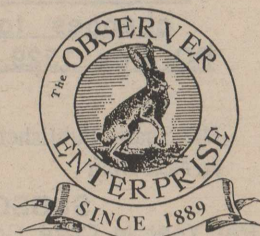

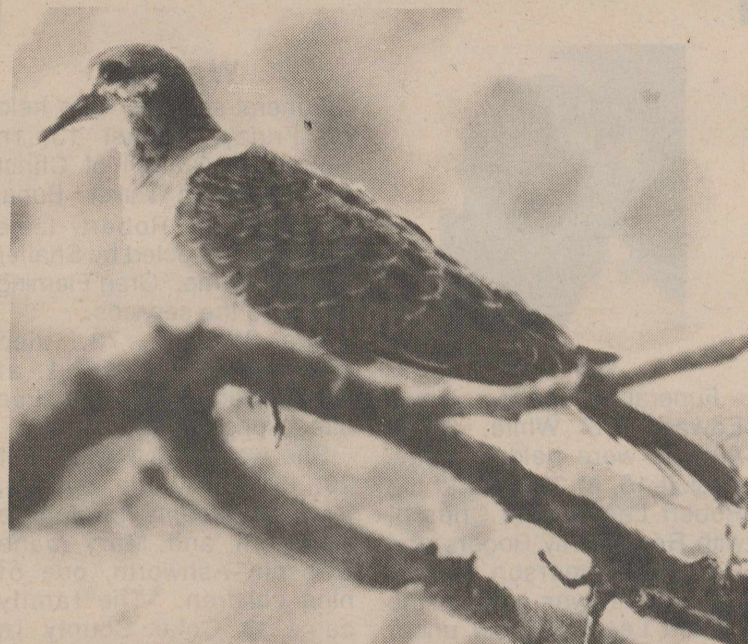
### Dispatchers to receive training

On August 19 and 20, dispatchers from San Angelo/Tom Green County and those from surrounding counties, including: Coke, Concho, Irion, Kimble, Mason, McCulloch, Menard, Reagan, Sterling, and Sutton; will receive specialized Emergency Medical Dispatch/Crisis Communications training. This valuable training sponsored by the Concho Valley Council of Governments Regional 9-1-1 program will enable our dispatchers, who are in actuality, the first on the scene, to save lives and provide improved public safety service to our citizens and responders. The training will be held at the San Angelo Police Academy.

Dispatchers will learn proven techniques in breaking hysteria thresholds; handling multiple calls; specific pre-arrival medical instructions; liability and legal issues and other methods to allow responders to arrive better prepared.

## Millican attends home economics confab

Sheri Millican, a vocational home economics teacher at Robert Lee High School, joined some 2,800 teachers at the 1993 State Professional Development Conference for Home Economics Teachers planned and coordinated by the Home Economics Division of the Texas Education Agency, August 2-5, in Austin, Texas.

The theme of the 1993 conference, "Making Connections: Educating for Future Success," provided the framework for the four day event. Attendees were offered training enhancing their teaching methodology skills and refining of program priorities.

Of special importance this year were the presentations and work sessions which focused on implementation of the newly adopted Master Plan for Career and Technology (formerly Vocational Education). The August conference provided initial information enabling Home Economics teachers to make the appropriate modifications in program focus and practice to meet the new priorities.

Judith Hetherly, Texas Education Agency's State Director for Home Economics Education said, "We have opportunities at this time to make changes that will be of significant benefits to students, families, communities, and careers for which we prepare students, and for the overall prominence and credibility of

our programs."

Dr. JoAhn Brown-Nash, co-founder of Prescription Learning Corporation, addressed the theme of the conference, focusing on how to create a school climate and teaching-learning environment where the many factors influencing each student's learning literally "connect," thus promoting attainment of skills and knowledge necessary for future success.

Claude Dollins, a home economist and nationally-known speaker, recognized for his ability to expand human potential in order to achieve superior performance, addressed the general session with a presentation entitled "When You Hire Me, You Get All of Me" providing information and tools to help prepare students to manage multiple roles.

Richard Froeschle, Executive Director of the State Occupational Information Coordinating Committee, provided state labor market data during a Tuesday session with input from the TEA Home Economics staff on how this data, as well as the more localized information and materials, could be used to guide local program planning, interpretation, and individual guidance activities with students and parents. The need for all Home Economics teachers to become skillful in communicating concepts from this session was stressed for effectively influencing local decisions.

Dr. Mary Montle Bacon, experienced psychologist, with a background in teaching, counseling, school administration, and currently serving as a delinquency prevention officer for the California Attorney General's Office, spoke on the topic "People, Like Flowers, Should be Appreciated When They Are in Full Bloom." Dr. Bacon provided insight into new ways of effectively working with students and other professionals realistically with

each situation presented.

"With the implementation of the newly adopted master plan for Career and Technology Education," said Doris Schwausch, 1993-94 President of VHETAT, "we, as Home Economics teachers, are entering an exciting period of development and change. In teaching essential life skills, the skills necessary for living in today's society, we are preparing the youth of today to meet the adult challenges of tomorrow."

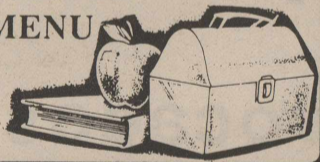

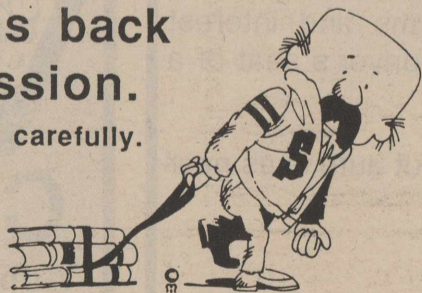


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## Bivins earns BA degree

### Lay good study habit foundation early

For young children, settling in to a good homework routine is the best lesson they can learn.

"Homework begins as early as kindergarten and first grade," said Dr. Florence Eddins, a child psychiatrist at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston. "These early years are the time for parents to lay the foundation for good study habits."

Eddins believes children's experiences in learning basic skills taught in the early grades will set the tone for how they perceive the rest of school.

To begin a homework routine, she recommends that parents teach by example.

"When it is time to do homework, sit nearby with some work of your own," Eddins said. "This way you give your child an idea of how to do homework."

Flexibility is the next key in creating the right homework environment. Eddins cautions parents to remember that what works for them may not be right for their child.

"A child's attention span is much shorter," she said. "You may need uninterrupted quiet to get work done, but your child may need short breaks."

Eddins warns parents not to let struggles arise over these differences.

"Some children may like

music or television in the background or may need a play period before settling down to work," Eddins said. "The important thing is to experiment and learn what works best for your child."

As homework guidelines are established, Eddins encourages parents to let the child play a key role in the decision making process.

For example, if a parent feels that listening to music is becoming detrimental, Eddins suggests talking it over with the child and trying homework without music for a week to see how it goes.

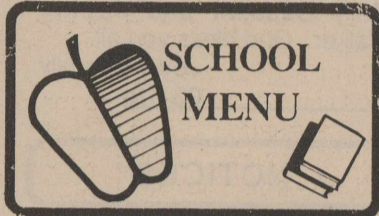
"If your child has trouble establishing a good routine, help them set time limits for completion," Eddins said. "Gradually you and your child will find what works best."

Homework success also depends on good communication between the parents and teacher. Parents should learn what the school expects of the child and of the parents.

Teachers can establish a system for sending home written notices of homework assignments if a child is having difficulty remembering to do homework or failing to tell the parents about homework.

As the grades begin to come in, Eddins urges parents to acknowledge both the successes and the failures.

"The best reward is that parents take notice and admire their child's efforts in school," Eddins said.

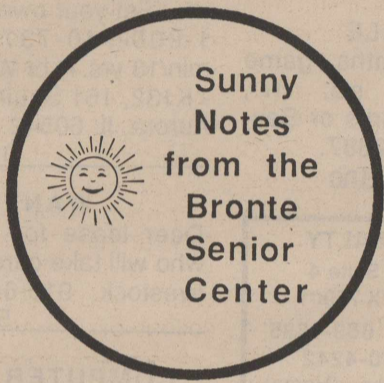

## SHANNON HEALTH NOTES

### Senility

Not too many years ago, medical professionals sought to counter the myth that senility, or dementia, was a normal function of aging. Now there's evidence that many cases of dementia might even be preventable. When you think of dementia you may think first of Alzheimer's disease, but a report in the *New England Journal of Medicine* (1-21), suggests that mini-strokes may cause more dementia than previously thought.

The study of eighty-five year olds in Sweden showed twenty-nine percent had signs of dementia. A larger than expected number appeared to have vascular dementia, probably caused by a series of strokes so small that the person may not have known they were occurring. Dr. Eric Larson, of the University of Washington, Seattle, wrote an accompanying editorial. He says the relatively high amount of vascular dementia is added reason to reduce the number of risk factors for stroke, especially high blood pressure and smoking, and by doing so a certain amount of dementia or senility may be preventable.

# TPWD surprised by Spence largemouth

Texas Parks and Wildlife Department fisheries biologists were surprised by the number of largemouth bass collected at Lake E. V. Spence during a cove sample the first week of August.

According to Biologist Bill Follis "We were expecting around 8-9 pounds per acre, and we collected 24 pounds per acre (lbs./ac)."

According to Follis this is greater than it has been since the mid-1980's. "This increase is due to the rise in water level in 1992." He also added, "Water level expansion increases the available cover and habitat for the bass to spawn and live in and increase the available food supply."

The bass range in size from abundant small young-of-the-year (1-3 inch fish) to one that was 23 inches long and 7.6 pounds. A total of 11.08

lbs/ac. of legal largemouth bass (14 inches and bigger) were collected and 9.16 lbs/ac of bass 10-13 inches long. At current growth rates, those bass will be legal sized by next year. Additionally, 3.01 lbs./ac of small largemouth bass (4-9 inches) were collected and they should reach legal size in 2-3 years.

The channel catfish population looks very good; 32 lbs/ac with many 12 inch and bigger fish. The flathead catfish population looks OK. There are a large number of small fish (less than 10 inches) and a small number of big fish (24 inches), but few in between.

The forage populations are excellent. A total of 18.25 lbs/ac of sunfishes (all species combined) were collected and 95.80 lbs/ac of shad (gizzard and threadfin) were collected. This large amount of forage

will provide a good food supply and lead to good growth for the largemouth bass, white and striped basses, and catfishes.

No striped bass were collected, but since they are an open water predator and we were working shoreline coves, we did not expect to catch any stripers. Few crappie were collected, which reflects the trends we have observed for the past few years in our frame net samples on Spence. However, most of the crappie collected were small young fish, meaning that there are some adults producing and keeping the population going.

## Pecan Management

Even with the extreme dry summer we are having, most of our pecan trees have fairly good nut set on them but now is a critical time for filling out and saving what pecans we have.

There are two extremely critical periods in pecan development where water is important. This is during early summer when the pecans begin to size up and during August and September when adequate moisture is required to fill the nuts out. A short supply of water now will cause poorly filled, low quality nuts.

Older pecan trees require about 50 inches of rainfall per year for optimum production. With extremely short supply of moisture so far you can see why additional watering is important. The best method of watering is slow deep soaking of the ground around the drip line of the tree. Shallow, frequent waterings will cause the feeder roots to come back to

water near the surface, making the tree more susceptible to freeze damage this winter.

There are three main possible causes of pecan drop in the latter part of the pecan development. These include:

\*An inadequate supply of available moisture. In order for pecans to produce nuts the tree must not be in a stress condition due to lack of water.

\*A deficiency of available nutrients. A poor fertilization and zinc spray program may result in pecans dropping prior to maturing. In addition, a heavy crop load in the preceding year reduces the level of stored food, and trees in this condition may shed pecans due to inadequate food reserves and as a self defense mechanism.

\*Insect or disease attack. Pecan pests will indirectly, through leaf damage or directly through nut damage, cause premature shedding of pecans.
