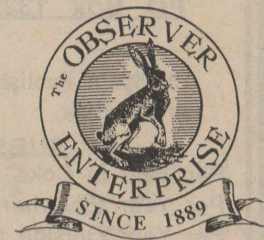

## Court discusses Wackenhut agreement

The Coke County Commissioners' Court met in Special Session, Monday, June 27, 1994.

The purpose of the meeting was:

1. Discuss Coke County Juvenile Justice Center, including the proposed ownership and financing as presented to Coke County by Wackenhut Corrections Corporation, including briefing by County Attorney Chris Wyatt, concerning Coke County's participation and liability exposure in connection with the Juvenile Facility.

2. Act on the following Juvenile Facility documents prepared and presented to Coke County by Wackenhut Corrections Corporation, all of which involve Coke County, Wackenhut Corrections Corporation, Texas Youth Commission, The Chicago Corporation, Coke County Juvenile Facility Financing Corporation and ChiCorp Financial Service, Inc.

### Citizenship Seminar

Attending the Texas Farm Bureau's 32nd annual Citizenship Seminar in San Angelo June 13-17 were Nick Arrott of Bronte, Jason Key of Robert Lee, and Ramey Wauer of Sterling City.

Sponsored by the Coke-Sterling County Farm Bureau, they were among approximately 400 high school junior and senior students from over 150 counties across the state.

Purpose of the seminar is to provide the students with a better understanding of their American heritage and the capitalistic free enterprise system, according to Bobby Roberts of Robert Lee, county FB president.

Speakers at this year's seminar and their subjects were as follows: Jack Jackson of Fort Worth, president of Jack Jackson & Associates, "Free Enterprise Principles/Projects"; Jolene Brown, West Branch, Iowa "Stand Up! Step Out! Lead!"; Michael Broome of Charlotte, N. C., a motivational speaker, "You and America -- Two Great Champions"; Dr. Ronald Trowbridge, Hillsdale College, Hillsdale, Michigan, "Constitutional Government"; and Texas Farm Bureau President Bob Stallman of Columbus welcomed the students to the seminar. Also, special presentations were made by Curtis Childers, president of the National FFA, and Brooke Leslie, Texas A & M University Student Body President.

### Crop Certification Deadline Nears

The Coke County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service (ASCS) reminds all farmers to certify their 1994 crop plantings, land uses, acreage conservation reserve and other program acreage as soon as possible.

Final Certification dates for program crops are: July 15 for Cotton, Grain Sorghum, Hay-grazer and CRP acres.

Dwayne Vincent explained certification as the procedure by which farmers report their program acreage to establish their eligibility to receive the benefits of price support, deficiency payments and other farm program benefits. Acreage reports are required for all participating farms.

He said growers not participating in the 1994 programs should report their acreage to establish planting history, ensure future benefits and protect crop acreage bases.

After certification, ASCS will select farms at random to verify that acreage reports are accurate. Aerial photographs are available for farmers to help identify their fields.

Spring seeded crops may be certified at any time between 8:00 am and 5:00 pm, Monday through Friday at the local ASCS office.

J. Deed of trust, including security agreement and financing statement.

At the beginning of the meeting, Commissioner James Tidwell read and presented a prepared statement concerning his position as a County Commissioner and his personal position as a property owner whose tract of land, approximately one mile south of Bronte, having been selected by Wackenhut Corrections Corporation, after the original site west of Bronte on Arrott brothers land was eliminated because of potential future hydrogen sulfide gas production. The oil and gas and mineral lease on the Arrott tract is owned by the Exxon Corporation.

After much discussion, an order was voted on and passed 4 to 0, with Commissioner Tidwell abstaining, to join the Wackenhut Corrections Corp. in building the Coke County Juvenile Justice Center on the Wackenhut selected site on Commissioner Tidwell's 38.7 acre tract.

The order also provided for the County Judge, with legal counsel, to proceed to close a non-profit, non-taxable agreement with Wackenhut Corrections Corp.

It is expected that all contracts shall be executed this week and site assessment, surveying and foundation forming will be completed this week and construction to begin as soon thereafter as possible. October 1, 1994 is targeted as completion date.


Under this non-taxable concept and contracts, Coke County will own the 6 million dollar facility in 16 years with a minimum estimated return of \$73,000 per year, into Coke County General Fund thereafter: Provided the facility grows, then the annual revenue will increase accordingly.


There will be no tax increase related to securing and operating this facility.

The Central Texas Improved Goat Production Conference will be held July 7, 1994 at the Brown County Coliseum. Registration will begin at 8:00 am and the program will begin at 9:00 am. The nominal registration fee will include a catered lunch with proceeding being mailed after the conference. Boer goats and their various crosses with other breeds will be on exhibit at the conference.

The program will begin with Norman Kohls, past President American Boer Goat Association, presenting a history of the meat goat industry, as well as the current situation on South Africa and the importation of Boer goats. Charles Turner, Ag Science Teacher and Rancher, will discuss breed standards of the various breeds of goats. Selection of goats for

Sports fans from all over the world are concerned and confused with the present-day situation of O. J. Simpson, a beloved and famous football player, a hero, now classified as a murderer.

A teacher from Blackwell School participated in an electrical workshop sponsored by West Texas Utilities June 23.

Leva Self from Blackwell attended the Electrical Circuits and Motor Theory 1994 Teacher Workshop.

More than fifty 4th through 8th grade science teachers from the Big Country area received hands on training in areas such as electrical circuits, electric motors and electrical safety in Abilene.

"Many of these teachers want more resources and information to use in their classrooms," said Kit Horne, farm and ranch community relations consultant of WTU.

"We try to give the 4th through 8th grade science teachers something they can't get from textbooks," said Horne, who has been coordinating science workshops for area educators for more than 10 years.

Once a year WTU sponsors workshops aimed at different teachers, such as science or agri-science teachers. By participating in these workshops, teachers may obtain credit from their school systems.

Diet vs. Performance

Is there a relationship to when we eat and what we eat and our performance? A number of studies have suggested that children who skip breakfast do not do as well in their studies as children who eat a regular breakfast. However, whether changing meal patterns or eating certain foods at certain times of the day can enhance mood and performance may not be as clearly answerable.

The Institute of Medicine's Food and Nutrition Board sponsored a meeting to investigate the effects of diet on cognitive, physical and emotional performance. The review of available research found evidence of improving physical performance and improving mood by diet, but since most studies were on selected groups, it is unclear how other groups of people would respond and how much variation there is among individuals in the various groups. The idea of enhancing performance by diet is very appealing, but the meeting concluded that until there is more evidence, no special food component or nutrient will substitute for a well-balanced diet and regular exercise.

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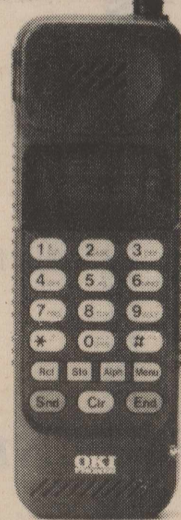
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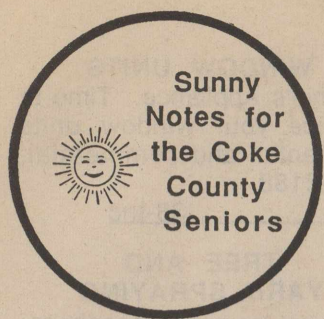

All of us need to try and find a positive side to this thing. I'm sure some amount of good will come from it, perhaps in the form of change.

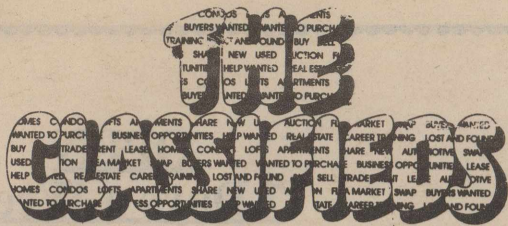

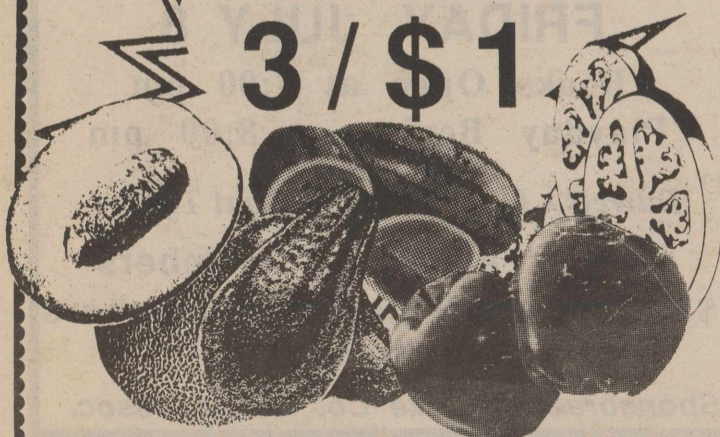
