Stock Show participation exceeds recent record

Approximately ninety Coke County youth exhibited livestock projects at the 54th Annual Coke County Stock Show, held last weekend at the Sterling Lindsey Memorial Exhibit Building in Robert Lee. And, according to show officials, the excellent participation in this year's show is higher than in the past several years.

Entries were down slightly from previous years, with mar-

ket hog numbers down some and the relatively new meat goat class experiencing the most increase in numbers from last year.

The show was followed by an exceptionally strong premium sale, according to show officials, and "the best ever barbecue lunch" on Saturday.

James Tennison and Shalon Waldrop started out on the right foot Friday night when their market lamb exhibits were named Grand Champion and Reserve Grand Champion, respectively. Amber Brosh and Michael Munoz took the top two spots in the meat goat division.

Saturday morning's top honors in the market hog show went to Blake Payne and James Tennison. Top prospect pigs were exhibited by James Tennison and Jessica Key.

Experience seemed to be the key in the steer show, as previous winners Casey Antilley and Russel Vaughn once again took the top two awards.

Horns gain football honors

Bronte Longhorns' running back Gary Bilbrey and offensive lineman Edwin Thomas have gained a number of honors since the finish of the 1993 football season. Both are seniors at BHS.

Gary, an all-around athlete, was placed on the all-district team in the tough 9-1A district and has recently been chosen as a running back on the Standard-Times 1993 All-West Texas Class 1A football team. At 6' 1" and 190 lbs., he rushed for 858 yards in five non-district games before being sidelined one game and parts of 2 or 3 others with a shoulder injury. Despite that injury he amassed 1,145 yards and 13 touchdowns this season. He is a repeater on the All-West Texas unit, turning in 15 touchdowns and 1,581 yards in 1992.

His parents are Mrs. Sheila Hanna of San Angelo, and Mr. and Mrs. Gary Bilbrey of Bronte.

Edwin is also a repeater on the prestigous All-West Texas football team. He was responsible for opening the holes for Longhorn rushers during the 1993 season which netted him district and area honors. Also to his credit, Edwin excels academically and is a straight A student.

His parents are William and Martha Thomas of Tennyson.

The Frank Percifull Overall Showmanship award was presented to Tracy Millican, with James Tennison taking the Ralph Walker Top Hand award.





Shannon to initiate

helicopter service Shannon Medical Center will begin a locally based emergency medical service helicopter program this spring, according to an announcement by Shannon President/CEO Tom Alexander.

Called "Medivac 1", the helicopter will be available around May 1 to Shannon's 16 county service area.

"As our referral area expands we need the capability to transfer trauma and critical patients back to San Angelo," Alexander said. "The best and fastest way to do that is with a helicopter."

According to Shannon Senior Vice President Lawrence Leonard, the aircraft is an American Eurocopter AS350 BA manufactured by American Eurocopter Corporation in Grand Prairie. It has a cruising speed of about 150 mph. "We'll be able to pick up patients within a 160 mile radius and return to San Angelo without refueling," he said.

Charles Benham, MD, medical director of Shannon's Medivac 1, said the helicopter will be an extension of the Emergency Department. "This aircraft has the same capabilities as our emergency department," he said. "Because of the level of technology incorporated into the equipment and the advanced training of personnel, as soon as a patient is put on board, the quality of care immediately matches that of our emergency department." Having the helicopter available undoubtedly will mean a life and death difference in some instances, according to Rod Gardner, director of Shannon's Emergency Department, who said it will not be used for routine cases. Medivac 1's flight crew will include a pilot, a paramedic, and a registered nurse. All paramedics and RNs will have Advance Cardiac Life Support, trauma, and pediatric emergency care certification. Flight training is also required. The helicopter's landing site in San Angelo will be at an undetermined location on the Medical Center's downtown campus.

Stenholm names manager




A parent can help in the following ways:





A new brochure developed at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston suggests ways the nearly 14 million Americans with the disease can reduce the risk of complications and maintain a healthy lifestyle.

The most important way to minimize the devastating effects of diabetes is taking control of blood sugar levels.

TSHL filing period

The filing period is underway for people who want to run for the Texas Silver Haired Legislature (TSHL), an all-senior elected body that advocates on behalf of older Texans. Filings began January 3, 1994 and will continue through February 28, 1994, with elections set for May 24, 1994.

The TSHL is a nonpartisan 116-member group that represents 28 districts in Texas. Members hold model legislative sessions every two years in Austin to identify the issues that are most important to senior Texans. Then they take priority issues to the Texas Legislature for legislative consideration.

Candidates for the TSHL must be 60 or older by January 1, 1994. They must also be registered Texas voters and live in the area from which they are seeking office.

Filing forms may be obtained from the Area Agency on Aging of the Concho Valley located at 4860 Knickerbocker Road. Completed forms must be returned to the Area Agency along with a \$5 filing fee.


The record of the first four TSHL's speaks for itself. Texas Legislators recognize the value of the informed members of the TSHL and frequently call on them to attend hearings, committee meetings, and provide testimony on vital issues. Approximately 70 percent of the issues which the TSHL have presented have been addressed by the Texas Legislature.

This TSHL will be the fifth group elected. Terms are for two years. Garden and Landscape Tips

Even though the calendar says winter, there are several landscape duties that can and need to be performed at this time.

For spring gardens, you could begin selecting your site and cleaning up the grass, weeds or old stubble. Turning this garden debris under now will aid in water retention and begin decomposing this litter early.

For lawns, this is a great time to water due to the drought conditions we have had. If you have dead patches of St. Augustine, rake the dead grass out of the lawn and fill that area with compost. Follow up with regualr supplies of water to encourage grass coverage in these spots. Now is an excellent time to soil test lawns and to kill all winter weeds with appropriate chemicals at the recommended rates.

This time of year is ideal for planting new pecan trees, mainly because of the selection of good trees. Most nurseries have pecan trees available now and your chances of getting a viable tree of the variety you choose are greater during this period. As most trees come as bare rooted, be sure and top the newly transplanted tree and keep the ground fairly moist by deep watering about every two weeks.

Roses should be watered every two weeks. This is also a good time to transplant any existing rose bushes. Before you transplant them in new beds, work several inches of compost or other decomposed organic matter in the soil.

Fruit trees can be planted during January to insure easier establishment and more vigorous growth. As with pecan trees, buy trees from reputable nurseries and avoid the "bargain plants" as they may not bear fruit true to selection. Be sure and dig holes large enough to give roots plenty of room and add some compost or sand in heavier soils. Don't fertilize fruit trees at planting as it may burn tender roots. Also remove half of the top of bareroot trees and prune carefully removing weak and poorly placed branches first.

When watering this winter and spring, it is best to avoid light frequent applications with fine sprinklers, especially with the salt content of Robert Lee water. When you water, soak the soil to a depth of 4 to 6 inches and don't water again until the top 1-2 inches of soil become dry. Also light, frequent applications cause roots to come back to the surface to the moisture, making them more susceptible to disease and freeze damage.


