with Robert Lee ISD and now Coke County Constable, was present with the Service Award for services rendered.

Fellow athletes awarded the coveted Steer Award to Danny Jackson and the Lady Steer Award to Shelbi Grim who also was honored with that award as a junior last year. They are given for leadership, 110% effort, and citizenship. The actual trophies are not awarded; they are engraved with the recipients' name each year and kept at the school. Plaques are substituted.

This has been the Year of the Steer. Every sport in the program attained playoff berths; some won at State level. Most schools would love to have that record, regardless of classification, though it's more difficult for those in Class 1A.

Not enough can be said for high school coaches; endless

hours are spent, many in travel, preparation, and other areas besides the coaching of athletes. Many high school students have not reached full physical capabilities yet.

So how do you account for smaller, slower, perhaps even

those with less natural aptitudes, winning over the others? It's the heart and will to win and the absolute belief that they can do it and it's put there by their coach, the soul of high school athletics. Next year a new crop of bright-eyed athletes will also believe.

Reception honors seniors

Robert Lee High School's graduating seniors and their families and teachers were honored Sunday night, May 23, with the annual After-Baccalaureate Reception in the Fellowship Hall of First United Methodist Church. Hosted by United Methodist Women and assisted by 5 young helpers from the Junior Sunday School class, 24 of the 26 senior class members were present for special recognition. Senior class sponsors and school officials attended as well as several classroom teachers.

A total of 95 names were registered, but several did not register. Punch and cookies were served from a table decorated with flowers and

colors chosen by the class. Cookies were provided by members of the church. The generous amount not used were refrigerated to be used at the All-Night Party to be given the seniors after graduation. No doubt, there will not be too many cookies for that group!

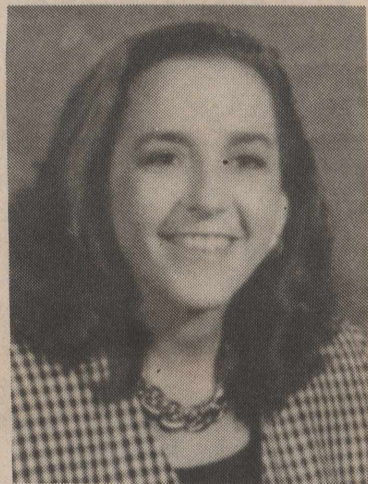
On Wednesday, May 26 at noon, the senior boys were treated to lunch in the park. Fourteen senior boys were honored by a group of their moms at that time.

Memorial Day pays tribute to veterans

Twice each year America sets aside a day to remember veterans: Memorial Day and Veterans Day. These are rightful days of tribute to more than two million who gave their lives and to those 27 million still living that served America.

It was President Lincoln who signed legislation in 1862 establishing national cemeteries. Memorial observances for honoring the war dead began in the mid-1860's in Columbus, Georgia; Columbus, Mississippi; Waterloo, N. Y., and Carbondale, Illinois. Apparently inspired by President Lincoln's attendance as speaker at Carbondale, retired General John A. Logan as Commander-in-Chief of the Grand Army of the Republic, the private organization representing Union veterans, issued a general order on May 5, 1868 establishing a nationwide Decoration Day on May 30.

Memorial Day also reminds us the veterans we honor and remember are America. You may be a veteran or your spouse, Uncle Harry or Aunt Sally may be, a neighbor, your doctor, realtor, grocer, banker, barber, anyone. Whoever they were, wherever, whenever, and however they served, they are America's veterans: They are the men and women who were drafted, who volunteered, who served in the Guard and the Reserves prior to federal duty, and those who chose military service to their country as a career.

Among the benefits service to their country earned them is the honor of burial in one of the 114 National Cemeteries administered by the Department of Veterans Affairs. Nationwide, more than two million Americans rest in National Cemeteries, Soldier Lots, Confederate Cemeteries and Monuments. Overseas in 24 American Battle Monuments cemeteries, 125,000 American casualties are interred. More than one million have died in service to their country.

In the state of Texas, VA National Cemeteries at El Paso, Houston, Kerrville, and San Antonio conducted 5,558 burials in Fiscal Year 1992.

Throughout the national cemetery system, famous men, such as President Zachary Taylor and Ernie Pyle, heroes such as Admiral Chester Nimitz, Barry Sadler, General Holland "Howling Mad" Smith, and Lt. Gen. Troy Middleton, and the unknowns rest side by side in the national cemeteries.

Women veterans, spouses and certain dependents are buried in national cemeteries. The first woman service member buried was Florena Budwin of Michigan who, disguised as a man, had followed her soldier husband to war. He fell in battle and as a Confederate prisoner she nursed

sick prisoners until her death. While Budwin was buried in special circumstances, Congress in 1948 made official the precedents and traditions in eligibility of spouses and dependent children for national cemetery burial.

Section XXVIII
PENALTIES
Page 28 state -

The breach of any rule or regulation contained herein, by the doing of any act forbidden by this Ordinance or the failure to do any act required by this Ordinance may in the case of conviction thereof be punished by the infliction of a fine not to exceed Two Hundred (\$200.00) Dollars or by imprisonment for not to exceed thirty (30) days or by both such fine and imprisonment. The penalty hereby authorized shall be in addition to any other penalty provided by the laws of the State of Texas, or by the laws of the United States of America, and may be enforced or imposed under complaints filed by the District, or any other interested person, in an appropriate court of jurisdiction.

LAP RIDING DANGERS

All fifty states have laws requiring children to be in safety seats while riding in cars, but some states allow a child to ride in the lap of an adult for the purposes of being fed, changed or rocked to sleep. A study published in the journal *Pediatrics* (7-1), says even that must change.

Researchers from the University of California, Irvine, estimate that more than two thousand infants are injured in the U.S. each year while riding in the laps of adults. Among infant fatalities studied, at least twenty-seven percent of the children were traveling on an adult's lap. In thirty-four of the one hundred-eighty-three crashes, the infant was the only death of the occupants of the car. Experts refer to the on-lap position as the child-crusher because in a crash, a child is crushed between the adult and the dashboard or windshield. The researchers conclude that on-lap travel must be eliminated.
