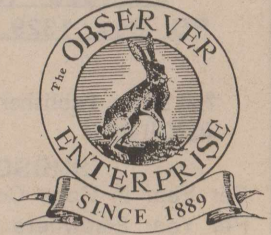

Voter registration deadline

The November 8th election is fast approaching, and now is the time to check the status of your voter registration. If you have moved within the county, or are a new resident of Coke County, your right to vote could be limited if you don't take a few minutes to review your voter registration card and notify the Voter Registrar of these changes.

A new citizen of Coke County can register to vote by filling out a new voter registration application at the County Tax Office in the Courthouse in Robert Lee. Application can also be obtained at the Post Office in Bronte and Robert Lee. These applications are postage paid.

Forms to change your voter registration records can be obtained at the County Tax Office in the Courthouse in Robert Lee, or you can mail a written statement of change with your voter registration card to D. Kristeen Roe, Voter Registrar, PO Box 169, Robert Lee, TX. Any statement of change must be signed and dated.

All applications and changes must be received by October 9th, or postmarked no later than October 11th, to be valid for the upcoming November 8th election.

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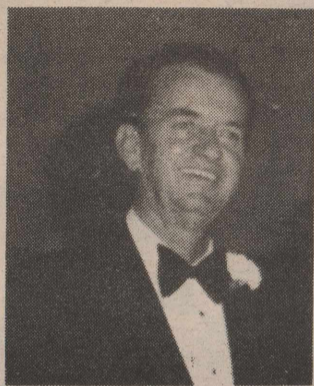

Charles Clyde Lee, 74, of San Angelo died at 10:15 am Wednesday, September 21, 1994, in Shannon Medical Center.

Services were held at 10 am Friday, September 23, at Park Heights Baptist Church with Dr. James A. Miller, pastor, officiating. Graveside services were at 3:30 pm in Oakwood Cemetery in Waco with D. Michael Toby, pastor of First Baptist Church of Woodway, officiating. Arrangements were by Johnson's Funeral Home.

Clyde was born October 21, 1919, in Maverick, Texas, to Edgar Lorenza "Renza" and Bernice Little Lee. Before moving to San Angelo 2 1/2 years ago, he lived in Bronte, where he was an oil landman. Clyde was a member of the Park Heights Baptist Church. He was preceded in death by his parents and one brother, Joe B. Lee.

Clyde was a U. S. Army veteran who served in the 234th, a special military police force. This group was attached to Supreme Headquarters Allied Expeditionary Forces in England. It became known as "Ike's Boys." General Eisenhower called upon this company for all security and ceremonies which included security for "Little Red School House" in Reims, Germany, where the Germans surrendered at the end of World War II.

Clyde was married to Bobbie Roe on February 14, 1946, in Winters, Texas.

Survivors include his wife, Bobbie Lee of San Angelo; two sons, Ronald C. Lee and wife, Kreta of Waco and Charles Craig Lee and wife, Linda of Dallas; one daughter, Janet Lee Richards and husband, Gary of Baytown; one brother, Royce Lee and wife, Betty of Bronte; two sisters, Margaret Martin of Bronte and Dorothy Forbus of Kerrville; and six grandchil-

dren, Robyn Lee, Heather Lee, Amber Lee, Jennifer Richards, Kyle Richards and Timothy Lee.

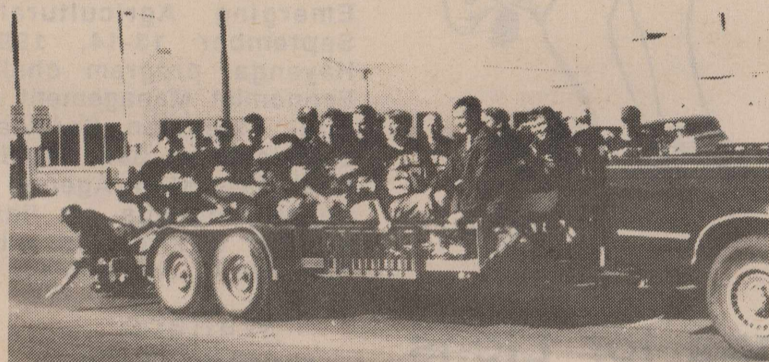

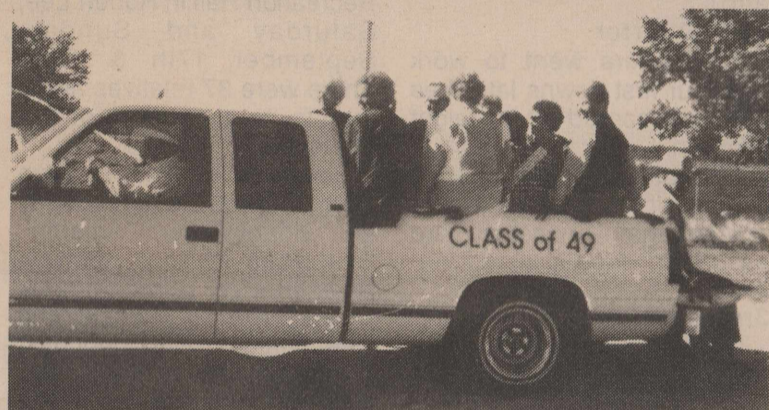

4th Quarter

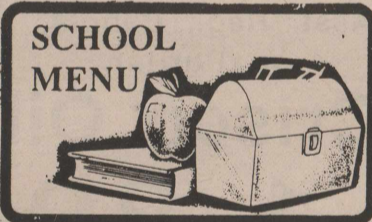

The Bronte Longhorns entertained a large Homecoming crowd Friday night with a 32-0 victory over the Santa Anna Mountaineers. The Mountaineers came to Bronte fired up and ready to spoil the Horn's Homecoming, which they did the first half.

In spite of the fact the first half was scoreless, the Horns were moving the ball everywhere except across the goal line. The Horns had 332 yards rushing on 47 carries and 66 yards passing for a total of 398 yards for the evening.

Keith Treadaway had 114 yards on 10 carries, Russel Vaughn had 110 yards on 19 carries, Kale Beck had 55 yards on 7 carries, Nicholas Arrott had 40 yards on 8 carries, Cody Holland had 11 yards on 2 carries and Cory Robinson had 24 yards on 1 carry.

The offensive line did a good job of moving the "King-size" Mountaineers out of the way allowing the Longhorns good running yardage.

1st Half

In the first 1st and 2nd quarter the Longhorns were able to move the ball up and down the field, but not across the goal line. The Horns failed on several 4th down attempts, turning the ball over to the Mountaineers. The Horn's defense allowed Santa Anna 4 of their 7 first downs in the 1st half. Two fumbles stopped the Horns, but the Mountaineers were not able to take advantage of it. The Mountaineers played good defense stalling the Horns near the goal line.

3rd Quarter

The Horns came out moving the ball with Russel Vaughn and Kale Beck picking up good yardage. Kale Beck pulled in a pass and moved the ball to the Santa Anna 40 yard line. 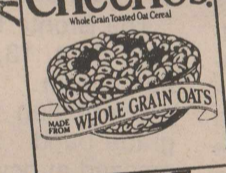

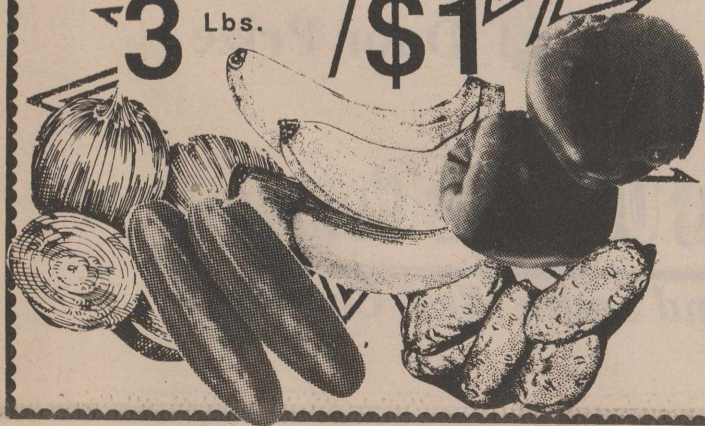

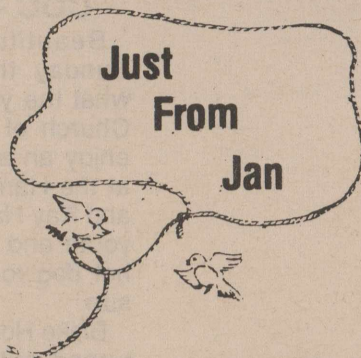

Winning Nutrition for the Athlete

Good nutrition is one choice an athlete can make to provide fuel for the body whether it is to play football, soccer, swimming, walking, or jogging. Like any of these

sporting events, good nutrition has basic guidelines. Athletes must follow and practice the dietary rules to feel great and score those winning points.

What would be the preferred nutritional choices an athlete should make? All athletes need to make dietary choices that provide enough energy in the form of carbohydrates and fats and essential protein, vitamins, and minerals. So, the diet should contain about 55 to 60 percent of calories from carbohydrates with 10 to 15 percent from sugars and the remainder from complex carbohydrates, no more than 30 percent of calories from fat and the remaining 10 to 15 percent from protein.

So, what does this mean in the food choices an athlete must make on a daily basis? Every day an athlete should include grains, vegetables, fruits, beans, lean meats, and low-fat dairy products in his diet. The basis of the diet should come from complex carbohydrates with some sugar. Fluids - especially water - are important to prevent dehydration which can prevent any athlete from playing his best during the competition.

The reasons carbohydrates are so important for the ath-

lete is that the body uses glucose in the blood for energy. When starches or sugars are eaten, the body changes them to glucose - the only form of carbohydrates used directly by muscles for energy. Most glucose is stored as glycogen in the liver and muscles. During exercise, glycogen is broken down in the muscles to provide energy. Usually enough glycogen is present in muscles for 90 to 120 minutes of exercise.

One frequently asked question by athletes is: "Do I need extra protein or protein supplements to build muscles?" The answer is absolutely not. Muscles are built through training and exercise. The USDA Food Guide Pyramid recommends that not only athletes, but all people need the amount of protein obtained by eating two 3 ounce servings from the meat, poultry, fish, dry beans, eggs, and nuts group. In addition, some protein is obtained from the milk, yogurt, and cheese group as well as the bread, cereal, rice, and pasta group. Extra protein supplements are not beneficial for muscle development. Unlike carbohydrates, protein cannot be stored in the body, and any excess will either be burned as energy or stored as body fat.

Boll Weevil eradication headquarters established

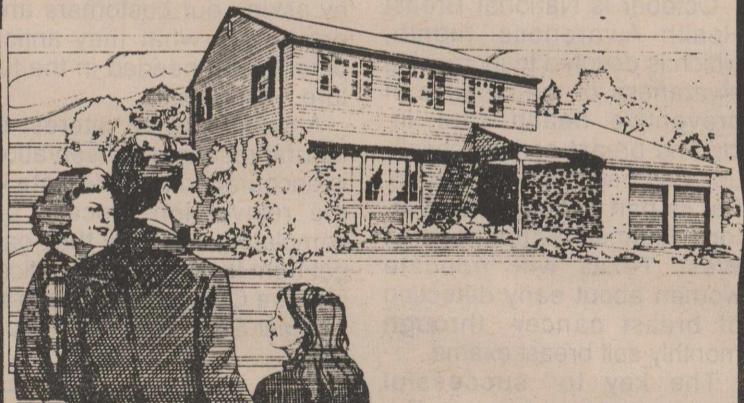
House and Senate conferees working on agriculture appropriations legislation for fiscal year 1995 have agreed to increase funding for boll weevil eradication efforts, according to Representative Charles Stenholm, Chairman of the House Agriculture Subcommittee on Department Operations.

"After working long and hard to secure increased funding, I am extremely pleased that the conferees accepted the House position to provide increased program support for the national boll weevil eradication effort," said Stenholm. "The Boll Weevil Eradication Program Office, which has relocated to Abilene, and the 12-14 new jobs which it brings to the Big Country, will greatly benefit from this increased funding."

The House Appropriations Committee had originally designated \$13.084 million in funding for USDA's Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS) to continue the Boll Weevil Eradication Program; boll weevils have been ranked by USDA at the single most destructive pest in Texas, Arkansas and Alabama. As a result of an amendment Stenholm introduced in June, \$5 million in additional funding was directed to APHIS for boll weevil eradication efforts for fiscal year 1995.

The Boll Weevil Eradication Program is a jointly funded partnership wherein producers contribute 70% of the cost, and APHIS makes up the remaining 30%. Studies have shown that this proven eradication program returns over \$12 in economic benefits to growers and their communities for every \$1 of cost. In addition, the program has resulted in reductions of pesticide use of up to 90% in areas where eradication is complete.

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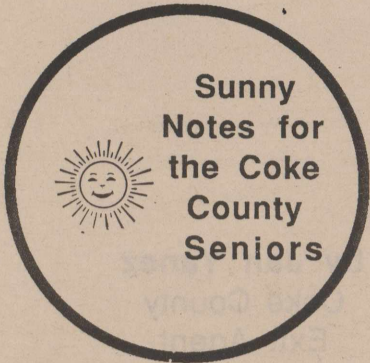

Revenging Montezuma

If you plan to travel to a place where water quality is suspect, an Emory University School of Medicine professor has suggestions that may help you avoid a serious bout with the traveler's diarrhea known as Montezuma's Revenge. Before you leave on your trip, Dr. Phyllis Kozarsky, director of Emory's Travel Well Program, suggests purchasing packets of rehydration solution at your pharmacy to replace body salts and fluid. Pepto Bismol, if you are not allergic to aspirin, and Imodium may also come in handy. Your own doctor may prescribe an antibiotic to take in case you do get diarrhea while away from home.

Dr. Kozarsky recommends replenishing lost potassium by eating bananas and citrus fruits, but avoid dairy products. These and other recommendations are in the Emory University Handbook for Travel Health. She says travelers diarrhea can be more serious than just a nuisance. If it becomes persistent or is accompanied by fever, seek medical attention.

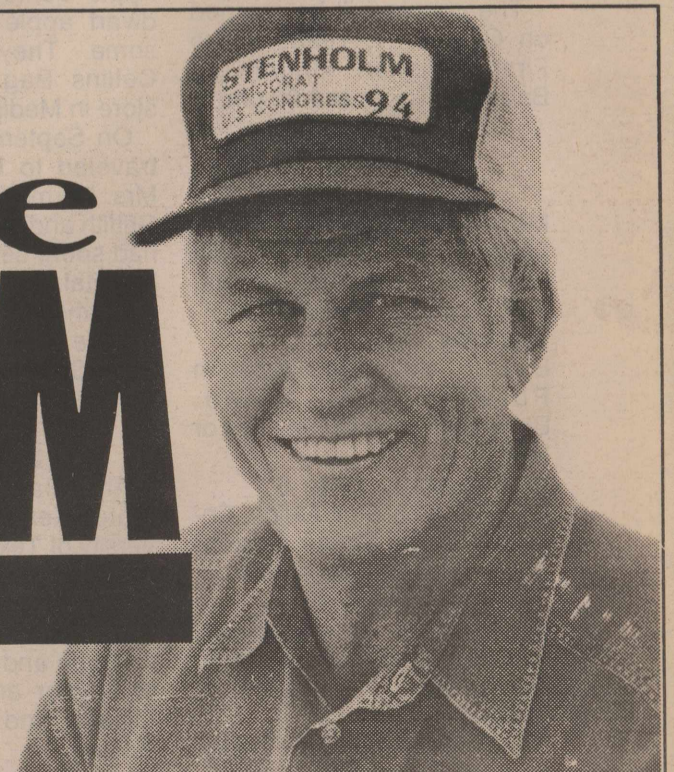

Sims addresses committee

State Senator Bill Sims (D-Paint Rock), addressed the U.S. House Committee on Agriculture's Subcommittee on Department Operations and Nutrition in Cleburne, Texas recently regarding the Endangered Species Act, the proposed critical habitat designation for 33 central Texas counties, and private property rights.

Concerning the proposed critical habitat designation, Sims said, "What we are very concerned about is the Federal government's taking control of private property. The proposed establishment of a 21 million acre, a 900,000 acre or even a ten acre critical habitat on private land is preposterous. There is no doubt in my mind that this procedure would be an act of 'taking' of private property without compensation."

Sims, Chairman of the Texas Senate Natural Resources Committee, has long been concerned about private property rights. During his tenure in the Senate, he has sponsored and actively supported legislation which protected and preserved the rights of private property owners. Sims also organized a joint House/Senate natural Resources Committee hearing at the state Capitol in Austin recently to hear from the U.S. Fish and Wildlife representatives about the Endangered Species Act and proposed critical habitat designations.

In his closing statement to the Congressional Committee Sims said, "I urge that you leave private property rights alone...or get ready for the fight of your life."

94 Influenza and Pneumonia Season Approaches

Each year millions of Americans are afflicted with influenza and pneumonia. Those most at risk are the very young, the very old, those suffering from chronic lung or heart disease and those with weakened immune systems.

This fall, the American Lung Association of Texas urges all those who are considered high risk to get a flu shot. You are at risk if you are over age 65, have chronic lung, heart or kidney disease, reside in a nursing home or other long-term care facility or if you have other chronic diseases. In addition, health care workers should be immunized to reduce the chances of spreading this condition to high-risk people. The shot is recommended every year because influenza virus strain changes annually. The ideal time to receive flu vaccine is between October 15 and November 15.

According to the Lung Association, both influenza and pneumonia are deadly. "Influenza is a highly contagious, potentially life-threatening lung disease," said Dr. William Paul Glezen, epidemiologist at the Influenza Research Center at Baylor University. "Since 1960, pneumonia has been the leading killer by infectious disease in the U. S. It is both the most common and most deadly complication arising from influenza," he explained.

"Combined, influenza and pneumonia are the fourth leading cause of death among all American women and fifth leading cause of death among all Americans over the age of 65," Dr. Glezen said. Lung disease, including influenza and pneumonia, is the third

leading cause of death in America.

Senior citizens are at particularly high risk for both influenza and pneumonia and are most likely to be hospitalized as a result of this deadly combination. Influenza and pneumonia are the fifth leading cause of death for those aged 65 and over, resulting in 68,962 deaths in 1991 alone.

"Only 4% of older adults living in the community receive their influenza shots every year, and only 20% receive the pneumococcal pneumonia vaccine," said Dr. Glezen. "Both vaccines are covered under Medicare and other health insurance programs.

For more information on influenza and pneumonia shots, call the American Lung Association of Texas at 800/252-5864.

The Association fights lung disease and promotes lung health through statewide programs of research, health education, advocacy and community service. Its life-saving programs are made possible by public contributions and community volunteers.

Influenza Fact Sheet

*Influenza is a potentially life threatening contagious disease that is caused by a virus. When the flu attacks the lungs, the lining of the respiratory tract is damaged. The tissues temporarily become swollen and inflamed, but usually heal within two weeks.

*Influenza and pneumonia (the most common complication of flu) combined are the fourth leading cause of death among all American women and the fifth leading cause of death among all Americans over the age of 65.

*In 1991, there were more than 129 million estimated cases of the flu, nationwide, resulting in 249.6 million bed days at a cost to our nation of more than \$11.5 billion. In addition, influenza and pneumonia resulted in 77,860 deaths.

*For healthy children and adults, influenza is typically a moderately severe illness. For unhealthy people, influenza can be very severe or dangerous. In a flu epidemic year, from 20 to 50% of people not immunized may contract influenza.

*Adults 65 years of age and older who contract influenza are much more likely to have serious complications from this illness, which can affect their

health and independence.

*A person can have influenza more than once because the virus that causes influenza may belong to different strains of one of three different flu virus families, A, B, or the rare type C. Type A viruses tend to have disproportionate affect on adults, Type B viruses have a disproportionate affect on children. Both A and B have strains that cause illness of varying severity. The influenza A family has more strains than the B family.

*Flu can be prevented with influenza vaccine. This vaccine is produced each year so that the vaccine can contain influenza viruses that are expected to cause illness that year. A yearly influenza vaccination is about 75% effective in preventing flu and reducing the severity of the flu.

*Target populations for flu vaccine are people 65 years of age and older, and others with chronic health conditions, such as lung disease.

*Most people experience little or no reaction to the vaccine. One in four people might have a swollen, red, tender area where the vaccination was given.

*Influenza vaccines are covered by Medicare and other health insurance programs.

*The best period to receive the influenza vaccine is between October 15 and November 15, before the peak of the influenza season.

*Influenza is very serious illness for anyone at high risk. Certain diseases that place people at high risk include: Chronic lung disease such as asthma, emphysema, chronic bronchitis, bronchiectasis, tuberculosis or cystic fibrosis; heart disease, chronic kidney disease; diabetes or other chronic metabolic disorder; severe anemia; diseases or treatments that depress immunity.

*Some of the symptoms associated with the flu are: fever, chills, weakness, loss of appetite, bodily aches and pains, sore throat/dry cough, burning eyes, and coughing.

*Two anti-viral drugs, amantadine and rimantadine are useful for treating influenza A if given as soon as possible after exposure to or onset of flu. Both drugs are used as preventive medications, but they must be taken daily as long as flu cases continue to occur in the community. Both may cause mild side effects.

*Call the American Lung Association at 1-800-LUNG-USA for more information.

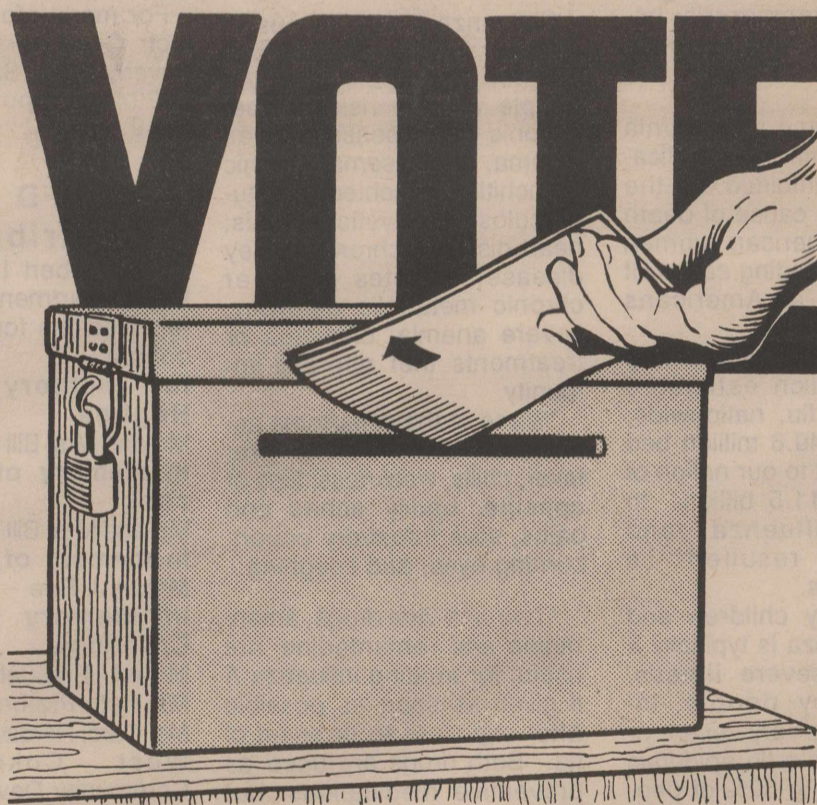
