Pageant performances conclude this weekend

"Ole Coke County, Home of the Rabbit Twisters," continues its annual production this week on Friday and Saturday nights, July 30 and 31, beginning at 8:00 pm. Last week's shows were well received by responsive audiences.

The customary intermission report by Coke County Pageant Association President Harrell Johnston and Publicity Chairman Jeffie Roberts disclosed that 35 Texas cities and eight states were represented those two nights, and the two winners of **RABBIT TWISTER T-shirts for** having traveled the greatest distance to Robert Lee were from Alaska and Ireland.

This is the 17th year of annual performances depicting that part of Texas history lived by Coke County pioneers. Scenes portray real and imagined incidents based on information in "History of Coke County, Home of the Rabbit Twisters," by Jessie Newton Yarbrough; "From Top of Old Hayrick," by Jewell Pritchett; "Coke County," published by Ron and Thelma Peters in 1984, (now out of print and unavailable); "Heap Many Texas Chiefs," by Roy Holt; and personal interviews with many Coke County citizens who are descendents of early pioneer families.

Lucile Bryan has been identified as "author, director"

but she asked that that title be omitted from future program books. Indeed, she insists, beside the scenes she wrote, others were written by Johnny Millican and Lynn Green, with two songs arranged into short scenes composed by Doak Snead and Bonita Copeland. As quoted from the 1991 program booklet, "Our story is based on history -- Our portrayal is light-hearted reverie."



Clinic boasts new assistant

The Robert Lee Shamrock Clinic is now staffed by David Dickensheets, a physician assistant. He had been at the local clinic for about six weeks.

The community had been advised months ago by Shannon Medical Center, Robert Lee's "parent" medical facility for the clinic, that chances of obtaining another doctor were slim to none. Representatives, speaking to a meeting of the West Coke County Community Development, raised the possibility of acquiring a physician assistant for the local clinic.

Physician assistants (PA's) are being widely used in the United States, particular in rural settings and smaller cities

due to the difficulty of obtaining a doctor. The cost is relatively lower; they are highly skilled; they fit the criteria needed for a nursing home/emergency clinic situa-

tion like Robert Lee.

Many communities sing the praises of their physician assistant who normally moves to an area and becomes part of it. This forms a close bond between him (or her) and his patients who value the medical skills he has brought through intensive training and experience. He is in constant contact with physicians who are available to him through the "parent" medical facility, such as Shannon.

Clinics surrounding Robert Lee now have PA's, including Mason, Menard, and Coleman.

At the time of the public meeting, Betty Fife, West Coke County Nursing Home administrator, told the group a retired Air Force PA was interested in the Robert Lee Clinic. David Dickensheets is that man

He was born in Ohio, joined the Air Force after finishing high school, and went in wanting to be in the Air Traffic Control. Because he wore glasses, he was turned down for that field. He got into the medical field by the back door when he was asked if he. wanted to be a medic or be a security police officer. He said he chose the medic's assignment over the security job for obvious reasons.

He served eleven years as a medic, including a stint in Vietnam. When the PA field became a reality, he attended school in Wichita Falls and interned in various government facilities. Serving as an Air Force PA, he worked in a number of places - 9 1/2 years

work in Robert Lee when the couple gets moved.

Clinic hours are 8 am - 12 noon, 1-5 pm weekday. David emphasized that on weekends or nights, a patient may call the nursing home and they will contact him.



Baptist youth-led revival



On hand for the celebration were KLST television personnel.



Previous studies have suggested white-collar workers might have a lower risk of heart attack than blue-collar workers. However, Dr. Patricia Hebert and her colleagues, at Harvard Medical School and Brigham and Women's Hospital in Boston, suggest it's not the job but differences in cholesterol levels between white-collar and blue-collar workers. When they took into consideration major risk factors for heart attacks, such as smoking, obesity, calorie consumption, and amount of exercise, white-collar workers had some advantages over blue-collar workers.

The major difference appeared to be in levels of HDL. the good kind of cholesterol. White-collar workers in the study tended to have higher levels of HDL. Dr. Hebert says, in *Archives of Internal Medicine*, people in any occupation can improve their levels of HDL, and lower their risk of heart disease by quitting smoking, losing weight if obese, and exercising.






