Deer, turkey seasons begin Saturday

That day is fast approaching for sportsmen (and women) who have waited anxiously since last season to get a crack at the "big one" that eluded them.

Fall gun season will open for Coke County hunters on Saturday, Nov. 6. It will enable them to harvest four deer, with a 2-buck limit, Nov. 6 - Jan. 2. Turkey season will run concurrently to the deer season, with 3 turkeys for the fall and spring hunts allowed.

Hometown Holiday Giveaway

Beginning this past Monday, Nov. 1st, customers should begin saving their receipts from Ole Bronte merchants and businesses. The dollars spent will convert into points, and the points will convert into prizes at the end of December. Grand prize will be a Magnavox color T. V. with remote, a microwave oven, VCR, bicycles, card table and chair set, and more prizes too numerous to mention.

Quail season opened statewide Oct. 30 with a 15-count bag limit. That season ends Feb. 27. Quail prospects are optimistic. Shotgunners had several poor years now since the almost record year in 1987 until last year. Numbers improved in 1992 and biologists expect some increase for this season's hunt.

Deer and turkey hunts should be comparable to last year. Antler size on deer could be down, mostly due to record hunting pressures and the harvest of immature

bucks. Texas Parks and Wildlife technician B. D. Davis of Winters suggests that some changes could be forthcoming for Coke County and surrounding counties to help combat this problem and promote more effective management.

Game numbers are at least the same as 1992, however, and kills may be up this year due to decrease in vegetation. Deer and turkey will be more visible as well as using feeders more, Good Hunting!

Election Results

Fourteen of the 16 proposed constitutional amendments on Tuesday's Special Election ballot were approved by Texas Voters. Rejected statewide were proposals #1 and #16. Proposition 1 would have authorized the issuance of \$50 million in bonds to help businesses owned by minorities and women. Defeated by a lesser margin, #16 would have authorized \$75 million for agricultural business loans.

Only 392 Coke County voters went to the polls Tuesday out of 2,183 eligible. Voter turnout was equally poor across the state. County voters turned down propositions #1,2,5,7,9 and 16.

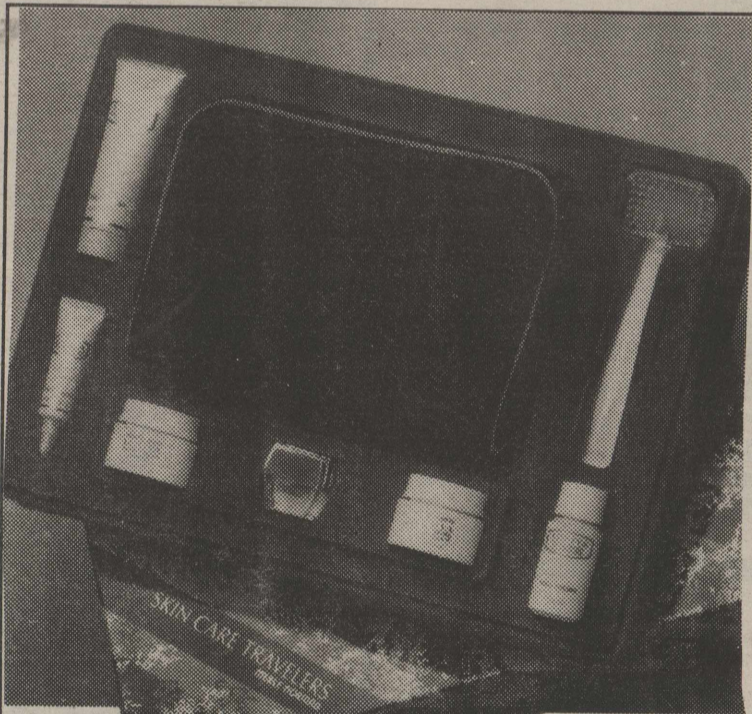

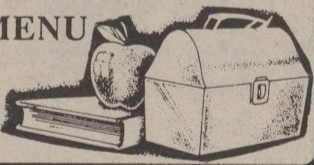
3rd Quarter

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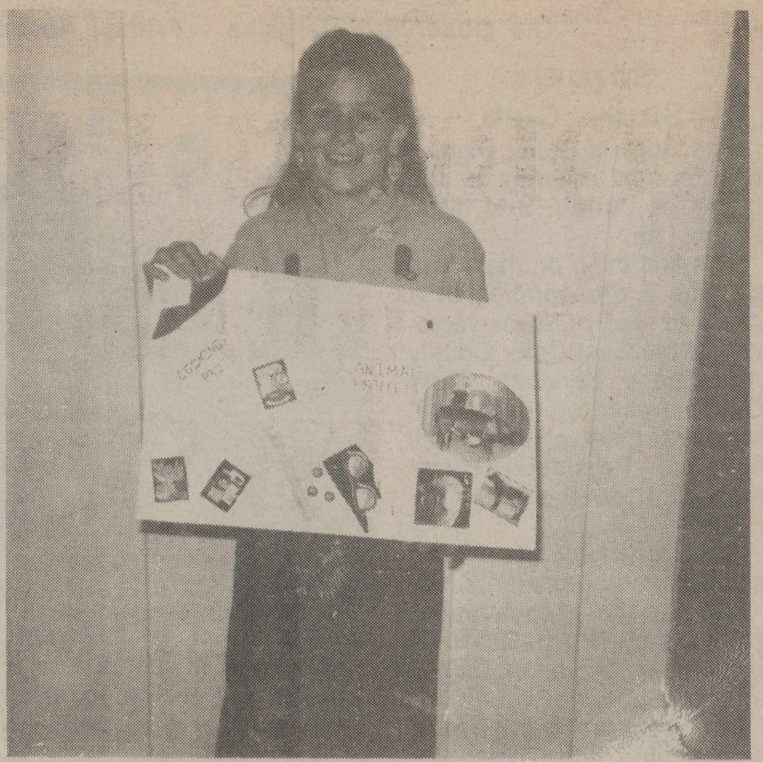

Horns fall to Roby in freeze-out game

The Bronte Longhorns traveled to Roby Friday night to challenge the Roby Lions to a game of freeze out. At game time the wind was blowing 20 to 30 mph straight from the north pole and the wind chill factor was +5 degrees. Perhaps the greatest challenge of the night for the Bronte and Roby coaches was getting the Longhorns and the Lions out of the field-house on to the playing field. Surviving frostbite and cold exposure was the primary objective of the night with a little football thrown in. There was sleet and snow scattered around and it snowed most of the second half. The Longhorns could not overcome the cold and sputtered all evening. A blocked punt on the first series of downs for the Longhorns set the pace for the rest of the game. The Longhorns had 131 yards rushing on 46 carries and 21 yards passing on 2 completions. The Horns scored their second touchdown of the game with 10 seconds left in the game. One official signaled a touchdown and another official said no. Gary Bilbrey had penetrated the end zone by one yard but was pushed back out. Unfortunately, the officials were cold, watery eyed like everyone else, and due to the wind and lacked concentration. The Horns gave it their best effort

under such adverse conditions.

In the 1st Quarter the Lions kicked off to the Longhorns. The Horns pick up a first down then have to punt. The punt was blocked and the Lions pick it up and raced 43 yards for a touchdown. The two point conversion failed. On the Longhorn's next series of downs they had to punt, the Lions fumbled the punt and the Horns recovered. Six plays later Gary Bilbrey scored from 5 yards out. The two point conversion failed. At the end of the 1st quarter the score was 6-6.

On the second play of the 2nd Quarter the Lions scored on a 25 yard run. The 2 point conversion failed. The Horns offense had difficulty moving the ball in the second quarter. The Horn defense kept the Lions away from the end zone. Roby led 12-6.

In the 3rd Quarter both teams fumbled the ball several times. Each team punted three times as defense controlled the third quarter. The score was 6-12 at the end of the third quarter.

In the 4th Quarter defense was still in control of the game. However, the Horn offense drove 60 yards to the one yard line with thirty seconds left in the game and third down coming up. On third and one Bilbrey crossed the goal line by inches and was pushed back. They placed the ball on the 1/16 inch line where Bilbrey's knee hit the ground when he was pushed back. Now it is 4th and 1/16th of an inch for the touchdown. On the next play Bilbrey penetrated the goal line by a yard. The official nearest the play signals a touchdown and the other official on the far side of the pile up signaled no touchdown. After the officials discussion they ruled no touchdown and Longhorns were heart broken. In the world of athletics one of the hardest lessons an athlete must learn is that tie referees and officials make mistakes, and life itself is no exception, people make mistakes. The Longhorns played good defense, allowing only one touchdown. Cold weather is more merciful to the defen-

sive teams. The offensive teams played well considering numb hands and the fact you have to play more conservatively in freezing weather conditions. Next week is homecoming at BHS and For-san comes to town.

There is no medicine like hope, no incentive so great and no tonic so powerful as expectation of something tomorrow.

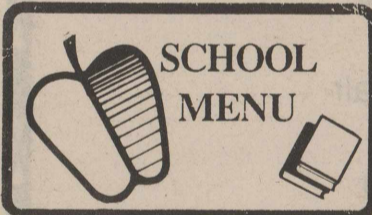

Pursuant to Title 49, United States Code, Section 1612 of the Federal Transit Act, the Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) issues this notice for solicitation of proposals and/or applications from private and public nonprofit organizations serving elderly and/or disabled persons to utilize funds available under the Section 16 grant program, administered by TxDOT.

Notice of Invitation: The Texas Department of Transportation (TxDOT) is issuing this request for applications for the Section 16 grant program. The Section 16 grant program provides capital assistance to nonprofit organizations which provide transportation services to the elderly and/or disabled persons in Texas.

Funding for the Section 16 grant program is appropriated by the Federal government under the Federal Transit Act as described in TRA Circular 9070.1C, December 23, 1992. Fiscal year 1994 appropriations for Section 16 grant program are expected to be announced in October.

Eligible capital expenses under the Section 16 grant program include: (1) the replacement of vehicles such as buses, vans, trolleys, etc., currently used to transport elderly and/or disabled persons; and such auxiliary equipment as is normally acquired with vehicles of this type; (2) the purchase of vehicles for service expansions and new services to the elderly and/or disabled persons; and such auxiliary equipment as is normally acquired with vehicles; and (3) the purchase of radio equipment only, i.e. equipment that is not part of a vehicle allowed categories 1 and 2 of this paragraph. Section 16 funds must be used for transportation projects serving elderly and/or disabled persons.

Each project will be evaluated in the appropriate category in accordance with the stated selection criteria. However, TxDOT reserves the right to establish minimum required scores.

Projects must meet Federal funding criteria included in Circular 9070.1C and must

also comply with property management standards set out in Title 43, Chapter 31.57 of the Texas Administrative Code, relative to the replacement of vehicles. To be eligible for consideration, each 16 proposal must include the following documents and information:

- (1) Successful completion of the pre-application interview and on-site visit with the District public transportation coordinator.
- (2) A complete Section 16 grant application, copies of which are available at TxDOT District offices. Application requesting funds for multiple projects should group them within the application by funding category (replacement vehicles, expansion vehicles, new starts, and radios). The narrative should demonstrate the need for the equipment, the capability to maintain and operate the equipment, and the involvement of the applicant and the community in requesting funding for the equipment.
- (3) A budget for each category of equipment which shows the unit cost of each item and total equipment

costs. The federal dollars and local match dollars provided by the applicant should be noted.

(4) Compliance with the American Disabilities Act to provide transportation services that are accessible to disabled persons.

(5) Provide proof of demonstrated coordination efforts with other transit systems within the applicant's immediate service area in the application.

(6) Proof of local match ability to pay a minimum of 20 percent of funding for said equipment. No federal dollars may be used as local match unless authorized by the federal agency that awards those monies.

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HEALTH NOTES

MS Update

Multiple sclerosis afflicts about two hundred fifty thousand Americans each year. Medical researchers are getting closer to effective treatments on several fronts.

A report in the journal *Nature* (3-93), suggests that the same well-understood chain of events that causes a disease like multiple sclerosis in laboratory animals, is the same culprit that causes the disease in humans.

Researchers at five medical centers, including Stanford University in California and Rocky Mountain MD Center in Colorado, identified the chemical that causes the immune system's T cells to launch an attack on protective coating of nerve fibers known as myelin. That's on the research front. Closer to being available to MS patients is a form of an immune system chemical called beta interferon, recommended by an advisory committee to the FDA. This is the first new drug in more than twenty years that has shown promise of slowing the crippling effects of the disease. Although this recommendation does not guarantee approval by the FDA, the opinion of a diverse group of experts is an important step in regulatory process.

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
