County tracksters, coach lauded by ST

In a fitting finale to the Robert Lee Steers' unprecedented 1993-94 season, Head Coach and Athletic Director Edward Poehls was named Co-Coach of the Year and three athletes were chosen for the Standard-Times All West Texas Track team.

Coach Ed Poehls was chosen to share the spotlight with Nat Sawyer, 4A San Angelo Lake View coach. His Steers went undefeated for the season until the Class 1A UIL. state track meet. Even then, the team finished 4th in the state meet, only eight points short of Sudan, who won the state title. Poehls, always the motivator, fielded the largest group of track competitors at the school ever. A number of times during the season, scoring over 200 points per meet on their way to district,

Picked over other vertical jumpers with higher records, junior Lee McCown perhaps personifies the high school athlete. His personal high was 6-2 but his concentration and dedication literally gained new heights with a 6-6 to finish third in the state meet. A multi-event athlete, he also was 2nd in the discus at 159' 1 and 7th in the 110 hurdles.

John Williams, a senior, was chosen for the throwing events squad. He has a personal record of 55' 11" in the shot put and was state meet runner-up at 55' 2 1/4". As a sophomore in 1992, he won the state shot put crown. He also placed high all year in the discus standings.

Also named to the throwing events All West Texas team was senior Dean Burns. He won the state discus title at 160' 5" and has a personal best of 165' 2 1/2". He, along with Steer team mates Mc-Cown and Williams placed 1, 2, 3 in the discus at twenty consecutive meets from 1992-94.

The three athletes were members of Robert Lee 1993 state quarterfinalist football team and two were on the 1994 regional finalist basketball squad. Two were also state golf qualifiers. The trio also excel academically and took part in all school activities.

Johnson Chosen


Jill Johnson of Bronte High School has been chosen a member of the San Angelo Standard Times All West Texas Track Athletes.

Short speeches were given by LeDrew Arrott, Candace Phillips, Karen Sefcik and Pat Oglesby.



The main attraction, of course, was the big chicken and fish fry. Two special birthdays were also celebrated. Ray Coalson who is 90 years old and Billy Ray Scott whose age remains unknown.



West Texas Pecan Management

Watering - Newly transplanted trees require a minimum of seven to ten gallons of water per week depending upon soil structure. A soaking type action where a hose or drip emitter disperses a small amount over a period of time reduces evaporation and porduces a more constant soil moisture at a deeper soil depth.

Irrigation requirements increase with the age of the tree. Older trees will require as much as 50 inches of precipitation annually. Since the arid west averages less than 19 inches annualy, a considerable amount of supplemental irrigation is required.

During the developmental stages of pecan nutlets, available moisture at two specific periods is critical to large, high quality pecans. The latter part of May and June are when pecans begin to size up. A deficiency of moisture during this period makes for small pecans. Early August and through September moisture is needed to fill nuts properly. Adequate moisture during June and July, but a short supply during August and September results in large poorly-filled pecans that even squirrels pass up.

Allowing water to soak from a slowly running outlet is one of the best methods of irrigating large trees.

West Texas Pecan Facts -Pecans shed bark. As the tree grows older new bark is produced within the old bark and the older bark is sluffed Insects use these off. crevices and cracks for hiding, but are not usually pests. This bark sluff is a natural occurrence and is more pronounced in certain varieties such as Burkett.

Pecan varieties are chosen through breeding programs. Older varieties were improved native pecans. A native pecan is classified as a pecan that developed through generations of natural selection of wild trees.

sult. Control of yellow pecan aphids is extremely difficult. Spraying trees with Malathion, Diazinon, or Lorsban may give temporary relief. Sevin will not control aphids.

There are three main possible causes of pecan drop during the latter part of pecan development. These are: 1.) An inadequate supply of moisture. In order to produce nuts pecan trees must not be in a stress condition due to lack of water. 2.) A deficiency of essential nutrients. A poor fertillization and zinc spray program may result in pecans dropping prior to maturing. In addition, a heavy crop load in the preceding year reduces the level of stored food, and trees in this condition may shed pecans due to inadequate food reserves and as a self defense mechanism. 3.) Insect or disease attack. Pecan pests will indirectly, through leaf damage or directly through nut damage, cause premature shedding of


Jameson named to **Dean's List**


If a Burkett nut is planted, the resulting tree will be a Burkett seedling and not a native or a Burkett. Only one of the parents, the female (Burkett) is known. The male parent could have been any pecan tree in the neighborhood or orchard. The nut produced from this variety seedling may look like a Burkett, like a male parent or like neither.

The sticky substance dropping from pecan trees like rain is the result of insects feeding on pecan leaves. These tiny insects are aphids which suck sap from leaflets and deposit a sticky substance commonly called honeydew. Large populations of yellow and black aphids are sometimes established in July, August, or September. Extensive leaf loss and a sticky mess can re-







Does body weight determine longevity? Doctors at Harvard School of Public Health and Brigham and Women's Hospital in Boston, followed up on a study of nearly twenty thousand graduates. They found that men who weighed about twenty percent less than the United States average for their age and height had the lowest death rates.


A significant increase in death rates did not occur until men weighed twenty percent or more over the desirable weight. Those who were more than twenty percent over the desirable weight increased their chances of dying by two-thirds. Deaths just from heart and circulatory disease started to increase in men when they were slightly over the desirable weight, and in the heaviest group was two and one-half times that of the leanest group of men.

Dr. I-Min Lee and her colleagues reported in the Journal of the American Medical Association (12-14), that the death rates for the heaviest men are an argument against an increase in the desirable weight tables. ©1992, Lyle Dean, Inc.

Food Safety Tips for the summer

Consumers should be very aware of food safety precautions during the summer when outdoor activities such as picnics, campouts, and cookouts are popular.

Often these activities involve food. Unfortunately, the incidence of foodborne illness also seems to rise during these months. Bacteria that cause foodborne illness grow best at warm weather temperatures, specifically at "danger zone temperatures" between 40 degrees Fahrenheit and 140 degrees Fahrenheit.

Foods that are most perishable are called "red flag" foods. They are moist protein-containing foods such as poultry, meats, eggs -- foods that are sometimes misunderstood as being non-perishable.

It's important to follow the "hot food - cold food rule" for perishable foods. "Keep hot foods hot (over 140 degrees) and cold foods cold (below 40 degrees)". The combination of these foods plus temperatures in the danger zone spell trouble.

Prevention of foodborne illness starts with the planning of the menu. Do not include "red flag" foods unless you can keep them either hot or cold. If refrigeration is needed, but not available, foods can be packed in an ice chest. It's important not to pack the ice chest too full and use adequate ice or ice packs to keep the foods at 40 degrees. Use shallow containers so food will stay chilled throughout. Also, keep the ice chest in the shade.

Some foods do not require refrigeration until opened and may be better items to take on a picnic. These include canned meats, peanut butter and jelly, breads, crackers, cereal and nut mixes. Dried and fresh fruits are another option.

Plan to eat as soon as possible after you arrive at the picnic site. Store any leftovers promptly and properly, or throw them away. It is best to carry only what you plan to eat. Don't leave foods out for more than two hours. In hot summer temperatures, one hour is a better rule to follow.

If you pick up deli or fast food items, either pick them up immediately before the event and eat as soon as you arrive, or buy them the night before and refrigerate.

Cleanliness is very important to prevent the spread of bacteria. Avoid handling foods more than necessary. Never handle raw foods and cooked foods together. Do not reuse any utensils that touched raw food without washing them. Spread a clean tablecloth on the table before serving the food. Use disposables since adequate hand-washing or dishwashing facilities may not be available. Use these items only once, then throw them away.


Lloyd Walker, BHS teacher, and Walter King, BHS student, attended the conference with WTU representative Kit Horne.

Selective Service

Responding to a recent decision by the President, the U. S. House of Representatives voted on May 23 to continue the requirement for all men to register with Selective Service upon reaching age 18. The members considered a proposed amendment to the Defense Authorization Bill, H. R. 4301, that would have ended registration. The amendment was rejected 125 to 273.

Five days before the vote, President Clinton notified Congress that continuing draft registration and providing funding to operate the Selective Service System is "essential to our national security." In letters to the lead-ership of the House and Senate on May 18, the President based his decision on a recently completed review of the program by a National Security Council working group. He concluded that the Selective Service System and peacetime registration must be retained as a prudent military preparedness measure in an uncertain world, as a link between American society and the volunteer military, and as a symbol of national resolve.

Although there has been no need to draft men for military service during the past 21 years, the nation has maintained the capability to reinstate a draft in a major crisis. Since July, 1980, draft registration has been an obligation of virtually every man, ages 18-25. Federal law requires that every man must register within 30 days of his 18th birthday. Each man completes a short form to provide Selective Service with his name, date of birth, address, phone number, and Social Security number. Registration forms are available at any post office. Most men also receive a registration reminder in the mail a few months be fore reaching age 18, and they may use it to register by return mail. The Selective Service System has a telephone line dedicated to answering questions about registration: (708) 688-6888. Men who don't register are in violation of Federal law. Non-registrants can be prosecuted, and they are ineligible for Federal Student financial aid, most federal jobs, and job training. The law applies to male immigrant aliens, 18 through 25 years old, as well as male citizens.

Scholars Program

Kendra Teschendorf of San Angelo, granddaughter of James and Katy Chambers and Robert and Mary Teschendorf, all of Bronte, is one of 60 eighth grade students in San Angelo who will get a shot at a free college education through a unique program there.

The "Up and Coming Scholars" Program is a joint venture between ASU and San Angelo Independent Schools. The program's aim is to provide high-achieving but low income students to pursue a degree at ASU after finishing high school.

Students have a strict schedule to adhere to until they are out of high school. A certain grade average, no unexcused absences and maintain membership in the Drug Abuse and Awareness and Prevention program.

The Up and Coming Scholars Program is essentially adopting these students. They will have access to ASU Library and computer labs, and help will be provided for use of other resources available on the campus.

Kendra, of Lee Junior High is excited about the program. "It makes me feel like I've got a future", she said. "It makes me feel important".

Her mother said that when Kendra learns what's available and how to use the resources, "she'll be nonstop".
