

John D. Holmes of New Braunfels died Wednesday, September 29, at McKenna Memorial Hospital in New Braunfels at the age of 51.



The bride attended Sundown High School and South Plains College. She is employed by B. A. R. Treating Services Inc.






Bronte 6th grade builds quilt





Hunters under 12 years of age must be accompanied by a licensed hunter 17 years of age or older. Those under 12 are not eligible for the training course. Cost of of the required course is \$5, which goes to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Dept.





Habits, Healthy and Un

Americans are slacking off on some aspects of healthy living. A recent Louis Harris poll for Baxter Health Care showed only one third of us now get strenuous exercise three times a week or more, down four percent from a year ago. The poll shows two thirds of us are overweight, up from fifty-eight percent a decade ago. Those who say they are under great stress at least several days a week has risen constantly over the past decade. It's now at thirty-three percent. Not all the news is bad.

For instance, use of seatbelts has risen dramatically. Seventy percent now say they use seatbelts all the time. However, the percentage who say they obey the speed limit all the time is down to slightly less than half. Perhaps the best of the good news is that seventy-six percent of Americans are non-smokers, an all time high, and use of illegal drugs is down. Despite the mixed news about health habits, more than half of those surveyed think those with unhealthy habits should pay more for their health insurance or a greater share of their medical bills.


