# Rabid raccoon attacks man in RL

Ed LaFountain, a weekend resident of Robert Lee, began a series of anti-rabies shots with an Odessa doctor last week after being informed by Sheriff's Deputy Jeff Barnes a raccoon which attacked him had tested positive for rabies. LaFountain, 50, was attacked by the animal in his yard on Hwy. 208 near the Robert Lee post office. It sank its teeth into the calf of his leg and had to be choked off. After he killed the animal, he notified the sheriff's office and Barnes took it for testing early Monday morning.

A number of rabies cases have been reported across Texas in the last few months, including Coke County. Animals in advanced stages of the disease exhibit this aggressive behavior. Residents should watch for wild animals unafraid of humans or appear injured or crippled and avoid contact if possible.

Mr. Belcher was born October 29, 1920 in Wichita Falls, Texas. He married Savannah Caperton on February 13, 1949 in Bronte, Texas.

He graduated from Mc-Camey High School in 1938 as one of Texas High School Football's Outstanding Athletes. He attended Angelo State Junior College, Baylor University and graduated from Sul Ross with his Bachelor and Master Degrees. He did graduate work at the University of Texas in Austin and Oxford University in Cambridge, England. Mr. Belcher was named Who's Who in American Education, he worked with the American Cancer Society, the Boy Scouts of America as a Scout Master, Rotary Club and the Arthritis Foundation. Mr. Belcher lived in Andrews for 16 years and was employed by Humble Oil, before coming to Odessa to coach and teach with the Ector County ISD until his retirement. He was active for many years in the Southwest Conference Football Officials' Association and the Southwest Basketball Officials' Association. He served in the Air Force during WWII.

Survivors include his wife of Odessa, Texas; two sons. Robert W. Conner of Portland, Oregon, and Jack D. 





# Horn Fly Control

Heavy spring rains across much of Texas have created extra parasite problems for livestock producers.

Horn fly control has always been important for many ranchers, but this year it is even more so.

These blood-sucking flies reduce weight gains and milk production in mother cows with calves. Weight gains worth \$2 to \$8 have been measured in experiments for every \$1 invested in horn fly control.

Horn flies spend most of their time on the cow, the females leaving only for the few minutes it takes to lay eggs in freshly deposited manure. A single fly may feed up to 20 times a day.

Horn flies can be successfully controlled with insecticides because the flies spend so much time on the cow and are soon exposed to a lethal dose. Insecticides can be applied with selftreatment devices such as dust bags, back rubbers, the LiquiDuster, and ear tags, or by using sprays, boluses, and feed supplements.

Ear tags have been commonly used because they combine an effective insecticide, a pyrethroid, with the ear tag, which is a slow release device. The result is several months of control.

However, these very factors that make the tag so effective have led to their widespread use, and the increased resistance to pyrethroids in horn flies.

Resistance occurs as season-long use of the same insecticide kills the susceptible horn flies, leaving only resistance pests to reproduce. Soon, the resistance flies are dominant and the insecticide is no longer effective.

There are several practices ranchers can follow to delay horn fly resistance.

Producers can rotate the pyrethroid tag with a n organophosphate tag every one to three years. Resistance to organophosphate tags has not been documented in Texas.

Ranchers should apply tags or treat with insecticides only when horn fly numbers reach 200 to 300 per head. Research has indicated that fewer than 250 flies per animal rarely cause economic losses.

Depleted tags should be removed at the end of the horn fly season.

An organophosphate insecticide spray, dust, or bolus may be used to kill pyrethroid-resistant flies.

These practices allow some susceptible flies to survive and reproduce in the spring and fall, helping to dilute the resistant genes in the population. Tolerating a few horn flies actually helps slow resistance, making insecticides like pyrethroid ear tags effective when they are most needed.

Certain insecticides in feed additives and boluses also control horn flies. The active ingredient is an insect growth regulator callled methoprene. It passes through the cow into the manure and kills the developing horn fly larvae, or maggots.

Methoprene is neither a organophospate or pyrethroid and therefore is effective in managing horn fly resistance by rotating insecticide doses.

Boluses are applied once at the start of the fly season, and an insecticide spray can be used to kill adult flies present at the time boluses are administered.

Animals should be observed after dosing to ensure that if boluses are regurgitated, the animal is treated again.

Flies migrate between herds, so fly control in bolustreated herds is improved if horn flies are controlled in adjacent herds.

Producers are reminded to use unlined rubber gloves when applying ear tags.

# Fluids important in exercise

Summer heat combined with physical activity can sap the body of as much as two quarts of fluid in one hour and can cause dehydration.

"The solution, as obvious as it sounds, is to drink plenty of water," said Dr. Jim Pivarnik, an exercise physiologist at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston.

Not drinking enough fluids can affect exercise performance and lead to heat ill-

Signs of water depletion include extreme thirst and dry lips and tongue. In severe cases, there can be an increase in heart rate and breathing, dizziness, confusion, and coma. The skin may appear dry and non-elastic while the sufferer may feel lethargic and have headaches and cramps.

A simple sign of possible dehydration is darker yellow urine.

Pivarnik recommends eight ounces of water each 15 min-Kuempel's Korner utes during excercise.

# New World In Caring For Elderly

Caring for aging parents is a lot more complicated than it once was because of changes in family structure. Delayed marriage, delayed childbirth, divorce, remarriage and stepfamilies create logistical and emotional complications to go along with usual stresses of caring for aging parents.

Linda George, associate director of the Duke University Center for the Study of Aging and Human Development, says the biggest challenge for care-givers comes from the fact that most women now work outside the home.

So far, there is no evidence that older people are going to nursing homes earlier, but when the baby boomers hit retirement age in the next twenty years, the outlook is, in her words, daunting.

Professor George says the clearer things are in regard to what parents want and what adult children are willing to give, the better it is. She says the best thing older people can do is raise this issue with their children, because it is harder for an adult child to initiate this kind of conversation than for the parent.



Grilling carefully also can prevent excessive smoke and charring that may be unhealthy. To keep your cookouts both safe and fun, follow these simple tips in proper food preparation and grilling:

\*Select high quality fresh meat, poultry or seafood products for the best results in outdoor grilling.

\*Keep meat products at a temperature of 40 degrees Fahrenheit or less until right before grilling. Thaw frozen meat products in the refrigerator -- not at room temperature. At room temperatures, the outer layers of meat

may reach a temperature that promotes bacterial growth before the inner layers are thawed.

\*Keep marinating foods in the refrigerator. Do not use leftover marinade as a sauce on cooked meat. Marinade may contain bacteria from raw meat that could contaminate cooked meat.

Always wash your hands before and after working with raw meat or poultry. Handle raw foods and cooked foods separately.

\*Wash work surfaces and cutting boards thoroughly with hot, soapy water before and after preparing meat for grilling. To sanitize, clean with a solution of 1 1/2 to 2 teaspoons of bleach per quart of water. Use a different cutting board for meats than for raw fruits and vegetables.

\*After you place the meat on the grill, wash utensils and platters with hot, soapy water before using them again to serve the meat. Cooking kills bacteria, but cooked foods can be recontaminated with unwashed utensils.

\*Keep serving time after cooking to a maximum of two hours and refrigerate all leftovers immediately at 40 degrees Fahrenheit or below.

\*Chicken, pork, turkey, and ground meat products should be cooked until the juice runs clear or the temperature reaches 170 degrees.

\*Eating raw or rare meat is not recommended especially for person who have chronic illnesses, are recovering from surgery or have compromised immune systems. Cook meat thoroughly to kill bacteria.

These additional suggestions will keep food from becoming too heavily smoked or charred:

\*Choose meats for cookouts that are low in fat to avoid flare ups from dripping fat. Trim excess fat from the meat before grilling.

\*Avoid marinades or basting sauces that contain a lot of fat.

\*Cover the grill with aluminum foil. Punch holes between the grids to let juice drip out.

\*If dripping fat causes heavy smoke, move the food to another section of the grill, rotate the grill or reduce the

\*Learn to control the fire. Cook the meat until it is done, but without charring it. Remove any charred or burned material that forms on the food's surface. Do not eat it.

\*Wrap foods such as fish and vegetables in foil to protect them from smoke while grilling.

\*Reduce grilling time by precooking many foods, including poultry and ribs, by boiling or cooking in the microwave. However, immediately place precooked foods on the grill to complete cooking and give it that grill flavor. Partially cooked foods may develop bacterial growth that causes foodborne illness.

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

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

People with diabetes, for example, should discuss with their physicians the effect crossing time zones will have on insulin schedules, said Dr. James H. Runnels of the Travel Medicine Service at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston. Dosage and timing may need adjustment.

For international trips, an insulin insulator pack, available at pharmacies, is recommended. If the destination is a particularly hot climate, an insulated cold pack is also advisable.

People with heart disease should guard against infectious diseases by getting appropriate vaccinations and preventive medicines, and they should be prepared to fight traveler's diarrhea, Runnels said.

High elevations can also be a problem for heart-disease patients who suffer from shortness of breath or similar symptoms.

They should consult their physicians before planning international travel.

Pulmonary disease is another illness requiring special planning.

"Lung-disease patients should investigate how much walking and climbing may be involved, and they should take into account the altitude of their destinations," Runnels said.

They should also determine if they will encounter severe pollution, humidity or pollen. Physicians should be consulted to be certain oxygen needs will not interfere with air travel.

In general, a traveler with special health concerns should:

\*Talk to a physician before planning a trip.

\*Obtain the names of physicians in destination and cities.


