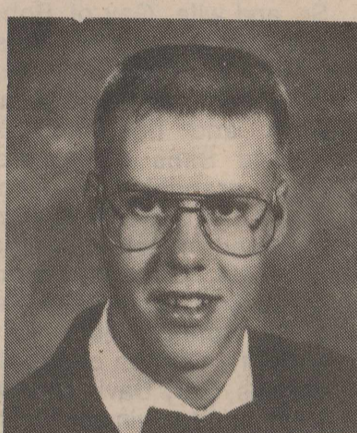
## Coach, players named to All-West Texas Team

The honors just keep rolling in for Robert Lee athletes and coaches. At the end of the football season Coach Ed Poehls was named Coach of the Year on the Standard Time 1993 All West Texas Class 1A football team. Players Dean Burns and Scot Millican were also honored by the Standard Times.

Now, it's time for the basketball team to reap the rewards of a fantastic season.

Coach Kurt White was recently named Co-Coach of the Year on the Standard Times 1994 All-West Texas Basketball Team. He shared the award with Midland High coach Jack Stephenson. The honor was richly deserved, as Coach White took the RLHS team farther than any other team in Robert Lee school history. The Steers advanced to the finals match-up in the regional tourney where they lost a heart-breaker in the final seconds to Lipan (who, incidently, went on to win state). Coach White has been with the Steers for two seasons, both have been extremely successful by anyone's standards. He led the team to a 24-5 record this season and last season had a 21-6 record that ended with a double overtime loss to Eula in the bi-district contest.

Senior Joe Blair was also placed on the Standard Times team. The 6' 2" forward averaged 12.3 points, 6.8 rebounds, and 3 steals per game. Blair was the team leader for the Steers and was solid in every aspect of the

game. His maturity was a stabilizing factor for a team that was made up of two seniors, two sophomores and a junior. He was also named to the All-District 22-1A team. Joe is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Roy Blair.

Honors also went to Lee McCown, a junior at RLHS. Like Blair, McCown was a strong player for the team. His stats for the season averaged out to 14.1 points, 8.3 rebounds, and 2.3 steals per game. He showed an amazing amount of stamina during the regional tournament, averaging 22 points and 15 rebounds in 3 games. During the 82-60 win over Brock in the semi-finals game, McCown scored 20 points and snared an unbelievable 24 rebounds. Just to prove that his abilities were no fluke, he scored another 26 points in the finals against Lipan. McCown was also placed on the All-District 22-1A team. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Sid McCown.

Let anyone think these awards are light-weight, keep in mind that these folks were chosen from a field of players and coaches from schools as large as 5A, such as San Angelo, Odessa, and Midland.

Meek supplies blood to nine area hospitals including Hendrick Medical Center, the Dialysis Center, Abilene Regional Medical Center, Anson General, DeLeon Hospital, Rolling Plains Hospital in Sweetwater, Dyess Air Force Base Hospital, Abilene State School and Shackelford Hospital in Albany.

At the present time there is a need for 70 donors a day to keep pace with the demand.

**Hare preaches at SS COC**

Robert Lee "Bob" Hare, who has worked for 44 years in East European missions, preached on evangelism at the Southside Church of Christ of Robert Lee on Sunday morning, March 20. He spoke of the many years in which he and others smuggled Bibles into Communist nations, and of the many years in which Christians prayed that the Gospel of Christ might be freely

preached there. Reminding the congregation of God's use of Persia's King Cyrus to return Israel from exile (Ezra 1:1-4), Hare suggested that God similarly used a world leader three or four years ago to accomplish his purposes in the reforms initiated by the Soviet Union's Gorbachev. Thus, in his opinion, the fall of the Iron Curtain and the religious freedom which has accompanied it, is one of the most important and exciting times in all the history of Christianity.

Hare stressed the importance of evangelism on the part of all Christians, because all who have heard and respond to the Gospel have "good news" to share - all Christians are missionaries. And citing Matthew 9:37-38, he stressed that all should "pray that the Lord of harvest send out reapers."

Though now 74 years old, and in declining health due to two heart attacks since 1990, Hare continues to travel from his home in Breckenridge, Texas, each year to preach and to distribute Bibles, and currently plans to travel to Czechoslovakia, Hungary, and Croatia for evangelistic meetings in May and June. He says that distributing Bibles to people in that part of the world who are so eager to receive them is a joyful experience that can also turn out to be painful. A couple of years ago he had the task of looking up a woman in a small town in Czechoslovakia who had requested a Bible. He finally found her, gave her a Bible, and the short, two hundred pound lady expressed her joy by hugging him. In fact she hugged him so enthusiastically that he heard one of his ribs pop. And that rib is still sore.

When he visited Robert Lee for the first time in 1988, Bob Hare was intrigued to find out about "Coke County Rabbit Twisters", being that his full name is Robert Lee Hare. He says that he always feels at home here.

**ASCS 1994 Farm Crop Program**

Sign up started March 1 and will run through April 29 for the ASCS 1994 Farm Crop Program. For 1994, producers will be paid on 85% of their crop acreage base. There are NO set-aside requirements, ACR, on wheat, barley, oats or grain sorghum. If you have small grains planted but need to graze the acres and not take your livestock off, make an appointment to come by, you can still participate in the program. Remember that the take off date was March 15. If you intend to participate in the grain sorghum program it MUST be planted in rows. The intent at planting must be for mechanical harvest, NOT grazing.

There are no projected payments on oats, at this time, but since there are no ACR requirements and you can still graze, it might pay you in the long run to sign up.



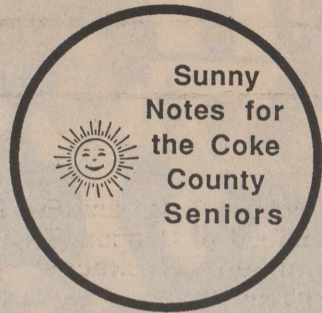

### Top ten things you should know about Social Security

With apologies to Dave Letterman, here are the top ten things you should know about Social Security:

**Number 10:** Your Social Security benefit is based on your earnings, so make sure your employer is using your correct name and Social Security number when reporting your earnings to the government.

**Number 9:** Social Security is more than retirement. Disability coverage for people who can't work for a year or more and survivors benefits for the family members of a worker who has died are important and often overlooked parts of Social Security.

**Number 8:** When you work, you earn Social Security "credits", up to a maximum of four per year. Most people need 40 credits (10 years of work) to qualify for retirement benefits. Younger people need fewer credits for disability and survivors coverage.

**Number 7:** Social Security provides benefits to qualified family members of retired and disabled workers. Generally, children under 18 can get checks and so can a spouse who is 62 or older or who's caring for a minor child. In many cases, divorced spouses also get benefits.

**Number 6:** You can get an estimate of your Social Security benefits and a copy of your earnings history by calling 1-800-772-1213.

**Number 5:** Check with Social Security about a year before you plan to retire. In some cases, you can get retirement benefits even before you stop working.

**Number 4:** When you file for

retirement benefits, we need to see a certified copy of your birth certificate and your last W-2 form (or tax return if you're self-employed).

**Number 3:** Social Security should not be directly compared to private savings and pension programs because "social" objectives are a fundamental part of Social Security. For example, workers with low incomes get a benefit that represents a higher percentage of their earnings than do well-paid workers.

**Number 2:** You should not expect to live on your Social Security. The program was always intended to supplement, not replace, private pensions plans and other savings and investments.

**Number 1:** Social Security will be there when you need it. Social Security has changed a lot in the last 60 years, and it undoubtedly will change in the next 60 years...but a basic program that provides benefits to retired people, to people with disabilities, and to the survivors of a worker who has died will always be the foundation of our society's income maintenance network.

### Passive smoke

Pregnant women may be getting the message about the dangers of smoking, but the majority return to the habit following pregnancy.

"It then becomes a risk for the newborn child," says Dr. Marianna Sockrider, a pediatric pulmonologist at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston. "The mothers think they have 'saved' their baby from exposure to tobacco smoke, but when they light up the danger begins again."

Sockrider says that one hurdle for pregnant women who quit smoking is the change in attitudes of those around them once the baby is born.

"During pregnancy, people are sensitive about smoking," she said. "They don't smoke around the pregnant woman, or offer her cigarettes. But once the baby is born, the pressure to smoke resumes."

Sockrider, who treats children with asthma and other respiratory disorders, often counsels parents about the dangers of passive smoking. Passive smoke is more poisonous than smoke inhaled directly from cigarettes and contains more than 2,000 toxins, some of which are known cancer-causing chemicals.

Second-hand smoke can burn the eyes, nose and throat, an irritation that can be more severe in babies due to their small features. It can also lead to ear infections, respiratory infections such as bronchiolitis and pneumonia, and can affect lung function. In addition, some studies have questioned possible ties to increases in crib deaths and impaired intelligence and child development.

Even though they may wish to stop smoking for good, new mothers are not always prepared for the temptations from well-intentioned smoker friends or loved ones.

"By planning ahead, they can examine why they smoke and look at different coping mechanisms for after the pregnancy," Sockrider said. "They can talk with their spouse or other smokers in the house to help create a smoke-free environment."

Sockrider suggests parents who want to lessen the health risks from second-hand smoke either quit smoking or do the following:

\*Designate a smoking area outside or in a well-ventilated room.

\*Cut back. There is a direct link between increased health risks and the number of cigarettes smoked. Also, cutting back the amount you smoke could be the first step toward quitting.

\*Know that you are in control. Tobacco smoke is the leading cause of death in the United States. Disease and death is resulting from its use either directly or passively is 100 percent preventable.

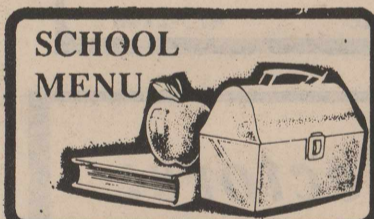

**Put safety behind the wheel in severe weather**

"If you don't like the weather, just wait a minute"... this is a saying which is often heard in Texas, well-known for its capricious meteorological developments.

As spring approaches, these shifting weather patterns intensify, creating severe weather and road conditions which are less than favorable for Texans who must face the elements from behind the wheel.

The Texas Automobile Insurance Service Office (TAISO) and the Texas Division of Emergency Management have suggestions to help Texans cope with severe weather driving by putting safety in the driver's seat.

**Taking Defensive Actions**

Much of Texas will seldom experience snow or ice, but it's a sure bet that all of us will have to put up with rain, wind and fog. Adverse weather affects visibility, traction and vehicle control. With the onset of severe weather, be prepared to take these defensive actions if necessary.

\*Clean or defrost your windshield and windows thoroughly before driving your car.

**Coping with Adverse Road Conditions**

\*Adjust your speed to the road's surface conditions. Posted speed limits are for ideal conditions only.

\*On slippery surfaces, slow down sooner so you can use your brakes sparingly and use less power in starting and accelerating.

\*Pump your brakes on slippery roads to avoid locked-wheel skids. This gives alternate intervals of braking and steering control.

\*If you skid, steer in the direction of the skid.

\*Wet leaves are very slippery, so use caution.

\*Hydroplaning occurs when standing water on the pavement, worn tires and speed combine to cause a loss of steering and reduce traction. A wedge of water can actually build up between the tires and the road and lift the wheels from contact with the pavement.

\*Slow down and be aware of those who don't.

**Controlling Vehicle Conditions**

Chances of avoiding an accident are much better if your vehicle is in tip-top condition.

Proper maintenance affects your ability to control the vehicle and increases your chances of avoiding an accident.

\*Defective turn signals can confuse other drivers about your intentions and cause a collision.

\*Brakes which are worn or improperly adjusted need to be replaced or corrected. You never know when you'll have to stop quickly.

\*Good tire care is essential. Worn tires could cause a blowout and throw your car out of control.

\*Keep headlamps and windshield wipers in top working order to afford yourself and others optimum visibility.

\*A seat belt and shoulder harness must be worn at all times.

So, actually it's not a bad idea to practice these severe weather driving tips before the weather changes again. Rain or shine, these safety tips won't steer you wrong.

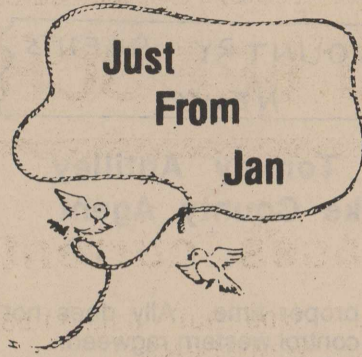

**Interactions and adverse reactions of medications**

Managing medications properly and safely can reduce adverse reactions and help keep health care costs under control. But most are unaware of what causes different medicines to interact.

Interactions and adverse reactions occur when two or more drugs (prescriptions or over the counter):

\*Complement each other and increase the effects of the drugs.

\*Antagonize each other and decrease the effects of the drugs preventing efficiency.

\*Are processed with one drug being preferentially treated by the liver, leaving the other drug to accumulate in the body.

\*Are taken into the body and one drug increases the amount of natural enzymes which causes the other drug to be processed too rapidly.

Some adverse reactions occur simply because of the characteristics of the drug.

Individuals can take personal responsibility for their wellness by following these steps:

\*Store medications in a dry, cool location (generally, not the bathroom cabinet).

\*Mark doses taken on a daily calendar to minimize either "double dosing" or missed dosing.

\*Keep medications in the vial or bottle provided (Do not put all pills, capsules, tablets in one bottle).

\*Do not take medication prescribed for someone else who might have a similar condition.

\*Read the label on prescription and over the counter drugs.

\*Ask the physician and pharmacist about your medications. For wellness and self-responsibility, the patient has an important role to play in understanding medications. Older adults can play an important part in keeping well.

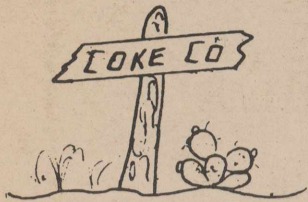

Weeds and range management

The relatively mild winter has resulted in the germination of many broadleaf plants. Annual broomweed seedlings are abundant in many areas of the state. Broadleaf plants may be desirable or undesirable depending on management objectives. Grass production can be reduced significantly if these broadleaf plants develop to a mature stand. To improve grass production, the broadleaf plants are easily controlled with herbicides if the infestation is recognized when the plants are in a seedling stage of growth. Ranchers should be encouraged to survey their rangeland now to determine if a weed infestation is present. Grazon P+D, Weedmaster, 2,4-D, Grazon PC, Banvel or Ally (Escort) provide excellent control of most broadleaf weeds when applied at the

Following are a few "rules of thumb" that are used in the art and science of range management:

\*Weed control will increase grass production one pound for every pound of weeds removed.

\*Weeds can economically be controlled if they exceed a density of 8 plants per square yard.

\*Pastures should be reseeded if desirable plants make up less than 10 percent of the total vegetation.

\*With proper grazing only 25 percent of each year's annual forage production is consumed by livestock.

\*Insects, rabbits, trampling, etc. consume 25 percent of each year's forage production.

\*Proper grazing equates to take half, leave half.

\*Rangeland can be stocked to 1 to 1.5 animal units per section for every inch of annual rainfall received.

With these rules of thumb in mind producers should evaluate their range or pasture each spring and determine if you have a week problem, what and how much forage can you expect and make some sound management decisions for utilization of forage produced. Remember, you are actually selling grass or forage produced rather than pounds of lamb, calves, or wool. No grass, no pounds, pure and simple.

Heartbreak of Depression

Depression is considered mainly a state of mind, but a lot of manifestations of depression are physical. Several studies have shown that heart patients are prone to depression and that people with heart disease who have clinical depression are more likely to have heart attacks than heart patients who are not depressed. Why, has been a mystery.

Associate professor Robert Carney, of Washington University in St. Louis, was able to find a link between depression and episodes of a potentially lethal heart rhythm called ventricular tachycardia. Although the study was small, the relationship was significant - heart patients with depression were six to seven times more likely to have episodes of v-tach than those not suffering from depression. While depression is a common problem in people with heart disease, depression may be easily treated, thus improving the outlook, mentally and physically, for these patients.

WHEREAS, present rates charged for services by the Robert Lee waterworks are insufficient to support the increase in prices and obligation of said waterworks system of said city, keep the same in good repair, and furnish water to the citizens of said city,

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF ROBERT LEE, That,  
Section 1: Effective with the bills for the month of April 1994, the monthly rates for water services shall be as follows:

Inside city limits: Minimum charge (for up to and including 3,000 gallons) \$8.00.

Outside city limits: Minimum charge (for up to and including 3,000 gallons) \$10.50.

All usage over 3,000 gallon minimum shall be at a charge of \$1.45 per thousand gallons.

Charges to the Coke County Rural Water Association shall be the same as to the increase in the city.
