T. L. Atchison was in town Thursday and said he had finished picking his cotton and that he got 19 bales from 60 acres cultivated by himself and his son.

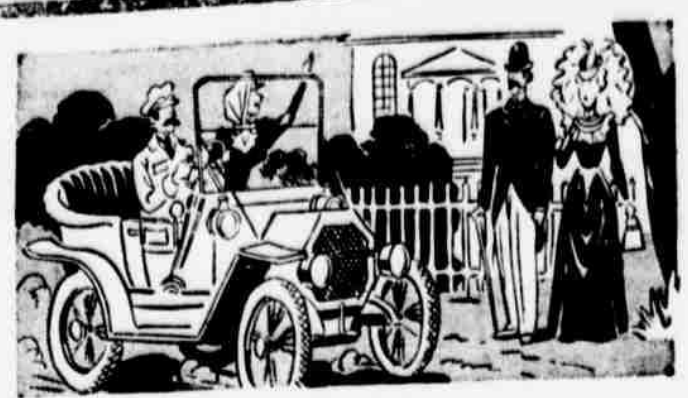
The Earnest & Sanders Gin at this place has ginned 2000 bales

The skeleton of a man was found in the banks of the Brazos River near Red Bluff crossing on the Chas. McGregor farm in northwest Haskell County this week. Officers say there is likely no possible chance for positive identification. Old timers are reported to have stated there were several instances of some missing men in this section more than 30 years ago. One instance related is that a gun was found about 30 years ago in the general vicinity where the skeleton was unearthed this week, but that the man known to have owned the gun was never located. Some theorize it might be the remains of the man whose gun was found, or someone else passing through the country who died and was buried there. The spot where the skeleton was found is near Kiowa Peak a landmark in that section known to early explorers and travelers.

50 Years Ago—Jan. 27, 1906

W. B. Roberts of the northeast side was in town Monday. He says he had in about 45 acres of cotton last year and made 14 bales. He also reports there are many new houses going up in his community.

J. M. Blackmore has finished picking cotton and says he got 17 bales from 43 acres, and that if it had been put in 100 pound bales he would have made 19 bales. He values the crop made by himself and family on 80 acres last year at \$1400.

C. H. Burton of Sagerton was in Haskell the other day and told us that his town was trying to solve their water problem. Surveys have been made which show that the method will probably be construction of a large surface tank that can furnish the town.

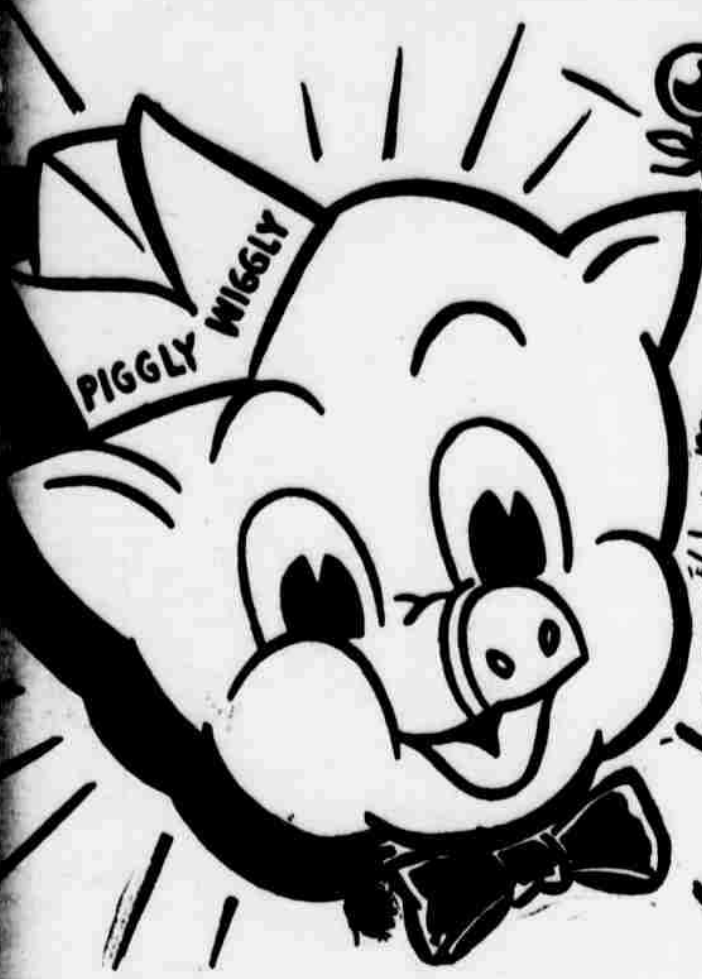

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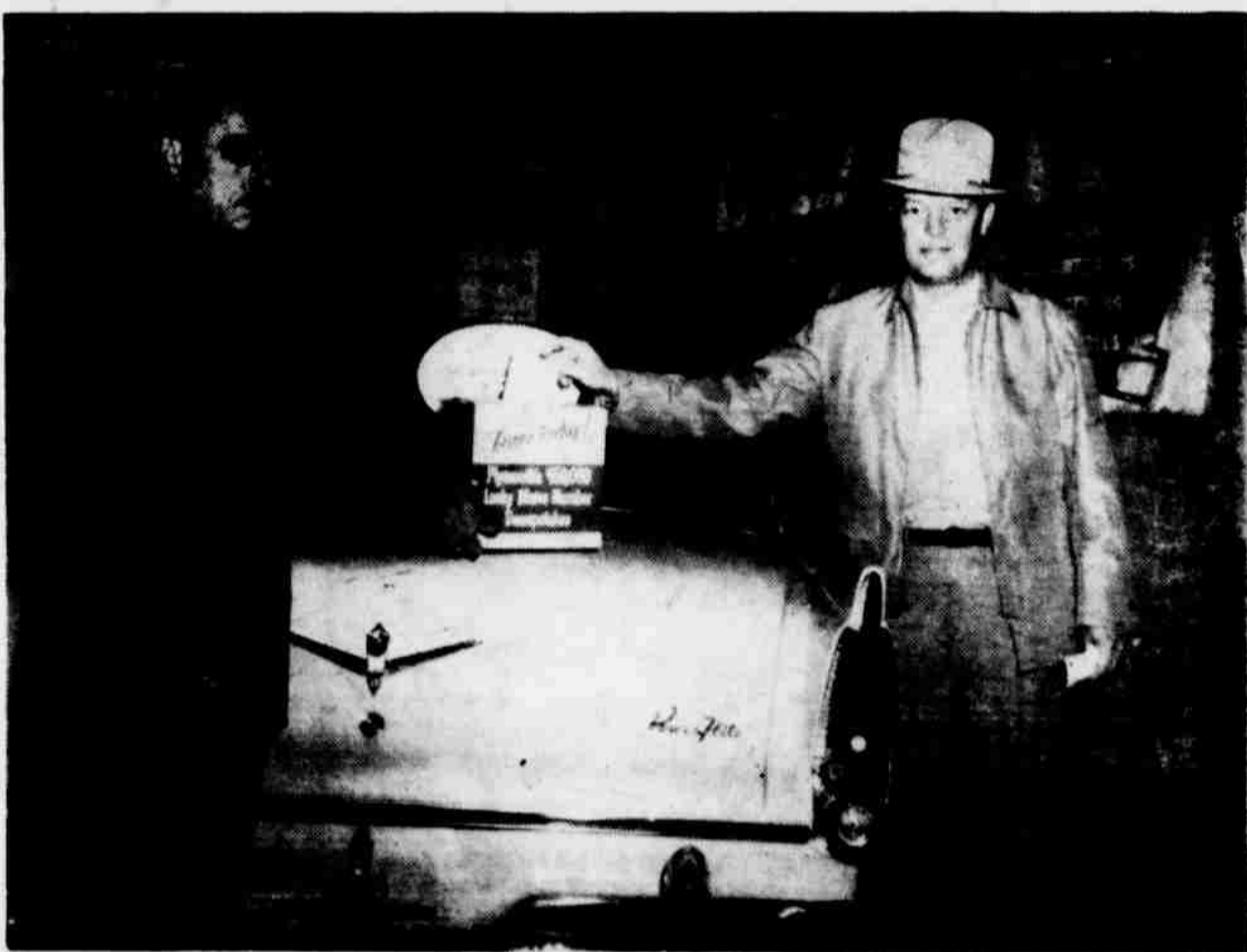

The full grown animal was one of the largest killed here in recent months. It measured 32 inches from head to tip of its tail, and weighed 35 pounds.

Bobcats, at one time almost completely eradicated in this section, have become increasingly numerous in recent years, farmers and sportsmen report.
