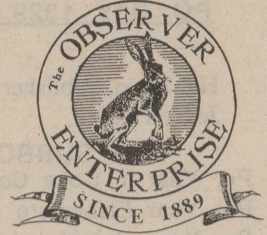

BNH bond election passes

The bond election held Tuesday in Bronte for the expansion of Bronte Nursing Home passed by a margin of 134-39. The passing of the bond issue will increase the size of the nursing home by 24 beds or 12 rooms.

Board member Pat Oglesby said Wednesday morning that she was very pleased with the results of the election but at the same time was disappointed in the small number of voters that turned out to cast ballots. She also stated that

she is very proud of their facility and the board will strive to see that monies appropriated will be used wisely.

Man dies in boating accident

The son of a Bronte woman was killed Friday, June 3, in a boating accident on Lake Sweetwater. David Brown, 44, of Sweetwater was thrown from a boat, along with two other Sweetwater men, and the boat ran over the trio.

Brown was not wearing a life jacket when the accident occurred about 8:30 pm, said Game Warden Ken Nivins. His body was recovered about two hours later. His companions, apparently less seriously injured, struggled to shore. They were transported to Abilene's Hendrick Medical Center.

The boat finally grounded itself after striking several boat docks and a tree.

The victim was the son of Mrs. Hettie Brown of Bronte.

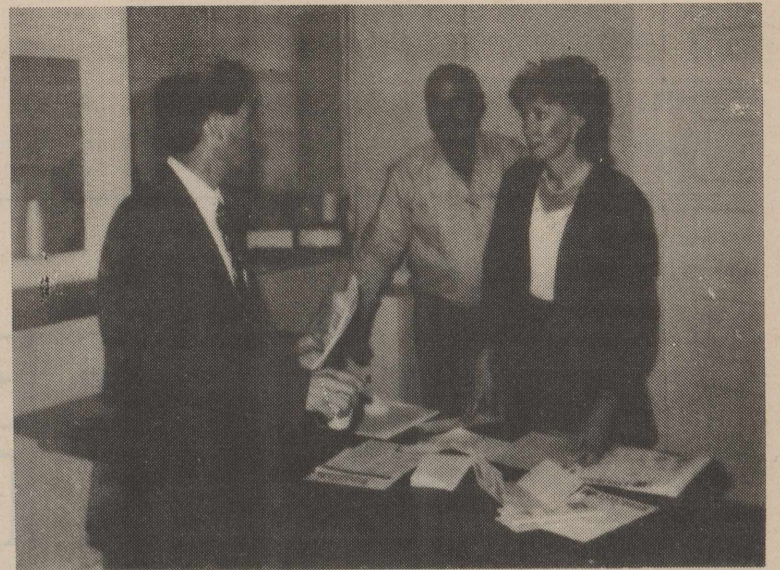
Adams Children Meet

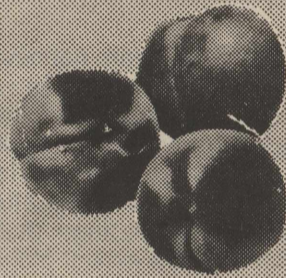

McCown earns All American honors

Ron McCown of Robert Lee earned All American honors this past weekend while competing in the decathlon for Stephen F. Austin State University in the Division I National Track Meet. The top 8 competitors are named All American. The top 18 major college decathletes in the United States this year participated in this meet in Boise, Idaho.

Ron placed 7th in the competition. This 7th place finish earned 2 points for SFA. These points, along with the points of two teammates, helped SFA finish ahead of such teams as the University of Texas, Texas A&M, TCU, and Texas Tech in the team standings.

Ron's best events were the high jump - 6' 9 1/2", the 400 meter run - 50.13, long jump - 22' 5", pole vault - 14' 5", and javelin - 171' 11". Ron scored 7,392 points, which was almost 100 points better than his previous best.

During the track season, Ron placed 2nd in the Southland Conference, which had 3 of the top 8 NCAA decathletes in the United States this year.

Ron has been selected by the U.S. Olympic Development Committee to attend the Olympic Training Camp in Colorado Springs, Colorado in July.

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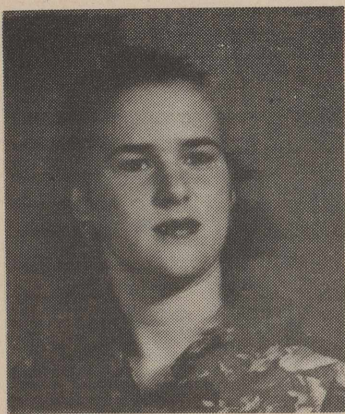

SHANNON HEALTH NOTES

Pet Problems

If you seek medical attention for unexplained rashes and marks on your skin, do not be surprised if you are asked whether you have a household pet. Dr. Clinton Sayers, a clinical instructor of dermatology at the University of Colorado School of Medicine, says a host of tiny critters that infest pets, such as fleas and lice, are a common source of skin irritations on humans.

Not all humans react the same way to bites from these tiny insects and they are usually more annoying than serious, since most bugs can be controlled or eliminated. In his presentation to the American Academy of Dermatology, Dr. Sayers pointed to the ticks and mites that are able to pass along serious viral and bacterial infections, such as Lyme disease.

Pets can also pass along poison ivy to their owners. This is not a condemnation of household pets, rather it may be a possible explanation for unexplained rashes or other marks on the humans in a household.

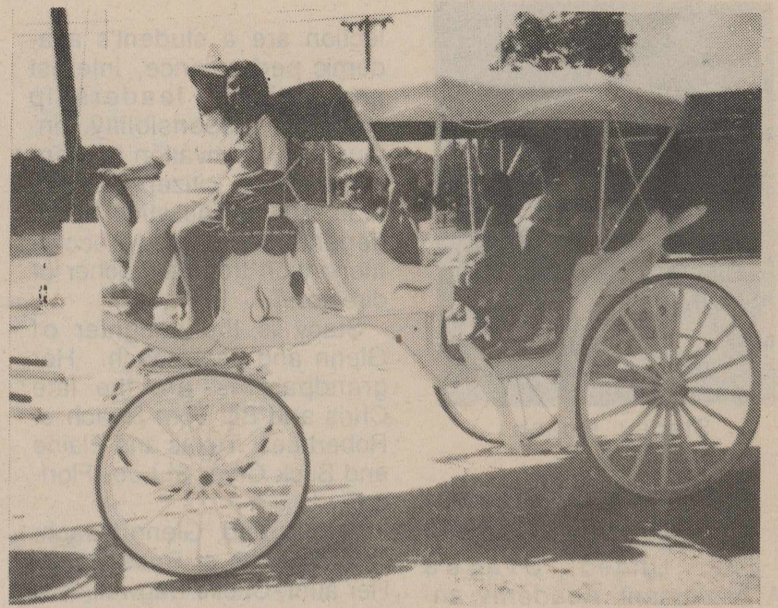

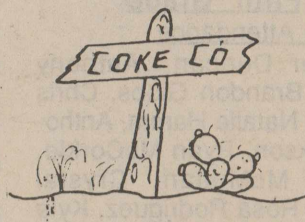

Treat for Cattle Grubs

Cattle grubs are internal parasites and their damage is largely unseen, yet they cause greater economic losses to the U.S. beef cattle industry than any other insect pest.

While grubs are usually found on the backs of infested animals during the winter months, that's not the time for control measures since the pests have already done their damage. Feed efficiency and animal vigor are reduced in infested animals.

Grubs are the larvae or worm stage of heel flies, and adult heel flies are active over most of the state from March through May.

The time to control grubs is from now through August when grubs are small and before infested animals suffer stress, weight loss, and decreased feed efficiency. Considerable hide damage will occur if infested animals are slaughtered.

Heel flies cannot sting, have no functional mouth parts, and cause no pain to cattle. Yet, they frighten animals, making them difficult to manage.

Heel flies lay their eggs on an animal's hair in the lower leg region, glued in position. Tiny larvae hatch in a few days, crawl down to the base of the hair and burrow into the animal's skin.

Then they begin a migratory course through the animal's body, congregating in the throat after a few months, and after eight to nine months, appear in the mature grub state on the animal's back.

If a producer has a history of grubs in his cattle herd, it's best to treat each animal over three months of age with one application of an approved systemic insecticide or injectable treatment during the May through August period.

Systemic insecticides are absorbed directly through the animal's skin, circulate throughout the body, and kill grubs while they are small. Injectable treatments are circulated in the animal's body fluids to kill the invading pests.

These insecticides come in various forms - dips, sprays, pour-ons, injections, and spot-on treatments. A listing of approved insecticides and methods for controlling cattle grubs is available at the County Extension office.

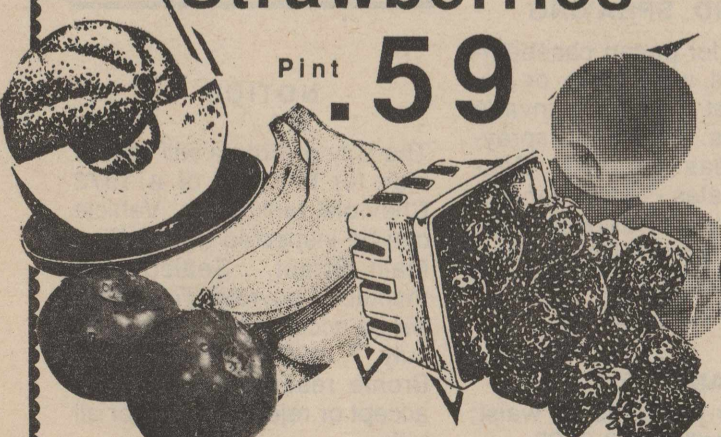

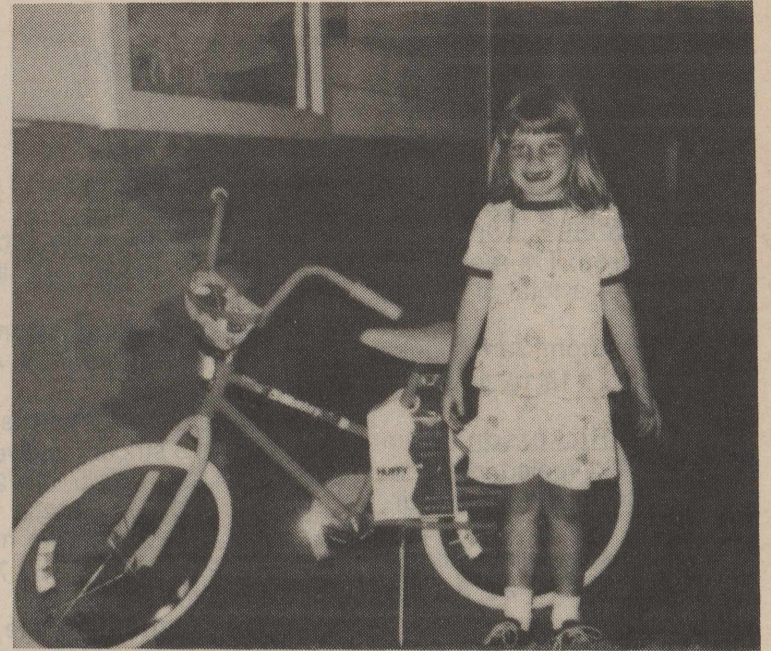

Jim Bowie Days

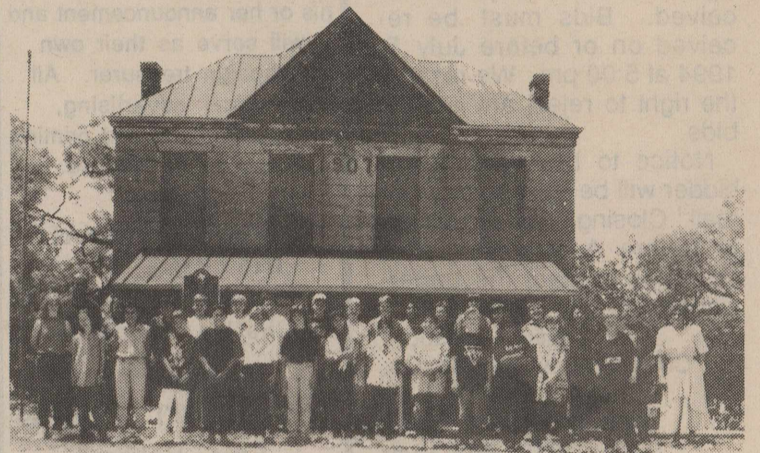
Menard's Jim Bowie Days will be held June 16 - 19, 1994.

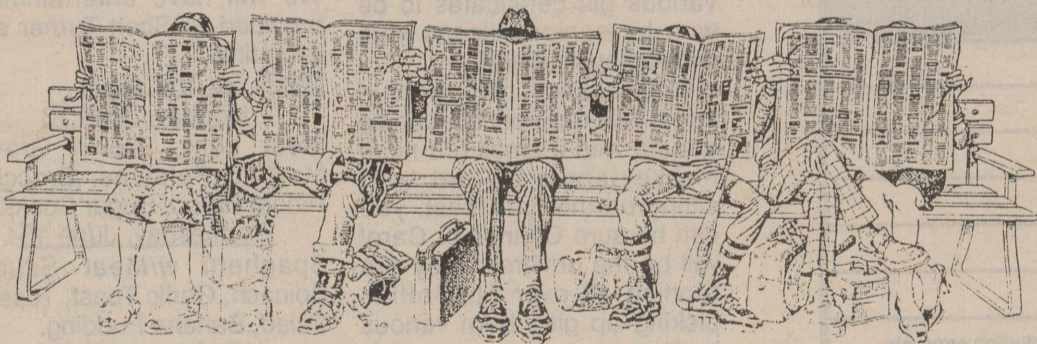


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
