County to pursue state jail or juvenile facility

A possibility exists that Coke County could acquire a State jail facility or a juvenile incarceration/correction center.

On the 9th day of February, 1994, the Commissioners Court met in Special Session, with all members present, for the purpose of meeting and hearing James Jonas, an attorney from Austin.

Mr. Jonas comes highly recommended, and brought information that he had been instrumental in securing jail facilities in Mitchell County, Childress, Pampa, Karnes

County, and Dickens County. He considered Coke County very suitable for similar type facilities.

The Court met again in Special Session on Feb. 17th, to consider retaining James Jonas.

Meeting with the court were several members of the County Industrial Committee. Among those present were Bill Allen, Frank Sanders, Martin Lee, Jackie Walker and Bobby Baker.

The Commissioners Court asked Rep. Rob Junell to this meeting to bring the latest

State jail requirements and needs to the group.

Rep. Junell is also very familiar with the character and reputation of James Jonas and highly recommended him as a consultant and professional in his field.

Two very important things happened during this meeting on the 17th of February.

#1. The Commissioners Court voted unanimously to retain James Jonas, which has been done.

#2. Frank Sanders, C. E. O. First National Bank of Bronte, and Bill Allen, C. E. O. and Board chairman of Robert Lee State Bank, jointly pledged \$1,500 each in support of the Commissioners Court's decision to pursue a State jail facility or a juvenile incarceration/correction center within Coke County.

Both county banking institutions have a long-standing tradition of being active in the economic development and promotion of future interests for the area. They have always set a leading example with shows of confidence in the county's potential.

The State correction center as proposed is a 500 bed facility estimated to employ approximately 120 people. The site would require a minimum of 70 acres of land.

A general information meeting will be held on Tuesday, March 1, at 7:00 pm in the Coke County district courtroom. Professional consultant James Jonas and Ed Wendler, a representative of Wackenhut Corrections Corporation will be present to field questions and concerns from the public. The Commissioners Court will also attend the meeting and urge county residents to attend.

Sandwiches and snacks will be available at 6:30 pm in the Commissioners Conference Room prior to the meeting.

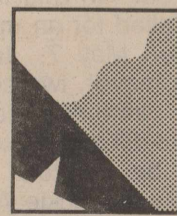
Central Baptist Guest Speaker

Breast Cancer

What part does family history play in the risk of getting breast cancer? The risk of getting breast cancer increases for all women as they get older, but a new study from the American Cancer Society shows genetic breast cancer is statistically more prevalent in women under the age of sixty. By age sixty women with a family history of breast cancer have about the same risk as women of the same age with no family history of the disease.

Dr. Eugenia Calle, whose study was published in the *American Journal of Epidemiology* (11-16-93), found that women under forty who had a family history of breast cancer had five times the risk compared to women without a family history. Overall, slightly more than four percent of all breast cancer deaths could be attributed to family history, but in women under fifty, sixteen percent of deaths are attributable to family history. Dr. Calle says the study should help identify younger women for whom mammography may be especially valuable.

Counselor's Comments

Testing is so common in our world, students need to know how to take a test. There is more to testing than just knowing the material to be tested. Many times students will do poorly on a test because they lack knowledge in test-taking skills. Before testing takes place, teachers and parents can help students with certain skills to help them succeed in taking the test. Below are some test-taking skills that are extremely important. There are also some suggestions that will help and many times raise the confidence level of students.

The first thing students need to do is to look over the entire test or be aware of the kind of test. For example, is the test true-false, multiple choice, fill in the blank, or essay. Second, the students need to read the directions very carefully, and read all of the directions. Looking for key words in the directions will help the student to know what they need to do. For example, words such as locate, write, identify the main idea, choose the best answer, etc., are some key words to look for. Students need to refrain from answering questions before they read and understand all directions. Ask the test administrator or teacher to clarify anything that is unclear.

Students need to respond to items for which the answer is known and skip the items they are unsure of until later. Then they need to go back to these. Some items on the test may give students a clue or a reminder for those items the student could not answer at the beginning. If an item seems too difficult, the student should underline key words answering who, what, when, where, how, why, and then respond to the question. Always go back and check all answers for accuracy, which means: Check for questions not answered, following directions, proper use of math operations, more than one answer marked, etc.

Some additional suggestions would be: 1) in order for

a statement to be true, all of the statement must be true (words such as always, never, all, etc.), 2) when matching items on a test, first answer all that are known and cross off answers used, and then go back and make the best choices for those items remaining, 3) on essay questions, be sure to answer using who, what, when, where, how and why, 4) on multiple-choice items, read all choices before responding; if any of the choices look new or different, they are probably not the correct answer, 5) if a true-false item looks new or different, it is probably false.

Another important skill is for the student to concentrate on positive self-talk and get away from negative self-talk. An example of negative self-talk would be: "I'll never get finished." an example of positive self-talk would be: "Just take one step at a time." Students need to breathe properly and relax so they can concentrate. Becoming tense will only cause the student problems.

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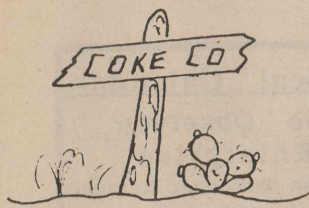

Grow Texas Onions
by Tommy Antilley

Onion planting time is here! Onions do well in Texas if growers plant the right variety at the appropriate time.

Success with onions has to do with understanding the phenomena of bulbing, Antilley said.

Bulbing occurs as a result of the length of daylight hours. Day-length requirement differs among varieties which have broken down into short-day, intermediate-day, and long-day types.

A variety's day-length requirement must be met or bulbing will not occur.

Short-day varieties, such as the new 1015Y or Texas Super Sweet onion, require about 12 hours of daylight and will produce anywhere in Texas if planted at the right time.

Medium-day and long-day types, which produce hotter and more pungent onions, grow only in specific areas.

The larger the plant, or the more leaves it has when bulbing is initiated, the larger the bulb will be.

The best way to have the right sized plant at the right time is to set out pencil-sized

transplants six weeks before the average frost free date. In Coke County, the average date of the last freeze is March 24.

Most Texas soils are adequate for growing onions, but some may need more organic matter to increase drainage.

Planting onions on top of raised beds will improve drainage and will enable the soil to warm up more quickly in the spring.

Several weeks prior to planting, evenly scatter about 1/2 pound of a complete fertilizer, such as 10-10-10, over 50 square feet of bed surface.

To plant onions, make small holes in the row 3 to 4 inches apart and about 1 inch deep. Set one transplant in each hole, firm the soil around it and water immediately.

After three to four weeks, side dress plants with one cup of ammonium sulfate or 2/3 cup of ammonium nitrate. Place the fertilizer about 4 inches from the onion plants.

Keep the soil moist, especially once bulbing (swelling at the base of the plant) begins.

Mulching around plants with 2 to 3 inches of organic matter is highly recommended.

Once plants start to mature, as indicated by a softening of the "neck" just above the bulb, allow the soil to begin drying. When bulbs are mature, the softened necks will cause the plant tops to fall over. At this time, pull up the onions and place them in a dry area to cure.

Several days later, clip the roots and tops, leaving 1 inch of stem attached to the bulbs to prevent entry of decay organisms.

Onions are usually ready for harvesting between May and late July.

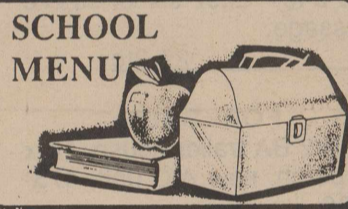
Duesterhaus joins the services

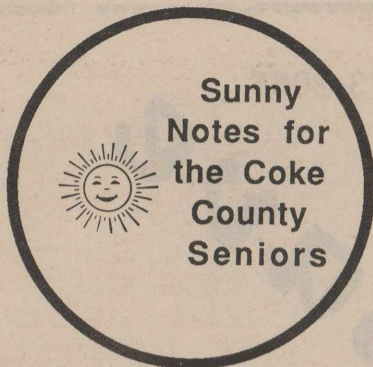

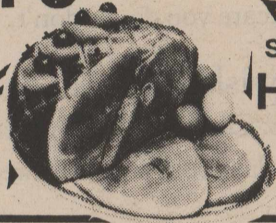

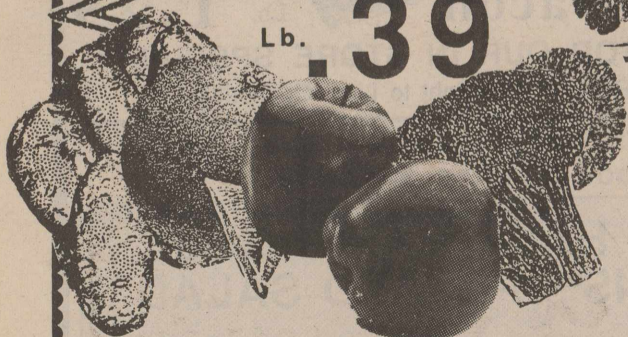
