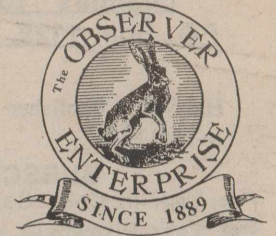

Letter to the Editor

Dear Editor;
I am writing this letter to clarify a few statements made by a DISGRUNTLED past board member.

When hired as administrator I was given the authority to operate the facility in accordance to Federal & State Regulations and the policies of the nursing home. Which included recruitment, employment and discharge of all staff. The Bronte Nursing Home as always, had a person named as Assistant Administrator. The Assistant Administrator is designated by the administrator, to act competently in his/her absence and be familiar with established policies and procedures of the facility.

I asked the Board to approve a different person as assistant, because I needed a person who had a working relationship with the staff, residents, and families, a person willing to change and learn the new federal and state regulations, and a person that had enough energy to work a HARD eight, nine or ten hour day and be able to stand the pressure and traffic in the front office. Candace Phillip's appointment was approved by a majority vote of the Board of Directors.

All purchases or expenses are approved by the Board of Directors at the regular monthly meetings. All the statements, invoices are available for inspection. The debt that we have incurred is from the conference activity room and nurses' lounge being built, and there was not enough money left in the savings account to cover the monthly shortages that we experience.

The auditor and myself cautioned the board about letting the taxes drop too much over the last four years. The board did not take heed. In January of this year I reported to the board that we would be in the red before the summer was over.

As insinuated in the letter, I hire friends. Well, that might be true, but there isn't an

overabundance of applicants just waiting to go to work in the nursing home. Nothing was said when this board member's wife worked here, or their sisters, cousins, granddaughters, or friends. I have no relatives on staff, and I am not prejudiced against people who are divorced, single mothers, or those who live a different lifestyle.

If employees come to work when scheduled, do a good job when here, that's about all an employer can expect nowadays. I pray that God will open your eyes to see what is really going on here!! May God Bless, support, and comfort my other board members, my staff, and my patients that they will be able to endure this time consuming situation.

I thank the citizens of East Coke County who support the nursing home with their visitation, prayers, and non-judgmental attitude.

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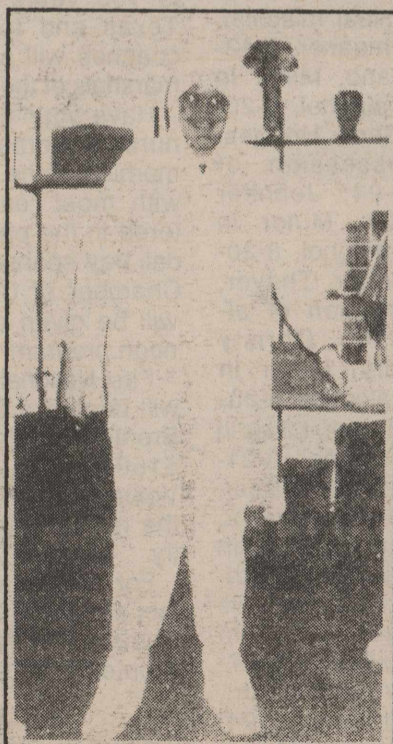

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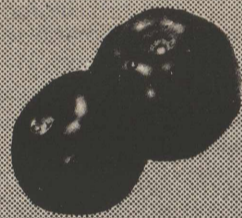
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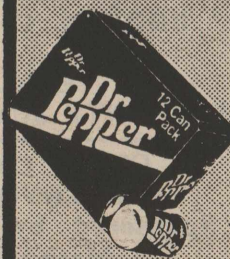

Horns start with win at Cross Plains

The Longhorns began the 1994 football season in August with 8 seniors, 9 juniors, 10 sophomores, and 6 freshmen. After two successful scrimmages with Christoval and Eden, the Horns lost only 1 freshman.

Friday night the Longhorns headed northeast to take on the Cross Plains Buffaloes. You put a herd of Buffaloes on a field with a herd of Longhorns and throw in 4 inches of rain and you have a messy mess. In spite of the wet field and having to run through a herd of Buffaloes, the Longhorns rushed for 138 yards on 32 carries. Keith Treadaway had a great night with 76 yards on 18 carries, Brent Taylor had 49 yards on 7 carries, Russel Vaughn had 10 yards on 5 carries and Cory Robinson had 4 yards on 2 carries. Jason Wilson caught 2 passes for 40 yards and Cory Robinson caught 1 pass for 12 yards.

Seventy five yards in penalties wiped out several long runs and passes. The Horns fumbled 3 times and lost 2.

The offensive line did a good job of shooing the Buffaloes away. The offensive line consists of Phillip Ratliff, James Hambricht, Delvin Pierce, Darrel Sharp, David Cason, and Todd Harrell.

The defense did an excellent job of stopping the Buffaloes all night long. The Horns picked off three passes

and recovered one fumble.

The Buffaloes scored early in the game when they recovered a fumble on the Longhorn 35 yard line. The Horns shut out Cross Plains for the next 3 quarters.

The defense includes Phillip Ratliff, David Cason, Clint Brashear, Delvin Pierce, James Hambricht, Darrel Sharp, Cody Holland, Cory Robinson, Gary Walker, Keith Treadaway and Brent Taylor. These Horns held the Buffaloes to 28 yards rushing the second half. Brent Taylor had 2 punts for a 40.5 average. The Longhorns prevailed 14-16.

In the 1st quarter Bronte took the opening kickoff and fumbled 3 plays later on their own 35 yard line. Eight plays later the Buffaloes scored on a 2 yard run. The PAT attempt failed. The Horns were not able to move the ball on the next series of downs. Russel Vaughn intercepted a Buffalo pass and returned it 10 yard to the Cross Plains 40 yard line. Good running by Treadaway moved the ball to the 4 yard line.

2nd quarter On the next play Keith Treadaway scored on a sweep and the score was tied 6-6. The PAT failed. The next series of downs for the Buffaloes was a long one filled with penalties. The Buffaloes attempted 3 punts, and on the third attempt a bad snap and an alert defense gave the ball to the Horns on the Cross Plains 40 yard line. A 29 yard pass from Taylor to Wilson put the ball on the 11 yard line. Two plays later Treadaway found the endzone again for 6 points. The 2 point conversion from Taylor to Treadaway was good and the Horns lead 14-6. The Buffaloes drove to the Longhorn 5 yard line before a 4th and 1 attempt failed and the Horns defense prevailed.

The 3rd and 4th quarters were a defensive battle. The Horns defense only allowed the Buffaloes 28 yards rushing the second half. Nick

Arrott picked off a Buffalo pass returned it 15 yards to the Buffalo 45 yard line. The Horns moved to the Buffalo 5 yard line before a fumble stopped the drive. Brent Taylor picked off a Buffalo pass and eight plays later the Horns were on the Cross Plains 2 yard line. Two delay of game penalties put the ball on the 12 yard line. A 4th and 12 pass went incomplete and the Horns came up empty. The Horns had a good night of solid football and came home with a 14-6 win. Miles comes to Bronte Friday.

Dysfunctional Eating

Much has been written about the eating disorders of young women, especially college students, but a study by a team of nutrition, psychology and sports and medicine experts from Cornell University and Ithaca College found that more than forty percent of male college lightweight football players had unhealthy eating behaviors, the most common being binge eating.

Researcher Wanda Koszewski says athletes in other sports with weight restrictions, such as wrestling, crew and body building, are at risk for an eating problem that could jeopardize their health.

Athletes have been known to use such high-risk tactics to lose weight as jogging in hot showers while wrapped in plastic bags, using diuretics, laxatives, steroids, amphetamines, self-induced vomiting and fasting before weigh-ins then gorging themselves later. Athletes who achieve hypohydration—low body fluids—significantly increase their risk of injury, especially in a contact sport.

Supplemental Feeding

With the dry conditions we have experienced most of this year, supplemental feeding of livestock this winter has increased in importance for our cattle and sheep to maintain a high level of production. A lot of our pastures are short on available forage, therefore a supplemental feed may need to contain energy as well as protein. If energy is the limiting factor it needs to be remembered that energy can't be stored like protein and livestock must receive adequate levels each day.

The normal protein level needed for maintenance of a 1,000 pound cow that is pregnant is 1.05 pounds of protein per day and one that is in high lactation is 2.7 pounds of protein. For a 120 pound pregnant ewe the protein needed is .33 pounds per day and one in high lactation is .42 pounds per day. These levels of protein are necessary for adequate production. If protein becomes limited it not only can affect the condition of the cow or ewe this winter, but will greatly influence her production for the next year. Livestock deficient in protein will breed slow or not at all, have much lower milk production on their next offspring and will wean a much smaller lamb or calf. Therefore we are not only trying to maintain body condition and production for this year, but we are predetermining what production level that female will produce next year.

Animals that consume diets lower in protein lose their appetites, develop a rough appearance, become weak and possess lowered resistance to diseases, and overall growth, reproduction and weights of offspring are greatly reduced. There is a common misconception that the animal can simply eat more to make up the needed nutrients, but in actuality, low protein levels in forage slow down digestion and the animals actually eat less in a day due to the longer rumination time, thus becoming more deficient in needed nutrients. Protein supplementation on poor quality forage will increase digestion and utilization of this forage.

Remember that it takes more feed and expense to put weight back on than to maintain present body condition. Begin feeding when there is a noticeable decline in body condition or significant weight loss. Supplementation needs to begin before livestock lose 10% of their body weight. To save some feed cost, livestock can be di-

vided into dry animals and those that have a lamb or calf or just about to calve or lamb. Dry animals can be separated and fed less than those lactating. Also, remember that nutrient levels about 5-6 weeks before lambing or calving will predetermine the milking ability of that animal. If nutrient levels are low during this time, no increased amount of feeding will catch up the milking level. Plus animals in good condition before parturition will maintain a higher level of milking ability for a longer period of time, resulting in larger weaning weights. Supplemental feeding is expensive, but it is like the old filter commercials, you either pay a little now or a lot later in reduced production levels.

Counselor's Comments

by Vicky McCutchen

In order to have responsible children, responsible parenting is a necessity. Children who have confidence believe in themselves and their abilities. It takes courage to say no and to stay away from situations that present problems. This confidence enables children to experiment with new ideas and they are able to control their own well-being socially and academically.

Encouragement can be used by parents to help their children develop the above characteristics. Parents must realize that communication is not only words. Actions play an active role in communication: the tone of voice, body language, facial expressions, and gestures. Seventy-five percent of all communication comes from actions, and only twenty-five percent from words. Encouragement should be developed by parents so it can be used even when children misbehave. Children who misbehave are discouraged and they are crying out for encouragement.

Words can be used to destroy self-confidence or develop it and build it up. Comparing siblings behavior and actions may encourage competitiveness between them. Making a statement to a child such as "I really didn't think you could do this well," lets them know you did not have faith in their ability. Statements that contain "yes, but" in them makes a child feel set

up. An example would be "It's good that you made an 85 on this paper, but I think you could have made a 95 if you tried harder." The first part of this statement conveys a good message, but the last part conveys disappointment. A child will remember the last part. A better statement would be "It's good that you made an 85 on this lesson. Is there anything you might do differently the next time?"

Building confidence and courage requires encouraging messages such as these:

"I believe you are just fine as you are - not as I or anyone else thinks you ought to be.

"I have faith in you and trust you.

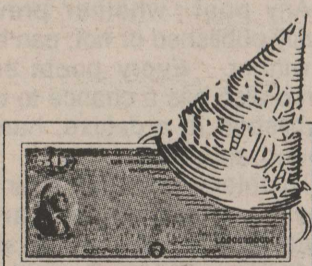
