District Court convenes

Steven Ray Polasek, Criminal Mischief, 3 years deferred adjudication, \$908.73 restitution, court cost \$147.50, \$200 fine.

For the second year, Texas hunting and fishing license bought now will be valid immediately on purchase, for the coming seasons. This avoids buying a temporary now and a new license after August 31 as in the past. Buy licenses now to save standing in lines or be tempted to hunt without new permits.

Most license and stamp requirements are the same as last year. The resident combination hunting/fishing license is \$25 and resident hunting and fishing licenses are \$13 each. Good advice, as usual, is to pick up all free game guides for the 1994-95 seasons and read thoroughly.

Bronte businesses victims of shoplifting

A slick crew of shoplifters hit Bronte merchants Saturday afternoon, August 13th. The team was comprised of two women, two teenagers, and a 6 week old baby, all Hispanic.

Entering stores just before closing time, the team was very adept at using the baby to create distractions with the sales-clerks, and the group then split and used a black "diaper" bag and their oversized clothing to remove merchandise from the stores.

Hardest hit was Cumbie's Mercantile, losing \$675 worth of merchandise, and Celia Bowden's "Antiques & More" with a total of approximately \$200.

Local merchants are taking steps to insure that this type of activity will not happen again. "We want to get the word out to other small town merchants as to what happened," said Susan Williams, owner of Cumbie Mercantile.

"We take it for granted sometimes that these incidents occur only in malls or bigger towns. We need to all be aware that none of us are exempt from the ever-growing crime problem, and adopt some procedures to avoid these occurrences".







Exercise Poseidon-94 involved the sharing of diving instruction techniques between the U.S. and Romania. Joint dives, sunken wreckage salvage, and underwater cutting and welding procedures were practiced.

Ross is one of more than 90 men and women who comprise the crew of USS Grapple. The 255-foot long rescue and salvage ship was designed to save battle damaged combat ships from further damage and tow them to safety.

The mission of USS Grapple reflects the ongoing changes in naval strategy. With the shift in focus from global to regional contingencies, naval forces with their power, speed, strategic agility and mobility often offer the country the best force for addressing crises and conflicts anywhere in the world.

Teach Latch Key kids about food safety

Millions of youngsters who will be on their own at home after school this year could benefit from a few food safety rules to prevent foodborne ill-

Children usually prepare their own snacks when they return from school. Parents can help prevent foodborne illness by reviewing the following list with children:

*Deposit books and book bags somewhere besides the kitchen. They can harbor many harmful germs.

*Throw away any left-over perishable foods brought home from a carried lunch. An exception to this might be unopened cans of foods that are shelf-stable and don't require refrigeration, such as canned fruits and canned

*Always wash hands before touching food.

*Use only clean utensils.

*Keep cold foods refrigerated. Always put milk, meat, cheese, etc., back in the refrigerator immediately and be sure the refrigerator door is closed tightly. Take out only what you plan to eat and refrigerate leftovers from any cans that are open.

*Don't eat any food that looks or smells "funny".

That chain link fence plus is a real eye-grabber.



Riding Drunk

The era of the designated driver has undoubtedly contributed to the dramatic decline in traffic deaths, but even if the driver has not been drinking, passengers who have are more at risk than those who have not been drinking.

Dr. Patricia Waller, director of the University of Michigan Transportation Research Institute, says the notion that people who have been drinking are protected from injury because they are relaxed is a persistent myth. Her statistics show that even with a designated driver behind the wheel, a passenger who has been drinking faces twice the risk of dying from injuries in a crash as those who have not been drinking.

All of the reasons are not certain, but emergency medicine specialists Dr. Brian Zink says it is known that alcohol use seems to prolong the period in which breathing stops than normally occurs after a brain injury.
