
be Santa's helpers.

Senator Bill Sims of Paint Rock chose to announce his bid for re-election in Coke County on Monday afternoon. Speaking from the steps of the courthouse in Robert Lee, he explained that Coke and Menard counties were the only two counties he has represented his entire five terms in the Texas Senate. District lines have moved several times; he will be a candidate for District 24 but will serve out his term in District 25.

As chairman of the Natural Resources Committee and a member of the Finance and Criminal Justice committees, Sims plays a key role in shaping policies that affect the 24th District, Texas and the

In addition to his positions on standing committees of the Texas Senate, Sims serves the state on a number of boards, including the Texas Energy Council, the Edwards Aquifer Oversight Committee, and the Southern States Energy Board. He also is cochairman of the Joint Interim Committee on Storage Tanks and serves as director of the High Plains Research Foundation. He has been executive secretary of the Texas Sheep and Goat Raisers' Association and the Texas Wool and Mohair Warehouse Association since 1966.

Sen. Sims was raised on a ranch near Paint Rock, while his wife, the former Sue Lowe, grew up in Sterling City.

Straying from political concerns, he congratulated the Steer football team and coaching staff for their stellar 1993 season. The squad and coaches were present at the press conference.

Accompanying Sen. Sims was his wife, Sue, (Sweet Sue, as he referred to her): Clay Carsner, his aide, and 72nd Dist. Rep. Rob Junell. A number of Bronte and Robert Lee officials and constituents. including Coke County Democratic Chairman Patti Ivey, also attended.



December is the time of
year that tells a senior in high
school that college is right
around the corner. Some
students will choose a twoyear college, some a four-year
college or university, some a
technical or trade school, and
some will choose a military
career. Whatever the choice
is, application for admission
should be done as soon as
possible.

Students planning to attend a post-secondary institution should have taken or plan to take the ACT and/or SAT tests for college admissions requirements. A student will need those scores sent to their college along with an application for admission. Students will not be accepted until these tests are taken and the scores are received by the college of their choice. If a student is applying for a scholarship at the college of their chioce, they must have already been accepted into that college.

Financial aid for school is also coming up in January. The application process will begin for the 1994-95 school year beginning January 1, 1994 for all students who plan to get financial assistance from the federal government. The Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) must be completed by the student to apply for federal Title IV student aid programs (Pell Grants, Stafford Loans, Supplemental Educational Opportunity Grants, College Work-Study, Perkins Loans).

The Financial Aid Forms (FAF) is used to collect additional information needed by many colleges and private scholarship programs to determine eligibility for non-Title IV funds. A fee is charged to the student for the FAF.

Students also need to contact the college financial aid administrator to find out if more forms for your college are needed and what other types of financial aid could be available. Colleges will have deadlines for their financial aid. Scholarship information should also be obtained from the college of the student's choice. The FAFSA form application is for Federal student financial aid for the 1994-95 school year (July 1, 1994 - June 30, 1995).

SHANNON HEALTH NOTES

Heart Attack Predictor

Men who have slightly higher than normal systolic blood pressure at rest and higher than two hundred when they exercise vigorously may have an excessive risk of dying from a heart attack.

The Norwegian study, presented to the American Heart Association's annual meeting on high blood pressure research, confirms an earlier study in France. Systolic blood pressure is measured when the heart contracts with each heart beat. It is the first and higher number in a blood pressure reading. Men with resting systolic blood pressure of at least one hundred forty, whose pressure rose to two hundred or above during exercise had about twice the rate of heart attacks as men with normal systolic pressure and exercise pressure below two hundred.

Dr. Sverre Kjeldsen, co-author of the study, says the rate of fatal heart attacks in the high blood pressure group was also significantly higher. Medications are available to control even mild high blood pressure and possibly prevent a future heart attack.

Keep Holiday Meals Healthful

Although holidays are special times -- they present unique challenges especially for those with special food needs. It is a time when many people may gain unwanted weight thus compromising their health. It may take a holiday meal make-over to enjoy the holidays with no weight gain. Overweight predisposes people to the development of heart disease, diabetes, etc. So keeping your weight within normal limits is important to help prevent these diseases.

If you are hosting a healthy meal, some basic changes you can offer your quests are a a variety of lower-fat, lowercalorie foods along with traditional favorites. Modify recipes using some of the many low-fat choices offered by many of the food processors in response to consumer's concerns about health. For example, dairy products include many low or non-fat choices such as low or not-fat sour cream, skim milk and lower fat cheeses. Use more oils to replace hydrogenated or solid fats. Baste meats with wine, fruit juice, or broth instead of butter, margarine or shortening on the pan when baking. Two egg whites can be substituted for a whole egg in most recipes to reduce cholesterol content. Replace buttered bread crumbs on tops of casseroles with crushed cereal. You not only reduce the fat, but you also increase the complex carbohydrates -- a recommendation of the dietary quidelines. Another excellent complex carbohydrate source is special request, lower fat or air popped popcorn. Use a variety of flavored salts to add flavor and interest to this high fiber snack.

Meat processors are offering a variety of lower fat alternatives for holiday fare. Lowfat varieties of cocktail sausages, lower fat beef or turkey sausages, and lower fat cold cuts. Serve these processed meats on top of a variety of whole wheat, rye,

pumpernickel, or other breads with mustard, horseradish or low-fat mayonnaise or salad dressing that will add nutrition and flavor with less fat. Also add some vegetable dippers such as green peppers, broccoli, cherry tomatoes, radish roses, celery and carrot sticks with low-fat dips to add flavor, nutrition and interest to holiday snacks. Fruit such as apples, pears or grapes served with a special dip made with light cream cheese flavored with brown sugar and vanilla also adds interest and flavor to any holiday meal.

Cutting portions for each food group is also important. Select leaner cuts from the (leg/loin) meat group to two 3ounce portions which is about the size of a deck of cards. A skinless chicken breast is about three ounces also. Choose two or more servings of milk from low-fat choices. One half cup cooked or one cup of raw vegetables is a serving. Try to eat at least three servings of vegetables and two servings of fruit daily.

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


Steers end record year at quarterfinals




RL FFA News

Beef Cow Nutritional Supplementation

Some things never seem to change, and this is certainly true in beef cattle production. Even though a lot has changed in the last 20 or 25 years, beef cows still need the same nutrients they always have, vitamins, minerals, protein, and energy. In general, we can say the following about these four classes of nutrients under typical grazing conditions:

1.) Minerals, especially phosphorous and salt but also magnesium and several trace minerals, are practically always deficient in most perennial pastures and native ranges. The only exception is when plants first start new growth.

2.) Protein is periodically deficient. A shortage can occur at almost any time, but is almost certain during winter dormancy and, in most years, late summer.

3.) Energy is occasionally deficient. Fortunately, it also is periodically in surplus in most years. Cows can store excess forage energy as body condition or fat. But at times, especially during drought or under overstocked conditions, stored body reserves are depleted.

4.) Vitamins are rarely deficient under most grazing

regimes. During extended periods of drought, lack of vitamin A can be a problem.

What has changed in the last 20 to 25 years is that we know more about specific nutritional needs. And we have more choices and better products to meet these needs. What do we mean?

1.) Good high phosphorous minerals (8% to 15%) are widely available. Not so common are minerals adequate in magnesium, copper, zinc, mangenese, and selenium. Check your mineral.

2.) We now know that various forms of protein are required for ruminants such as cattle. You've probably heard of bypass or undegradable protein sources. However, this seems to be of less concern in cow herd nutrition than stocker or feedlot programs.

3.) There is no question that the average cow is now larger and higher producing. So nutritional requirements are higher. And recommended minimum protein levels are now great to insure efficient rumen function.

4.) There are limits in feeding high starch supplements to cows on range, pasture, or hay. Excess starch reduces efficiency of forage consumption and utilization.

Poor results usually occur from feeding more than 3 to 4 pounds a day of a feed based on corn, milo, etc., including most breeder cubes.

5.) More new, useful byproduct feeds are available.

How should we use this information in planning beef cow supplementation programs?

1.) Provide good mineral free-choice year round.

2.) Always supplement protein when needed. This will use forage most efficiently and help keep cows in good body condition most economically. It is easier to maintain body condition than re-

3.) Don't be afraid of good by-products like soybean hulls, wheat mids, rice bran, and others.

4.) If we provide minerals and protein when needed, and don't overstock, then supplemental energy can be minimized. Supplementing high levels of energy is usually biologically and economically inefficient. But if grass is short and energy is needed, either supply it or reduce animal numbers. Otherwise, reproduction and performance will be unacceptably low. You can't starve a profit out of

Don't add mirth to girth

Ah, the holidays: a time for family gatherings, Christmas shopping, parties and eating -- enough to be 5 to 7 pounds heavier come Super Bowl Sunday in late January.

Many people gain about that much during the holiday season, according to Kay Schooler, registered dietitian and Director of Nutrition Services at Scott & White Memorial Hospital and Clinic.

"Seven pounds is easy to gain. If a person takes in an extra 500 calories a day, just in little extra treats, he or she will gain about a pound a week. That's not hard to do with all the cookies and sweets around work," said Ms. Schooler.

Many people get into trouble by letting the holidays linger on for several months, starting with Halloween and continuing through the Super

It's normal for people to overeat this time of the year. "The trap we get into during the holidays is that we feel we must partake completely. Then we blame ourselves when we overindulge. It's better if we could limit overeating to just a few days instead of a whole two months," she said.

But instead, people sit back and say, "Well, I've messed up my diet by eating this, so why should I try to keep up with my diet the rest of the year?"

The key to avoid having to loosen your belt buckle a to make you more thirsty. couple of notches over the holidays is planning.

"You know you're going to Grandma's for a big holiday dinner," Ms. Schooler added. "Admit to youself you might go overboard for just this one meal. Begin earlier in the week by watching your calorie intake and increase your acitivity level a week or two beforehand. When you plan on overeating, the most important thing you can do is get additional exercise."

To burn off the extra 17,500 or so calories consumed over the holidays, you will have to walk 175 miles. Burning 100 calories per mile, it will take over 58 days of waking 3 miles a day to work off all those extra pounds.

Determination is also important. "If you don't want to gain weight, you won't if you plan ahead. Mind over matter is

pretty important," Schooler said.

keep in mind to help you get through the holidays without gaining weight:

*Don't approach holiday meals after fasting all day. A light snack beforehand will keep you from gorging when you arrive at a party.

*Never stand at a buffet or hors d'oeuvres table. Take one or two items and move across the room and talk with someone.

*Keep in mind that alcohol does have calories. If eggnog is served limit yourself to one punch cup, which has 335 calories.

*If you want to try everything on a buffet, take a fourth or third of the average serving

*Don't overeat or take seconds to please an insistent

*Don't use holidays and vacations as an excuse for gaining weight.

*Don't neglect exercise or

physical activity.

*Eat dessert two hours after the main meal. This will replace the 1,100-calorie snack usually eaten later.

*Concentrate on socializing and being with people. Don't make food the focus.

*Just say "no thanks"; it's easier than you think.

*Watch out for salty foods. They trigger your appetite more. Also, salty dishes tend

*Plan ahead and be spe about how to approach the holidays. Focus on the posi-

*Chew gum while preparing and cleaning up the meal so you won't be tempted to

*Remember to eat slowly and savor every mouthful: you will be satisfied with less food.






