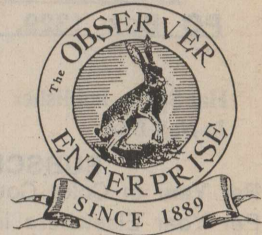

Juvenile facility plans negotiated

Coke County Judge Royce Lee and County Commissioners Tim Millican, James Tidwell, and Paul Burns, were in Austin Wednesday to make final negotiations with the Wackenhut Corporation for the facility for female juvenile offenders to be located in the county.

Steve Robinson, executive director of the Texas Youth Commission in Austin, announced Wednesday, May 25, the selection of the Coke County site over 9 other bids. A press conference was held in the county courtroom on Thursday to confirm and discuss the selection. State Representative Rob Junell, who deserves much of the credit for the selection, was on hand and named a number of other officials, including Sen. Bill Sims and U. S. Rep. Charlie Stenholm, who

worked diligently for Coke County.

Judge Lee also thanked a number of judges, juvenile officers, attorneys, mayors Martin Lee and Jackie Walker, the county commissioners, and citizens who had been beneficial in the effort.

According to Junell, sometimes people are unaware of some who remained in the background in helping with a project such as his own staff, Gov. Ann Richards, Lt. Gov. Bullock, and Speaker Laney.

Texas Youth Commission representatives say they expect the Coke County facility to be a model and forerunner of those which will come later. Education, medical attention, substance abuse treatment, and counseling will be offered in the complex. Emphasis will be on rehabilitation rather than punishment.

In the initial announcement, Robinson emphasized the importance of this program providing services to meet the unique needs of female juvenile offenders as well as holding them accountable for their delinquent acts. He also stated that through this partnership with the private sector, the Texas Youth Commission will be able to expand its capacity in order to retain other offenders for longer periods in a secure placement.

Robinson said staff from the Texas Youth Commission and Wackenhut will enter into contract negotiations immediately with the facility to begin operations for 75-100 youth no later than Oct. 1, 1994.

The facility will originally employ 80 people, Lee said, but he added that this number does not include the construction crew that will be needed to build the complex.

Sanders conducts rabies seminar

Jeff Sanders with the Department of Health in San Angelo presented a one-day seminar on rabies to Tommy Antilley, extension agent, and sheriff's department staff Marshall Millican, Rick Styles, Jeff Barnes, and Wayne McCutchen.

The area, which has been plagued with rabies this year, is becoming more aware of the disease, but people are often not sure of what to do or whom to call. Numerous suspicious animals, especially fox, have been seen, but a good number of confirmed rabies cases have been noted in the county. Two county residents have already taken rabies shots.

Rabid fox have been killed in the Sanco area by Eddie Derrick and neighbors; some from Silver, Tennyson, and Valley View have also been reported.

Foremost of the warning symptoms of rabies is the loss of the fear of humans by wild animals; strange behavior of domestic animals - dogs, cats, or livestock; unsteadiness or appearing lame or injured due to loss of muscle control; skunks' loss of odor; or unusual death of animals. Most common carriers of rabies are fox, skunks, and bats. Birds (other than bats), possums, and squirrels, are not rabies carriers.

Those who deal with livestock are urged to be careful in handling sick animals. Pets should all have their shots.

Millican said according to their information, although the rabies is a deadly disease it is a fragile virus. It cannot live in a temperature lower than body temperature. A dead animal cannot transmit the disease, even if eaten by another.

The Department of Health now recommends keeping a dog in isolation 90 days and giving it a rabies shot and 2 boosters if it had not been vaccinated. If it had had a shot and is in contact with a rabies carrier, they recommend isolation for 45 days and 1 booster shot.

The sheriff's office is the county rabies control office. If you have an animal report or a question you may call 453-2717.

I encourage you to vote FOR passage of the Bond Election on Tuesday, June 7th.

Meeks - Fox Engagement

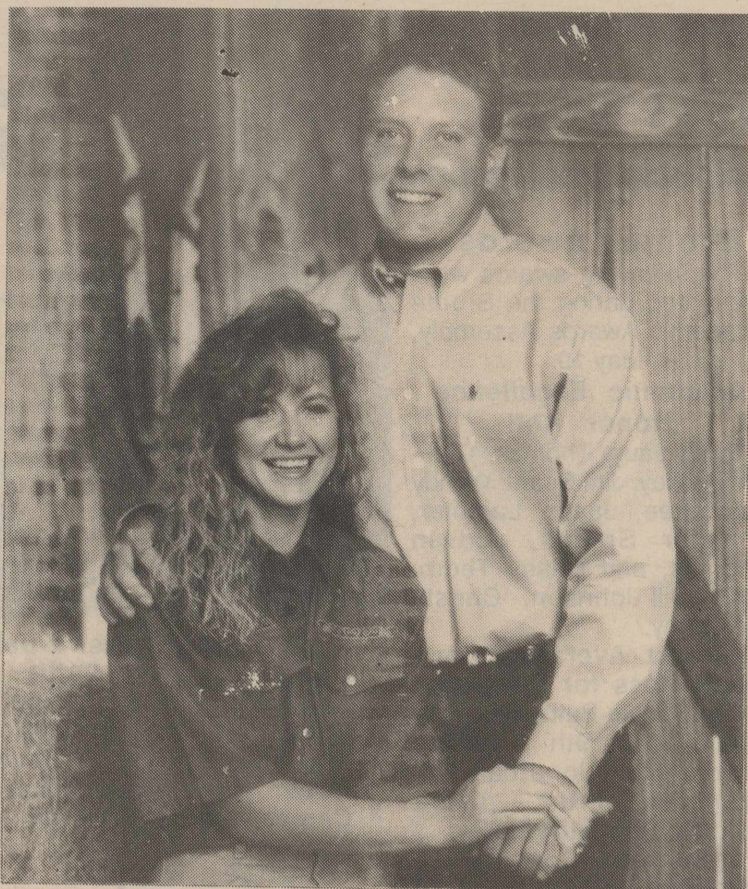
Karen Lee Meeks and Robert Keith Fox will be married July 2, 1994, at Sierra Vista Methodist Church in San Angelo, Texas.

Stenholm introduces budget

Congressman Charles Stenholm recently introduced the Common Cents Budget Reform act of 1994 (CCBRA), bipartisan legislation to reform the budget process and control federal spending.

"Washington's failure to control spending and to wisely manage the taxpayer's money has become a threat to our nation's economic future," said Stenholm. "This legislation will make the budget process more honest, more understandable, and will make an important contribution to a much-needed reform of the federal budget."

The Common Cents Budget Reform Act would make the following four basic reforms: 1.) require that budget proposals compare their budgets to the amount actually spent the prior year (the baseline), rather than against an inflated baseline; 2.) require congress to vote on rescissions proposed by the president, rather than ignoring them as current law allows; 3.) allow Members to designate that savings from cuts be

directed to deficit reduction; and 4.) stop using "emergency" spending bills, such as earthquake assistance for example, to add spending for non-emergency measures.

"The folks in the coffee shops in the 17th District can't make heads or tails out of a federal budget process that talks about baselines and budget cuts, but results in deficit spending," said Stenholm. "It's time for us to take some of the confusion out of the budget process, and we can begin by saying what we mean and meaning what we say."

Stenholm anticipates votes on each of the four provisions of the CCBRA by the Fourth of July district work period.

ent restaurants. Each senior was presented with a cassette player, alarm clock, a nylon travel bag, and a \$10 Chamber Buck.

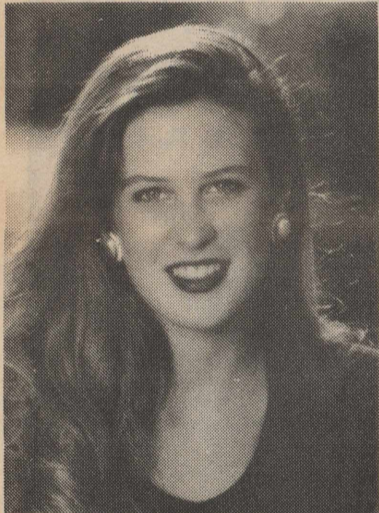

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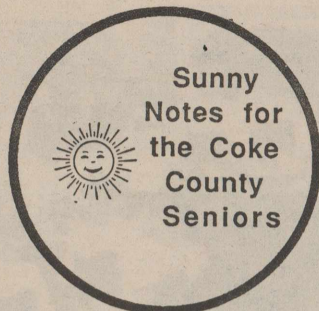

SHANNON HEALTH NOTES

Alcohol Traffic Deaths Down

The good news is that national health objectives for the year 2000 regarding alcohol-related traffic deaths have already been surpassed. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention and the National Highway Safety Administration report that between 1982 and 1992 alcohol-related traffic deaths decreased thirty percent, most of that coming between 1990 and 1992.

Despite the rapid success of the efforts to reduce drunk driving, the federal statistics still suggest that, unless more progress is made, about forty percent of us will be involved in an alcohol-related crash during our lifetime. The federal government has set as one of its goals for the next four years, reducing the proportion of alcohol-related traffic deaths from the current forty-five percent to forty-three percent.

Another goal is to increase seat belt use to seventy-five percent from the current sixty-two percent. If successful, the CDC says these goals could save nearly three thousand more lives each year plus a savings of nearly a billion dollars in health-care costs.

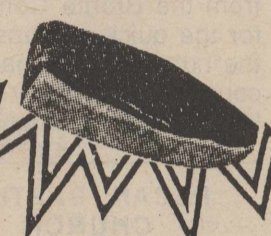

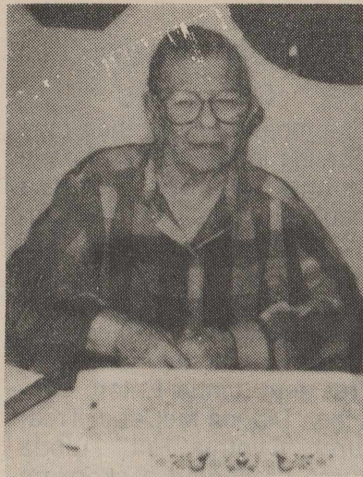

Richards couple receive degrees

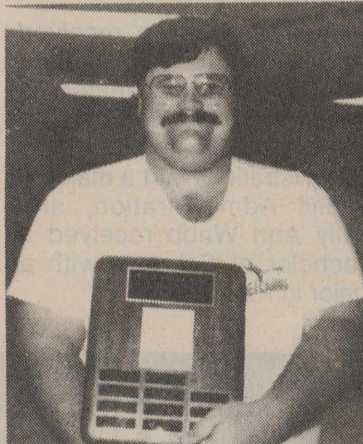

Injury Prevention

To prevent running injuries, pay attention to the four "S's": stretching, stride, shoes, and surface.

"Many of the common running injuries can be prevented by simple adjustments in your running program or even a new pair of shoes," said Dr. Donald Baxter, a clinical professor of orthopedic surgery at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston.

"A full 10 or 15 minutes should be devoted to carefully stretching thigh and calf muscles," Baxter said.

A simple adjustment in stride may be necessary if aches and pains develop.

"A very long stride may cause the runner to land too far back on the heel, causing injuries to the ankle, achilles tendon and arch," Baxter said. "Taking extremely short strides may strain calf and thigh muscles or stress the foot and ankle."

An exercise physiologist can analyze stride on stationary tracks using video tape to pick up flaws in motion.

The third "S", shoes, is intimidating to many people because of the number of specialty running shoes on the market.

"Many of these shoes are expensive," said Baxter. "But, when fitted and cared for properly, the shoes can help prevent injuries. The key is finding the right kind of shoe."

Baxter suggests taking along an old pair of running shoes so a sales representative can see how you run.

Selecting the proper running surface is also important. Surfaces such as concrete roads and sidewalks can cause shin splints, minute fractures in the bone below the knee.

"Even the most expensive shoes cannot eliminate all of the shock waves caused by constant running on that type of surface," Baxter said.

Baxter suggests a relatively smooth-surface track or running trail. Even asphalt streets are softer than concrete.

Baxter also recommends cross-training.

Replacing one or two days of running with cycling or swimming gives certain muscle groups a rest while still providing a good aerobic workout.

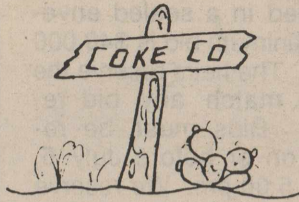
AON Elects Officers

Pecan Nut Casebearer Control

With the crazy weather and variations in temperature this spring, precise prediction for control of the pecan nut casebearer will be difficult. Unless there is a tremendous load of casebearer eggs present on the nutlets, it is suggested not to spray for control of casebearers for several reasons. One, with the possible heavy crop of nuts that it looks like we may have, some thinning will have to take place or your nuts will not fill out completely. It is better to have fewer nuts that are filled out completely than a tremendous load that is only half-filled. Also, if you spray when there is little or no casebearer eggs present, besides wasting money and time you will damage the beneficial population of insects that will help us down the road on aphids, etc. Yellow pecan

aphid is a much larger pest for our area than the pecan nut casebearer.

The estimated spray dates for control should be warranted by a heavy egg population between May 26 and June 2. Only spray if you can find numerous eggs. These will be on the ends of the small nutlets and will be white in color and about the size of a pin head. Unless there are around 20 percent of the nutlets infested with eggs, I would suggest not spraying.
