### Bozarth Accepts Coaching Position At Lake View

Connie Bryan Bozarth, Bronte native, has accepted the volleyball coaching position at Lake View High School in San Angelo.

A volleyball standout at Bronte High School, she went on to play for the ASU Rambelles in four Lone Star Conference Championship seasons, 1982-1986. She was named all-LSC player three times during her college career.

Upon her graduation from Angelo State University, Connie's plans included attending Texas University to seek her Masters Degree in journalism. (Her late step-father, Ben Oglesby, had been a longtime owner and publisher of the Bronte Enterprise and the Robert Lee Observer.) However, fate intervened and Bronte High School, long a volleyball power, was looking for a volleyball coach. She returned to her hometown and never looked back. She coached six seasons with the Lady 'Horns, leading them to two state titles and five playoff appearances.

Connie moved on to Seguin for the '92-'93 season leaving Bronte with a 109-42 six-season record. Connie's husband, Tim Bozarth, is a summer candidate for graduation from the University of Texas of San Antonio.

The Lake View Maidens squad will be made up mostly of juniors and needs work. Connie hopes to be the catalyst; she will be the 3rd volleyball coach in three years at the school. She certainly has the credentials and experience to make it happen.

Her mother, Mrs. Pat Oglesby, still resides in Bronte and has seen plenty of volleyball games over the past seventeen years or so. And it looks like she's not through yet.

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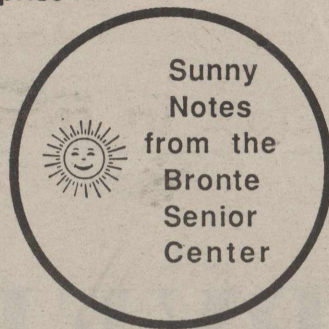

**BROCCOLI IS BACK IN**

The resurgence in the popularity of broccoli has less to do with President Bush leaving the White House than it does a recent study at Johns Hopkins University School of Medicine suggested that broccoli may help avoid cancer. Researchers found a chemical in broccoli that stimulates certain enzymes in the body that are known to help fight against tumors.

Still don't like broccoli? Molly Gee, chief dietitian at the Institute for Preventive Medicine at Methodist Hospital in Houston, says high levels of the chemical, sulforaphane, is also found in carrots, brussel sprouts, green onions, and cauliflower. She says your quest for health should not ignore other healthy vegetables, fruits, and grains nor the well-known benefits of regular exercise.

The couple is at home on Red Cloud Ranch west of Robert Lee, following a wedding trip to San Antonio and surrounding points of interest in the hill country.

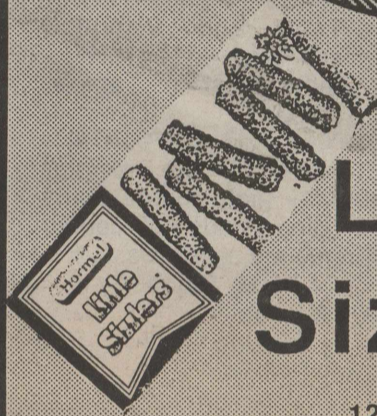

**Artificial Tanning**

If you want a bronze glow that's safe for your skin, stay out of the sun this summer and hit the bottle. That is, a bottle of artificial tanning cream.

"The only truly 'safe' tan is the kind you rub on your skin," says Dr. John Wolf, chief of Dermatology at the Methodist Hospital in Houston. Don't be fooled into believing the artificial color on your skin is actually a base for a deeper, darker tan. "Artificial tanning creams offer no protection against the sun's damaging rays," says Wolf, "so be sure to apply sunscreen or sunblock before you head out into the sun."

Wolf says a suntan is simply a sign of damage to your skin, so he strongly discourages anyone from deliberately "tanning." But, he does have advice for those who insist on worshipping the sun. Go slowly, use a sunscreen with an SPF of at least a 4, 6, or 8 and when you've got the tan you seek, use a sunblock that will offer the maximum protection.

However, not everyone will spend their summer days spread on a beach towel soaking up the sun as they darken and damage their skin. Many people find themselves under the sun in the garden, on the golf course, at a picnic, or just cruising in a convertible. In fact, 75% of the damage done by the sun's rays happens during our everyday activities.

"Everyone, regardless of their skin tone, should use a sunscreen with an SPF of at least 15 everyday," says Dr. Wolf. If your goal is to completely block out the sun, an SPF of 30 is recommended.

If you're going swimming or playing a sport, choose a sunscreen or block that won't easily wash off in the water or with perspiration. A wide-brimmed hat is a good shield, but most clothing will not act as a barrier between the sun and your skin.

Sunlight damage is increased by wind, heat, and humidity and during the hours of 10 am until 3 pm when the sun's rays are the strongest.

Once you think you've covered yourself with sunscreen, Dr. Wolf advises checking a few other 'out of the way' and often missed places.

"Your ears, nose, lower lip, neck, shoulders, feet, and in some cases, the top of your

head should be protected too," Wolf explains. "Those places are the most common spots for the development of malignant melanoma, a potentially fatal form of skin cancer."

A melanoma may appear as a dark brown or black spot that is usually irregular in shape and color. The appearance of a new or changing mole should prompt a visit to a doctor so it can be examined, especially if it pops up suddenly or is painful, itching, or bleeding.

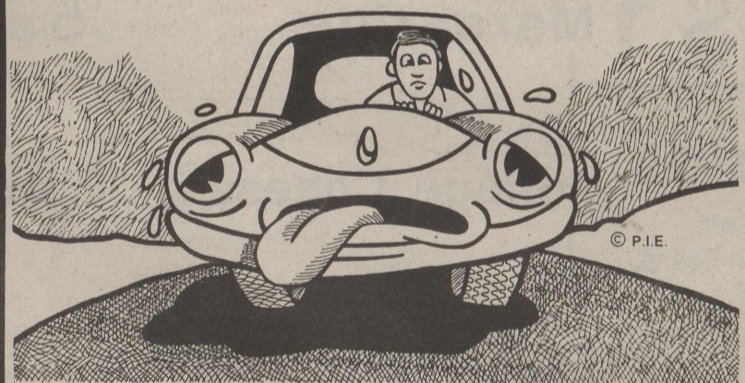


