New car sticker goes inside windshield

Introducing the latest in antitheft devices from Texas.

The Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) is issuing a new vehicle registration sticker -- for placement inside windshields instead of outside on license plates. The program begins with registrations expiring January 1994.

The sticker is larger and of a different design. Its main purpose is to deter theft -- bringing up another important feature.

If the sticker is peeled off the windshield, the word

Bike-a-thon cancelled

In 1992, 568,885 replacement license plates and stickers were used. TxDOT estimates that 60 percent of replacement stickers issued were due to theft. At \$5.30 per replacement, replacing the stickers cost the public \$1.8 million and a lot of time and aggravation.

"When the word gets out that these stickers are useless when peeled off the glass, incidence of stolen stickers will drop quickly, as will the cost of replacing stolen stickers," said Jerry Dike, director of Tx-

DOT's Division of Motor Vehicle Titles and Registration. "But the savings don't stop there. If all stolen stickers were used on vehicles that would otherwise be legally registered, state and county revenue losses could exceed \$17 million. Recouping these losses could mean savings passed on for use on other projects."

The 72nd Texas Legislature passed a law in 1991 mandating the sticker change to lower vehicle registration theft. Drivers whose vehicles have no windshield will continue using the license plate stickers.



The Robert Lee Steers came to Bronte Friday night to challenge the Bronte Longhorns to a head to head battle of the undefeated. What is the difference between a Longhorn and a Steer? Well, in the first place they are both obviously full of bull. It depends on how you look at it, but you could say they are both full of bologna, or you might say they are both full of weiners or roast. Another difference is their horns. A Steer has short horns and a Longhorn has Longhorns (I mean longer horns). However, Friday night it was none of the above. It was all T-bone and sirloin steaks. by Stover Taylor no different. The Horns had four turnovers while the Steers had two. The most decisive factor for the Longhorns was the loss of running back Gary Bilbrey. You cannot lose the heart of your offensive game (150 yards per game average) and not have a serious adverse effect on your ability to move the football and win games. Gary played one quarter and rushed for 45 yards on 7 car-

> In the 1st quarter Gary Bilbrey takes the opening kick-off for the Longhorns and returns the ball 36 yards to the Horns 40 yard line. Six plays later after Bilbrey rushes for 24 yards and Jason Wilson caught a 3 yard pass, Brent Taylor carries the ball into the end zone on a 2 yard run. Rudy Sanchez kicked the extra point. The Horns kick off to the Steers and run 14 offensive plays before they are forced to punt. Longhorns get the ball on their own 10 yard line. Four rushes nets 23 yards and the 1st quarter ends with the score 7-0.

> In the 2nd quarter on the 1st play Gary Bilbrey leaves the game with a dislocated shoulder. Gary is a tremendous athlete and a team leader, we wish him a speedy recovery. On the next series of downs Jay Parker caught a pass for 7 yards, Jacob Golson and Jason Cooper combined rushes for 16 yards. On the next play Brent Taylor rolls out to the left side of the Longhorn offensive line for a 40 yard touchdown run. The play was nullified because of a penalty. Three plays later Brent Taylor went back to pass but all receivers were covered, so he ran the ball up the middle of the field for a 27 yard touchdown. Sanchez's extra point attempt was good. The Steers take the kick-off and march down the field on 8 plays to the Horns 35 yard line. Jason Cooper picks off a Steer pass and the Longhorns have the ball on their own 3 yard line. On the next play Jason Cooper takes a hard hit as he crosses the line of scrimmage and the ball pops back into the end zone where Brent Taylor fell on the ball and the Steers are awarded a 2 point safety. The Longhorns had to punt from their own 20 yard

line giving the Steers good field position. Seven plays later Brent Taylor picks off a Joe Blair pass and returns the ball 15 yards to the Horns 40 yard line. After a 15 yard pass to Jay Parker and 2 incompleted passes, the Steers pick off a Brent Taylor pass on their own 15 yard line. One play later the 1st half ended with the score 14-2.

In the 3rd quarter the Steers took the opening kickoff and 10 plays later Lee Mc-Cown scored on a one yard run. The extra point attempt failed. On the next Longhorn possession the Horns Brent Taylor fumbled the ball and the Steers recovered it on the Longhorns 40 yard line. The Steers drove down to the Longhorns 6 yard line and the 3rd quarter ended with the score 14-8.

On the 3rd play of the 4th quarter Lee McCown scored his 2nd touchdown on a 6 yard run. The extra point attempt was good.

The remainder of the 4th quarter was a defensive battle. Neither team was able to mount a substantial drive. Brent Taylor had a good night punting the football, 2 punts for a 42 yard average. Rudy Sanchez did another great job kicking the ball on kick-off and extra points. The Bronte fans could not have asked for a more exciting game. The Longhorns travel to Sterling City Friday night to take on the Eagles who are undefeated this season with a 6-0 record.

Lady Horns win again

On Oct. 9 the Bronte Lady Longhorns rolled over Santa Anna's Mountaineers 15-1, 15-2. Bronte's record is 13-8, 6-0 at home, and 3-0 in district play.

Counselor Comments

by Vicky McCutchen As college costs continue to increase each year, high school students and their parents are concerned about how they will pay for college. It is recommended by college admissions officers, financial aid advisors, and college testing programs that parents begin and maintain a College Savings Plan by the time the students reach their 7th and 8th grade year, or as early as possible. Another important step for parents to take is to apply for financial aid. Many families think they will not meet eligiblity requirements for financial aid and will fail to apply for assistance. As a result, they may choose a college on the basis of cost or decide that their student should not apply for college admissions at all.

There are several ways for families to obtain information they need to make decisions about financial aid needs. The ACT (American College Testing) program offers to parents and their students a service that helps them identify costs for up to three schools they are considering for college. This will help them by giving them an estimate of how much that family would be expected to pay at those particular schools, if they are likely to qualify for federal need-based financial aid, identifies major sources of aid, and it helps them to project estimated educational expenses and sources of funds over a calendar year. It also provides information about scholarships and financial aid opportunities in their state. General information about financial planning and federal aid programs is also provided.

There is a fee for this service. Information concerning this service can be obtained from your child's school or the ACT program. Many schools are informing parents and students of this service if they

are concerned about college

All students and their parents should apply for federal financial aid and financial aid from the college of their choice, even if they think they would not qualify. By applying, students are eligible for many sources of aid.

Nicotine Inhaler

After a long line of products designed to help people stop smoking, nicotine gum was introduced. Then, the nicotine patch. Now, tests of a nicotine inhaler show significant success rates among a group of smokers trying to quit, compared to smokers using an inhaler with no medical ingredients. The nicotine inhaler, not yet on the market in the U.S., is a plastic tube with a plug impregnated with nicotine at one end. It could be called a smokeless cigarette, in fact, both groups were instructed to inhale deeply, but more often than if they were smoking a cigarette.

Participants in both groups could replace the inhaler when they felt it had no more effect. The inhalers were phased out after six months, but follow-up visits to doctors' offices continued for a year, about fifteen percent of the men and women who had used inhalers containing nicotine were not smoking, compared to only five percent in the group using the placebo inhaler. The Danish researchers reported in the Journal of the American Medical Association, that increased success rates could be expected if the nicotine inhaler were combined with behavioral modification programs.

When elected officials on the federal, state and local levels begin wrestling with the question of how to provide quality, affordable health care, the central question is always who will be the providers of our health care services. There are not enough primary care physicians, and it takes about seven years to train a doctor.

The answer that more and more communities are turning to is the Physician Assistant (PA). The profession is one of the fastest growing health careers in the country, and the U. S. Department of Labor projects the number of PA jobs in the United States will increase by 44% through the year 2005.

PAs can provide a broad range of medical services that, in the past, were performed only by licensed physicians. PAs take medical histories, perform physical exams, order and interpret tests, make diagnoses, establish and carry out treatment plans, suture wounds, and, in 32 states plus the District of Columbia and Guam, write prescriptions. Last year, PAs handled more than 149 million patient visits.

This month, thousands of PAs around the country celebrate National Physician Assistant Day. Its history began October 6, 1967, when three former medical corpsmen, who wanted to transfer the skills they had learned in the military service to a civilian profession, graduated from the first PA program at Duke University.

Today there are more than 25,000 PAs in the country who perform an essential role by improving public access to health care. More than half of all PAs provide primary care which is defined as family and general medicine, internal medicine, pediatric care and OB/GYN care. PAs are not independent practitioners, though; they practice medicine with supervision by licensed physicians.

About 70% of all PAs work in public and private clinics, for health maintenance organizations or medical offices. About 30% work in hospitals. PAs also serve as commissioned officers in all branches of the military.

To become a physician assistant, an individual must graduate from one of the 57 accredited programs in the nation. A typical PA program requires 102 weeks training, compared with 153 weeks for a medical students. Most states also require PAs to pass a national certifying board examination before they can practice medicine. PAs are required to accumulate 100 continuing medical education credits every two vears, and to maintain their certification, they must retake the certifying exam every six







Services for the Elderly

Services for the Elderly is a two hour pre-employment lab designed to equip students with skills to care for the elderly. Services for the Elderly is a unique new program offered at Bronte High School in cooperation with Bronte Nursing Home.

The program is under the direction of Home Economics teacher Julie Massey, High School Principal Scott Turner, Bronte Nursing Home Administrator Pam Shaffer, and Social Services Director Sherri Eubanks.

The program consists of classroom hours and lab hours. Seven seniors and one junior will visit the nursing home on Wednesdays and Thursdays.

Sherri Eubanks has coordinated the program at the nursing home. Visiting each resident and helping with activities introduces the students to the nursing home setting. Study will consist of job opportunities; physical, emotional, and social needs of the elderly; transportation; clothing needs; nutritional; exercise; safety; vital signs; terminal illness; death and dying.

The students who complete the course will have the opportunity to take the state nurse's aide exam. Upon successfully passing the state exam, the students will be certified nurse's aides, and can seek employment in the field of endeavor.


