Dairy judgers earn trip to national FFA contest

by Elaine Gibbs Four FFA members are going to Kansas City, Missouri! No, they're not deserting their families and friends, and no, they haven't been kicked out of Texas. Christy Hendry, James Tennison, Jaclyn Waldrop, and Casey Antilley have earned a trip to the National Dairy Judging Contest in Kansas City, Missouri, by placing first out of 69 teams to win a State Championship. They started down the road to the national contest by placing first in District and 5th overall at Texas Tech. The State contest was at Texas A & M, where Casey Antilley was the 5th high individual.

Other judging teams that represented Robert Lee FFA throughout the year include the Livestock team, the poultry team, the Meat judging team, and the Horse judging team. These teams attended judging meets at Snyder, Sweetwater, Cross Plains, Tarleton State University, and Texas Tech University. At Texas Tech University, the site of the District and Area Contests, the Livestock team placed third in District and 10th in Area. The Meats team was the District runner-up, while the Poultry team placed 4th. The Horse team finished 3rd in District and 13th in Area.

The National Dairy judging meet will be held in Kansas City, Missouri in November, 1994.

Ten students and Mr. York attended the District Banquet at Sterling City on April 26th. They enjoyed barbecue and all the trimmings while tending to the business of the Concho district. Jeremy Burns' rousing speech secured him a spot as the Concho District Sentinel for the 1994-95 year.

Early Voting

Early voting for local municipal, school, and hospital district governing boards ended Tuesday, May 3, with light turnouts.

The three taxing entities will hold elections on Saturday, May 7, to elect their managing panels. Polls will be open 7 am - 7 pm for balloting.

The city of Robert Lee has two council vacancies for regular terms and will also fill an unexpired term created by a resignation. The current term of Mayor Jackie Walker will also expire. She is the only candidate for that position. John Conley has filed for the unexpired city council term; three candidates - Kenneth Green, Kelly Nichols, and Donnie Devoll - will vie for the two regular slots on the panel. The two council members whose terms do not expire are Jeff Eubanks and Beth Prather.

The city hall will serve as the polling place for the election.

Three vacancies exist on the Robert Lee Independent School District's Board of Trustees. Five candidates have filed to fill those positions on the panel - Beverly Burdett, Kim Hodge, Darrel Pitcock, Larry Hayes, and Dianne Simpson. Remaining on the board are Mary Grim, Bill Burns, Billy Hill, and Mark Riley.

Votes may be cast Saturday in the high school foyer.

Voters in the West Coke County Hospital District election will cast ballots in the county courthouse. Four candidates are on the ballot to fill three positions - Winton Milliff, Linda Arledge, Bill Carwile, and Steve Whiteker. Two board members remain on the panel whose terms do not expire - Mary Bessent and Elaine Lee.


Bronte Elections



Deadline nears

Tom Green, Irion, Sterling, and Coke County farmers interested in election to the Farmers Home Adminstration area committee have until May 19 to get their nominating petitions signed and turned in, FmHA County Supervisor, Paul Cline said today.

One person will be elected for a three-year term to the three-person committee at the June 30 election. Cline said anyone who has an interest in a farm in Tom Green, Irion, Sterling, or Coke County as owner, tenant or sharecropper is eligible to run for the committee seat and to vote in the election. A spouse of an eligible farmer is also considered to be a farmer for those purposes.

Nominating petitions, which must be signed by the nominee and two eligible farmer voters, and other information can be obtained at the FmHA county office at 3514 Devonian Dr. Suite B., San Angelo, TX, Cline said.

FmHA county committees perform a variety of duties, in-

May is Older Americans Month

"This year, during May, Older Americans Month will once again salute the contributions of older persons and signal a commitment to renewed efforts to enhance the quality of life for the Nation's senior citizens," said Franklin H. Upp Social Security manager in San Angelo.

Today, the elderly account for an increasing percentage of the world's population. In the United States, the population aged 65 and older grew at a rate more than twice the rate of the population as a whole during the 1980's and the trend will accelerate as the Baby Boom Generation begins to reach retirement age in the early part of the 21st century.

"One of the most important links that older Americans have to their government is Social Security," says Upp. "Here in the San Angelo district," said Upp, "senior citi-zens receive a total of \$14 million each month in Social Security retirement and survivors benefits. The other services that we provide to older Americans are important as well. For example, we process about 180 new retirement and survivors claims every month, and answer hundreds of questions about Social Security and many general questions about Medicare, help people sign-up for direct deposit, and keep our beneficiary's records up-todate by processing changes of address and other reports."





4-H Light Rifle and Silhouette







Belt use in states with a seat belt law is nearly double than in the states with no law; nearly 63% versus 36%;

Eighty-eight percent of people polled believe belts save lives and reduce injuries; 75 percent favor belt use laws; 70 percent say the risk of receiving a citation would make them buckle up; 65 percent say police should issue more citations;

In 1992, 6.4 million motor vehicles crashes were reported by the police. 3.4 million people were injured or killed in these crashes.

Thirty nine thousand, two hundred, thirty five deaths resulted from these crashes; that is an average of 1,007 deaths a day or one every 13 minutes; a decrease of 6 percent from 1991; and the lowest number since 1962;

Seventy five percent of all crashes occur within 25 miles of home.

Forty percent of fatal crashes occur on roads with posted speed limits of 45 miles per hour or less;

Motor vehicle crashes are the leading cause of death for persons aged 6 to 33;

Motor vehicle crashes cost society more than \$137 billion each year. Personal and other household crimes cost their victims \$19 billion;



Carbon monoxide poisoning may go unrecognized, because the headaches. nausea and dizziness mimic other illnesses.

Burning Charcoal Indoors

SHANNON

A report in the *Journal of the American Medical Association* (1-4) points to another source of carbon monoxide poisoning - people using charcoal briquets for heat or cooking when their power is out.

Packages of charcoal briquets contain warnings against indoor use. but the warnings are printed in English and Dr. Neil Hamson, of Virginia Mason Medical Center in Seattle, says many of the patients were first-generation immigrants who did not understand English. The researchers suggest clarifying the warning on the bag. In addition, during times of loss of electrical power, especially during winter months, the public should be reminded not to burn briquets in an enclosed area

WTU advises check up

It may not be hot enough for your air conditioner yet, but rising temperatures remind you to get a pre-season check-up on your home's air conditioning system.

"Summer has a way of sneaking up on us," said Bob Bein, Residential Program Advisor for West Texas Utilities Company. "A pre-season check-up on a home's cooling system could save a lot of uncomfortable days if the system fails in the middle of a heat wave."

In addition to troubleshooting with a pre-season checkup, the efficiency of the system can be increased throughout the summer with a few simple maintenance procedures.

For central air conditioning systems, Bein said owners should take the following steps to make sure getting through the summer is a breeze.

First, have the system inspected by a licensed contractor or service technician before it's in use for the season. The inspection should include a check of freon levels, as well as making sure both indoor and outdoor fans have the right oil levels.

once a month. Filters can be cleaned either with warm water or by using a vacuum.

"Keeping the window unit filter clean not only helps efficiency, it improves the air quality in the house," Bein said. "You get two-for-one benefits from the job."

Also make sure the top air discharge area and the bottom air intake sections of the window unit are clear of obstructions, and check to be sure the unit is properly sealed to the window frame with caulking.

"These maintenance checks aren't much trouble, and they'll send you into the summer with a better chance of keeping cool," Bein said.


"If your cooling system is past the point of maintenance and needs replacing, your heating and cooling contractor can tell you about new high-efficiency systems, such as an electric heat pump," Bein said.

"Even if you're a die-hard do-it-yourselfer, never try to check or add refrigerant yourself," Bein said. "New federal regulations require units to be serviced so that no refrigerant is released into the air. This is a job for a professional."

It doesn't take a professional, though, to perform two other basic maintenance jobs. For best efficiency, change the filters in the unit every 30-45 days and trim shrubs or high grass and weeds away from the outdoor unit so it has a clear path for air circulation.

Window system units also require maintenance steps to keep them humming. When working on a window unit, always unplug the unit before removing the front cover.

Inspect the unit before the cooling season begins and clean the filter, a procedure that should be done at least This is the type of activity that needs to become a tradition in Robert Lee and Coke County.
