STEERS ADVANCE TO QUARTERFINALS!

Local activities are on hold. Santa Claus will have to wait. The Robert Lee Steers are still playing football and we live from Friday till Friday.

The team played high-level offense and defense for total domination of Hico in Early last Friday night. The Steer's coaching staff and the squad have worked intently this week readying for the quarterfinal clash against Crawford, who are 11-1. The clubs will meet at 7:30 in Gordon Wood Stadium in Brownwood Friday night.

When the Crawford-Alvord match-up was moved to Saturday last week, several attended the game in Granbury including Coach Edward Poehls. Asked Tuesday about his impression of Crawford, he noted, "the squad is used to winning, and are sound both on offense and defense. They adjust and can make a quick comeback; Alvord went ahead 14-0 and Crawford came back to beat them 21-14. Size-wise, they are about our size, overall. A fast ball club, their reading technique is good, and they can run or pass. Crawford has a good quarterback with some tall receivers, one 6' 3". They have some weapons."

It is significant to note on the stats that quarterback Jerry Zepka has 847 yards rushing for the season while the two half-backs have 891 and 813. Zepka has also passed for 840 yards, with a split end who has 465 yards receiving.

Coach Poehls said Tuesday his Steers are ready to go, and as they have exhibited all year, will just take every game one at a time. In speaking of the tremendous support from the school, students, and community, he said they all hope to "make those folks proud".

Lunar eclipse

Sunday night's lunar eclipse was visible to more people in the United States than in any year since 1982. The nights had been so lighted by the moon the previous week that the stars have been barely visible. Once the eerie shadow covered the round globe of the moon, the stars seemed so bright and close.

The earth's shadow became visible on the moon's surface about 10-10:30 pm. Total eclipse was about 12:15 -1:00 am, then began moving off. Those who stayed up, or retired and got up later, had a great view since the moon was almost overhead during the lunar show.

A lunar eclipse is easy to watch since it requires no precautions or equipment to prevent eye damage. Binoculars provided a more detailed look at the phenomenon.







-Counselor's Comments-

by Vicky McCutchen The holidays are fast approaching us and with them bring a basket full of expectations: delicious meals, family get togethers, a break from school, traveling to relatives homes, and many other fun activities. But for some kids, the realities they live with may fall short of these expectations. Some of these could be: deciding which family to spend their holiday with; trying to feel comfortable around parents/people they don't see often; facing the disappointment of presents that can't be given or won't be received because the money is too tight. These are just a few reasons the holidays can be tough for some kids.

Suicide is one of the leading causes of death for persons between the ages of 15 and 24. Many say that for every suicide completed there are 50 to 100 attempts. Numerically, there are over 500,000 reports filed each year of teenagers who try to kill themselves. To magnify the concern, one adolescent suicide often triggers a succession of other attempts by those who somehow romanticize suicide or view it as a solution to their own problem.

In general, a suicide attempt is usually an act that follows deep depression, hopelessness and helplessness. Stressful situations such as the death of a loved one, the loss of an important relationship or extreme health problems can create emotions that lead to suicidal thinking. For teenagers, seemingly less traumatic events which occur one after another over a period of time can sometimes cause feelings of failure, loneliness, and hopelessness and may led to a serious depression. The following behaviors may signal suicidal distress: 1.) emotional upset

over a recent stressful event such as a loss of a loved one, family problems, break up of an important relationship; 2.) prolonged depression; 3.) withdrawal from friends and family; 4.) persistent difficulty in sleeping and/or loss of appetite; 5.) statements about not wanting to live; 6.) giving away possessions; 7.) chronic hostility; 8.) being able to describe specific plan for suicide; 9.) loss of interest in previously valued activities; 10.) sudden improvement in a person who has been depressed for a long time. (This is often the time that the person gains the energy to carry through suicidal plan.)



We Still Eat Too Much Fat

Despite warnings linking high fat diets to disease, a series of studies using statistics from the long-term Framingham Study shows total fat consumption for men and women has remained at about thirty-eight percent of total calories since the mid-1950s. while cholesterol consumption has dropped significantly.

One of the Boston University Medical Center researchers, Dr. Barbara Millen Posner, says this shows that while Americans are able to adopt simple dietary changes, the bewildering array of food choices may make it difficult to arrive at healthy combinations.

There are factors besides fatty diets that contribute to body fat. Another review of Framingham data found two related indicators of body fatness in early childhood. Those are lack of physical activity and time spent watching television. Dr. Lynn Moore says it has been shown that if children are not active by late in their elementary school years, they are very unlikely to ever be active as adults.

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Shannon Health Notes is a public service of

In a meeting Tuesday night, Nov. 23, in the county courthouse, about 25 persons from Bronte and Robert Lee gathered to gain more information on the program. James Wilson of Robert Lee was present and agreed to serve as Emergency Management Coordinator.

Speaking to the various response groups - fire departments, EMS personnel, county commissioners, as well as others who could respond quickly to any disaster - was Ken Clark of Seminole. He is a regulatory officer for Mid-American Pipeline Company, a division of Mapco, Inc. His informative presentation involved scenarios that can and have happened involving pipeline ruptures.

Clark's company owns a loop of linepipe through Coke County, northwest to southeast. He advised caution in digging or otherwise disturbing a marked pipeline area since most ruptures occur from 3rd party damage. He noted that lines now carry much higher pressure products than 20 years ago, though they can carry everything from methane to crude oil. Clark also warned that the stench additive is only injected into finished products,

Every Texas city and town is such as propane, since the stench product is very corrosive to coated pipelines. Therefore, most leaks are not easily noticed; the gases are odorless and colorless.

High pressure lines maintains the product as liquid (which is very cold; skin can be freeze-burned) but is converted to a fog on the ground. It lays low because it is heavier than air.

A computer panel in Tulsa, OK may note a change in pressure before a town or community does and will contact an industry representative immediately. At that time emergency response teams will be notified. An immediate local show of authority is necessary to seal off the endangered area and begin evacuation. The company will try to turn off product flow first at terminals 50 miles apart and then approximate 10-mile apart valves. By this time fires or explosions may have occurred with or without injuries.

Clark advised local agencies not to rely on volunteer resident evacuation - give them no choice but to leave. Keep everyone at least one mile from the vapor cloud - two miles on the downside. A rule of thumb is, if you can see the fog - you're too close.

Emergency personnel present felt that valuable information was gained at the meeting and future meetings may be called to discuss other emergencies such as tornadoes, plane crashes, or other kinds of disasters requiring

Fur season opens Dec. 1st

Trappers are reminded that the fur-bearing animal season is Dec. 1 through Jan. 31, except for muskrat and nutria. Muskrat season is Nov. 15 through March 15 while nutria may be taken year round.

Steve Pritchett, Texas Parks and Wildlife Department game warden in Austin, said fur-bearing animals may be taken for the purpose of sale only during these seasons. Texas statutes define furbearing animals as badgers, beavers, foxes, minks, muskrats, nutria, opossums, otters, raccoons, ring-tailed cats, skunks, and civet cats.

A \$15 trapper license (\$250 for nonresidents) is required to take fur-bearing animals or the pelts of fur-bearing animals, except landowners may take fur-bearers without a license when found depredating on that land (fur-bearing animals taken under such conditions may not be possessed or sold); anyone may transport a suspected diseased fur-bearer to a public health facility for diagnosis; and, new this year, a person who possesses a hunting license and is engaged in a lawful hunting activity for any species other than fur-bearing animals may take and possess a fur-bearing animal without the need of a trapper's license. Bag limit is one per day, not more than two in possession.

Fur-bearers may not be taken on public roads or right of way, from a boat on any public water or from private property without consent of the landowner or his agent.

Coyotes and bobcats, considered nongame animals in Texas, can be taken at any

time during the year by a licensed hunter, Pritchett said. The season for taking bobcats for the purpose of selling the pelt or transporting it out of state is Nov. 15 through Feb. 15. A hunting license is required for taking coyotes and bobcats at any time.

Bobcats are not classified as fur-bearing animals in Texas so a trapper's license is not required, but before the pelt is sold or transported out of state it must be presented to a registered bobcat pelt dealer (usually licensed fur buyer) for permanent tagging, he said. Only bobcat pelts taken during the Nov. 15 to Feb. 15 season may be tagged and sold. Hunters not planning to sell bobcat pelts are reminded that any bobcat pelt must be tagged prior to export of the pelt out of state.

Other restrictions may apply for hunting and trapping furbearing animals and are explained in the Fur-bearing Animal Regulations Digest. For further information on furbearers or bobcats, contact any TPWD law enforcement field office or TPWD head-quarters at 1-800-792-1112.
