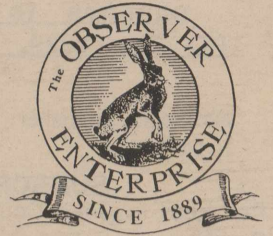

**USDA SCS forums slated**

Nearly 60 years ago, the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Soil Conservation Service was created to address a national resource crisis called the Dust Bowl. Since then, the agency has undergone a number of changes, resulting in the agency now known as the Soil Conservation Service or SCS. In its reinvention process, the agency aims to create the natural resources agency of the future.

To do this, the SCS in Texas has scheduled six forums around the state to solicit recommendations on the agency's future direction.

The first forum was held in Stephenville on August 2.

"Predicting the future is a difficult task. However, we believe that one of the best ways to prepare for tomorrow is by looking at the past and by asking our customers and employees what they anticipate will be needed in the future," Oneth said.

Anyone with an interest in natural resource conservation is invited to participate. A survey form is available for those who are unable to attend the forums. More information and copies of the survey may be obtained from local SCS offices. They are listed in telephone directories under U.S. Government, Agriculture Department.

### Older Is Younger

Something has happened to older Americans. They do not fit the image we have of older people. Clifford Barnett, a medical anthropologist at Stanford University, says most of his students believe at least twenty percent of people sixty-five and older are in nursing homes, when it is actually only five percent.

Barnett says older people are younger than you think. When you look at the health of people over time, those who are seventy-five today tend to be like people in the past who were sixty-five. He says employers, too, will have to change their stereotypes of the old, because as the population gets older, society will need to make more use of older people's skills.

Even older people themselves hold negative stereotypes about aging, and the more an individual has absorbed those stereotypes, the more difficult aging will likely be for him or her. Conversely, if you think young it will be easier to stay young.

### Inmate labor benefits Texas Wildlife

A cooperative effort that has put 600 inmates of the Texas Department of Criminal Justice to work at two Texas Parks and Wildlife Department wildlife management areas this summer is worth more than \$1 million in labor related costs, according to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

"This program has exceeded all our expectations," said Cook, who helped set up the program with TDCJ. "This will benefit us immensely in the upkeep of our wildlife areas and ultimately the enjoyment of the public users of these facilities."

In addition to manual labor-intensive job, inmates will be assisting in several wildlife management related projects, including documentation of observations of threatened or endangered species such as the canebrake rattlesnake and Texas horned lizard; conducting alligator nest surveys; and construction of feral hog traps and pit fall arrays used to capture and survey small mammals, insects and amphibians.

The project is scheduled to continue through August. TPWD and TDCJ officials are discussing plans to expand these cooperative projects to additional wildlife management areas in 1995.

### Beware of food poisoning

Hectic food preparation can increase the chances for food poisoning, especially among young children.

Children are more vulnerable because their intestinal tracts and immune systems are not fully developed, said Dr. Kathleen Motil of the USDA's Children's Nutrition Research Center at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston, and they may have less resistance to the bacteria that cause food-borne illness.

Symptoms of food poisoning include stomach cramps, nausea, diarrhea, vomiting, and in some cases, fever. Symptoms appear from 2 to 36 hours after eating and last several days.

When children become ill, parents should make sure they get plenty to drink to prevent dehydration.

"Oral rehydrating solutions, available in pharmacies, are better for toddler and pre-schoolers because they contain appropriate concentrations of salts (electrolytes) that maintain their body fluids," Motil said.

### Legal Matters Most Frequently asked questions.

As your attorney general, I receive thousands of phone calls and letters each month.

The most common question Texans ask me is how they can get legal advice from the Office of the Attorney General. Unfortunately, the Texas Constitution and state law prohibit our office from giving legal advice or written opinions to anyone who is not a state official or entity. The governor; heads of state agencies, boards or commissions; district attorneys and other similar officials are the only ones to whom I can give legal advice.

That doesn't mean that you can't get help from our office. It just means that we will act on behalf of all Texans when a problem arises. For example, my Consumer Protection Division will investigate and prosecute those who mislead consumers or who produce shoddy goods or services.

Here are some of the questions I am asked most frequently, along with their answers:

**Question:** I just had my car repaired and the mechanic didn't do the job right. What can I do about it? Can you help?

**Answer:** Our Consumer Protection Division provides a mediation service to help resolve your problem. But first, you should try to resolve the dispute with the shop. Get everything in writing, ask for your old parts back, and pay your bill. (Otherwise, the mechanic has the legal right to keep your car until you pay).

**Question:** Does Texas recognize common law marriages?

**Answer:** Yes, the state does recognize common law or informal marriages. Contrary to popular belief, there is no minimum number of years a couple must live together. In order to prove that a marriage exists, the parties involved must have a certificate of informal marriage from their county clerk. Under the common law, if two people agree that they are married, live together in Texas as husband and wife, and represent themselves to be husband and wife, they are considered married.

**Question:** Why can't I attend the executive session of the local school board meeting?

**Answer:** You can't attend the executive session because the law allows a governmental body to hold an executive session that's closed to the public. Under the Texas Open Meetings Act, every meeting or session of every governmental body shall be open to the public, except as provided by the act and the Texas Constitution. Those exceptions include consultations with an organization's attorney, discussions concerning property purchases, and personnel matters.

**Questions:** Where do I complain about my attorney?

**Answer:** If you want to complain about the improper actions of an attorney, your best course of action is to file a grievance with the State Bar of Texas. Your attorney may be investigated by a grievance committee of attorneys and lay persons. To lodge a complaint, call 1-800-932-1900.

**Question:** Can I take a de-

fensive driving course instead of paying a traffic fine?

**Answer:** Yes, but you may have to pay a fee to the court in addition to the cost of the class. The court can, at its option, delay proceedings and allow you 90 days to take the course. The charge then can be dismissed.

**Question:** How can I establish residency to qualify for in-state tuition to a state-supported college or university?

**Answer:** You must be 18 years of age or older and live and work in Texas for 12 months immediately before you register for school. However, if you are a dependent of someone else (normally your parents), their residency status will determine your status. In other words, dependent students from out of state cannot work a part-time job while in school to qualify for in-state tuition.



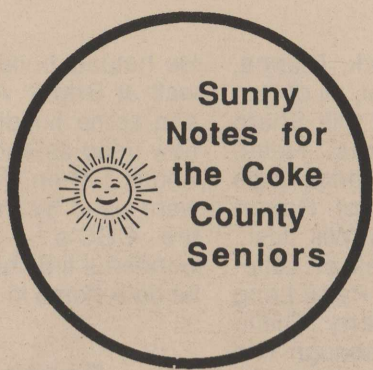

**Lean beef can be okay**

When a cholesterol lowering diet is prescribed, lean beef can stay on the menu. Researchers at Baylor College of Medicine in Houston have determined that eating lean beef in a cholesterol lowering diet produces reductions in levels of total blood cholesterol and low density lipoprotein, the "bad" cholesterol, similar to those achieved by eating chicken.

"The keys to keeping beef in a heart-healthy, low fat diet are the amount of fat in the meat and the portion size," said the study's principal investigator, Lynne Scott, director of the DeBakey Heart Center's Diet Modification Clinic at Baylor and The Methodist Hospital.

The study was funded by the National Livestock and Meat Board.

**Lindsey authors successful fiction novels**

Widow of historian, author, and former publisher of the O/E, Ulmer Bird, Josephine retains her interest in everything, including homefolks.)

Son of Earl Lindsey, now of Austin, and the late Hazel Lindsay, David was raised at Silver where he attended elementary school. He attended Colorado City high school 26 miles away, traveling by school bus.

Marrying young, he and his wife, Joyce had two children when David received his Masters degree in English literature from North Texas State University at Denton. The family moved to Austin where he worked at a number of jobs, mainly with publishing companies. He credits his wife with encouraging him to try his hand writing fiction.

His first novel, the 1983 Black Gold, Red Death, set the stage for a career of mystery writing - eight dark murder tales, the latest An Absence of Light, just out. David, 49, is being compared to Stephen King. He is now well-known for his grisly, graphic settings and descriptions. The author has gleaned much of his knowledge of horrible, bizarre crimes by visits and research with friends in law enforcement and pathology labs.

He admits when he began to write his lucrative works, he was surprised by his own fascination with violence and gore. However, the fact remains that David is solidly entrenched in his chosen field, well-known on book shelves, and his ardent fans await his next offering.

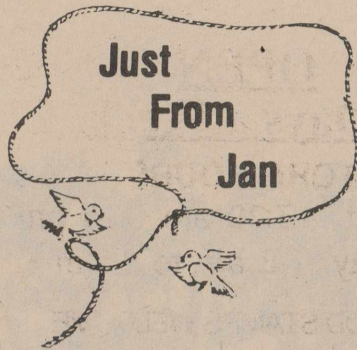

Avoid cross contamination of cooked and raw products. Keep food handling areas clean. Do not overcook products, and serve food at appropriate temperatures. Guarantee the success of the picnic, barbecues and patio parties with seafood.

Seafood over the coals is a great way to savor the flavor of any seafood product.

**Sims to serve on Interim Committee**

Texas Senator Bill Sims (Paint Rock) has been appointed to the SENATE INTERIM COMMITTEE ON RURAL TRANSPORTATION INFRASTRUCTURE by the Lieutenant Governor of Texas, Bob Bullock.

The Committee has been organized by Bullock to study and make recommendations regarding rural transportation infrastructure, focusing efforts on preventive maintenance and improved rural road safety. Following review, the Committee will make recommendations regarding the allocation of funding for the maintenance and construction of farm to market roads and substandard bridges located in rural areas.

Joining Senator Sims on the Committee are Senator Kenneth L. Armbrister (Victoria) and Senator Bill Haley (Center). The Committee will also seek public input, via scheduled meetings, and the expert assistance of the Texas Department of Transportation.

In addition to identifying existing needs in road maintenance and new construction, the Committee has been challenged to identify sources of funding for rural projects and to recommend relevant enhancements in the Texas Constitution and statutory law.

The Committee is to submit its findings and conclusions in a final report as soon as possible, but no later than December 1, 1994.

Friends and family members honored Ray Coalson with a bar-b-que dinner and cake and ice cream for his 90th birthday. The celebration was held July 30 th at the Church of Christ annex.

Ray Coalson was born in 1904 in Bronte where he continues to farm and ranch. He has been seen recently standing on a bale of hay on top of the cab of his pickup pruning trees.

Smoking or grilling fish or shellfish on the outdoor grill is an easy and satisfying way to create delicious seafood meals.

Smoking provides a unique flavor to seafood unlike anything you can produce in the kitchen. Smoked seafoods are excellent right off the grill, or they can be combined with other ingredients for impressive salads, dips, spreads or a variety of hearty entrees.

Grilling fish involves cooking at low to moderate heat on unity that has charcoal, lava briquettes of electric coils. Texas seafood cooked over coals, from hibachis to covered units with motorized spits, offer a festive alternative to conventional cooking. A metal grill over direct heat is usually used for cooking fish. The heat source may be charcoal or wood, a gas flame or an electric element. The same piece of equipment can be used for both smoking or grilling procedures. For grilling or smoking, consider fish steaks or fillets, dressed or drawn fish, shrimp and even whole blue crab. Follow normal grilling procedures.

With seafood, use moderate heat. Turning the product over is optional if a hood is used, since most seafoods will cook consistently throughout because sufficient heat is circulated around the product. To retain natural juices and fine flavor, be careful not to overcook the product. Seafoods lack a lot of connective tissue and long muscle fiber, so a short cooking time is all that is necessary. Look for an opaque appearance throughout to indicate doneness.

Remember these points:

\*Begin with a good quality product. Poorly handled fish will produce an unacceptable smoked item.

\*Keep heat low and even. The smoke should do most of the cooking, not the heat.

\*Use only hardwoods for producing smoke. Pines and other softwoods produce an unacceptable smoke item.

\*Thoroughly cook fish. Flake a sample to test for doneness.

\*Refrigerate or freeze smoked fish if not eaten immediately. Smoking does not preserve fish. It is still a perishable item and should be handled as such.

**NATIONAL SCHOOL LUNCH PROGRAM/SCHOOL BREAKFAST PROGRAM**

BRONTE ISD today announced its policy for providing free and reduced-price meals for children served under the National School Lunch Program and/or School Breakfast Program. The central office has a copy of the policy and may be reviewed by any interested party.

The household size and income criteria identified below will be used to determine eligibility for free and reduced-price benefits. Children from households whose income is at or below the levels shown are eligible for free or reduced-price meals. Foster children who are the legal responsibility of a welfare agency or court may also be eligible for benefits regardless of the income of the household with whom they reside. Eligibility for the foster child is based on the child's income.

Application forms are being distributed to all households with a letter informing households of the availability of free and reduced-price meals for their children. Applications also are available at the principal's office in each school. To apply for free and reduced-price meals, households must fill out the application and return it to the school. Applications may be submitted anytime during the school year. The information households provide on the application will be used for the purpose of determining eligibility and verification of data. Applications may be verified by the school officials at any time during the school year.

For school officials to determine eligibility for free and reduced price benefits, households receiving food stamps of AFDC only have to list their child's name, food stamp, of AFDC case number, and an adult household member must sign the application. Households who do not list a food stamp of AFDC case number must list the names of household members, the amount and source of the income received by each household member, and the social security number of the adult household member who signs the application. If the adult who signs the application does not have a social security number, the household member must indicate that a social security number is not available by writing the word "NONE". The application must be signed by an adult household member.

Under the provisions of the free and reduced-price meal policy the campus principals will review applications and determine eligibility. Parents or guardians dissatisfied with the ruling of the official may wish to discuss the decision with the reviewing official on an informal basis. Parents wishing to make a formal appeal for a hearing on the decision may make a request either orally or in writing to Michael Hartman, Superintendent, PO Box 670, Bronte, Texas, 76933 - 915-473-2511.

Households that list a food stamp or AFDC case number must report when the household no longer receives these benefits. Other households approved for benefits based on income information must report increases in household income of over \$50 per month or \$600 per year and decreases in household size. Also, if a household member becomes unemployed or if the household size increases, the household should contact the school. Such changes may make the children of the household eligible for benefits if the household's income falls at or below the levels shown above.

In the operation of child feeding programs administered by the US Department of Agriculture, no child will be discriminated against because of race, color, sex, national origin, age, or handicap. If any member of a household believes they have been discriminated against, they should write immediately to the Secretary of Agriculture, Washington, D.C. 20250.

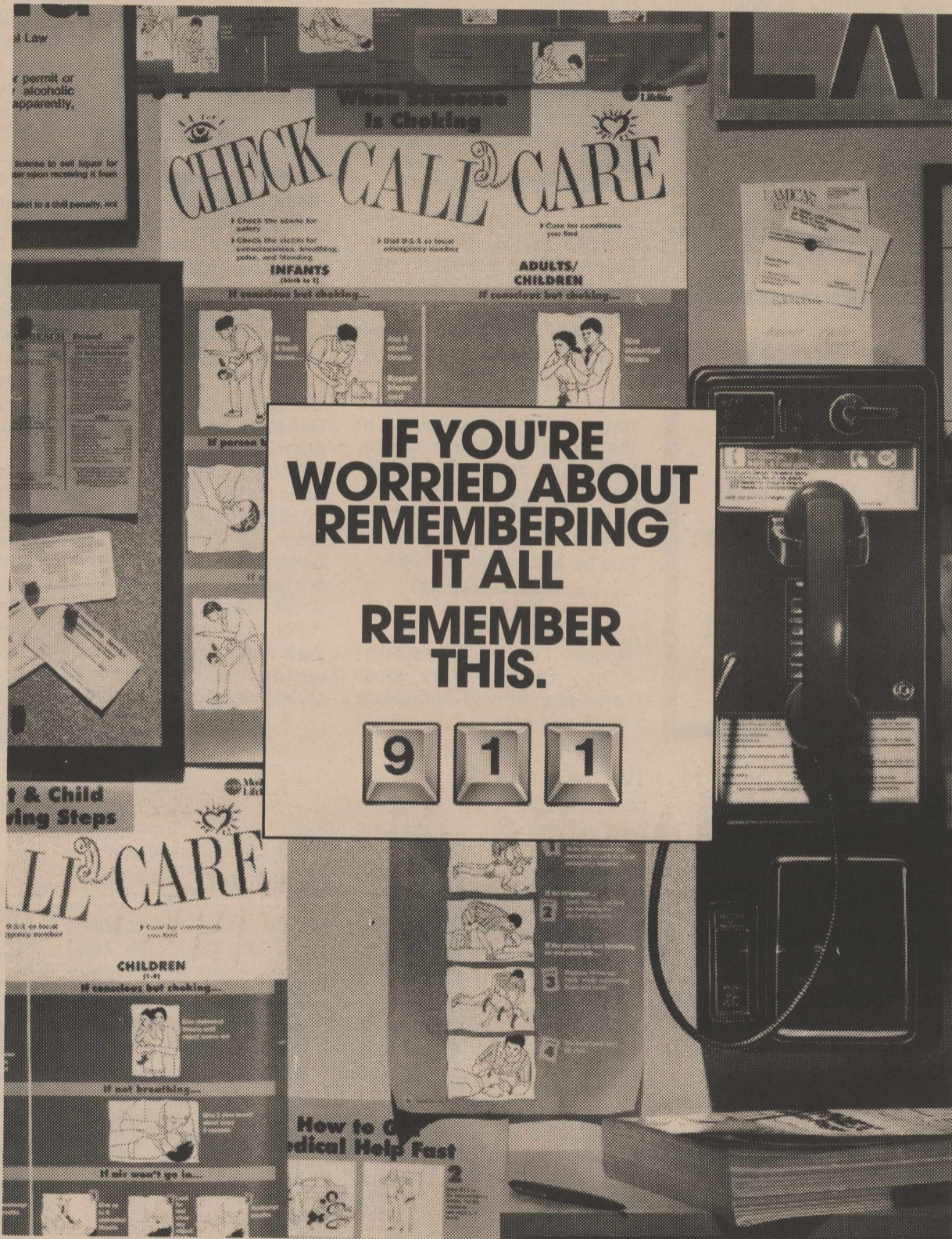

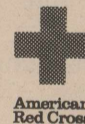
