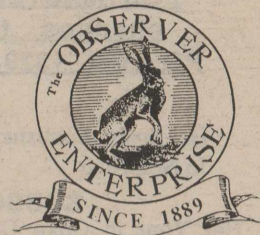

City council adopts curfew ordinance

The Robert Lee City Council met on Monday evening, March 14, and in that session adopted a curfew ordinance for the city. The curfew will become effective April 1, 1994. Highlights of the ordi-

nance state that minors, or those under 17 years old, are in violation if they are in a public place or on the premises of any establishment between 12:01 am and 6:00 am. A parent or guardian commits

an offense if he or she permits a minor to remain out during prohibited hours. An operator of an establishment is in violation if he permits a minor on premises after hours. A number of exceptions to the rules are listed including school related functions and in company of parents or adults. The curfew ordinance will be reviewed in 18 months. A copy of the entire curfew is available at the Robert Lee city hall.

Robert Lee joins a number of surrounding cities who already have curfews in place, including Ballinger and Sterling City. The curfew was adopted after a great deal of study and after holding two public hearings to gain input from residents. A large number of interested citizens attended the first meeting on Feb. 10 and several expressed their opinions, including Sheriff Poke Brown of Sterling City, Sheriff Marshall Millican, and Deputy Jeff Barnes. County Attorney Chris Wyatt and Mayor Jackie Walker spoke to the group on the legality of the ordinance.

A follow-up public meeting was conducted at the Robert Lee city hall on the evening of March 8 when only a handful of residents were in attendance.

Odessa man killed in boating accident

A boating accident on Lake E. V. Spence Sunday afternoon took the life of a 61 year old Odessa man. Thomas Gerald Furstenberg apparently was killed by the prop of his boat motor after being dumped into the water.

The incident occurred in the upper end of the lake, just above the pump station, between Cedar Cove and Pecan Creek. The victim, along with his 40 year old son, Ronald Furstenberg of Odessa, were thrown into the cold water after the boat made a sharp left turn. Neither man had on a life jacket. The victim was hit by the prop, winding his clothing around it, which may have killed the motor. He suffered fatal wounds to the back of the head and one arm. The younger man, clinging to an ice chest, was rescued some

Burglary charges filed

The Coke County Sheriff's department has been kept busy with several criminal investigations, a number of vehicle accidents, as well as miscellaneous complaints.

According to Sheriff Marshall Millican, four 18 year old men, two from Hutto and two from Taylor, were arrested last Friday night and charged with two counts each of felony criminal mischief and felony burglary of a vehicle. The four, on Spring Break, drove upon a disabled vehicle belonging to a San Angelo resident. The incident occurred about 4 1/2 miles southwest of Robert Lee near the intersection of Hwy 158 and FM 2034. Millican's report included descriptions of damage to

the vehicle by a .44 pistol and a small caliber weapon. Extensive damage resulted from bullet holes and bashing with a heavy item taken from the car.

The stolen articles were recovered from the defendants' vehicle when they were apprehended about 9 miles west of Robert Lee.

The incident occurred about 10:30 pm Friday evening. They were magisterated about 5:30 am on Saturday at the Coke County courthouse by Joan Davis, Justice of the Peace, Pct. 1. The four were taken to Tom Green County Jail.

Local Elections

Voters in Bronte are reminded that the last day to file for Bronte School Board of Trustees, City of Bronte and East Coke County Hospital District for the election to be held on May 7, is through March 23, 1994.

The terms of Richard Hembree, Andra Arrott, and Martin DeLaGarza will expire for the Bronte School Board of Trustees. Applications for a place on the ballot will be taken at the school superintendents office from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. Monday through Friday.

For the City of Bronte terms of Mayor Martin Lee, Aldermen Bill Thomas and Paul McGuire will expire. Another city alderman slot needs to be filled due to a resignation.

Candidates may file at Bronte City Hall from 8 a.m. to 12 noon and 1 p.m. to 5 p.m. Monday through Friday until May 23.

Three places are up for East Coke County Hospital District Board to serve for two years. They are currently held by LeDrew Arrott, Eddie Alexander, and Pat Oglesby. Persons wishing to file may come by or contact Pam Shaffer at Bronte Nursing Home on Monday through Friday from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. in the business office.

Local Elections

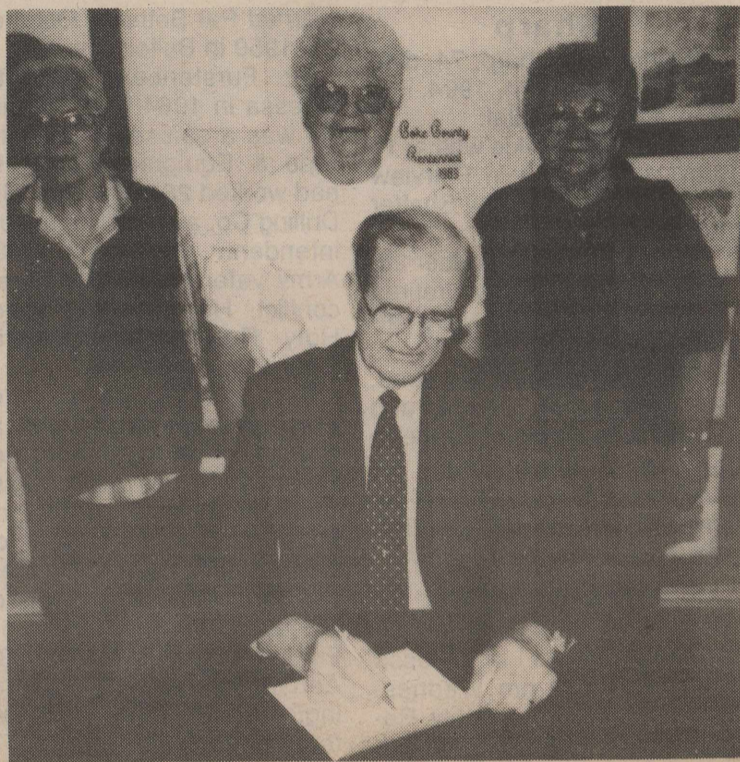
Candidate filing continues through Wednesday, March 23, for three local elections to be held May 7.

Robert Lee ISD board of trustees has three members, Butch Davis, Beverly Burdett, and Jim Clendennen, whose terms expire. Candidates may contact the Superintendent's office between 8 am and 4:00 pm Monday - Friday.

Three vacancies will occur on the West Coke County Hospital District board of directors. These include Steve Whiteker, Linda Arledge, and Winton Milliff. A petition to place a candidate's name on the ballot may be picked up at the hospital district administrator's office at the nursing home.

Applications for a place on the Robert Lee city governing panel may be picked up during business hours at city hall. The terms of Mayor Jackie Walker and councilmen Jim Dunklin and Speedy Brasuell will expire. One council member will also be named to fill an unexpired term created when a member resigned.

The early voting period for the three elections will begin in April.

The body of Mr. Furstenberg was brought by boat to Paint Creek Marina where the death was certified by Peace Justice Jack Moore of Bronte who ordered an autopsy.

Bronte's EMS unit also responded to the accident. On the scene, were Sheriff Marshall Millican, Constable Kenneth Rasco, Deputy Wayne McCutchen, Deputy Rick Styles, CRMWD Superintendent Royce Hood, and Joe Longoria, an employee of CRMWD. The body was recovered by Parks & Wildlife personnel Kenneth Eaves and Gary Mitchell.

Letter to the Editor

Dear Editor,
 In 1969 the State Legislature created the East Coke County Hospital District in order for a nursing home to be built on the east side of the county and the ability to collect taxes to support that nursing home. Even with the collection of taxes and State Medicaid money the nursing home stayed in the red until 1986. It has operated in the black since then and with the extra tax money going back into the facility. But in this past year with the increase in staff turn-over, labor costs skyrocketing, medical supplies, insurance and improvements in order to meet state and federal regulations the nursing home will fall short of revenues in order to stay in the black.

Most people, in the county, do not think about the nursing home until they are in need of the services they provide. More than any other business, the nursing home industry in the State of Texas is the most regulated. The State and Federal Regulations demand that adequate care is given. The nursing homes in Coke County exceed those standards. We can no longer give above average care without additional funds.

Future plans for the Bronte Nursing Home will need the support of all the taxpayers in east Coke County. With additional revenue the construction of 10 more rooms or 20-beds can be built, to bring our bed capacity to 60 beds. Statistics show that a 60-bed facility is the break even point.

Income is as follows: 65% Medicaid, 20% Private Pay and 15% Taxes. The cost of adding 20-beds would be around \$500,000 dollars.

An additional 20 patients at an average of \$61 per day will be approximately \$450,000 a year.

In the past ten years the hospital district taxes have actually gone down. In 1989 the tax rate was .265 per \$100.00 valuation, in the 1993 the tax rate is .223 per \$100.00 valuation. The tax rate will have to go up enough to cover monthly expenses and to help pay off the cost of the addition. After the beds are built and patients are admitted, which will probably take eight months to a year and we can get additional revenue, the tax rate can slowly be dropped the following years.

As of this time we do not know what tax rate would be necessary to complete the

project and for how long.

This attempt at getting a prison shows we are ready to make changes to improve our lives but how many people visit Huntsville, Texas?

Why not a state park on Lake Spence, a retirement center, or advertise for an innovative company to move here. And why not support the businesses we do have? Maybe small business loans to hometown people to fill our empty buildings.

We could improve our school systems to the point of setting a new standard for Texas. You can't tell me this wouldn't bring in good families, along with the obvious benefits. Don't sell Coke County short.

I may not have much of a say in these matters, and that may be falling on deaf ears, but this is not our answer.

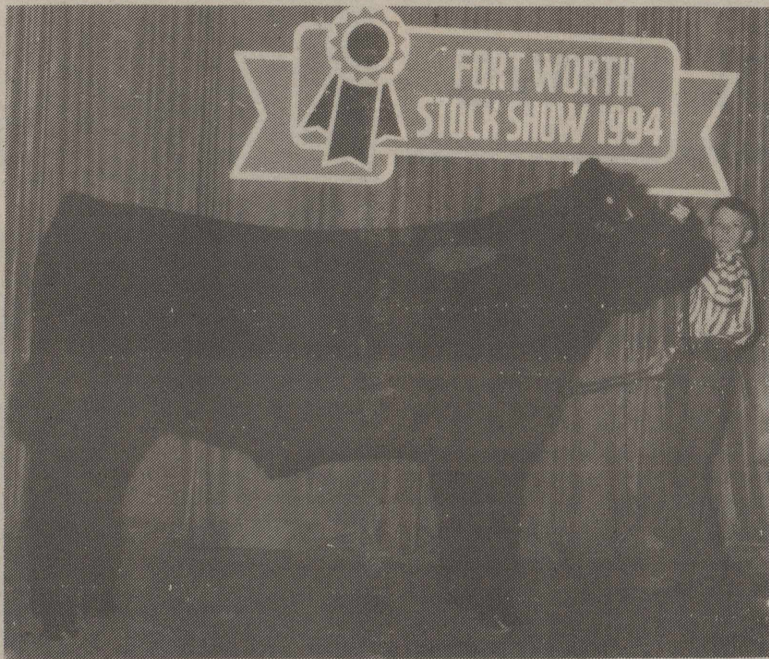
4-H'ers Place at Major Shows

Correctional facility update

{The following is a copy of a letter from James Jonas, an attorney hired by Coke County to look into the possible location of a correctional facility, to Ed Wendler with Wackenhut Corp.}

To: Ed Wendler, Sr.

From: James Jonas

Re: Coke County Project

Since our meeting on Monday, Coke County Judge Royce Lee and I have had a telephone conference on how to move this project forward. Judge Lee is in the process of establishing regional support for a Coke County Youth Facility through his network of area elected officials and leaders. He is also continually identifying and obtaining commitment for strategic resources (e.g. medical support). The county leadership has a strong desire to establish a time line that is realistic but also keeps things progressing.

In trying to gather the necessary information, the following questions are raised:

1. What is the next step in this project for Wackenhut?
2. What steps should be taken prior to obtaining a site?
3. Is there any general information on the successful Wackenhut Corrections operations?
4. Is it possible for Wackenhut to design, construct, finance, and operate the envisioned youth facility? If requested by Coke County, would Wackenhut fulfill all of these responsibilities?
5. Where could interested citizens go to see a facility?
6. At what stage of this effort will there need to be a formalized relationship between Wackenhut and Coke County?
7. Does Wackenhut have staff that could assist in site selection?
8. Is there any information that Coke County needs to supply to Wackenhut?
9. What is the projected time between now and when a facility could be opened?

Hopefully, these questions can be easily answered by yourself or another member of the Wackenhut team.

A response by phone to me (512-322-5500) or by fax to the County Judge Royce Lee (915-453-2157) and me (512-469-5505) in the next few days would be a great help.

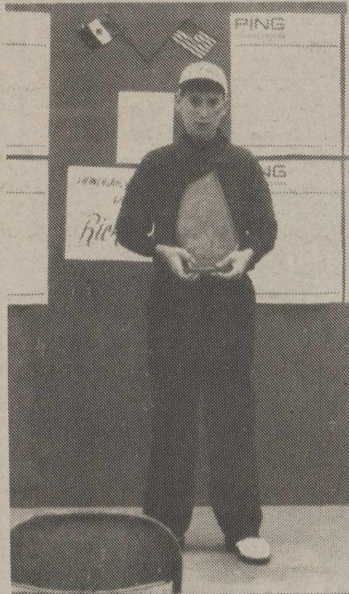

Devoll wins at golf

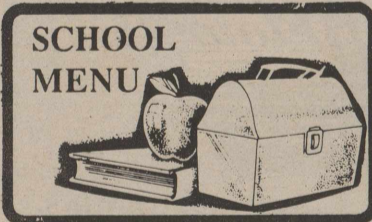
Casey Devoll, a junior at H.M. King High School in Kingsville, fought the cold and windy conditions and a field of over 140 golfers in Laredo on February 25 and 26, turning in a two day total of 140 to capture first place in the Border Olympics Golf Tournament.

Devoll shot a 71 for the first round followed by a two under par 69 to win the individual honor. Enroute to his 69, he had two birdies, 6 pars, and a bogey for a 34 on the front nine. On the back nine, he birdied the 11th hole to go with 8 pars for a 35. His total score was one shot shy of the two-round tournament record of 139.

The boyish faced junior, who is the top man on Coach Earl Simpson's squad, summed up his impressive second round performance in three categories: "Driving, chipping, and putting."

"His is by far the best short-game golfer I've had in the 19 years I have taught," Simpson said.

Devoll's win in Laredo was preceded by a second place finish in the Alice tournament and he placed second in the

Lipan wins state!

They moved to Bronte in the 1950's when he was transferred by Atlantic-Richfield Oil Company to Bronte. He retired in 1961.

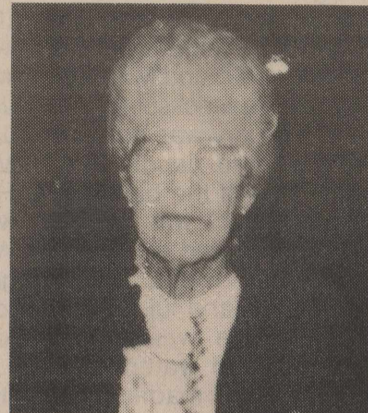
Shortly after moving to Bronte, they opened a Radio and TV Repair Shop and Card Shop that they operated until 1992.

SHANNON HEALTH NOTES

Air Pollution Risks

Some medical studies linking air pollution with death rates have been criticized for not taking into consideration cigarette smoking and other health risks. Dr. Douglas Dockery, of Harvard School of Public Health, and his colleagues reviewed death records of more than eight thousand adults in six cities in the United States. They found that death rates were most strongly associated with cigarette smoking, but after that they found significant links between air pollution and death rates.

The death rate in the most polluted of the cities was twenty-six percent higher than that of the least polluted cities. The study, published in the *New England Journal of Medicine* (12-9), found the increased deaths linked to air pollution were more likely to be from cardiopulmonary disease and lung cancer, than from other causes. 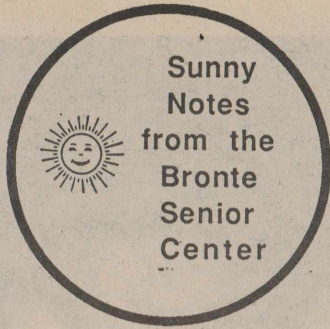

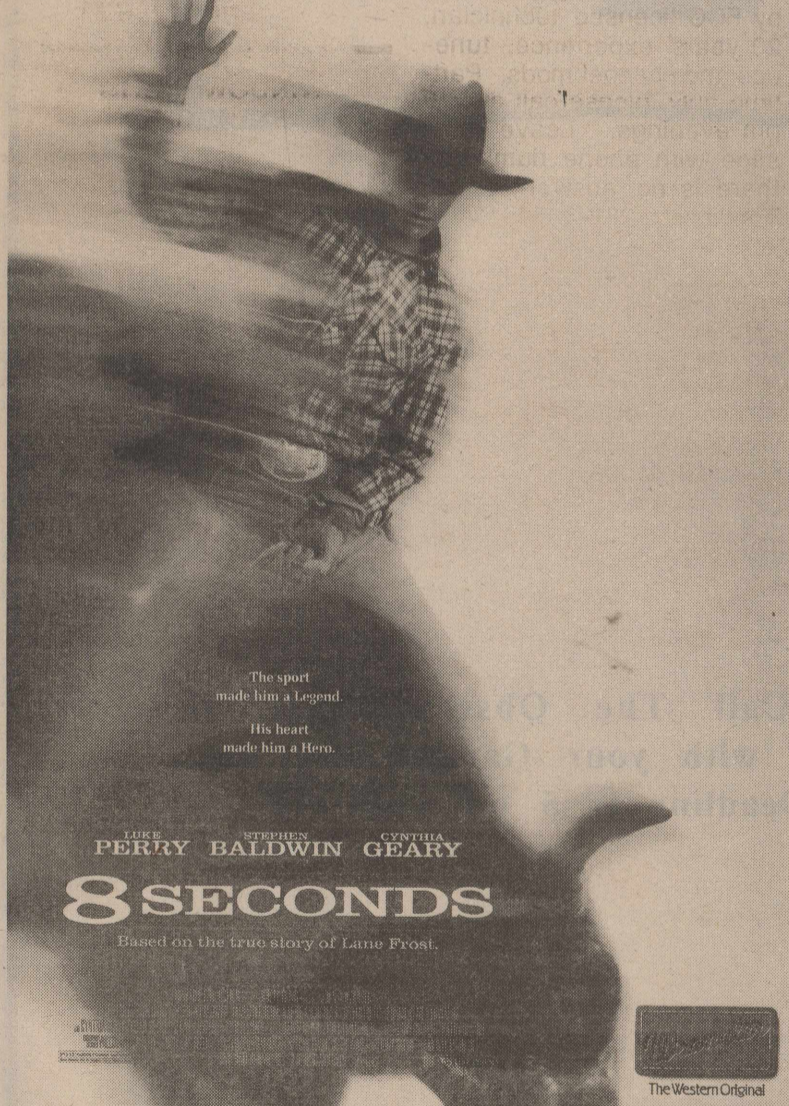

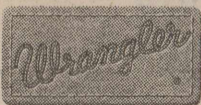
