Permian Bass Club

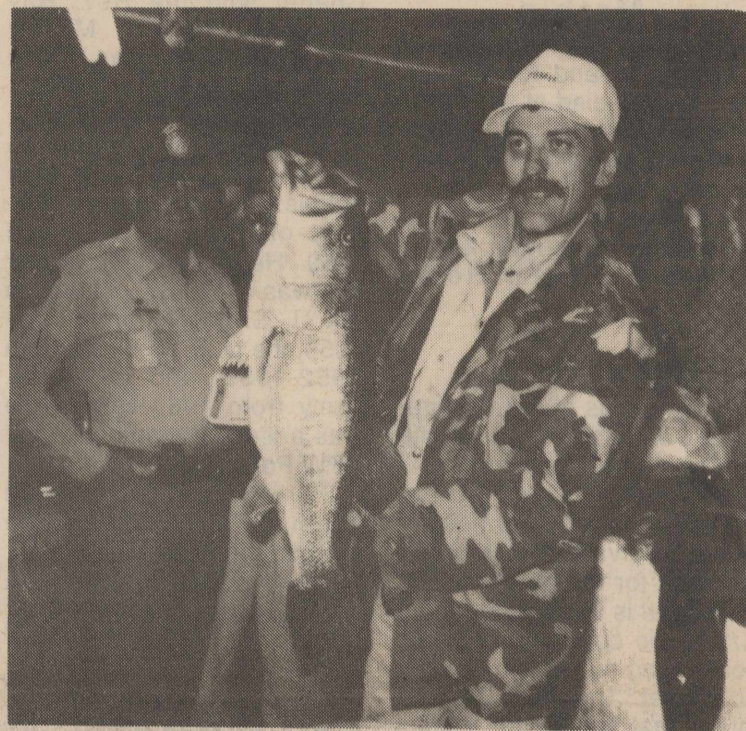
The Permian Bass Club expected good fishing on Saturday at Spence for their tournament. What they didn't expect was that one of their members would set a new lake record.

David Miller of Gardendale, fishing with his father, Gene Miller, was barely away from the Paint Creek Marina headquarters when he began plugging in the mouth of Salt Creek. He snagged the big bass at 8 am. As his dad reached down to grab the huge bass, David realizing what he had, yelled, "No Dad! Use the net". The rest is history. The big'un weighed 14 lbs 2 oz, was 28 1/2 inches long, and 19 3/4 inches in girth, which beat the current black bass record by almost two pounds. The catch was made with a white Nichols Spinner bait.

Spence, a sleeper lake since the water has been low, may see more fishing pressure now. It has been known more for its striped bass population than for black bass, but a number of good blacks were caught Saturday. Three fishermen weighed in bass over 8 lbs. and several in the four and five plus range were brought in.

Permian Bass Club is strictly a catch and release group and strive to not overfish area lakes, said Karla Miller. She said 108 adults, plus 8 youth, fished the Saturday tourney. The Club did not fish Spence last year but put the lake back on their spring schedule for 1994. They will hold another tournament there in June.

Miller garnered about \$300 for his catch which included Big Bass (and how) and the most pounds for 2 fish, 16.27 lbs. total. He opted to donate his big bass to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department's Lunker Program. She will be taken live to the state's tanks for proper care, tests, and study. Miller will receive a replica mount for his wall and a certificate for his donation.

In order to meet the amount of nutritional value, the menus that you are offered at noon include at least 1) a serving of milk but tea is also served; 2) a serving of enriched bread or starch; 3) 2-3 ounces of protein; 4) 2 servings of vegetables and; 5) a serving of fruit or dessert. Our menus offer a variety of foods and include several vegetables and/or fruit and is designed not to exceed 1,000 calories.

The application of the "new" dietary guidelines will mean that the meals will be lower in fat, salt, and include more servings of fruit and vegetables.

The meals are offered on Monday, Wednesday and Friday. Home Delivered Meals are also available for those who qualify. To make reservations call 473-6471. Mary Percifull will be glad to visit in the home with those who think they might qualify for a Home Delivered Meal. Transportation is provided to the Bronte Senior Center for the Meal program. A donation for the meal is recommended.

ASCS announces second Wetlands Reserve Program Signup

The second Wetlands Reserve Program signup will be held February 28 through March 11, 1994, according to Grant Buntrock, Administrator of the U. S. Department of Agriculture's Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS).

"Landowners in Texas will have the opportunity to enroll eligible acreage in the WRP," Buntrock said.

The Wetlands Reserve Program, funded at \$66,675 million to enroll up to 75,000 acres during Fiscal Year 1994, protects and restores habitat for migratory birds and other wildlife, helps purify water supplies, and helps absorb flood waters.

Last funded in FY 1992 with a limitation of 50,000 acres, landowners on 2,337 farms sought enrollment for over 462,000 acres. Acreage was tentatively accepted for 49,888 acres on 265 farms. This acreage will be restored to 30,868 acres to forested wetlands, 14,105 acres to emergent wetlands, 3,374 acres to scrub-shrub and other types of wetlands and 1,542 acres of riparian area or upland buffers.

About 7,509 acres will directly benefit the recovery of threatened or endangered species. Another 30,085 acres may be utilized by threatened or endangered species or lie within ongoing State or Federal wetland restoration and wildlife project areas.

Under the program, permanent easements are purchased from participating landowners of farmed wetlands; prior converted wetlands; and riparian areas that link wetlands. Participants agree to accept no more than the fair market value of their land for agricultural use in return for a lump sum payment and cost-share assistance for implementing wetland restoration practices.

ASCS Announces 1994 Farm Signup

Signup for the 1994 Farm Crop Program has begun. Producers began signing up on Monday, March 1 and will continue until April 29. For 1994, producers will be paid on 85% of their crop acreage bases. Set-aside requirements are as follows: wheat, oats, barley, and grain sorghum all have a 0%, (zero) required. Those wishing to plant cotton will have a 11% required set-aside. This is good for Coke-Sterling because most all our producers plant the small grains, and with no set-aside requirements, everyone can take advantage of the program.

Both Coke and Sterling counties have a March 15 date to get all stock off your small grains if you participate in the program.

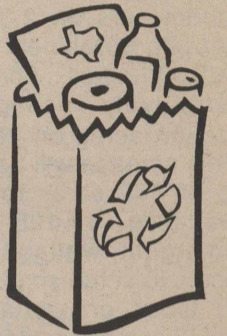

Watering Lawns and Gardens

Watering is one of the basic elements of lawn and garden maintenance, and often one of the costliest. Thus, good water management is essential.

Soil type, grass or vegetable species and water quality influence the amount of supplemental water and the watering frequency required for lawns and gardens.

Management also influences the amount of water needed to maintain a healthy green lawn. Frequent fertilization and close mowing tend to increase the amount of watering required.

Applications of soluble nitrogen fertilizer in late spring and summer significantly increase water use.

A good early spring fertility program will meet most grass

The "Social" Part of Social Security

Many people mistakenly try to compare Social Security to private pensions or investment plans. Although there are similarities, the differences are more important... and more revealing about the true nature of Social Security.

The key difference is summed up in the word "social". It was paired with the word "security" for a reason: social objectives are a key element of the Social Security program. Such objectives are generally not a part of any kind of private investment system.

One of the primary social objectives of Social Security is to raise the standard of living for lower income workers. Social Security planners accomplished this through a benefit computation formula that is weighted in favor of workers with low wages who have less opportunity to save for their retirement during their working years. For example, low-paid workers could conceivably get a Social Security benefit that replaces up to 90% of their pre-retirement earnings. Highly paid workers receive rates of return that are considerably less. The average is about 42%.

Another of Social Security's social objectives is to provide greater financial protection to families than is generally available through private pensions and investment plans. A wide range of Social Security benefits are available to a worker's spouse, widow(er), and children if they meet various eligibility requirements.

Also, many people who attempt to compare Social Security to other retirement or pension plans fail to consider that Social Security is more than a retirement program. The extensive disability and survivors benefits available from Social Security are not generally available through private retirement systems.

Please keep these points in mind the next time you try to assess the value of Social Security in terms of other pension or retirement plans.

requirements for nutrients without increasing water needs.

During hot dry conditions raise mowing heights to reduce water needs. Raising mower up to 2-3 inches maintains a deeper root system than 1 inch. Mow St. Augustine, bluegrass, and tall fescue at 3 inches during dry weather.

With the salty water we have here, it is best to thoroughly wet the soil to a depth of 4-6 inches and wait until the top 1-2 inches of soil dry before watering again. Light, frequent waterings will result in a salt buildup near the soil surface that could damage grass and gardens.

Watering should be done early in the morning so there is less evaporation which would increase salt content. For gardens it is best to flood irrigate down the row rather than sprinkle which leaves salt residue on the plants. Never water at night or late evening as this could result in increased disease and fungal problems. For more information on water conservation contact the County Extension Office at 453-2461.

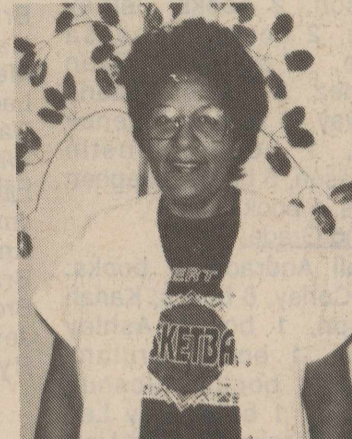

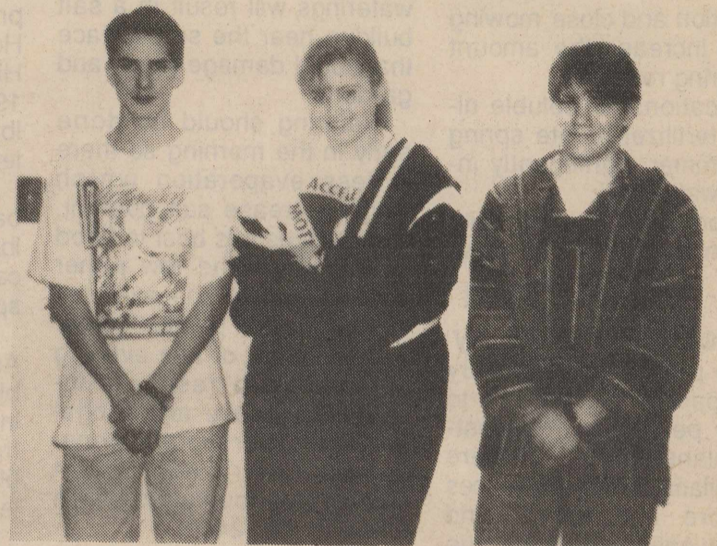

When a student becomes 18 years of age, there are certain rights and responsibilities that students are not aware of and sometimes we as adults forget to let them know.

When a student turns 18 years of age in the state of Texas, they become an adult. This means the 18 year old has the right to vote, make contracts in their own name, and become completely independent. This also means the 18 year old is held personally accountable for their own actions. As an 18 year old in the state of Texas, a person is given all the rights of an "adult" except in the laws pertaining to alcoholic beverages. These are some of the rights a student has after reaching 18 that were not present before: 1) to vote, 2) to make a will, 3) to sue in your own name, 4) to make a contract in your own name, 5) to obtain medical treatment

without parental consent, 6) to marry without parental consent, 7) to be completely independent.

Some responsibilities the 18 year old has are: 1) in Texas after age 17, any criminal charges filed against them will be tried in adult criminal court rather than juvenile court, 2) their parents are no longer required to support them, and the parents are not liable for any accidents the student may cause, 3) the student is eligible for jury duty, and 4) all males are required to register for Military Service.

SAD

Do the shorter hours of daylight in winter affect your mood? It is not unusual to feel depressed and to have non-specific physical complaints, such as lethargy or fatigue, during the winter months. This cluster of symptoms are especially common in northern climates. What I am describing may be Seasonal Affective Disorder, or SAD. Women tend to be more affected by it than men.

Dr. Norman Rosenthal, of the National Institutes of Mental Health, says once diagnosed by your doctor, SAD usually responds to treatment. He says spending time in front of a bank of fluorescent lights for a specific period of time each day seems to help most people with SAD feel more energetic and cheerful within a short time.

The report, in the *Journal of the American Medical Association* (12-7), says researchers are looking at what makes bright light ease symptoms of SAD. Other treatments, such as medications, exercise, and stress management may also be useful.
